UNION FIGHTING TUBERCULOSIS TO MEET IN STATES

New York, Aug. 21.—The International Union Against Tuberculosis, which has just closed its meeting in Brussels, announces that the 12th meeting of the organization will be held in the United States in connection with the Sesqui-Centennial of Philadelphia. The next meeting in 1924 will be held in Berne, Switzerland. The president-elect for the American meeting is Dr. Theobald Smith, director of the Rockefeller Foundation Animal Research Laboratory at Princeton, N. J., and discoverer of the bovine tubercle bacillus. The National Tuberculosis Association also announces that its annual meeting in 1923 will be held in Santa Barbara, Cal., June 18 to 25.

CUBA INVITING SPANISH SETTLERS

Havana, Cuba, Aug. 19.—Increase in the population of Cuba from 2,000,000 to 10,000,000, mainly through immigration from Spain, is one of the purposes of the new Secretary of State, Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, former Cuban Minister at Washington.

The Secretary believes that Spanish immigrants, for numerous reasons, will make the most desirable additions to Cuba's population, and is holding conferences with his colleagues on the best methods to bring these elements to the island. The necessity of checking the flow of workers from Cuban cane fields to Spain, caused by unfavorable financial conditions, and the advisability of counteracting the flood of Chinese, Jamaicans and Haitians is being stressed by Dr. de Cespedes.

POLITICAL MOVE IN SOUTH AFRICA

Nationalists Make Effort to Join With Labor

London, Aug. 21.—South African Nationalist leaders, at a meeting in Johannesburg, advocated working to bring about an understanding between the Labor and Nationalist parties in an effort to defeat Premier Smuts at the next general election, says a Reuter dispatch from Cape Town to-day.

SUMMER HOME IN THOUSAND ISLANDS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Cananogue, Ont., Aug. 21.—In one of the most spectacular fires seen in the Thousand Islands district for years, the Summer residence of Edward Bradley, of New York, situated on Wellesley Island, about 7½ miles from here, was totally destroyed.

LOAN IN INDIA OVER £30,000,000

New Record for Government Borrowing Set Up

London, Aug. 21.—(Canadian Press Cable)—According to dispatches from the Reuter correspondent at Calcutta, India, is not in such a poverty-stricken condition as is depicted by a number of extremist journals, judging from the result of the Government's new loan. Over £30,000,000 has been subscribed, constituting a record for state borrowing in India for a single year. During the past six years India's response to the Government's demand for a loan has exceeded £137,000,000, although before the war the subscription of £3,500,000 was considered an excellent success.

TWO AIRMEN IN INDIA BURNED; PLANE CRASHED

London, Aug. 21.—Lieutenants Luard and Duncan were burned to death when their aeroplane crashed to the ground in flames at Bardonia, British India, says a dispatch yesterday to the Exchange Telegraph Company. The accident occurred when the aviators were ascending with bombs to deal with unruly tribesmen, says the dispatch.

MINNESOTA FIRES UNDER CONTROL

Heavy Showers of Rain Still Needed in Forest Areas

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 21.—With virtually all forest fires in Northern Minnesota reported under control, the state to-day began preparations for a concentrated effort to prevent as far as possible in future any recurrence of disastrous blazes. Steps taken by state officials included establishment of an aeroplane patrol for use until further notice, recruiting of an observation force of forest rangers, establishment of a radio service and assignment of National Guard troops to aid in fighting fires.

BROTHERHOOD IN INDUSTRY IS FOUND BY INVESTIGATORS

Boston, Aug. 21.—Survey committees of the Unitarian Laymen's League, investigating business conditions in the United States and in Canada, in which industrial harmony prevails and conflict is unknown, have completed their reports of 650 surveys, covering both the very largest industries and also many which though small are representative, and the "one outstanding fact which exists in every single case," was announced by the League as follows: "The managers have acted upon their consciousness that all who work in their organizations are fellow human beings—brothers—and the spirit of the managers is also the spirit of the great majority of the workers."

"The Unitarian Laymen's League is not equipped to make complete surveys of all the concerns in the United States and Canada in which industrial harmony prevails, but certainly the fact that in every case reported success in business and industrial harmony have gone hand in hand with action based upon the principles of man's brotherhood with man, is a fact which probably indicates the direction of the wind."

BRITISH COAL SHIP LOADERS ARE WORKING OVERTIME

London, Aug. 21.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The influx of orders for coal due to the strike in the United States led employers on the northeast coast to suggest a continuous loading system by means of a third shift of workers.

Trade union leaders strongly objected on the ground that such an extension would amount to a permanent blacking. They were contending, moreover, that two shifts was sufficient to meet all demands. In the course of the negotiations with the employers, they were concentrated on the second objection, the result being protracted discussions, but an agreement has now been signed under which the men will work two hours overtime daily until October 31, when the matter can be further discussed if a third shift is found necessary.

MANITOBBANS ASKED TO ELECT MINISTERS

Winnipeg, Aug. 21.—It is apparent that the Hon. W. R. Clubb, Minister of Public Works, Morris; Hon. Neil Cameron, Minister of Agriculture, Manitoba; and Hon. D. L. McLeod, Provincial Secretary, Arthur, will have a walkover at the by-elections to be held in those constituencies on September 5.

CUBAN CONGRESS CUTS SALARIES

Havana, Cuba, Aug. 21.—Congress has decided that the country is being overcharged when it pays \$30,251 a year for each of its 24 Senators and \$12,000 a year for each of its 120 Representatives.

COCAINE AND LIQUOR SEIZED IN TORONTO

Toronto, Aug. 21.—Twenty-five one-ounce bottles of cocaine and eighteen bottles of liquor were seized by a squad of provincial police when they raided a house on Simcoe Street here.

GIRLS JOIN RUSH TO HARVEST FIELDS

One in Ten of Those From East Are Females

35,000 Harvesters Come From East; Many to Settle

Winnipeg, Aug. 21.—Comment is very general on the superior quality of the harvest excursionists coming to the Prairies this season. A third of the thirty-five thousand expected from the East have passed through this gateway. The majority are young men, sons of farmers, many of them wearing service buttons. Probably one in ten are girls, and most of them are from the farms of Ontario and the Maritime Provinces. Quebec never did send very many harvest hands to the West.

Distribution has been reduced to a science this season. Each of the Provinces has an official representative on the spot. These Provincial agents have lists of sections where requests have been made for men and women. Every person assigned to a given district knows approximately where he is going. As nearly as possible they are permitted to keep their group formation. For instance, a gang of young fellows from the same rural section of Ontario want to remain together. They are sent to the same town and will from there distribute themselves through the neighborhood.

This season there has been a noticeable increase in the number who want to go to those sections adjacent to available homestead lands. That means that the boys figure on getting a farm for themselves. Always a certain percentage of these excursionists locate permanently. The rule is to fasten themselves on farmers who will employ them through the harvest and into the winter. By next summer they have saved some money, accustomed themselves to their new life and found the homestead they favor.

After next year's harvest they will do their "filling" and probably break up a few acres.

FEUD ENDED IN TWO DEATHS

California Farmer Killed a Farmer and Was Killed

Ukiah, Cal., Aug. 21.—Issue Crespin and John Haynes, aged ranchmen in a remote section of Mendocino County and enemies in a feud of years, "shot it out" with high-powered rifles yesterday. Both were killed. Crespin was about 70 years of age and Haynes about 60. Haynes, it was said, fired first and fatally wounded Crespin, only to be shot in turn and killed by Leo Batt, son-in-law of Crespin.

The shooting fulfilled predictions of neighbors, who had said the two would one day "shoot it out." The feud started years ago over erection of a gate across a road the Crespins had to use to reach their property.

FARMER HANGED HIMSELF

Martinsville, Que., Aug. 21.—The body of Clarence Cassa, a farmer about 50 years of age, was found hanging in his barn Saturday morning.

TWENTY BUSHELS TO THE ACRE

That is Expectation Regarding Wheat in Saskatchewan

Regina, Aug. 21.—Wheat cutting and rye threshing are general in Saskatchewan, according to a crop report issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

In some districts the whole year crop has been harvested, and another week of favorable weather will see the completion of the work of the binders in many districts. The yield will vary in different sections of the province to a wide extent. The correspondent of the branch at Allida, in the southeast section, reports that what will yield as low as twelve bushels to the acre, while from Lammman, in the same district, the report is that the average yield of wheat will be twenty-five bushels.

Little or no damage from rust is forecast in the statements of the field men, but sawflies have destroyed crops to a certain extent. Officials of the branch declared, however, that loss from these pests will be very small as compared with last year.

U. S. SENATOR WAS WRONGED, SAYS HUGHES

Washington, Aug. 21.—Secretary Hughes, in a letter made public by the Republican National Committee, expresses the conviction after a review of the Newberry case, "that Senator Newberry was wrongly and most unjustly convicted."

The Secretary, writing to the Rev. Hugh E. McCauley, of Paterson, N. J., in response to an inquiry as to the "facts" in the Newberry case, gives in detail the findings of the courts, especially the Supreme Court which set aside the conviction of Mr. Newberry.

Mr. Hughes expresses the belief that "there seems to be a general misconception of the nature of the litigation and its result, and Senator Newberry has suffered in consequence of a most serious injustice."

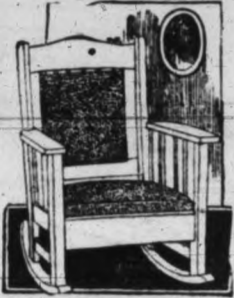

New Game Regulations Issued By B.C. Board

Game regulations for 1922 made by the B. C. Game Conservation Board under M. B. Jackson, K. C., M. P. P., chairman, were issued to-day by Attorney-General Manson.

Open seasons for big game:

1. Moose, males, in A. B. C., Fort George, Omineca, and Cariboo from September 1 to December 15.
2. Cariboo, males, throughout Province, except Queen Charlotte Islands, and that part of Province south and east of the main line of the C. N. R., from September 1 to December 15.
3. Mountain sheep, males, in part of Province north of main line of G. T. P., from September 1 to November 15. In Columbia, Cranbrook and Fernie open season from October 1 to November 15. In part of Lillooet west of Fraser River and south of Hanceville and Clinton wagon road from Fraser River Bridge at Churn Creek to northern boundary of Lillooet district, from September 1 to November 15.
4. Mountain goat throughout Province except south of main line of C. P. R., from September 1 to December 15. South of main line of C. P. R., from September 15 to December 15.
5. Bear on Vancouver Island, from November 7, 1922, to June 30, 1923. Throughout rest of Province, from September 1, 1922, to October 31, 1922. Provided that no bear shall be trapped in any part of the Province.
6. Deer—bucks only, throughout Province excepting Queen Charlotte Islands, North and South Saanich, and Highland District, and south of P. and N. grant, east of Sooke River and Harbor, September 15 to December 15, 1922.

Fur-Bearing Animals.

7. In Western district all fur-bearing animals save beaver, December 15, 1922 to March 31, 1923. Beaver, February 1, 1923 to March 31, 1923. In Northern and Eastern districts to north of the main line C. P. R. from February 1 to May 15, 1923.
- Muskrats in Eastern district south of main line C. P. R. from January 1 to March 31, 1923, trapping in Eastern and Northern districts north of main line C. P. R. for trapping of otter, mink and muskrats from December 1 to April 30, 1923.
- All other fur-bearing animals, except beaver, in Northern and Eastern districts, north of main line C. P. R., from November 1 to March 31, 1923.

Game Birds.

8. Ducks (except wood and eider) —Wilson and Jack Snipe, Black-breasted and Golden Plover, Greater and Lesser Yellow Legs in Northern district from September 2 to December 17, 1922.
- In Eastern district, the same as in Northern.
- In Western district north parallel 53, September 9, December 24, 1922.
- In Western district south parallel 53, from October 15 to January 30, 1923.

Geese and Brant.

9. Geese and Brant in Northern district, September 2 to December 17, 1922.
- In Eastern district the same as in Northern.
- In Western district north parallel 53, from September 9 to December 24, 1922.
- In Western district south of parallel 53, November 11 to February 24, 1923.

Grouse.

10. Grouse and Ptarmigan (except prairie chickadee, sharp-tailed and pin-tailed grouse) in Northern district and portion of Eastern including Omineca, Fort George, and Cariboo from September 2 to November 15. In remainder of Eastern section from September 23 to October 31.
- Blue Grouse—in Western district except South Saanich, Highland district and Cowichan municipality, September 23 to October 31.
- Willow Grouse—in Western district save Island and Comox, from October 15 to October 31.

Quail.

11. Quail, in Eastern district at Similkameen, South Okanagan only from October 21 to November 15, 1922. In Western district (valley quail only) in Cowichan, Esquimalt, Saanich (except Oak Bay municipality), Nanaimo, and Charlislands from October 14 to December 31.

Pheasants.

12. Pheasants (except Golden and Silver) in Eastern district cooke only in South Okanagan, Similkameen

1. Moose and cariboo, bulls over one year of age, in Adin, Omineca to December 15, 1922.
2. Bear in Northern and Eastern districts from September 1, 1922 to June 30, 1923.

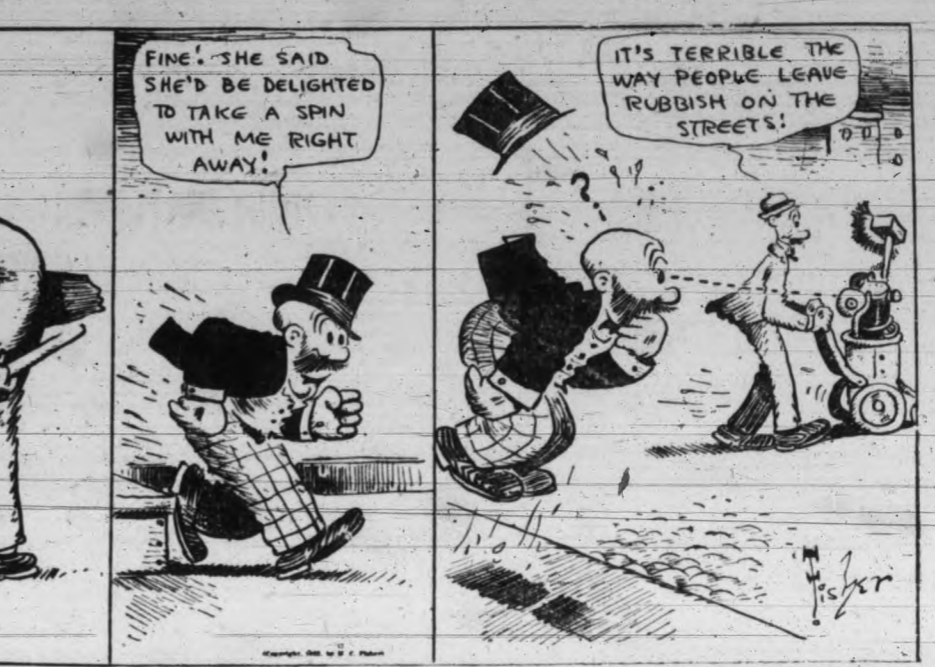
