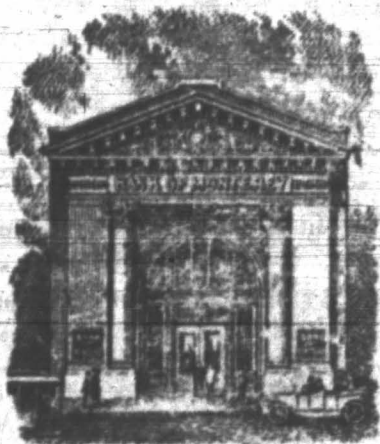

The present owner feels great pride in the age and growth and possession of the account. To many of us this story points the way to moderate wealth. By depositing in a savings bank even \$5 once in a while, and leaving it there, we can have a small nest egg when our earning capacity is on the wane.

Another Tradition Gone.

Another tradition of the United States Supreme Court has been shattered. An associate justice went home to vote the other day. When he argued against Judge Hughes that he had not shown interest enough in public questions even to make a trip to New York for elections, the reply was forthcoming that for years it had not been customary for members of the Supreme Court to spend the time to travel home to cast their ballots. The argument was quieted.

But now Judge Hughes' successor on the supreme bench has shown his independence and his good citizenship by traveling all the way to Ohio to drop his ballot into the box. He apparently does not see the propriety of a justice so far withdrawing from the activities of citizenship as voluntarily to disfranchise himself. It was a fit tradition to destroy.

Truly "It is More Blessed to Give Than to Receive" Knowledge of Spanish Its Advantages

My dear sir:

Your editorial in last week's issue in regard to the "Value of Learning Spanish" is opportune, and will help in the country-wide campaign that is being made to focus the attention of our educators to the value of a speaking knowledge of Spanish in the possession of our maturing generation.

The relations of the United States with Latin America, commercial, political and social, will be their most important relations during these coming decades, and the young man with a working familiarity with the Spanish language, will begin his career with an asset of the value of capital.

There is now, and will be more and more, a demand for young men qualified in the operations of

certain big corporations in the south of us, the first inquiry made, in engaging the services of representatives, is as to their command of Spanish. It is a prerequisite, and as indispensable as intelligence, or health, or probity.

No one result in the schooling of today will bring to the possessor a quicker return for his effort—both in material gain and in opportunity.

For a man to go to South America to sell goods, or to obtain a contract, or to negotiate a deal, or to represent the government in political negotiations, or to take up farm lands, or to work a mining claim, or to get a concession—and not to understand and speak Spanish, would be like a man starting in a foot-race with a millstone around his neck. And opportunities to do all these things are today being freely offered to men properly qualified.

What a fine career for a young man to work out; what a broad horizon; what an interesting field!

English and Spanish and French are the languages of today. Why not put their use in the minds of the American students of today?
