## REMARKS.

THE large general Catalogues which have been distributed throughout the Union, comprise every estimable variety of Fruit ripening throughout the year, and especially such as have been recommended by the different Pomological Conventions, and embrace Trees of the usual sizes for planting in Orchards and Gardens. All are in the most healthy and vigorous state, and will be supplied at the lowest rates named in the present Catalogue; and it may be taken as a rule that we will at all times sell as low, and many articles lower than they can be obtained elsewhere, *of equal size and quality*. The Extra Large-sized Trees, which are in a bearing state, have required many years to bring them to their present size, and are such as seldom can be obtained elsewhere, and are worthy of the special attention of those who desire Fruit Trees for immediate bearing, whereby many years are gained in the planting of Orchards and Gardens. The Extra Large-sized Ornamental Trees and Shrubbery, including the Large-sized Evergreens, are worthy the especial attention of those who desire to promptly embellish their Lawns, Avenues, and other Grounds, and many of them are especially adapted to Cemeteries. None of the Apples and Pears, or other Fruit Trees, are grafted on pieces of roots, as has been unfortunately practised elsewhere.

NOTE.—In consequence of the Railroad which connects Flushing with the city of New York being laid through our largest Nursery of fifty acres, we will supply Nurseries and others requiring large numbers of Trees at reduced rates, as that portion of our lands is required for building-lots. We especially suggest to younger Nurseries the importance to them of securing genuine warranted Fruit Trees of our superior varieties, many of which are not obtainable elsewhere.

All Trees, &c., are labeled and packed in a superior manner, in matted bales or boxes, so that it is scarcely possible that any can be injured, and we charge for the packing barely enough to cover the actual cost. We ship the packages, or send them by Railroad, or by Transportation Lines, or by Express Lines, precisely as ordered, and we forward the receipt for the packages with the Invoice, and there is consequently the best security for their delivery. After being thus delivered, they are entirely at the risk of the purchaser.

## REDUCED PRICES OF STRAWBERRIES.

The following Strawberries have been selected from the varieties that have been brought to notice in this country and Europe, and the others have been rejected. As a general result, all the Hermaphrodite varieties that have been introduced from Europe have proved worthless, on account of their unproductiveness. In fact, it may be taken as a general guide, that Pistillate varieties can alone be relied on for *abundant and regular crops*. A few exceptions exist among the American Hermaphrodites where fair crops are produced; but even these cannot be deemed equally reliable, in all respects, as the Pistillates. It is mortifying to witness the ignorance displayed by many of our Pomological writers when describing the qualities and relative productiveness of the varieties they recommend to the public. To see such long discarded varieties as the Swainstone Seedling, British Queen, Alice Maud, Burr's Seedling, and Duke of Kent's Scarlet, recommended by one late author, and the two last named, together with Brewer's Emperor, Groveend Scarlet, Black Prince, and Willey, recommended by another late author, are the grossest wrongs which ignorance can practice on its readers. The same may be said of most of the Nursery Catalogues, in which unproductive Staminate, that will not produce one-fourth of a crop, are recommended to their customers, not from any wrong intent, but from neglect of investigation.

Scions of Anger's Quince, for budding Pears on, \$1 50 per 100, and Scions of Currants, Gooseberries, Raspberries, Berberries, Mulberries, Poplars, Willows, Figs, Pomegranates, Double Altheas, Roses, and of all other Trees and Shrubs that will grow from Cuttings, \$2 50 per 100 and \$20 per 1000, but no quantity is sent amounting to less than the price of a Tree or Shrub of the same kind. Scions of the six finest species of Osiers, most celebrated for baskets, &c., \$1 per 100 and \$5 per 1000. It is better that such orders be sent in the Fall or Winter, and the scions can be forwarded by express if so ordered.

# TRANSPLANTING TREES.

BEFORE you dig up the Trees intended to be transplanted, or before you unpack any you may have received, you should fully prepare the holes to receive them. But if, from any cause, delay is indispensably necessary for preparing the holes, the trees should be well wet over the roots and branches, and the roots then be well covered in a trench, till you are ready to plant them. It is of great benefit to puddle the roots of Trees before planting them, which operation should be performed thus: Make a hole in the ground four feet in diameter, and two and a half deep, and fill it with water; then pulverize equal quantities of rich mould and old decomposed manure, and throw in, and mix the whole well, so as to form a thick puddle. At the time of planting, place the roots of each tree in the puddle, giving the tree two or three turns until the puddle adheres to every root, then proceed immediately to plant it, the holes having been previously prepared as follows: Make the holes full large in proportion to the size and spread of the roots of the trees, so that they may be spread out, and in no wise cramped. The usual diameter will be three to four feet, and the depth two to three feet. In removing the earth, place the surface soil aside by itself, and cast away the poisonous bottom soil as useless. Mix in with the surface soil about an equal portion of rich mould, and of old well-rotted manure, in sufficient quantity to replace the poisonous soil cast aside, and then pulverize the whole. This done, then spread a portion of the prepared compost at the bottom of the hole, and after having pared any bruised or broken parts of the roots of the tree, place it in position, and at a depth of one inch below that at which it had previously stood. Then, whilst one person holds the tree erect, let another fill in the prepared compost till the roots are covered, treading it down well; then fill up the remainder without treading, as the surface should be loose in order to receive the rains. Make a slight cavity around the tree for the same object, and to receive waterings. When thus planted, water the tree plentifully, and do the same occasionally afterwards, and especially if the weather should prove dry. Evergreen Trees are usually transplanted with balls of earth, and, therefore, the puddling will be dispensed with, unless some of the roots should become bare.
