WILSON RECEIVES NOTE FROM ALLIES

Paul Deschanel Is Formally Made Head of French Republic

Inauguration Ceremony-Power Handed Over by M. Poincare After His Notable Term-Formal Reception Follows Ceremony

Paris, Feb. 18.—Paul Deschanel to-day became tenth President of the French Republic, succeeding Raymond Poincare, who laid aside the robes of office after one of the most critical periods in the history of the country. The formal transfer from the old to the new regime occurred at the Palace of the Elysee this afternoon,

The inauguration of the French President is a formal ceremony and the number permitted to witness the transfer of authority is limited to the Presidents of the Senate and the Chamber of Deputies, committees from each house and members of the Cabinet.

Premier Millerand, shortly before the hour set for the cere mony, drove to the Palais Bourbon, where, as President of the Chamber, M. Deschanel has maintained his residence, and called

On the conclusion of the formality President Deschanel and expresident Poincare were driven through the crowded streets to the City Hall, where they were received by the President of the Municipal Council, the Prefect of the Department of the Seine and the President of the General Council.

Greetings were extended to the President and the retiring Executive and a formal reception followed at which Paris society was liberally represented.

Paris, Feb. 18.—Premier Millerand to-day offered President-Elect Deschanel the resignation of the Cabinet, as is customary on the accession of a new President. M. Deschanel refused to accept the resignation and asked the Premier to remain in office.

A sweeping grant of amnesty will be granted by President Deschanel. Civil and military offenders will be included, the only exceptions being persons convicted of treason against the state.

DISPUTE ON WHEAT PRICE UNSETTLED

Ottawa Has Not Come to Agreement With Greece

Ottawa, Feb. 17—(Canadian Press.)
—The dispute which has arisen over the price of wheat sold by the Canada Wheat Board to the Greek Government shows no signs of being immediately settled. It was stated about a week ago that Lloyd Harris, who acted prominently in connection with the sale of the wheat, was coming to Ottawa, for a conference with the Government, but Sir George Foster, Acting Prime Minister, to-day refused to discuss the matter in any way and stated that he had no knowledge of Mr. Harris's movements or intentions.

Canadian wheat growers, it is understood, are interested to the extent of from \$1,000,000 to \$3,000,000, as Mr. Harris's statement was to the effect that the Greek Government was charged \$3 a bushel when it was agreed, it should be given the same rate as Belgium, which was \$2.47 a bushel. Earlier reports were to the effect that Sir George Foster had the matter in hand.

Coblenz, Feb. 18. — An arrangement has just been completed between the commanders of the American and French armies of occupation for the regular exchange of junior officers for training in the military methods of the other nation. Three American officers will join a French unit in the Rhineland to-morrow for three weeks' service, and French officers of the same rank will join the Americans for the same period.

A similar agreement between British and American armies on the Rhine has been concluded, and the exchange will begin soon.

Calgary is almost sugarless. Distributors are entirely out of white sugar. The supply of brown sugar is also at the vanishing point, and cornsyrup, which not any too popular for sweetening, is the only substitute in quantity.

Reply From Allies Received in States But Not Made Public

Not Eve Summary of Allied Leaders' Statement on Adriatic Situation Will Be Given at Present by American Government

Washington, Feb. 18 .- The reply of the Allied Supreme Council at London to President Wilson's note on the Adriatic situation was received to-day at the State Department from Ambassador Davis and was decoded as fast as it came in.

It was announced officially that the reply would not be made public at this time, and it was indicated that not even a summary of it would be given out. Publication of the reply has been left by the Council to President Wilson, according to London dispatches, but the Council expected to give the press a summary of its contents.

While waiting for the note to be decoded, officials noted from the London dispatches that the reply was said to be a modification of the original one prepared last Saturday. London, Feb. 18.—The reply of the Supreme Allied Council to President Wilson's note relative to the Adriatic settlement was coded and forwarded to Washington by the American Embassy here. Announcement was made that the question of making public the text of the reply would rest with Mr. Wilson.

Mesopotamia and Persia Situation Cause British to Try Plan

Washington, Feb. 18.—Great Britain relies largely on her air forces for the defence of Persia and Meso potamia, according to official advice

potamia, according to official advices received here. Winston Churchill, British War Minister, recently informed Parliament that air bases had been established at Bagdad and Karachi, the latter a port on the Arabian Sea and the terminus of an important railroad.

Military experts here attach great importance to this announcement because it is an innovation in military strategy in two important particulars. It is the first time, authorities say, that air forces have been relied upon to so large a degree purely for defence. Also the impossibility of conducting operations in desert regions has been overcome by carrying on the operations in the air.

Communication

British authorities have feared that Bolshevik troops, which have pentrated Turkestan, might enter Afghanistan and attack Persia from the flank. It is believed that the aerial forces have been organized partly to meet this threatened danger.

Following up the interesting statement to The Times of a surplus of \$1,043,000. of revenue over current expenditure on the operations of the fiscal year 1918-1919, which Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, was able to make when presenting the Public Accounts, the Minister yesterday afternoon was able to show a more striking position as regards the nine months of the present fiscal year, which ended with the close of 1919.

Not only has the revenue come in so well that the receipts for nine months exceed what was expected for twelve months, but they show a surplus of \$1,452,042 over both current expenditure and capital expenditure for the three-quarters.

The estimated revenue for the twelve months ending March 31 next, is \$10,209,960.13. The actual revenue received up to December 31 was \$10.609,454.34 or \$400,000 greater than the whole year. The estimated expenditure for the whole year on current account is \$11,071,113.01, and on capital account \$2,242.190 or a total estimated expenditure of \$1,313,303.01. For the nine months current expenditure amounted to \$7,806,408.43, and capital expenditure to \$1,341,006.05 or a total actual expenditure of \$9,147,-412.48.

There is thus a surplus on the nine months' operations of \$2.803.047 \$1.05 revenue over current expenditure, and a surplus of \$1,462.041.86 over an expenditure, current and capiture. There is in the Canadian Bank of Commerce to-day to the credit of the consolidated revenue fund approximately \$1,645,000.

American firms are said to be conserving their own supply and buying up a large part of the visible supply in Western

Canada for their present use.

H. W. Whitla, K. C., counsel for the Board of Commerce in Winnipeg, telegraphed this morning to the Board of Commerce here, as follows:

"The Chief Inspector of Crown Timber Agencies reports that a serious shortage is being created in lumber supplies in the three prairie provinces by United States concerns buying up large available stocks for shipment South. The United States firms are holding American lumber.



GREAT NEW COTTON AREA IN AUSTRALIA

Lindsay, Explorer, Finds Big Agricultural Tracts in Northern Territory

Melbourne, Feb. 17.—David Lindsay, the explorer, has discovered large tracts of new agricultural lands in the Northern Territory of Australia which previously had been marked on the maps as desert land. The explorer reports that water is freely obtainable at a shallow depth, and that cotton can satisfactorily be grown. He asserts that cotton already is now growing wild over scattered areas.

David Lindsay, the famous Australian explorer, was born in Goolwa, South Australia, of Scottish parents, on June 20, 1856. He was educated at private schools and entered the Survey Department of South Australia in 1872. After being the Junior Surveyor of the Northern Territory and in control of Public Works until 1882, he explored Arnhem Land, in the Northern Territory, in 1883, and the northwest of South Australia in 1884. Later he continued to explore and survey from the Southern boundary to the Gulf of Carpentaria, and rode across Australia from north to south with only a small black boy as companion. For two years he surveyed explored and prospected in the MacDonnell Ranges, Central Australia. He was the leader of the Elder Scientific Exploring Expedition and he crossed the great Victoria District, 550 miles in thirty-five days.

In every attack upon Government policy he drags a skeleton from his own political record before the public view. The Dominion Trust with its trail of death and ruin, the Kitsilano deal, the G. E. scandal, his disregard of the requirements of the laws he was sworn to maintain when he was Attorney-General, the cynical complication of his public duty with his private practice, are but a few items of the chapter of administrative enormities which caused the electors to put him out of of-fice and nearly out of public life. It is a hard record to live down. Certainly it cannot be forgotten or forgiven by the electorate as long as the Leader of the Opposition furnishes no indication in his speeches that he would not do the same things again if he were in office.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—(Canadian Press)
—Official notification was received
by the Government yesterday that the League of Nations-Persia, Chile, Paraguay and Argentina. At the time of the Paris Peace Conference,

Paraguay and Argentina. At the time of the Paris Peace Conference, the four were included among states not represented at the Conference but invited to join. They were named in the annex to the covenant.

Admission of the South American countries is regarded here as of particular significance in view of the stand taken by the Canadian Government in respect of Canada's status and voting rights in the League. Paraguay, for instance, is a country of only 1,000,000 population as compared with over 8,000,000 in Canada, but Paraguay will now have the same voting rights in the Assembly as the Dominion. Before the admission of Paraguay a number of Central and South American states with even smaller populations had voting rights equal with Canada. They, however, were signatories of the Treaty of Versailles, and along with Canada were counted among the original members of the League.

According to advices received by the Government, there is a strong sentiment throughout the Dominion in favor of insistence on full Canadian rights in the League.

heart to see that these farmer folk do not get what is known in the language of the street as a "bum steer." There is no doubt that this country will be a great mixed farming section, but the wonderful little valleys like those of the Mud and Willow will develop in a few years' time into dairying districts of the first order. These nearby valleys are splendidly watered with streams and brooks in abundance, a condition of affairs called for by the dairy farmer. The soil is rich, containing a large amount of virgin humus. This loam has been found very rich indeed in nitrogen. Most of the upland country near us has been swept with fire many times, the result being that the humus on the top has in many cases been burnt almost completely away, with the exception of from one to three inches of the famous chocolate loam of the country. This land, however, can be built up by sowing a good catch of a legume crop, such as clover, and turning it under to a depth of eight inches. The valley-land can be made to grow alfalfa, a good yield being from one and a half to two tons per acre, being harvested twice and used for pasture to a certain extent. A good nurse crop for affalfa in the district surrounding us has been found to be oats.

The settler will want to seed down pastures for his herd. No feed for cows is so cheap as good pasture. Instead of allowing his slashed and burnt off lands to grow a crop of weeds, it could be seeded down to grass and clover between the stumps and made into a good pasture. Divide your slashing by a rail or stump fence and keep changing from one to the other as the pasture gets eaten. There is no reason for allowing a pasture to be tramped and eaten without rest. Here is a good mixture for a permanent pasturage suitable for our climate: Orchard grass, 4 lb.; red top grass, 3 lb.; English clover, 4 lb.; red clover, 3 lb. and Alsike 3 lb. per acre.

If your land doesn't happen to be in the moist valleys, but situated on our upland or bench country, I would recommend the substitution of "tall oat grass" for "red-top grass" and instead of "red clover," alfalfa. This last legume is going to be the great bench land crop for this north country.

Air Board Sets Regulations to Control Aeronautical Development

he Air Regulations for the Do-ion of Canada, 1920, are now to d, and contain many surprises. Air Board Act, the Convention after to International Air Naviga-and a full list of directions and ditions for the licensing and op-ion of aircraft in Canada are in-ited in the publication.

The eleven other clauses are relative to incidentals, and provide for conditions that may arise later.

Clause (b) in the above would presuppose the institution of a government branch of experimental aerial research work. Such a branch would normally follow the advancement made by other countries in types and speeds of aircraft and at all be times be of the utmost value from a stragetical view-point. The latter clause (c) gives promise of government aerodromes and works throughout the Dominion, which points to the fact that the Air Board will institute a department of flying operations for the various department of flying operations for the various department all programs.

Aircraft are to carry registration marks indicating hationality and origin, just as vessels, will also carry log books showing data on all facts required by the Air Board, including number of engine, maker, operator, license number, registered carrying capacity and performance. Aircraft found carrying over the load at which they are registered will suffer, similarly to vessels overloading past the Plimsoll mark.

Indeed the whole situation as applied to aeronautical development and aerial traffic is on all fours with marine navigation.

A large section of the regulations deal with the rules of aerial traffic, riding lights and signals by day and night and the color of the signal will convey the meaning intended.

Examination of personnel and aircraft, and the periodical re-examination of the same has been amply provided for, and there will be no danger of unfit pilots or unsound-craft taking the air with the lives of the public at their mercy. England, according to Mr. Thomson, is not being pinched severely through food shortage, except in the case of butter.

"Butter in England is very scarce," says Mr. Thomson. "Just imagine what it would be like to have to exist on one" ounce of butter a week, as much as you here in Victoria use at each meal. That is the quantity the people in England have to get along on now. Canada was looked to for butter, but this country is not producing enough to meet her own wants."

Conditions Improving.

Mr. Thomson explains that the meat supply is not worrying England much as she has on hand enough to last her for seven months.

"The drop in sterling exchange is also not worrfying the English people much," he said. "Conditions are growing continually brighter. The adverse exchange rate with each successive drop is reducing the importations into England from the United States and increasing the exports.


