## ORNAMENTALBRANCHES

Dramegand Pastisg.-This department reecies liberal aitention. Superior facilities are furnisiced, under a competent Instructor, exclusively deroted to this department, for the study and practice of Linear and Perspective to this department, for the study and practice of Linear and Perspective Colors.

Music.-Vocal and Jnstrumental Music receives special attention. Instruction in Vocal Music is given to the whole school, at regular periods.
The ladies are allowed to substitute these branches, together with German and French, for some of the higher studies in Mathematies, and for the Latin and Greek
The classes in Mensuration, Leveling and survering, are practiced in the use of the Quadrant and other instruments, and in Plotting.

In the department of Ancient Languages, the classes are practiced in oral and witten exercises in Latin and Greek, throughout the Course; and, in the third year, in writing translations from Latin into Greek, and from Greek into Latin. In addition to the books above named, Zumpt's. Latin Grammar and Kümer's Greek Grammar are used.
Anthon's Classical Dictionary; Smith's Dictionary of Greck and Roman Biography and Mythology, Ramshorn's Latin Synonyms, Robinson's Lexicon of the New Testament, ard Forbiger's Ancient Geography, are recommended as books of reference.
Regular courses of Lectures will be given in Natural Philosophy and Chem istry : and occasionai Lectures on Astronoms, Geology, and sach other sul)jects as the wants of particular classes may recuire.

The classes in the First Year of Academic studics have exercises in reading and analyzing Milton, Thompson, and other pocts, in connection with course of familiar lectures on the principles of English Grammar.
A Nommal Class will be formed, (when required) and special attention will be given to those who may wish to prepare themselves for the important duties of teaching
A Brbical Class will also be formed for the henefit of such as have the Ministry in riew.

Commerchal Departmext.-In this, Lectures on Commercial Law, Political Economy and Mercantile Etiquefte will be given. The conrse includes all that is refuisite to the Practical Accountant.

## LOOATION

## --:0:-

Williamsport is one of the most heautiful and healthful places in the state. It has never been subject to epidemics of any kind. No student las hitherto suffered in health by a residence here. On the contrary, many coming to the School sickly, have returned fully restored. The location is central and accessible from all quarters. The Railroads, now completed, bring us within a fcw hours ride of Elmita, Lockhaven, Danville, Pottsville, Harrisburg, Hollidaysburg, Philadelphia, Baltimore and New York. No more desirable position for a Seminary of Larning can be found.

## ORGANIKATION.

The school is organized on the most approved plan of the best Institations of New York and New lingland. It embraces both sexes, under the same goverument and instruction. The President's family and the Teachers occupy apartments in the building, and have a constant oversight of all the Students.

## ACCOMMODATIONS

The buildings will accommodate (two in a room) about two hundred students. They are of brick and heated by furnaces in the cellar. The rooms are large and well ventilated. In the entire arrangement of the buildings, great care has been had for the comfort and health of the occupants. The grounds contain about seveln acres, affording sufficient room for exercise and play.

> BOARDING, ETC

All students from a distance are required to board in the Seminary. By the following list of prices it will be seen that our total charges are quite as low as those of any Institution of like grade in this State; not excepting those schools in which cheap scholarships have been sold. We desire to bring down the cost of education to the lowest point possible, and thus afford to the masses, sound, intellectual, and moral culture. Board, including washing, (10 pieces, ) room and fuel, is $\$ 2.35$ per week.

## DISCIPLINE

The discipline is mild, but firm and impartial. While every encouragement will be civen to the orderly and studious, and due allowance be made for routhful indiscretions, ret the lawless and refractory cannot long remain among us,
RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Every student is required to attend religious services at the opening and close of school, each day, as well as public worship morning and evening, every Sabbath, at such place as parents or gnardians may designata.
N. B.-Each student must be supplied with a Bible, to be read wilhoul not or sectarian comment, in the morning and evening services of the Chapel. The whole school read in concert.
LITERARY SOCIETIES

Besides the regular weekly exercises in Composition and Declamation, there are three flourishing Literary Societies in the Institution : the "Pelles Lettres," "Gamma Epsilon," and "Tripartite Union," each of which prepares and reads to the school a paper once a month. Ahout 1600 vols. are in the Societies Libraries.

## MERIJ AND i) EMERIT

A strict weekly record is kept of all the exercises of the School, from which record the students will be graded.

A record of demerits is also kept. Tardiness, unexcused absences from required exercises, and all disorderly conduct, will subject the student to demerit marks. Three such marks may bring a private reproof before the Faculty ; six, a reproof before the Ladies or Gentlemen, as the case may be; nine, a public reprimand before the whole school; and twelve may send the offender away. Semi-Sessional Reports are sent to parents when requested.
TO YOUNG MEN

Several steady young men can have employment in the Institution, and thus meet a large portion of their expenses.

Schools also can be had by Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to teach. Applications are made from a distance for competent teachers.

## A WORD TO PARENTS.

1. Try to have your children here at the commencement of the term. The classes are then formed and it will be better for all concerned that the student start regularly with his class.
2. If possible, do not call them away during the session. Alsence, if only for a few days, disarranges the classes, and is generally the beginning of irregularity on the part of the scholar.

Do not allow your children to leave the school before the examinations, unless it camnot be aroided. Serious inconvenience, to all concerned, often arises from a neglect of this caution
4. Supply them tery speringly with spending moner. Parents cannot be too cautious on this point
$\therefore$ Select for your child one of the lustructors, as a Patron, to distribute his funds. In this way a more judicious use of your moner will be made, and your child be kept from many temptations
N. B. -These last two suggestions are to be regarded as established rules of the school.

Students not boarding in the Institution, must observe the following additional rules

1. Attend Evening Prayers
2. Must attend all the Seminary Exercises punctually.
3. Must spend the intervals between recitations in the Study Hall.
4. Must account for all absences by written excuse without delay, time and number of recitations being specified.
5. Mnst not visit the rooms of hoarders, without permission.

## BY-LAWS.

During the hours of study, the students shall not be unnecessarily absent from their rooms.
2. At the time appointed to attend prayer, recitation, lecture, or other exercise, each student shall repair quietly and promptly to the place designated.

At no time shall any student loiter in the halls, or about the doors, or fudulge in jumping, wrestling, loud talking, whistling, or anr other unnecessary noise, or in the use of tobacco, in the building.

The students shall not be absent from their rooms at night after the hour of study indicated by the ringing of the bell, nor shall they at any time, attend parties, or mixed assemblies, without permission from the President; nor shall they, at any time, visit taverns, eating houses, depots, or other places of public resort, or on any occasion indulge in the use of intoxicating liquors.

All profane and indecent language, playing at game of chance, injuring the property of the Institution or of the citizens, , uarreling, fighting, or the the property of the fistitution or of the cifizens, ftarreling, fighting,
6. No student shall leave the limits of the town for a longer time than one hour without permission.
. Each student will be held strictly accometahle for any damage he or she may cause to the Seminary property
. The Teachers and Steward must, at all times, have access to the students' rooms, and if it be judged necessary, the rooms will be cleansed at the expense of the occupants.
9. Cleanliness of person and of apparel, and a gentlemanly and lady-like deportment must be observed by all.
10. No water, dirt or other material, shall be thrown from any window in the buildings, or down the hot air flues, or into the halls after they have been cleamed.
11. The occupants of the Boarding House must have their rooms swept and in order, and their lights extinguished, at the established hours.
12. No student will be allowed to go a bathing, skating, fishing; gunning or riding, without permission
13. The students must not visit the kitchens, dining room, or any other room, except their own, without permission.
14. The Sabbath must be strictly observed by all. No walking about, visiting, or receiving of visits, except by friends from home, will be allowed. All must attend public worship twice during the day, at such place as they or thei guardians may prefer.
15. No lady shall at any time receive calls from gentlemen at her own room Friends from a distance can see the ladies in the parlor.
16. The young ladies will not be allowed to leave the Seminary grounds, at any time, without permission ; and the gentlemen will be restricted at the discretion of the Faculty
17. The students are expected to pay proper respect to the Steward, as well as to all officers of the Institution.
18. No student shall change his or her room, or boarding place, without special permission from the President.
19. No student will be permitted to leave the school, during its session, without an express request from the parent or guardian, made to the President and with the consent of the Faculty
20. Any student who, without just cause, shall fail to attend the examinations, will be considered as under censure, and will be so marked on the next Catalogue.
21. Permission to be absent from any exercise must be obtained, if possible before the absence occur.
22. No student will be permitted to leave any class without the consent of the Faculty
23. The Ladies and Gentlemen must not visit each others' apartments walk or ride together, without permission; nor converse together from the windows.
24. Students from the neighborhood will not be permitted to visit home at such times as will interfere with the regular exercises of the school.
25. Any offending student may be punished, according to the nature of the offence, by private or public reproof, suspension, dismission or expulsion.
26. Students dismissed or expelled, must leave the premises at once.
