



At a simple but solemn ceremony held at the premises of the Selangor Branch of the Indian Independence League on Wednesday at 7 p.m., at which most of the officials of the League were present, the ashes of Sri. Gunanayagam of the Publicity De-partment of the LIL. Rear Headquarters, who died at Saigon in August last, were handed over to Mrs. Kandiah, his mother, by Sri. M. K. Ramachandram, the Chairman of the League.

Sri. Gunanayagam had been connected with the Indian Independence Movement since its very inception in East Asia, He was attached to the Publicity Department and served in the League at Bangkok, Syonan and lastly in Saigon.

The late Sri. Gunanayagam was only 24 years of age at the time of bis death. He was the son of the late Sri, M. V. Kandiah, Accountant of the Federal Treasury, and was educated at Raffles College before the Greater East Asia War started.
