

October 1-December 31 Recent Acquisitions of Rare Books. Books and manuscripts acquired by gift and by purchase from American and European sources.

ALBERT H. WIGGIN GALLERY

January 1-January 26

Lithographs by John Copley. Lithographs from the artist's own collection purchased from him in 1946 and given to the Library as part of the Wiggin Cellection. Included in this exhibition are some of Copley's portraits and landscapes, scenes of life in Italy, and satirical observations of England and the English.

January 29-February 29
Prints by Corot, Jacque, Daubigny, and Millet.
In addition to showing the more famous etchers,
Corot and Millet, this exhibition places emphasis
on the works of the two lesser known Barbizen
artists, Charles Jacque and Charles Daubigny.

March 2-April 5

Edward Penfield: Posters for Harper's. Posters in color reflecting the influence of Toulouse-Lautree, Pierre Bonnard, and other French artists who were active at the turn of the century. Amusing glimpses of American manners, habits, and customs of the period are captured with sparkle and insight.

April 7-May 26

Toulouse-Lautrec. This exhibition marks the centennial of the artist's birth with more than forty lithographs, including some of the most famous posters. All are from the Library's own collection, one of the finest in the United States

May 26-July 22

English Caricature and Comic Art from the Collection of Draper Hill, Jr. A reminder of the wealth of humor and talent often lost to all but the historians delying into the past. Among the many artists who have long been ignored are James Gillray, Charles Keen, and William Heath.

July 23-September 28

Paris: Prints from the Wiggin Collection. Prints revealing various aspects of a great city as seen by such artists as Charles Meryon, Felix Buhot, Auguste Lópere, Pierre Bonnard, Maurice Utrillo, and others.

October 5-November 18

Etchings and Drypoints by Alphonse Legros. Selections from the nearly complete collection of Legros prints and drawings which was formed during the early part of this century by the late Francis Bliss of London and California, and which was acquired by Albert H. Wiggin for the Boston Public Library in 1942.

November 19-December 31 Nason's New England. For more than forty years Nason has been an interpreter of the New England scene. His favorite country is the back country of lonely farms where a hard struggle for existence is mirrored in weatherbeaten farmhouses and sagging barns.
