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FOREWORD.

My "REGISTER OF THE DESCENDANTS OF ABNER STANFORD, THE REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER," appeared in 1898 as a kind of circular letter to encourage relatives to inquire and investigate about genealogical facts immediately and easily accessible to them, that they might contribute material additional to that in the REGISTER, as well as correct its errors. The title was too comprehensive for the scope of the work, as it dealt only with descendants of Abner by his second wife. To all who are interested in these, the REGISTER will be found still valuable, for its appendix and chart. It may be found in the Boston Public Library, the Genealogical Library, at Boston, the State Library, at Concord, N.H., and in several other large libraries, as well as in certain small (New England) ones.

The present volume contains so far as has been possible to secure, *all* descendants of Abner. Omissions and errors are to be expected, and it is earnestly requested that any who detect these will kindly call the compiler's attention to them.

A great debt of obligation is gratefully acknowledged to Edmund D. Barbour, Esq., who unhesitatingly placed his valuable manuscript covering the subject in which I was interested, repeatedly at my disposal. In a majority of cases I have personally verified or corrected his material or contributed fresh matter, by examination of original records or by meeting or correspondence with individuals. His great work on the Barbours, in several large volumes, deals with the Stanfords from 1712 onward—since by the marriage of David Stanford and Lydia Morse, the Stanford and Barbour families were related. But, nevertheless, it has seemed to me that there is a useful place for such a volume as the present, along side the much larger and far more comprehensive one, because the present work will be within the pecuniary reach of all who may have any desire to possess it, while possibly the greater one may not.

FOREWORD.

There was no definite purpose to publish at this time; in fact, publication is quite accidental; for it was expected to obtain considerable more original matter, first, from members of the family, with whom the writer had begun to get nicely in touch; but circumstances led to a visit to the Orient, where wholly unexpected leisure led to a sudden decision; if the anticipated increment comes later, it may be feasible to include it in an appendix.

Acknowledgment of much valuable assistance is due Miss Emma Frances Harris, and to the many other generous members of the family, who have done so much to make this

volume what it is.

STANFORD is an ancient surname dating back to the Saxon Chronicles, in which it is found. It belongs to the class of nature-names, and is composed of two elements—stan meaning stone, and ford, a river-crossing. Originally, we may conjecture, one Thomas lived by a river where there was a shallow, stony bottom, or where there was a series of stepping-stones, like those at Ambleside in the English Lake District, over which passage was made; from this casual circumstance, he was designated as Thomas at or of or from or by the stone ford; and then, by degrees, arose the name Thomas Stanford.

Stanford became an English name from the Anglo-Saxon rather than from the Norman, contribution to the total of English surnames. At the present day, it is quite a common name in England, where it may be found in the directory of almost any large city. A recent directory of one of these cities, had eleven Stanfords. The directories of American cities also show that it is not a rare name in the United States, where it has been found almost from the very beginning of English colonization. There were Stanfords in Maryland very early in its history, and descendants of these, under other names, are to-day among the most prominent citizens of Massachusetts, Louisiana and other states. The Stanford family, a part of whose genealogy is given in this volume, dates back in New England history, to within about a score of years of the landing at Plymouth. From about 1650 to the present there seem to have been Stanfords at Falmouth or Portland, Me. In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries there were Stanfords at and about Ipswich, Mass. Quite a number of Stanfords were in the Revolutionary War. Among these were several, as Moses, of Natick, Joseph, of Packersfield, now Nelson, N.H., and Abner, of Upton, who belonged to the family, a portion of whose genealogy is here given.*

These Stanfords are supposed to have descended from Thomas Stanford or Staniforth, who resided at Concord, Mass., in 1644; how much earlier he was there is not known, nor at how early a date he came from England, but he removed from Concord in the above year. As early as 1652 Thomas and Robert Stanford are recorded as owning land at Falmouth Neck, Me., and these names are prominent in the history of that place during the next thirty-five or more years. It is supposed this Thomas Stanford, of Falmouth, was Thomas Staniforth, of Concord, and that he removed from the latter town to Maine. From historical notices, it seems probable that the Maine Stanfords and the Ipswich Stanfords were related.

In the records of the First Church at Charlestown, we find a Thomas Stanford, 'Thomas, ye blinde man,' who 'owned the covenant,' and so with all his family, was baptized and recorded on the parish register. By this we learn that he was at Charlestown in 1680, and it is a proper inference that he was there previously. He married Widow Sarah (Crouch) Jones, and died there about 1695, while she survived till 1707. From this 'Thomas, ye blinde man,' the descent of the Stanfords recorded in this volume, is absolutely clear and demonstrable, link by link, without a break. The first link, however, connecting Thomas, of Concord, with Thomas, of Charlestown, assumed to be a son of the former, while highly probable, yet must be regarded as problematical, until further investiga-

tion shall throw more light upon the subject.

Among the children of 'Thomas, ye blinde man,' was David, the oldest, born in 1680, at Charlestown; while a young man he removed to Natick and then to Sherborn, where, in 1712, he married Lydia Morse and settled down; they had a large family of children, mostly born at Sherborn, and among them was Caleb, born there in 1714; he married Ruth Cozzens, about 1740, and spent a good part of his life at Sherborn, where his children were born; in 1773 and the next few years, several of his children emigrated from Sherborn to Dublin, N.H., where new land was obtainable. He and his wife appear to have gone with these emigrants, and, eventually, to have died at Littleton, N.H., or Concord, Vt., to which places some of his children had removed, attracted by new land opened for settlement. Among the sons of Caleb were Joseph, born in 1745, and Abner, born in 1747. The former was a Minute Man for Peterboro, N.H., serving three days; later, he enlisted from Packersfield. The latter with his descendants by two wives, forms the subject of this volume.

ABNER STANFORD AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

Abner Stanford⁵ (Caleb, David, Thomas, Thomas) b. at Sherborn, May 12, 1747, m. at Mendon, Nov. 24, 1768 (int. there Feb. 17, 1768), Jemima Green, of Mendon, b. at Upton, Jan. 30, 1749, dau. of William Green and Hannah -... At marriage he was said to be of Mendon; in the intention we find Mrs. Jemima Green, but this does not occur in the marriage record, and was doubtless a slip for Miss, as she was not twenty years old. Their marriage was "confirmated by Joseph Dorr, Esqr."* They settled at Upton which was his home until 1789 or later. At an annual town meeting Mch 6, 1786, it was "voted: to choose a committee of fifteen to divide said town into school districts"; the committee reported in favor of six districts, and the inhabitants allotted to each are given. Abner Stanford appears in District No. 1, or "Rawson's District," of which Joshua Rawson and Wilson Rawson were members; all the other districts had at least twenty-one families, while No. 1 had only ten. This was really a part of what should have been the north district, but as the number of families in the north greatly exceeded the number in any other district (east, south, central and west), ten were set off in a special district, with their own school. (See Upton Records, III. pp. 68, 69, 90). Abner thus lived in the north part of the town. He enlisted in the Revolutionary War, Apl 27, 1775, as corporal in Captain David Batchelor's company, Col. Joseph Reed's regiment (20th), credited to Upton. He was at Roxbury, Oct. 24, 1775, and served for Upton practically all the time from the beginning to the end of

^{*} Joseph Dorr, Esq., was a justice of the peace, who was chosen Sep. 28, 1774, a delegate to the Provincial Congress, at Concord, Oct. 11, 1774. He was son of the Mendon minister of the same name and became, later, a judge.

the war in 1783. He was a three years' man in the Continental Army, mustered into Captain Japheth Daniels' company, Col. Thomas Nixon's 5th, later 6th, regiment Apl 21, 1777. He was on the pay roll of this company from Apl 17, 1777 to Dec. 31, 1779 and on the clothing list for five years from Jan. 1, 1778 to Dec. 31, 1782. He was in camp near Peekskill, Feb. 16, 1779, and at the Highlands, Je 12, 1779. He re-enlisted in 1780 for during the war. In 1780 and 1781 he appears in descriptive lists as thirty-three years old, six feet tall, with light complexion, brown hair and blue eyes; one list was dated 'Highlands, Feb. 23, 1780'; the other, 'West Point, Jan. 29, 1781.' He apparently was corporal until Nov. I, 1781, when he was reduced. From Jan. to Dec. 1781 his company was in Lt. Col. Calvin Smith's regiment and he was a private when the return was made. He was on furlo Dec., 1782. He appears on two statements of continental balances. He also is found on a company return of Col. Nixon's 6th regiment for arears of pay, delivered Mch 10, 1784. There are seven autograph signatures by him in the Mass. state archives. He took part in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne at Saratoga, Oct. 17, 1777. His discharge was at New Windsor, N.Y., June or July, 1783. Facts about his connection with the Revolution may be found in the Pension Office, Washington, the State House, Boston, the records of Worcester County, Worcester, and in the town records of Upton. There are thirty-eight cards in the Mass, archives referring to him, and at least fourteen references in the Upton records. See History of Worcester County, by Hurd, Vol. II. p. 910, Chap. 122, Upton, by Wm. T. Davis; Phila. 1889. See also Mass. Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War, compiled by the Secy. of the Commonwealth; Boston, 1892, etc. He was pensioned at eight dollars a month by the United States.

Joel, his last child by Jemima, was b. at Upton, Je 27, 1788; between this and 1796 he separated from her and went to Peterboro, N.H., where his name is on the invoices for 1796 and 1797 and where he resided until about 1799. He next removed to Dummerston, Vt, where, Nov. 24, 1800, he m. (2) Sarah Mackentire, "late of Peterboro." They lived at Dummerston until about 1807 or later, when they are said to have gone to New Boston, N.H., and thence to Chesterfield, where his name is on the town records for 1819, and where, about Apl of that year, he died; tradition says he was buried in the old cemetery back of the town house. He lived about

two miles from the center, on the Winchester road, on the hillside to the right of the road, in what is now a pasture partially grown up to wood; the cellar hole is still there, within sight of the barn now standing on the place where his son Willis lived and died.*

After their separation Jemima continued at Upton until her death Je 5, 1818. She doubtless made a home for Joel and some of her other children, during much of that period. The fact that Joel very soon after his marriage, settled at Upton is probably to be accounted for by supposing he did so to make a home for his mother in her latest years.

Sarah went to live with her oldest son, Duncan, at West Fairlee, Vt., sometime after 1819 and m. there, 1833, Israel Gould, son of ——, and father of her youngest child,

Smith's History of Peterboro.

"He was subsequently pensioned by the United States, as per record in the Pension Office at Washington. At Dummerston, Vt., it is recorded that Abner was married (2d) to Sarah Mackentire of Peterboro, N.H., (one of the good old Scotch-Irish stock that played so large a part in the early history of the town) It is also stated that their son Duncan (Jesse D.) was born at Peterboro, N.H., Sept. 26, 1798. An older sister, Clarissa, was probably born at Peterboro in 1796 or 1797. The name of Abner Stanford is on the Peterboro tax lists for 1796 and 1797, but not subsequently. The invoices previous to 1796 have not been found, and we have no evidence how early Abner came to Peterboro, except that it was probably after June 27, 1788, when his son Joel, by Jemima, was born

at Upton.

"It is not our purpose to go into the history of Joseph or Abner in detail or to follow them to their death, but simply to show their connection with Peterboro.

The first sentence refers, by implication, to Abner's older bro, Joseph. Incidentally it may be stated here that the latter, altho a Peterboro Minute Man, is omitted from the list of Revolutionary soldiers in

[&]quot;Abner Stanford, the next younger child of Caleb, was born at Sherborn, May 12, 1747, but did not remove to Dublin with the rest. He married at Mendon, Mass., Nov. 24, 1768, Jemima Green, settled in Upton, Mass., where he reared a large family, and from there entered the army Ap il 27, 1775, and served almost uninterruptedly, until his discharge in the summer of 1783. His name in this connection, appears repeatedly on the books of Upton, in the county and in the state records. There are thirty eight cards relating to him in the state archives, Boston, the substance of which will appear in the monumental series of "Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the American Revolution," along with the facts about Joseph Stanford, when that series reaches the letter S. The notices of Abner include two descriptive lists, and refer to some half dozen autograph signatures on the originals. He was then a corporal, thirty-three years old, six feet high of light complexion, with brown hair, blue eyes, enlisted for "during the war."

Wrantslow's first wife. See 13. He d. there Oct. 11, 1834, aged 68. She made her home there with Duncan until her death, Jan., 1855; it is supposed she was buried in Sunnybeam cemetery, Thetford, where Israel and his first wife, Martha Sargent, have stones. Israel was a farmer for many years in Thetford, near Sunnybeam. The children by Jemima were all b. at Upton.

The fact that this Israel Taft had a brother Berzaliel, makes it natural that this Israel should name his son Bezaleel. 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Joel Stanford⁶ (Abner,⁵ Caleb,⁴ David,³ Thomas,² Thomas1) m. at Milford, Aug. 8, 1811, by Rev. David Long, Phila (T.R.) Wiswall, b. at Milford, Aug. 4, 1700, T.R., eighth child of Timothy Wiswall and Diadama (T.R.) Daniels. lived in Milford, but spent the last three years of his life at Upton, where he d. Jan. 4, 1815, T.R., aged 26yrs. 6m. 7d. He was a painter and farmer. "His widow survived many years and built a house on a section of her father's estate" which included the present granite quarry between Milford and Braggville. The barn stood where the cutting shed now is; the house stood just across the present road and the trolley line passes between the two sites. She d. of cancer, at Milford, Jan. 23, 1851, aged 59yrs. 5m. 19d., T.R. Both were buried there.

Clarissa Stanford⁶ (Abner,⁵ Caleb,⁴ David,⁸ Thomas,² Thomas¹) m. at Boston, Oct. 20, 1833, by Rev. Benjamin Whittemore, George W. Phipps, T.R. They probably had children. Nothing whatever was known about Clarissa, beyond her name and the fact that my father had such a sister; there was a tradition, however, handed down to me by Lorin Follett, to the effect that she m. at Boston, and went to Maine to live; this led to my discovery of her marriage, but nothing further is known.

Jesse Duncan Stanford⁶ (Abner.⁵ Calcb,⁴ David,⁸ Thomas,² Thomas¹) m. at West Fairlee, Vt., July 4, 1824, by Elisha Thayer, J.P., Eunice Whitcomb, T.R. b. at Fitzwilliam, N.H., Aug. 6, 1795, dau. of Francis Whitcomb and Alice—
T.R. She d. at West Fairlee, May 10, 1857, of apoplexy, aged 61yrs. 9m. 4d., T.R., and was buried at South Fairlee, with stone. He m. (2) at Fairlee, July 25, 1857, by S. T. Morey, J. P., Sarah Kendrick, T.R., b. at Lyme, N.H., Nov. 8, 1810 (Leb. T.R.), dau. of Thomas Kendrick and Alvina—.

Jan. 1, 1838 he bought for \$400, of Midas King, of Landaff, N.H., a farm of nearly one hundred acres, lot 5 range 6, in West Fairlee, on what is still known as King Hill. Duncan lived there until after his second marriage, when, Apl 5, 1858, he deeded the farm in consideration of \$ 1000, to S. N. Southworth and Calvin M. Holbrook, who probably were acting as selectmen for the town; for it is said that Duncan deeded his farm to the town on condition he should be allowed the use of it for a home so long as he lived, and on condition he should be aided by the town in case he required such aid. At the annual town meeting March 1, 1859, it was "voted to refer the matter of taking Duncan Stanford's farm, to the selectmen." The selectmen's report covering 1859, says: "we have purchased the Stanford farm.....Balance due on the Stanford farm, \$ 292.83." At the annual town meeting, March 5, 1861,

the selectmen were appointed "a committee to settle with Duncan Stanford" for the above balance. At the annual meeting, 1862, the town voted to secure the selectmen from all legal liabilities "for giving a warrantee deed of the Stanford farm and for their paying over the money and interest for one year." Presumably if Duncan had elected to live on his farm, he could have spent the rest of his days there. It is said that Sarah was discontented and persuaded him to move to Lyme, and that then he wished to get the value of his farm from the town, but this was not granted. He went to Lyme about 1860 and lived there until about 1874, when he returned to West Fairlee, and died there Oct. 28, 1875, T.R., at the house of Loren Spaulding, near Berry's Corner, Blood Brook. He was buried at South Fairlee? She d. at Buttmanville (Lebanon), N.H. at her sister's, —, home, Oct. 23, 1899, and was buried at Lyme in the David A. Warren lot, without stone. were no children by her. 42

Philinda Stanford⁶ (Abner,⁵ Caleb,⁴ David,³ Thomas,² Thomas¹) m. at Chesterfield, Sep 11, 1823, by Jacob Amidon, J.P., Peter Follett, T.R., b. at Winchester, Nov. 2, 1796, son of Benjamin Follett and Demaris Whitcomb, of Winchester, T.R. Benjamin was a Revolutionary soldier. They lived on a farm in Winchester, on the Chesterfield road; about three miles below the farm where Willis Stanford lived and died. moved (to Halifax, Vt., but later?) from Winchester Chicopee Falls, in 1849, where they kept a boarding house. She d. there of consumption, Nov. 3, 1854, and was buried there, T.R., with stone. He ni. there (2) July 26, 1855, by Rev. R. B. Thurston (Cong'l), Mrs. Emeline E. Brown, a mill operative, b. at Whitingham, Vt., —— 1820, dau. of James Aldridge (Aldrich) and ——. They moved to Niagara Falls, C.W., about 1856, but returned about 1859; about 1862 or Spring, 1863, they moved to Jacksonville, Vt., where they remained until about 1869, when he went to live with his dau., Mrs. Flather, while she went to live with her only child, by Brown, Mrs. Sophronia (Brown) Nash, at Avoca, N.Y. Noth-

Willis Stanford (Abner, Caleb, David, Thomas, Thomas) no. at Keene, Jan. 1, 1826, Elinda Fassett Adams, b. at Winchester, Nov. 22, 1806, dau. of Elijah Adams and Anianda Fassett. They lived at Keene, Marlboro and Gilsum. She died at Keene, Oct. 30 (31, T.R.), 1857, and was buried there in Washington Street cemetery, with stone. He m. (2) at Keene, Jan. 13, 1858, by Rev. Newhall Culver, Laura Stiles, of Keene, b. at Harrisville, N.H. (at that time in a part of either Nelson or Dublin—probably the former), Apl 14, 1819, dau. of Abraham Stiles and

Oct. 17, 1857, Willis bought a small homestead at West Keene, of John W. Binney and mortgaged a part—one acre and a hundred twenty-four square rods, on the south of the Chesterfield road, to secure a note for \$200, loaned by Levi M. Adams, of Keene. This land extended from the corner of Chauncey B. Billings' land along the Cheshire railroad, along John Elliot's land and along Billings' land. The mortgage deed was signed by Willis and Elinda. Aug. 29, 1863, Adams assigned this mortgage to C. H. Stanford, to whom Willis on Aug. 21, 1863, in consideration of \$100. received from C.H.S. and of his assumption of the \$200. note and interest, had quit-claimed this land.

On Mch 29, 1858, Willis and Laura, for \$350, paid by Chas. Carter, of Keene, deeded him two acres with buildings, on the west side of the road to

Westmoreland.

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Oct. 17, 1864 Willis and Laura, of Keene, for \$1200. sold Chauncey B. Billings, of Keene, their homestead on the north side of West Street, containing about two acres,—the same land as that sold to Willis by Isaac Rand, Jan. 4, 1849 and Mch 18, 1850. About this time they bought a farm of fifty-two acres at Chesterfield, about two miles from town, on the Winchester road. His name first appears on the tax lists in 1866 and then continuously until his death.

He d. there Mch 17, 1884, of asthma, and was buried at Keene, in Washington Street cemetery, with stone. She d. at Chesterfield, Sep 29, 1900, of senile dementia and was buried at Keene, in Woodland cemetery, in the Amasa Brown lot, with stone. He was a farmer. There were no children by Laura.

Wrantslow Stanford (Abner, ⁵ Caleb, ⁴ David, ³ Thomas, ² Thomas ¹) m. at Thetford, Dec. 4, 1834, by Rev. Jacob P. Huntington, Christiana Gould, of Thetford, T.R., b. there Nov. 21, 1811, dau. of Israel Gould and Martha Sargent.

They lived at Thetford when first married, probably on the bluff, at Sunnybeam, on the Israel Gould farm, now owned by the Burrs; later at West Fairlee, near the lake (where the present creamery stands), on the Wilmot estate; possibly he lived within Post Mills line. They next moved to King Hill, West Fairlee, and were neighbors to Duncan Stanford. The record of this purchase is in vol. 4, p. 446 of the Land Records at West Fairlee. Rensalier Rowell, of West Fairlee, sold Christiana Stanford, of Thetford, for \$220, thirty-three acres of land, lot 6 range 6 (south-easterly third) bounded by land of Duncan Stanford, John P. Southworth, Alden B. Collcott and by the highway (on the west) from James Fallows' place to Middle Brook—being land shortly before owned by Arnold A. Elliot. The date was Mch 18, 1840, but on Nov. 20, 1841 this property was deeded back to Rowell. There was a small house on the premises, where one son, Freeman, was born. Later the Tituses occupied this place (\$\scrt{Se}\$ 42). The cellar hole with narrow "apple cellar," is still in good preservation with clumps of family lilaes about it. It is north of the Duncan Stanford farm on which the barn, on the west side of the road, still remains (\$\scrt{Se}\$ 9); it is also perhaps half way up the hill from that place and not far below the dilapidated shack on top of the hill, where the old King buildings stood. Subsequently the family moved to Post Mills and lived in a house at the village, owned by Dea. — Hinckley. From there Wrantslow went alone to Lowell, to secure work, leaving his wife and children at Post Mills. This was probably sometime between 1845 and 1847; for Charles Higgins, of Post Mills, says that Wrantslow went before the railroad at Thetford was built, on the construction of which he himself and Loren G. Stanford (\$\scrt{Se}\$ 71) worked in 1847-8. Afterwards he moved his family to Lowell, but his two older boys were "put out" to families at Thetford.

Christiana died at Lowell, Mch 14, 1854, and was buried there in Edson cemetery, with stone. He m. (2) at Lowell, Aug. 6 (Aug. 1, T.R., a mistake), 1854, by Rev. Eben B. Foster (Cong'l), Elizabeth Longley, b. at Shirley, Je 10, 1818, dan. of Elijah Longley and Betsey Stone. See Chandler's Hist. Shirley.

They lived at Lowell until 1859 or 1860, when he moved his family to

Lunenburg, while he worked at the Wason Car Shops, Springfield. His name is on the tax lists at Lunenburg for 1860 and 1861. May 6, 1862 they bought a farm of eighty-two acres, in the easterly part of Chelmsford, on the county road to Billerica; Apl 11, 1871 they sold this, moved to Lowell and from there, in 1873, to Chicopee and then, 1875, back to Lowell.

He died there Apl 29, 1876, of pneumonia, and was buried there in Edson cemetery, in the family lot (lot 11 range 45), with stone. He was a carpenter and worked continuously for the Merrimack Man'f'g. Co., at Lowell, for twelve years, when because of poor health, he made a change and soon went to farming; he had weak lungs and 'old fashioned consumption,' with occasional hemorrhages. After some years of very hard work on the farm, they decided on account of his poor health and for the sake of affording the children better educational opportunities, to return to the city. From 1871 until within a few years of her death, she was a boarding house keeper at Lowell, Chicopee and again at Lowell. She died there Oct. 11, 1892, of heart failure, and was buried in the family lot, with stone. Her last years were passed at the home of her daughter, Anna. They attended John St. Cong'l. Church, Lowell, of which she was almost a lifelong member.

He enlisted at Bradford, Sep 25, 1861, for three years and served in the disastrous Peninsula Campaign inaugurated and bungled to a conclusion by that great cunctator, McClellan, whose Fabian policy inured to the benefit of his enemies. Freeman was mustered into company B, sixth regiment Vermont volunteer infantry, at Montpelier, Oct. 15, left with his regiment on the 19th, for Washington and from there, on the 24th, for Camp Griffin near Lewinsville, Va., where presumably the winter was passed, during which the regiment suffered terribly from typhoid fever, diphtheria, measles and mumps. It was joined to the second, third, fourth and fifth Vermont regiments to complete the Vermont brigade which in the original organization of the Army of the Potomac, was in Gen. William F. Smith's division of the fourth corps under Gen. Keyes; but upon organization of the sixth corps, May 16, 1862, the Vermont brigade was the second in the second division, in this corps, under Gen. Smith. The sixth regiment broke camp Mch 10, 1862, to begin field work in the Peninsula Campaign; it first met the enemy at Warwick Creek, Apl 5, and shed its first blood, without loss of life, the next day. The battles in which it participated from Mch to July, were Warwick Creek, Apl 5, Lee's Mills, Apl 6, Williamsburg, May 5, Golding's Farm, Je 27, 28, Savage's Station, Je 29, White Oak Swamp or Bridge, Je 30; it also probably engaged in the siege of Yorktown, Apl 5—May 4; it was thus in the Seven Days' Battles before Richmond, some of the severest contests during the war.

Gen. Wm. Buel Franklin (1823–1903) says of this terrible week: "My experience during the period generally known as 'the seven days,' was with the sixth and second corps. During the whole time between Je 26 and July 2 there was not a night in which the men did not march almost continually, nor a day on which there was not a fight; some men fell by the wayside and were captured; they had no food but that which was carried in their haversacks and the hot weather soon rendered that uneatable. Sleep was out of the question and the rest obtained was while lying down awaiting an attack or sheltering themselves

from shot and shell."

Freeman was attacked by diarrhea at this critical juncture, the disease became chronic and he was removed from the front to the U.S. Genl. Hosp. at Newark, N.J., which he entered Aug. 20; he died there Oct. 4, 1862, and was buried in the Greenwood national cemetery at Fairmount, near Newark, in the soldiers' plot, with stone uniform with those of other soldiers. He was unmarried.

The regiment was composed of ten companies, A to K, from Middlesex county, and in June, took up quarters at Camp Cameron, Cambridge, left for war Aug. 17, 1861, and was stationed at Fortress Monroe from Sep to May, 1862, when it was the first Union regiment to march into Norfolk, Portsmouth and Suffolk; it joined the Arny of the Potomac, at Fair Oaks, Je 13 and shed its first blood Je 18, in Woodland Skirmish. "I can trust them anywhere," said Hooker of this regiment at this time; it was fighting at Peach Orchard, Je 25 and at Glendale, Je 30. "There is no doubt that at Glendale, the sixth Mass. saved the army," wrote Hooker to Gov. Andrew; it was at Malvern Hill, July 1, Bristow Station, Aug. 27, Second Bull Run, Aug. 29, 30, Fredericksburg, Dec. 12-14, "where Northern blood drenched the banks of the Rappahannock"; then at Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, July 2, 3, Wapping Heights, Locust Grove, July 18, Mine Run, Barker's Store, and a part of the battle of the Wilderness, May 5, 1864; it was attached to the second army corps, fourth division, second brigade of the Army of the Potomac.

Albert was mustered out July 27, 1864, he and seventeen others being the only original members of the company who completed the full term of enlistment. Before going to war he was an operative at Lowell and to this work he returned.

He married there May 13, 1865, by Rev. Amos Blanchard (Cong'l), Nancy Fuller Howard, T.R., b. at Washington, Me., Apl 5, 1847, dau. of Rev. Francis Howard (Free Baptist) and Hannah Linscott. They lived at Lowell. In the Autumn of 1867, he went to California "to better himself," and worked in a grain store, at San Francisco; she was to come out in the Spring; she arrived Apl 2, 1868, but had become disaffected and estranged, and, after twenty days, left on Apl 22, by steamer, for New York, "with her trunk marked Annie Fuller." They had no children. She is said to have m. (2) at Buffalo, N.Y., Apl 11, 1870, Theodore DeForest Deland, a mechanical engineer, by whom she has one son, Clyde Osmer, b. at Union City, Penn., Dec. 27, 1872, an artist who lives with his parents at 4429 Osage St., Phila.

Albert was soon lost to his friends, but in 1875, Overseer Taylor, of the Tremont mills, Lowell, who was going to California, was asked to inquire for him; he met him at Carson City, Nev.

Arthur, wrote him and he replied from Carson, by a single letter, in 1875; in 1876 he wrote once, from Wadsworth, Nev., to Anna; in 1877 he wrote once from Cornucopia, Nev., to his parents; and on Je 10, 1878, he wrote from Mill

City, Cornucopia, Elko Co., Nev., to Anna, since when nothing has been heard from him. In that letter he spoke hopefully of returning home: "will be back there by Thanksgiving or Christmas, if nothing happens to prevent"; he also mentioned an uprising of the Bannock Indians, who were on the war path and had already killed several white men; arms and amunition had been distributed by the Governor, and one party had left there that night for the front and another was going. Possibly he was killed by the Indians.

His first schooling was at Chelmsford, but later he graduated from the Green grammar and the high school, Lowell, entered Dartmouth College, then the sophomore class at Amherst College, where he graduated B.A. in 1882 and received the degree of M.A. in 1886; he graduated B.D. at Vale Divinity School. in 1885, and pursued a postgraduate course of one year there in 1886. In the summer of that year he received appointment as a missionary of the American Board, to Japan. He was ordained at the First Congregational Church, Lowell, of which he and his wife were members, Sep 15, 1886. They sailed from San Francisco, Oct. 19, and arrived at their station, Kyōto, in mid-November; for nine years he was professor of Old Testament exegesis and literature in the theological department of the Dōshisha; she engaged in evangelistic work among the churches, with more or less teaching in engaged in evangelistic work among the churches, with more or less teaching in the Döshisha girls' school and elsewhere; on return from furlo, they resided at Tottori, Matsuyama and Köbe, where both taught in Köbe College for girls, of which she was acting principal for two years. They have traveled in Hawaii, Korea, Northern China, to Pekin and the Great Wall, Shanghai and Southern China, Hongkong, Ceylon, India, Egypt, Palestine, Europe, etc. They studied some months at Berlin, during their furlo, where he matriculated at the University of the China and the China and Southern China. sity of Berlin and took courses under Weiss, Baethgen, Strack and others. In 1903 his health became seriously impaired, necessitating a return from Japan to the United States. The summer of 1904, they spent in Ireland, Scotland and England, largely in the open air, with much walking; they tramped over the English Lake District for five weeks, in which Mrs. Stanford's walking record was three hundred and forty miles and Mr. Stanford's, three hundred and eighty. Upon their return, they made their home at Auburndale, where Mrs. Stanford became superintendant of The Missionary Home, established some years ago by the late Mrs. Walker. In the Spring of 1906 Mr. Stanford went to Japan for a few months, as director of a party of tourists.

But the entire disappearance of the boot and shoe business in these Mass. towns, so that, at present, a visitor would receive no faint suggestion of this flourishing enterprise, is one of the striking phenomena of economic and social changes necessitated by the constantly developing industrial life of the nation—phenomena of much interest to the sociologist as well as to the economist.

They became acquainted at Lowell, where she had gone to work in the Merrimack mills, soon after the breaking up of her home, by the death of her father, in 1857. From Northport, they drove far up into the wilds of Maine, to a hamlet called Patten, where he settled, Sep. 6, 1862, and began the practice of medicine; he soon became a very successful and popular homeopathic physician at Patten and for miles around. Patten is, today, a smart little village, but it is still "a jumping off place"—into the woods. What must it have been in 1862, only twenty-two years after Lorenzo Wadlin and others, petitioned the court for incorporation as a plantation — No. 4 of range 6, assigning as a reason that they were "upwards of forty miles from any town or organized plantation by any possible road," and they found it rather inconvenient and expensive going to vote. Dr. Stanford began housekeeping in a couple of rooms over a store, in a shack of a building, which was at once his home and his office. They had desperately hard work to keep warm some of the time in winter, and their stock of furniture was limited; yet his wife has said that she was never so happy in the home of comfort where she was reared, nor in any home of her own since, as she was during those first early days of getting a start. A man's life consists not in the abundance of his possessions. He first appears on the tax list in 1863, when they had settled cosily in their own home; for he was assessed for a house, stable, office and lot, at \$ 650, as well as for a horse and a cow. With this modest little home on Parsonage street, they lived happily and prosperously with his enlarging practice, for but little over five years, when he was thrown from his carriage to the frozen ground, while on a professional visit into the country, in the autumn of 1867; he sustained internal injuries to the liver and had frequent hemorrhages until his death, Mch 29, 1868; he was buried with masonic orders, at Patten and has a stone. Citizens there today who knew him well, speak, with emphasis, of the marked impression he made on the community and of the high esteem in which he was held. Leland Stanford⁸ (Josiah, Lyman, Abner, Calcb, David, Thomas, Thomas) m. at —, Sep 30, 1850, Jane Elizabeth Lathrop, b. at Albany, N.Y., Aug. 25, 1828, dau. of Dyer Lathrop and Jane Ann Shields.

He became a lawyer in 1849, but after three years practice at Port Washington, Wis., the gold fever was irresistable and he went into the diggings in California. In a few years he secured gold eno to enable him to settle as a merchant at San Francisco (See 84). He rapidly became a popular and influential leader in politics, business and public enterprises. He was a delegate at the convention in Chicago, at which Abraham Lincoln was nominated for the presidency, and he was elected Governor of California in 1861. He was one of the great wargovernors on whom Lincoln leaned heavily for support and counsel. Far seeing

and shrewd, with a keen eye for the development of the Pacific Slope, he advocated a transcontinental railway, and became president of a company formed in 1861, for its construction. The stories about his personal superintendence of the construction and about the number of miles of track he laid in a day, are well known. He also helped to construct other railroads, and he soon became known

as "the railway king."

Shortly after the death of their only child in 1884, they determined to found a university as a memorial of that son. It is related that when considering this matter, they visited Harvard University. After having been shown all about, Mr. Stanford suddenly inquired what such a university plant was worth; when he was told, it is said that Mrs. Stanford, eagerly grasping his arm, exclaimed with that intensity and ardor so characteristic of her: "we can do it, Leland, we can do it!" He was twice elected to the United States Senate, from California, 1885 to 1897, but died during the latter term, at Palo Alto, and was buried there. After his death a question arose as to whether he had not defrauded the United States in some of his railroad transactions. The question was carried to the courts and Mrs. Stanford was cut off, temporarily, from the use of most of her income. It is said that she was allowed only one thousand dollars a month. She had been contributing largely from her current income, to the resources of the University, and it would cripple the institution seriously to have that contribution cease; she resolved to give the bulk of what was allowed her, to the University, saying, "I have seen the time when I had to live on \$100. a month, and I can do it again." Her interest in orphanages and hospitals is well known. But the founding and endowment of the Leland Stanford, Jr., University, at l'alo Alto, where their fine estate was located, will be the lasting memorial above all others, to perpetuate their names and ensure enduring gratitude from the public. After his death, her interest and generosity towards the University was unflagging, and on her death, the bulk of her fortune went to it; this institution has become one of the most richly endowed seats of learning in

Beside their large country estate at Palo Alto, they had a magnificent residence on Nob Hill, at San Franscisco, popularly referred to as the Stanford Palace. This was destroyed in the great earthquake and conflagration of Apl 18,

1906.



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
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
