1. DETAILS: On 7 August 1950, at approximately 0450 hours (MST), 1st Lt [redacted] [redacted] 3rd Fighter Squadron, Kirtland AFB, New Mexico, while flying at 30,000 feet observed what appeared to be an aircraft at 20,000 feet. [redacted] descended towards the object which disappeared in the distance even though [redacted] was flying at an indicated speed of 620 miles per hour. [redacted] 9-45

2. DETAILS: On 7 August 1950, [redacted] advised that while he was over Santa Fe, New Mexico, at a proximately 30,000 foot, he observed what he thought to be a C-47 or a C-54 transport type aircraft flying at approximately 20,000 feet. [redacted] advised that he then started to descend following the object and that although he was indicating over 620 miles per hour he was unable to follow the object which disappeared in the distance.
