Kearns Decides to Take His Financial Chances With Gate Money

SHELBY, Mont., July 3 .- Jack Kearns came to town on the morning train from Great Falls and, in accordance with his new plan to take charge of the fight promotion, went at once to fight headquarters and began to oversee the ticket sales. A large staff of United States internal revenue men also landed in Shelby to protect the government in current sales of tickets and to tally the government's due from past sales. The box office men said they could account for every penny, and that the government would receive all amusement tax due.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 3.—Jack Dempsey and Tom Gibbons will fight at Shelby tomorrow for the world's heavyweight championship under the agreement reached here at 2:30 a. m. (mountain time) today by which Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, agreed to accept the \$210,000 already paid him and take a chance of collecting \$100,000 out of the first gate receipts.

Where formerly ratio of mining versus farming was 81 to 13, the ratio now has become 63 to 30, the institute's report disclosed. The advancement of agriculture in South Africa is attributed by the institute to the introduction of modern farm methods and im-

"The two great enemies of machinery in South Africa, however," the institute declared, "are oxen

and negro labor." American farm machinery is being widely used in South Africa, according to the institute.

The institute called attention to the agricultural possibilities of Africa, asserting that the richest farm land in the world, along the Nile, in Egypt, is still being worked in the crude way it was done 5000 years ago.

Emil Neuenfeldt is the man who has made this city probably the greatest frog city in the country today. His "city of frogs" is located in his diminutive back-

The million frogs are kept in concrete trenches each 50 feet long and six feet wide. Each is fitted with a refrigerating plant and running water. The frogs are brought in from nearby creeks and marshes. During the harvest season as many as fifty men are employed.

By means of the refrigerating plant Neuenfeldt leads the frogs to believe that winter has come. Their croakings cease at once. They are fattened and the legs marketed, without causing neighbors the slightest inconvenience.
