Every one is familiar with the fact that on sligging a note, say middle C, into a plianoforte, the middle C-string will re-spond and vibrate in sympathy, but that the other strings do not. Or, again, on howing one tuning-fork, a second tuning-fork will respond if of the same pitch or tune.

The note of the sound emitted by any instrument is dependent upon the period of vibration, or oscillation, of the instru-ment which in case of middle C, is two hundred and fifty-six per minute. 


