My son and I saw one April 2nd
at 4:40 PM! and now know what it
looks like - It is like a small
Pilot-less plane - very bright metal -
no - motor noise and looks like the
picture of the German Pilot-less
plane - The center was Ball shaped
and very bright metal - It followed
along the coast line out of sight
coming from the South - heading North.

Later at 5:10 P.M. - same date
a second one came along same
direction and fell in the water



The metal wings were small and evidently broke as I fell as it looked like sheet of metal dropping at the side.

It could be clearly seen as it was a very clear day - we occupy the third floor of an apartment here with all windows in direct view of the Ocean.

We have had count of those seen at night - when there is a bright moon - but I apparently was not seriously considered as reporting photos and had decided when I saw the agent to make it public on the newspaper.

I wrote President Truman - no reply - I told New Pearson - no reply - we gave Major Faulk seal in for material - no reply - films etc - no acknowledgment as I decided no further reports from me.

1. This Headquarters has received numerous reports of sightings of unidentified aerial phenomena alleged to have been seen in the area between Wildwood, New Jersey and the vicinity of Norfolk, Virginia, during October 1948.

2. It is requested your office be alerted in order that an immediate investigation may be made of any future sightings reported from this area.

3. As an aid to the investigating officer, we are inclosing two (2) copies of our Essential Elements of Information forms to be used as a guide when securing the desired data.

b. The second and third articles are bakelite coil forms wrapped with ordinary thin enamel copper wire. These coils indicate that they were skillfully made at one time but were crudely ~~xxxx~~ rewrapped by one not familiar with the art of making a coil. These coils also have no connection with any AMC project.

c. The fourth article is a metallic box which is the remains of an electronic filter condenser made by the Polymet Manufacturing Co. of New York, N. Y. This article also has no connection with any AMC project.

d. The fifth article is the remains of a metallic magnetic ring that could not be identified as any part of any device used at this Command.

4. This information and attached photograph may be transmitted to the FBI to inform various agencies throughout the United States as to what action they deem necessary to take in the event of other similar specimens brought to their attention.

With reference to your letter of 27 March 1948, this is to advise you that Major M. W. Faulk left suddenly on leave due to pending transfer orders. No information or film has been received since the departure of Major Faulk who had been receiving all correspondence in connection with the Wildwood sightings. Only one roll of film has been received; the other two rolls mentioned, as well as additional information, may possibly have been forwarded to Major Faulk at his leave address and not as yet returned to this headquarters. The one roll of film received was processed in the Photographic Laboratory with negative results.

For security reasons, it is impossible to keep you informed of the official action being taken by this headquarters. However, an investigation has been initiated on the Wildwood, N. J. incidents.

This Command is making considerable effort to acknowledge receipt of all information. Your cooperation, as well as the cooperation of all individuals sufficiently interested in the security of their country, is urgently required. It is hoped that you will continue to inform this headquarters, as well as the FBI, of any new developments near Wildwood. The official address for such correspondence is as follows:

I have a letter date 6 April from
Colonel W. F. Clingerman received to day.

In reply I wish to state that I was
very glad to receive same. I knew something
was irregular when after sending information
film etc to Major Faulk there was no
further word from him, so I discontinued
any information. However I did ask
F.B.I. Philadelphia to identify Major Faulk
also the civilian who came with him.

Last Saturday April 3rd a gentleman
called on Mrs. Krueger (who Major Faulk
was when in Wild wood) and identified himself
as a retired Coast Guard officer from
Washington now C. I. Intelligence.

Mr Krueger tells me he questioned
her for over an hour. Had a folder of
photostats of what appeared to him
to be my letters. He held them clearly in
view and she clearly identified my writing.
He did not tell her they were my letters
but read from them. He told her I wanted
to see me. That he had been here in
Wildwood all week and could not find
me. He left a Cape May phone number
of a store there and said they would call
him and left instructions he wished to see
me.

Having been here all week and
saking down the apartment who could
have called me - the C. G. I. never left
my word for me - phoned or called on me.
Naturally I ignored the message. Mr Krueger
gave me. My reason if he had my correspondence
Major Faulk had he read them would
have noted I had told him not to contact
Mr Krueger again - that she had been
notified by her family not to talk
and was very nervous - she has been ill
