

00 LIEUTENANT COLONEL ALLENS WORTH.

A splendid audience of representa-00 tive colored people filled the main auditorium of Wesley Chapel M. E. church on the ninth of April to a reception and banquet tendered Lieutenant Colonel Allensworth by the Southern California Real Estate and Invest-00 ment Company, in honor of his retire-00 ment from the regular United States 00 Army and promotion from Major to 00 the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Mr. C. C. Flint, president of the 00 real estate company presided, and up- 00 on the opening of the reception he 00 congratulated his company for the 00 good fortune of having Colonel Allens-75 worth for its business manager, and 75 the colored people of the city for having in their midst the only colored man who had ever been placed on the re-00 tired list with a rank as high as Lieu-00 tenant Colonel.

The most effective of the many 00 speeches that were made, with the ex-00 ception of Colonel Allensworth's, were 00 those of Lieutenant Williams, Captain 00 Crumbly and Rev. Pack.

Lieutenant Williams informed the 00 audience of the many hardships to 50 which a colored soldier was exposed, and of the courage and manliness one 00 must possess in order to succeed as had Colonel Allensworth. On the race 00 question as it affected the army like his old neighbors of Atlanta DuDois, 00 Bowen and J. Max Barber, he was 00 strong and uncompromising.

Captain Crumbly spoke of the ca-00 reers of several colored soldiers who, 00 through the want of riper experience al.: had failed.

Rev. Peck was proud of our present 00 leaders, and could not see why the race should not succeed.

Colonel Allensworth was given a great ovation as he came forward to respond to the speeches; the response was in the nature of a reminiscence of his life in the army. For a half hour or more he kept the audience laughing continually at the way he kept the erring colored soldiers out of trouble, and how he overcame foolish, prejudice the white soldiers entertained for colored officers.

By that time the audience had be-25 come fully conscious of the importance 00 of the occasion, and through the suggestion of the president they went forward at the end of the speaking and congratulated the gray-haired victor and acknowledged their appreciation of the good name he had made for them. The evening was pleasantly and successfully closed by a banquet in the basement of the church.

The Binghampton (N. Y.) Republican says:

In Texas the Negroes have purchased two hundred and sixty acres of land, and started a seclusive colony. No one but a Negro will be permitted to buy land there or build a house. That is all right as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough. In Texas wild land can probably be purchased for twenty-five cents to a dollar an acre.

If the Negroes segregate and go in large numbers, there will be no such thing as going away back. Wherever there is a crowd is the center of the world, and the sun will revolve around it just as it goes around New York City.
