In his communication Mr. Sorby says in part: "Owing to the general ra of prosperity there is a genera nhancement of land values due not to enhancement of fand values due not to any act or enterprise on the part of the present owners, but to the mere fact of increased population, and the consequent municipal activities and developments following upon the growth of the city. It is within the knowledge of yourself (the mayor) and the council that as soon as any enter-prise is started or some large building erected in a secondary neighborhood where land can at the moment be bought cheaply, all the surrounding property, before unsaleable, is im-mediately enhanced in value. This sudden increase is not in any way due to the enterprise of the owners, but solely to extraneous causes, to the mere fact of the development of the city, which I take to be a collective term, as no unit can thrive on itself. All such developments mean increase in civic expenditure on roads, water, lighting, police, fire protection, library, parks, schools, board of health, etc., in which all dwellers within the muni-cipality participate. any act or enterprise on the part of business and retiring from the council, but he believed he could do good work for the city in the new position. 
Toronto, June 30 .- Ontario election
