APOTHECARIES': 20 grains = 1 scruple; 3 scruples = 1 dram; 8 drams = 1 ounce; 12 ounces = 1 pound.

AVOIRDUPOIS (short ton): 27 11-32 grains = 1 dram; 16 drams = 1 ounce; 16 ounces = 1 pound; 25 pounds = 1 quarter; 4 quarters = 1 cwt.; 20 cwt. = 1 ton.

AVOIRDUPOIS (long ton): 27 11-32 grains = 1 dram; 16 drams = 1 ounce; 16 ounces = 1 pound; 112 pounds = 1 cwt.; 20 cwt. = 1 ton.

TROY: 24 grains = 1 pennyweight; 20 pennyweights = 1 ounce; 12 ounces = 1 pound.

CIRCULAR: 60 seconds = 1 minute; 60 minutes = 1 degree; 30 degrees = 1 sign; 12 signs = 1 circle or circumference.

CUBIC: 1,728 cubic inches = 1 cubic foot; 27 cubic feet = 1 cubic yard.

Arbor Day is a legal holiday in Ariz., Fla., Md., N. M., Wis., and Wyo., the day being set by the Governor: In Tex., February 22; Nebraska, April 22; Utah, April 15; R. I., second Friday in May; Mont., second Tuesday in May; Ga. first Friday in December: Colo. and Me., (school holiday only), third Friday in April; in Oklahoma, the Friday following the second Monday in March: in Ark., first Saturday in March.

Every Saturday after 12: California in public offices: Ill. (in cities of 200,000 or more), Md., Mich., N. Y., N. J., Ohio, Pa., R. I., Va., D. C. (for banking purposes) and in New Orleans, La., and Charleston, S. C.; in La. and Mo. in cities of 100,000 or more; in Tenn., for State and county officers, and in Colo. and Ind. during summer months.

There is no national holiday, not even the Fourth of July. Congress has at various times appointed special holidays. The President's proclamation designating Thanksgiving Day makes it a holiday in D. C. and Territories.

THE METRIC SYSTEM.

Length.—Denominations: Millimetres (mm.), centimetres (cm.), metres (m.), kilometres (km.).

10 mm. = 1 cm.; 100 cm. = 1 m.; 1,000 m. = 1 km. Note.—A decimetre is 10 cm.

Weight.—Denominations: Grams (g.), kilos* (kg.), tons (metric tons).

1,000 g.=1 kg.; 1,000 kg.=1 metric ton.

Capacity.—Denominations: Cubic centimetres (c. c.), litres (l.).

1,000 c. c. = 1 l. Note.—A hectolitre is 100 l. (seldom used).

Relation of capacity and weight to length: A cubic decimetre is a litre, and a litre of water weighs a kilo.
