Mushroom Spawn Seto Champignonbrut Culture. Mushrooms may be grown in cellars, under benches in green houses, or in sheds wher-ever the temperature of 50 degrees can be kept up during the winter. The beds should be made from November to February, according to the time the Mushrooms are wanted, and it requires about two months for them to begin bearing. Secure fresh horse dung, free from straw and litter and mix an equal bulk of loam from an old pasture with it. Keep this under cover, taking care to turn it every day to prevent it from heating, until the pile is large enough to make a bed of the required size. Three or four feet wide, eight inches deep and any length desired are the proper proportions for a bed, but this may be varied. Prepare the mixture of loam and manure, making the bed in layers and pound-ing down each with the back of a spade. Leave this to heat through for a few days, and as soon as the heat subsides to 90 degrees make holes in the bed about a foot apart each way, into which put -pieces of spawn 2 or 3 inches in diameter; fill up the hole with compost, and at the expiration of a week or 10 days the spawn will have thoroughly difused itself through the bed. Spread layer of soil over the heap to the depth of 2 inches, and cover with 3 or 4 inches of hay, straw or litter. Ex-amine bed often to see that it does not get dry. 
