
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

Town Warrant.

Article 1. To see if the Town will accept the List of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen.

Art. 2. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library.

Art. 3. To act on report of town officers.

Art. 4. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will authorize the town treasurer to hire money under the approval of a majority of the selectmen to pay the current expenses of the town.

Art. 6. To choose all necessary town officers (one school committee for three years, one assessor for three years and town clerk for three years, and vote on the question, "Shall licenses be granted to sell intoxicating liquors?" "Yes" or "No."

Art. 7. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs of ways and bridges.

Art. 8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, transportation of scholars, and repairs on school buildings.

Art. 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of the poor, salaries of town officers, state aid, and incidental expenses.

Art, 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to payment of taxes, and what rate of interest is to be charged after a certain date for uncollected taxes. Art. 11. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the gypsy and brown tail moths.

Art. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of Selectmen

To the Citizens of the Town of Berkley :

In submitting our annual report we would call attention to a certain act of the legislature that may be of some interest to the town. A bill was passed this year which gives the City of Taunton the right to supply water to the Town of Berkley. The City of Taunton was in no way responsible for the passage of this act, and are not seeking an opportunity, nor are they apparently anxious to extend their water supply. While we have no recommendation to offer, this act makes it possible for the town to get water providing it is done within three years from the passage of the bill.

A franchise has been granted to the Taunton Gas Light Co., giving them the right to lay pipes and supply gas to the inhabitants of the town. They have laid about 2600 feet of pipe on Berkley street, which will reach thirteen houses. In a short time they undoubtedly will lay more pipe in the town, as they are willing to go anywhere that they can earn a reasonable amount on their investment.

In our report last year we recommended an appropriation of \$500.00 to cover our portion of the expense of repairing Berkley and Dighton Bridge, and that amount was raised. We made that recommendation after consulting with the Selectmen of Dighton and being assured by them that Dighton would make an appropriation to repair the bridge, which they failed to do, therefore nothing was done. The bridge needs painting and other repairs.

The allowance for the relief of our poor is more than double what it was a year ago, which is caused largely by the increase in the number receiving aid. If these conditions are to con8

tinue, and it seems reasonable to believe they will, it might be well to try and take up the matter of combining with some other towns to provide a home for our poor.

By referring to the Auditor's report and comparing the financial statement with that of last year we find that the assets of the town is \$1,325.64 less this year, and our tax rate \$2.00 per thousand higher.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:-

I have the honor of submitting my third annual report as superintendent of schools in your town. In connection with this report will be found several tables of statistics containing information of value in regard to each school.

The year just closed has been one of progress for us, the schools were never before in such good condition to serve the public, and it is a matter for congratulation that this has been brought about by a spirit of loyalty to the schools on the part of the voters and citizens of the town.

Enrollment.

The total membership in all the schools for the year ending in June 1908. was 200; June 1909, 226; and in June 1910, 189. These figures show a decrease in numbers, the greatest difference being in the Common school where the number is less than one-half what it was in the previous report.

Attendance and Tardiness.

The percentage of attendance for the year ending June 1908, was 92.7; June 1909, 92.4; and June 1910, 91.4. The average number of tardinesses for the same three years was as follows: 1908, 3.7; 1909, 4.5; and 1910, 4.2. The record for tardiness is a slight improvement over last year, but the percentage of attendance has fallen back one per cent. While the percentage is not a bad one for a rural community, a more regular attendance should be insisted upon.

Age and Schooling Certificates.

During the year three age and schooling certificates have been granted to children between fourteen and sixteen years of age, who had secured employment. The legislature of 1910 amended the law relating to certificates so that it is now necessary to show by physician's certificate or otherwise that the child is in sufficiently sound health and physically able to perform the work he or she intends to do. Certificates can be granted only under the following conditions:

1. The child must have reached his fourteenth birthday and be able to read and write sufficiently well to take up the work of the fourth grade.

2. An employment ticket must be presented properly filled out by the person or firm intending to employ the child. Blanks will be furnished by the superintendent of schools.

3. A certificate from some physician must be presented of the nature above stated. Blanks will be furnished by the superintendent of schools.

4. A certificate showing the child to be fourteen must be secured from the records of the city or town in which he was born or from the record of the church in which he was baptised.

5. The child and the parent or guardian both must appear before the one granting the certificate, the child to be examined and measured and the parent or guardian to take oath to the facts stated in the certificate.

Health of School Children.

The regularly appointed school physician, Dr. L. E. Butler, has made an examination of school children in accordance with the statute and instructions issued by the State Board of Education. The following is a copy of his report:

High School.

The number of pupils from your town this year in different high schools is twelve. The full list of names will be found on another page in this report. The total high school expense for the year has been as follows:

The town will be reimbursed by the state for the full amount of the tuition, leaving but \$308.35 to come

from local taxation. This is indeed a small price to pay for the privilege of extending to every one within the limits of the town the opportunity of attending high school with both tuition and car fare paid.

Teachers.

Since my last report there have been many changes in the teaching force, as is shown on another page of this report. Some of these changes were unavoidable, and some were due to small salaries. Since September our teaching force has been permanent and we hope it will continue so.

On account of a more liberal appropriation by the town we have been able to keep some teachers that we would otherwise have lost and to secure better trained teachers when engaging new ones. The higher salary has a direct effect upon the training and experience of the teachers we have been able to secure.

In the general average we get about what we pay for in teaching service as in everything else, and the increased appropriation for teachers' salaries was a move in the right direction, and I hope will be continued.

We have been able to continue the same arrangement with the Bridgewater Normal School, so that we have the advantage of an extra teacher at Myricks, the town paying her car fare only. I believe that our teachers are working hard and faithfully and that they and their schools deserve the heartiest co-operation of the parents and the public.

Size of Schools.

In the last report of the State Board of Education, we find the following in regard to the size of schools:

"One improvement of school conditions, which all interested in the welfare of the schools are trying to effect, is the lessening of the number of pupils to a teacher. This, in spite of the difficulties in the way, is being slowly accomplished. Schools of over 50 pupils, once so common in city schools, are now rare to find outside of the large cities; and even in the larger cities there has been a great change for the better.

In statistics recently published of the number of pupils per teacher in 23 cities, it is shown that in 14 cities the average membership was less than 35, and that the highest everage reported was but 40.8.

The returns for the State at large show that, while the increase in the average membership of the schools in the past twenty-five years is 70 per cent., the increase in the number of teachers is 83 per cent., and this in spite of the fact that many of the rural schools have been consolidated.

It is hoped that ere many years it will be forbidden by law for any teacher to have more than 30 pupils."

Repairs and Improvements.

Since my last report besides ordinary repairs, the No. 1, 3, 5 and 6 schoolhouses have been painted, and slate blackboards have been put up in the Common, Burt's Corner, Bridge, and Algerine schools. These boards were much needed and, although the first expense is considerable, it will be more economical in the end. They will need no yearly repairing and the schools will always have the best of boards.

Myricks School.

Since my last report an addition has been built at Myricks making a two room building. We now have a modern building in every respect, equipped with slate blackboards, and a steam heating apparatus. Instead of the lower grades being taken into a small hallway without ventilation and heat, they now have a modern, well lighted, and ventilated room. There is no reason why this school cannot do the best kind of work and it is a matter for congratulation that this much needed improvement has been made.

Assonet Neck School.

The school at Assonet Neck having fallen to a total membership of but five was closed and the pupils carried to the Bridge School. These children are being carried by a responsible person in a covered wagon, well protected from the weather. It seems to be working successfully and is certainly better for the pupils educationally, and less expensive to the town.

The Correct School Age.

Much has been said and written in regard to the proper age to first send a child to school, the number of hours per day the pupil should be in school, and the proper humber of years in the elementary school course. Many towns and cities have raised the entrance age to six years and it is generally accepted as a wise regulation.

Prof. John Tyler has given the following answer to the question:—At what age shall I first send my child to school?

"It depends. The natural school is the home. Growth is the first business of the child, and in the home he ought to grow best. He ought to live in an atmosphere of hopefulness, cheer, courage, kindliness, courtesy and refinement. He must absorb these until they become a part of him. And only the mother herself can furnish these.

The school is a human, artificial device to make good the deficiencies of home and surroundings. When every child was brought up in a large family on an old-fashioned farm the sole responsibility of the school was text-book learning. The home furnished nature study; physical and manual training, morals and religion. Open air and the spur of necessity did the rest.

If people lived under such conditions to-day the child, until he were ten or eleven years old, would be better off at home. If the child lives in a city flat or in a house with a yard as big as a pocket handkerchief, with an irritable father, a tired, nervous mother, and an army of nurses and governesses to vex and worry him, the sooner he is sent to kindergarten the better. He cannot possibly "grow and wax strong" and develop a steady, strong nervous system under such home surroundings.

If the system of training in the lower grades of our schools were so planned that they would furnish plenty of time for play in the open air, and thus promoted a healthy growth and development, the average child would be better off at school than at home after he is seven years of age. But, unfortunately, the lower grades in most of our schools hinder growth rather than promote it.

Between a home whose educational efficiency has been hampered or crippled by modern civilization and culture and the school which will make of the child a disembodied spirit and altogether neglect his physical well being throughout the 'lower grades, the children of the rising generation are badly situated.

Much depends on the individual child as well as the school and home. The 'only' child will be better off at school than at home, even in early childhood. He must learn in childhood to live comfortably with his mates and to form friendships, for this art will soon become impossible for him.

The nervous child will be better off at home until nine or ten years old if the home conditions favor growth and development of steady nerves. Otherwise, he had probably better go to school. The best place for him would be a New England hill farm, with wise and cheery grandparents.

The conclusion of the whole matter seems to be that the chief business of the child is to grow. The center of education is in his muscle and not in his brain. Pulmonary and digestive capacity is far more important than mental capacity.

Whether a child should be sent to school or remain at home depends then, upon whether his home or the school can best promote these inestimable virtues."

Your Committee has passed the following regulation in regard to new pupils:

"No pupil under seven years of age, who has not previously attended school and is prepared to enter some class already formed, shall be allowed to enter any school except during the first two weeks of the fall term."

By this regulation new beginners are allowed to enter school only during the first two weeks in the fall term. This saves the school from being constantly interrupted during the year by the formation of new classes and will prove a benefit both to those who are in school and to those whom it keeps out until they have a better opportunity to develop physically.

Recommendations.

For your consideration I will make the following recommendations:

- 1. Further increase of teachers' salaries.
- 2. A gradual revision of the course of study along more practical lines.
- 3. Equipping about one school house each year with modern adjustable seats and desks.
- 4. Closing No. 6 School and carrying the pupils to Myricks.

And I believe that, by rigid economy, these recommendations can be put into effect with a school appropriation the same as that of last year.

Teachers' Meetings

Local teachers' meetings have been held as usual and a Teachers' Institute was held in Dighton under the direction of the State Board of Education. This meeting was a great help to all our teachers. A copy of the program will be found in this report. A request for a meeting this year has already been made of the State authorities but as yet we do not know what action is to be taken.

Conclusion.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation for the spirit of harmony which has prevailed in all parts of the school department and for the co-operation on the part of parents and citizens which has made possible many improvements.

The complaint from No. 4 school, proved to be truancy unknown to parents; as they all agreed to attend school more regularly, I deemed a court case unnecessary.



Article 1. To see if the Town will accept the List of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen.

Art. 2. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library.

Art. 3. To act on report of town officers.

Art. 4. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will authorize the town treasurer to hire money under the approval of a majority of the selectmen to pay the current expenses of the town.

Art. 6. To choose all necessary town officers (one school committee for three years, one assessor for three years and town clerk for three years, and vote on the question, "Shall licenses be granted to sell intoxicating liquors?" "Yes" or "No."

Art. 7. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs of ways and bridges.

Art. 8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, repairs on school buildings, and car fares for high school scholars.

Art. 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of the poor, salaries of town officers, state aid, and incidental expenses. Art. 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to payment of taxes, and what rate of interest is to be charged after a certain date for uncollected taxes.

Art. 11. To choose a memorial committe and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the gypsy and brown tail moths and care of public shade trees.

Art. 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for fire protection.

Art. 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of Selectmen

To the Inhabitants of Berkley:

Owing to the increased expense of the town we have hired all the money we could this year under the vote passed at our annual meeting limiting that amount to \$6000. We hired this money as needed, one or two thousand at a time, making the notes payable at such times as in our judgment they could be met; they have all been paid but one of \$1000, issued in December and due in March. At the close of the year we did not have money enough to pay all bills there being about \$500 unpaid. With the expenses this year and the way the money has been hired, \$6000 was not enough. If we had known we were not going to have enough we could have arranged to carry over a \$2000 note instead of \$1000. We bring this to your attention so that full knowledge may be had as to the general conditions in order that this matter may be acted upon intelligently when fixing the amount another year.

There has been a great many forest fires during the year costing the town a lot of money and doing much damage to taxable property. These fires became so frequent during the early summer the selectmen took the responsibility upon themselves to offer \$100 reward for an arrest and conviction of any person found guilty of setting same. It is a serious matter which calls for the rigid enforcement of the law.

We need several more extinguishers and perhaps some other things for fighting fire. There is a law now wherehy certain towns are reimbursed one-half the amount they expend for fire apparatus providing the amount is not over \$500. We hope the town will make a liberal appropriation that we may have extinguishers enough so there will be some of them kept in each school district.

A claim has been made to the N. Y. N. H. & H. R. R. Co. for \$86 for labor fighting fire caused by said Company May 8 and 14.

Agreeable to the provisions in the will of the late Giles L. Leach, his heirs have paid into the treasury the sum of \$650, his bequest to the town. It was his request that \$150 be used to plant trees on the common, Maple and Linden, and if this amount was not all expended for trees, the balance was to go towards filling in the low place on the common north of the town hall. How the balance of \$500 shall be used is a matter for the town to decide. In so doing may we remember the public spirit which prompted this gift, that Mr. Leach was long a citizen of the town and for many years served its best interests in about every capacity, his last public office being that of town clerk.

The selectmen have appointed Edwin H. Allen, treasurer, and Ervine A. Chace, town clerk, to fill vacancies caused by the resignation of Samuel H. Cook.

The cost of maintaining our poor is steadily increasing, it amounts to over \$1000 this year.

We refer you to the auditor's report for our financial condition.

Board of Health

The town has been very fortunate in regard to contagious diseases, there has been only two cases reported during the year. The law in regard to same is as follows:

"A householder who knows that a person in his family or house is sick of small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other infectious or contagious disease declared by the State Board of Health to be dangerous to public health, shall forthwith give notice to the Board of Health of the city or town in which he dwells.

Upon death, recovery or removal of such person, the householder shall disinfect to the satisfaction of the Board such rooms of his house, articles therein as, in the opinion of the Board, have been exposed to infection or contagion.

Should one or both eyes of an infant become inflamed, swollen or red and show an unnatural discharge at any time within two weeks after birth, it shall be the duty of the nurse, relative or other attendant having charge of such infant, to report in writing within six hours thereafter to the Board of Health in the city or town in which the parents of the infant reside the fact that such inflammation, swelling and redness of the eyes and unnatural discharge exists.

On receipt of such report, or of notice of the same symptoms given by a physician as provided by the following section, the Board of Health shall take such immediate action as it may deem necessary in order that blindness may be prevented.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars. But the Board of Health of a city or town may in its discretion, disinfect or fumigate all such premises as in the opinion of the Board have been exposed to any infectious or contagious disease at the expense of the city or town and may employ any proper and competent person or corporation for the purpose of such disinfecting or fumigation."

Superintendent's Report.

To the School Committee of Berkley:---

Agreeable to your custom and regulation, I have the honor of presenting to you my report for the current year. The object of this and other similar reports is to keep the public in close touch with the work and progress of the schools. By necessity it represents the work of both my predeccessor and myself. It contains the usual statistics and appended reports, together with a brief statement of the conditions and needs of the schools so far as revealed by a single term's study. To Mr. Davis I am indebted for much that renders the school environment pleasant.

I also desire to acknowledge the cordial relations existing with and hearty co-operation of all the teachers. Unless these are in evidence the work of the Superintendent must in a degree fail. Every year it becomes more evident that the teacher is the real vital force and influence in the school. Because of this, great care must be exercised in selecting instructors. Having found an efficient teacher, wages ought to be a secondary consideration in retaining her services. The annual changing of teachers because of the low wage paid is not only deplorable but disastrous in any well arranged system of school work.

The year 1911 closed with only one teacher of the former year in service. Doubtless in some cases there has been only slight loss, while in others it will be very difficult to compensate for the change. Age, success, and experience are three factors that ought not to be underestimated when appropriations are made. The Assonet Neck school continues small, eight pupils. The worst feature of this school is the matter of attendance. There appears to be a lack of appreciation of the school. All things considered it would be better to close the school and transport the children as last year.

The schools at Myricks are doing commendable work. Miss Snow has fully made good the loss of Mrs. LeGrow who did such excellent work there for several years. The Primary room has been furnished with adjustable seats and chairs for the first three grades. This removes from the grammar room twenty-four pupils and enables the teacher to give more time to classes and less to discipline. The fourth grade continues to be seated in the larger room but enters the primary room for instruction. It is a pleasure to record that the students from Bridgewater Normal School who teach the primary grades have done such efficient work. In passing it may be stated that the expense of seating this primary room was met by an unexpended sum of money that remained after the building of the room.

Every year additional conditions arise which indicate that the school physician ought to visit schools more frequently and be on call for teacher and Superintendent. It cannot be foreseen when or how often his services may be needed. But there are occasions when for public safety frequent visits are necessary. For these and also to secure the best service at all times in protecting our homes there should be no hesitation to pay a reasonable fee and repeat it as often as necessary. It is a subject of thankfulness that during the past months when so many towns have had to close their schools because of wide spread sickness our town has been comparatively free of contagion.

In some localities attendance has been very satisfactory; perhaps as nearly perfect as can be secured in a scattered community. In other places sickness and a large share of carelessness has contributed to a low percentage of attendance. Many parents are far too thoughtless in regard to the education of their children. Any excuse offered by the child is considered valid; and the boy and girl are left free to wander about the streets and fields wherever and whenever they choose. Almost invariably the parents of these children are the first to find fault if their children are not promoted or fail to sustain themselves in the high school. A moment's earnest thought ought to convince any parent that there is a wide margin between street education and school training. Non attendance of this sort is not chargeable to the child but to the parent; but the *child* must suffer being cheated of his birthright, an education.

Any discussion of the enforcement of school laws relating to school attendance involves many factors; some of which are known and others only to be inferred. Among those that are known and that ought to be eliminated are these : the employment of children at home by the parent; the hiring of a child of one town by a resident of another town; the keeping children out of school to do errands. These three things, all of which were approved by the parents, have kept many children out of school, some even for weeks. When cases of this sort occur it is not a time for argument. The time for action, swift and sure, is at hand. It is a mistaken idea that if the children are not kept out of school to work, the town will have to support the family. The state, wisely looking toward the welfare of its future citizens, in all of its school laws, has declared for the education of the child. This education it has guaranteed for seven years, for not less than thirty-two week per year, and for as much longer as the schools of the town are in session annually. It is the duty of every law abiding citizen to stamp out ignorance as soon as possible. If the process leads to the courts it is not to be regretted since the manners and morals of many a parent are improved by an interview with a judge.

Frequently the statement is made that our schools are costing too much. This declaration is apt to be based on a comparison with schools of forty or more years ago. It is true that our schools are tending toward an annual increase in ex-

penditure. But while the school is costing more it is equally true that our whole manner of living has become expensive. Yesterday's luxuries are to-day's necessities. Education is more widely extended than it was decades ago. College graduates are more common than high school graduates were forty years since. The high school is at our door. It is open to all. Children can get a four years' training and be at home daily. They must have additional education in order to successfully compete in this rushing age. It is a battle of brains. The clerk, the accountant, the manager must bring things to pass, or fail. Men are paid for doing, not marking time. To properly equip our children for such a life costs much, but it pays well. It means enjoyable living, not mere physical existence. To secure the necessary helps whereby these children and young people may be trained for useful service costs money. Much of the material wears out in a single year. In comparison with later publications, few books remain at their best for five years.

In this progressive age two dollars per year per pupil is not extravagant in a properly equipped school. Every effort ought to be made by the teacher to get the best and fullest service from all supplies furnished. Only plain, serviceable, and best material should be purchased. Most of this has been accomplished; but some additions and changes are imperative if the teacher is to secure the best results.

In this mercenary age when men give almost their entire time and energy to the accumulation of wealth less care and thought is bestowed on artistic environment than ought to be. This is very conspicuous in regard to school grounds. It is a neglected side of our education. We select our school sites and erect our school buildings with little thought of the influence they are to exert upor the rising generation. Worse than all else we do not provide play grounds nor do we grade and plant our school yards. There is no basis for amazement that the children return to their homes without any incentive or inclination to make their homes attractive. While education along this line may not yield a bank account it will produce more than its equivalent in pleasure and contentment. Very slowly we are learning that the great influence that silently and powerfully draws the young men and women to the city is its attractions. Perhaps if we cultivated by our school environment and home surroundings that spirit of contentment that is in the breast of every child, we would half solve one of the perplexing problems of education, how to keep our boys on the farm. While it may not be easy to relocate buildings and secure desirable playgrounds, it ought to be possible to render present surroundings more attractive, by levelling and grading grounds and planting of some shrubbery.

Local teachers' meetings have been held as usual and application has been made to the Commissioner of Education for Teachers' Institute to be held in the month of May.

In closing I desire to express my appreciation of the loyal support given me by the teachers, school committee, and citizens in my efforts to render the schools effective.

TOWN WARRANT.

Article 1. To see if the town will accept the List of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen.

Article 2. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library.

Article 3. To act on report of town officers.

Article 4. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the town treasurer to hire money under the approval of a majority of the selectmen to pay the current expenses of the town.

Article 6. To choose all necessary town officers (one school committee for three years and one assessor for three years) and vote on the question, "Shall licenses be granted to sell intoxicating liquors?" "Yes" or "No."

Article 7. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs of ways and bridges.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent. transportation of scholars, and repairs on school buildings.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of the poor, salaries of town officers, state aid, and incidental expenses.

Article 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to payment of taxes, and what rate of interest is to be charged after a certain date for uncollected taxes.

Article 11. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the gypsy and brown tail moths, and care of public shade trees.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a public library, and if not to see what action the town will take in regard to a new library building.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to cut bushes in the cemetery.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

At our annual meeting last March the town voted appropriations amounting to \$6,817.46, plus the State, County and highway taxes, which were \$1,404.93, making a total of \$8,222.39; from this deduct the poll taxes, amounting to \$498.00, leaving \$7,724.39, every dollar of which had to be raised by taxation, a great deal more money than we have raised before. Our assessors were unable to find but little increase in our valuation, therefore the ultimate result, a high tax rate. In going over the list of appropriations it is hard to find where they could have been cut much; the purchase of a spraying outfit and fire extinguishers is an extraordinary expense that will not happen again for some time. We had some bad washouts last spring which necessitated an appropriation of \$300 to repair same. The town has recovered \$550.50 through an attachment of one of our outside poor cases: the state has reimbursed one-half of our expense for fire extinguishers; we have not had any bad forest fires, and if we are fortunate in getting through the winter without any heavy snow blockades or washouts in the spring, we should be in a position whereby the present tax rate can be considerably reduced, providing we exercise due care and judgment in making our appropriations in the spring. In years past it has been our custom to make a part of our appropriations from the cash on hand-when we had it,-in order to keep our tax rate down. This has probably been a little overdone, as this year we had no cash on hand to draw from, but the taxpayers have had the benefit. Our tax rate for the last sixteen years has averaged \$13.00 per thousand; too much considering the privileges, but it is not liable to average less for a like period unless our valuation should change.

In 1910 your board was instrumental in getting an act through the legislature to permit the City of Taunton to supply water to Berkley, said act to become void unless the City of Taunton should begin to distribute water through its pipes to consumers in Berkley within three years after the passage of same. The time expires April 12, 1913. The urgent need for a water supply was felt more than ever during the summer and fall. Not in the memory of the oldest residents has there been such a scarcity of water.

Now that the telephone line has been extended to Assonet Neck every part of the town is connected. At the present time there are eighty-two subscribers. It is greatly to our advantage that we are on the Taunton Exchange, for it gives us a service of over 3,000 local calls.

As Overseers of Poor we have to report one case of full support and twenty-nine cases where partial support and temporary aid has been granted. The appropriation of \$1,000 for this department has been over-run \$3.69.



SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

I have the honor of presenting to you my second annual report of the schools of Berkley. It contains the usual statistics and comments upon the work of the past year, together with suggestions for rendering the schools more effective. In order for the schools to flourish, the community must be kept informed regarding the work done and results secured. For this reason a school report should be considered as something more than a formal requirement.

It is a source of thankfulness that during the past term no serious attack of any disease has broken the school ranks of this locality. The early part of the year just closed was characterized by epidemics of various sorts. Almost every disease incident to child life invaded some home and thus lowered the standard of attendance. However, the efficient work done by school physicians has not been without its lasting benefits. Slowly but surely the public, as well as parents, is being taught the benefits of precaution and care. Only occasionally a parent is found who does not co-operate with school authorities in bettering the conditions of child life.

During the past year a change has been made in geographies and grammars. Tarr and McMurry geographies have displaced the old edition of Redway and Hinman that was very badly worn. Firman's Progressive Lessons in English have taken the place of Metcalf's grammar. Both of the books exchanged were out of date and inferior. Several of the remaining text books ought to be exchanged during the next few years, because they do not contain the necessary information. Any book is worthy of retention so long as it is the best obtainable; when it falls below this standard it should be discarded. In these days of rapid change in national boundaries, scientific knowledge, and pedagogical presentation, books soon reach the limit of their usefulness. Books relating to geography, natural science, and history soon grow old. During the past year the boundaries of northern Africa and Turkey have been greatly modified. The school text book must keep pace. The history that ends with the Roosevelt administration is out of date. The physiology that does not proclaim the benefits of fresh air, sunshine, and abundant good food as the best remedy for tuberculosis is obsolete.

A comparison of last year's report with the present will show a slight decrease in the per cent of school attendance. This is chiefly attributable to epidemics during the first two terms of the calendar year passed. Yet this is not the only factor that has caused less perfect attendance. In last year's report the Superintendent stated at some length the reasons why attendance was not better and what ought to be done. It still remains a fact that some few families are chiefly responsible for most of the tardy and absence marks of the registers. These families, thinking that they will not be arrested, continue from year to year to break the school laws. The training of foreign children for American citizenship is held at a discount. This is radically wrong. The keeping of children at home to work during school hours, and giving so much work to the child to do before he can start for school that by necessity he must be late, is a flagrant crime against the children. The allowance of this procedure brings another factor into the school problem: namely, that the bright, constant, American is being made the submerged tenth of our schools. In other words, the pupils that are habitually late or absent retard those that otherwise would advance rapidly. Because of this some pupils are several grades behind what they ought to be. This is most apparent in rural schools. The graded school is better adapted to advance the child rapidly than the ungraded. Apparently there is only one solution of the problem; the parent *must* be made to see his responsibility and accept its conditions. The plea of poverty, of large families, of home needs, cannot be considered. It is a fact universal, that wherever or whenever the home stands for education the children of that home will and do find a way to attend school.

During the past year the schools have secured a fair degree of success both in discipline and teaching. Again experience or education has proved to be a wise investment for the town. The best schools have been those under the care of the experienced or Normal trained teacher. This profession like most others demands that the teacher possess special adaptation for her work. It is not enough to have made a good record in school although that is quite desirable. There must be a flexibility of temperament that will enable the teacher to guickly estimate the demands of the occasion and adapt herself to the changes that occur. There must be firmness and tact to meet the emergencies that arise. There must be an alertness of mind and body that pushes the work and secures results. The employment of any teacher should depend on her ability to do the best possible work in the school that she is to teach. The child is too important a factor to be trifled with. The field of teaching should not be exploited by those who are not willing to pay the price, hard work.

No. 4 school continues to be small; in fact smaller than last year since three pupils have ceased to be members. At present only seven are enrolled. The attendance is good and there are only a few cases of tardiness.

Yet for the interest of the children and benefit of the town the children ought to be transferred to No. 3 school. The Algerine school numbers eight with a prospect of decrease. The attendance for the year is very poor. There is no accounting for it save on the basis of indifference to school privileges. This school should be combined with No. 1. After all pleas have been made for the maintenance of rural schools, there comes a time when the child alone is to be considered. And his interests are not properly maintained when he is the only member in each of his classes.

At the beginning of the fall term the school at Myricks was placed in charge of two permanent teachers. each keeping its own register. Formerly, this school has been in charge of one teacher with assistants, for a few weeks each, from the Normal school. For several reasons it appeared as the better policy to employ a permanent teacher in the lower grades as well as in the upper. The plan is an improvement upon the former method. Again, for several reasons, extending over quite a number of the years of the past, several of the grades are not up to the standard that they should be. But time, skillful teaching. and perfect attendance will solve the problem as years pass. It has been fortunate for the school that the principal remained for another year. Under her teaching the scholarship has advanced, and tardiness decreased.

The teaching of music, as one of the subjects of instruction, ought to claim the attention of every citizen. Most of the teachers sing a little and because of this the children are taught a few rote songs for special occasions. But there is great need for more definite drill and education along musical lines. As a nation we are far behind Germany in cultivating both vocal and instrumental music. Because of this our homes and churches suffer a loss. The function of school music is to develop a wide spread appreciation of good music. It is not expected to make professional singers of the school children, though it will be the means of arousing the dormant talent of many a child. As our mode of living becomes more complicated there arises a greater demand for expression of joy. Music furnishes this avenue. It lifts us from the plain of almost hopeless struggle into a realm of delight. It also furnishes us recreation for the hours of leisure. It furnishes wholesome and uplifting entertainment for social gatherings. Again every church feels the need of new and trained voices for all of its services. The choirs are never crowded. The invitation is always urgent for those who can and will sing. Why not employ a Supervisor of Music?

In closing I desire to impress upon the mind of every citizen, that the public school is a reliable, vital force for the extension of knowledge, for the uplifting of humanity, and development of noble citizenship.

I also wish to express my appreciation of the cordial co-operation extended me by all the teachers, school committee, and citizens in my work.



SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

Our valuation was increased last year over \$100,000. To one unfamiliar with the facts it would seem as if there was a great deal more taxable property found that had not previously been taxed; this increase however is not the result of finding any great amount more property but is due chiefly to changed opinion as to property values, it places our valuation over \$500,000.00; when the valuation of a town is more than \$500,000.00, it reduces considerably their portion of the state school fund.

Our tax rate \$11.80 is \$7.00 per thousand less this year than it was in 1912 and is accounted for by the increase in valuation and less money being appropriated.

Town officers and schools are the only accounts that exceed their appropriations.

In 1896 the town voted to have the Old Stage road from Taunton line to Freetown line surveyed and to have the State Highway Commission petitioned to accept it as a state highway, the plans and petition were filed with the Commission August 3, 1896, as yet the road has not been accepted by the state, the provisions of Chap. 279 of the Acts of 1908 known as the "Small Town Act" gives the Commission the right to make an allotment of money to improve this road—as our valuation is within the limits of this Act—providing it is petitioned for by the Selectmen. We have filed such a petition and to get favorable action on same, it will be necessary for the town to make an appropriation to be expended under the direction of the State Highway Commission for this purpose.

There have been about \$10,000.00 expended in the town by the state for highways, all on County street, the work was completed last December, it has always been a bad road in the spring and quite expensive to take care of.

As Overseers of Poor we have furnished aid to the amount of \$947.01. Mostly in the form of partial support. There have been a few cases of medical aid and temporary relief, some of these cases are settled outside of our town. We will be reimbursed for those by the municipalities where they belong.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

There have been three cases of scarlet fever and two cases of measles reported during the year. That all may become familiar with the health laws, we are publishing a list of infectious diseases and the laws in regard to same:

"A householder who knows that a person in his family or house is sick of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other infectious or contagious diseases declared by the State Board of Health to be dangerous to public health shall forthwith give notice to the Board of Health of the city or town in which he dwells.

Upon death. recovery or removal of such persons. the householder shall disinfect to the satisfaction of the Board such rooms of his house, articles therein as, in the opinion of the Board, have been exposed to infection or contagion.

Should one or both eyes of an infant become inflamed, swollen or red and show an unnatural discharge at any time within two weeks after birth, it shall be the duty of the nurse, relative or other attendant having charge of such infant, to report in writing within six hours thereafter to the Board of Health in the city or town in which the parents of the infant reside the fact that such inflammation, swelling and redness of the eyes and unnatural discharge exists.

On receipt of such report, or notice of the same symptoms given by a physician as provided by the following section, the Board of Health shall take such immediate action as it may deem necessary in order that blindness may be prevented.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars. But the Board of Health of a city or town may in its discretion, disinfect or fumigate all such premises as in the opinion of the Board have been exposed to any infectious or contagious diseases at the expense of the city or town and may employ any proper and competent person or corporation for the purpose of such disinfecting or fumigation."

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

I have the honor of presenting to you my third annual report of the schools of Berkley. It contains the usual statistics and comments upon the school work together with suggestions for rendering the work as effective as possible under existing conditions. It is also a source of information to others who desire to be informed regarding the progress of the schools.

Last year a paragraph of some length was devoted to school attendance. We again endorse every sentence that paragraph contained. The remedy for securing proper attendance has not been applied. So long as a few families realize they can break the school laws at their pleasure just that length of time the appeals of the superintendent will pass unheeded. It is not for the benefit of those who are charged with the administration of the schools that these sentences are written. The efforts put forth by teacher and superintendent are for the benefit of the child and for securing to him his full birthright. It is the duty of the proper officer to so conserve the pupils' rights that they shall have at least a fair education. This is the intent of the law as emphasized by the recent enactments relating to employment.

In respect to discipline and teaching the schools have secured a fair degree of success. The change of teachers at the Common and Bridge schools has not been any loss Again experience and education has proved to be a wise investment. Cheap employees, whether in the professions or in business, are expensive. Where such skilled labor is in demand as in teaching wages are a remote consideration. We do not forget that schools are expensive and yet at the same time we remember that for money and effort given they yield the largest revenue. The amount \$1.38, spent for each child for books and supplies certainly is modest. The size of the schools does not vary greatly from last year. The same problems present themselves for solution. We continue to believe that a consolidation of the smaller schools would prove a benefit to the children attending them.

After July 1, 1914, all teachers in this state who have taught thirty years, not less than fifteen of which were in this commonwealth, and are over sixty years of age may retire. Those over seventy years old must retire. All teachers in service after Sept. 1st, must contribute five percent of their annual salary to the retirement fund. No teacher can contribute less than \$35 nor more than \$100 per year. By necessity, a yearly contribution of this amount cannot fail of being felt by those who are already not receiving a large wage. This law is not permissive but compulsory. It is not even left with the teacher to send the percentage to the state treasurer, but is incumbent upon the town treasurer to perform that duty, after having deducted from the teachers' pay roll the required amount. For years pensions have been granted to men and women who have served in various capacities in civil and military life. Only very recently has any annuity been granted to those who have been the servants of all, namely teachers. Whatever personal opinion we may entertain respecting pensions in general. most citizens will concede that no class is more deserving of such recognition than the faithful teacher. In addition to the thirty years of service required, there must be added the initial expense of preparation that reaches into the thousands of dollars in many cases, also the four. six, eight, or more years of time given before the date of service begins. No other class of public servants are required to expend such an amount of initial capital, time, and money, before entering upon their duties. The long years of service are not only nerve racking but give less time and opportunity for advancement and are expensive beyond most other professions. Viewed from all sides in a candid and straight forward manner it would appear that the general wage of most of the teachers should be raised

Because of the newness of the recent Child Labor Law and the impression in some quarters that it is unjust, a word in regard to its development may not be ill timed. The law is the product of years of thought and work by those especially interested in child welfare. The case has been studied subjectively and objectively by men and women in close touch with every side of the problem. It is an accepted fact that for the good of future citizenship children should be prohibited from working unreasonable hours and under improper conditions. No child should be allowed to work ten hours a day, steadily, under any surroundings. Investigation has repeatedly shown cases where the child worked ten hours daily and the father who belonged to a union worked eight or less. The impression that the employment age has been raised to sixteen years is wrong. Only in a few dangerous occupations is the child prohibited from employment under that age. Furthermore the welfare of the child is conserved by securing to him four full grades of school advantages and not less than one hundred thirty days of attendance after reaching thirteen years of age. Again it is impossible for any parent to get a certificate by merely making oath to the child's age. An elastic conscience is of no avail in pushing the child into the mill. Undoubted proof in

writing must be furnished the superintendent or no certificate is obtainable; and there is a prescribed order in which evidence must be submitted. The form of the certificate itself is less complicated, easier to fill out, easier to keep on file, and less troublesome to obtain. The law as a whole is a decided improvement on all former enactments of that character.

Attention is called to a paragraph entitled. "Number of Pupils of Different Nationalities Attending School." A study of this paragraph may throw light on the subject of uon attendance of pupils. With the exception of one school the attendance has been good. That school has problems of its own which have never been solved and yet are capable of solution. It is plainly the duty to so enforce the school laws, which are primarily for the child's interest, that no school shall have the low attendance of 76.9 per cent.

A year ago in his report, the superintendent called attention to the desirability of employing a supervisor of music. We again emphasize the need of such an instructor. The benefit would be directly felt in the home and church. We ask a careful consideration of this suggestion.

It is a pleasure to express appreciation of the cordial relations that have existed between members of the school committee, superintendent, and teachers. This spirit is very essential in maintaining high standards and securing advancement.



#### TOWN WARRANT.

Art'cle 1. To see if the town will accept the List of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen.

Article 2. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library.

Article 3. To act on report of town officers.

Article 4. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

Article 6. To choose all necessary town officers (one selectman for three years, one assessor for three years. one school committee for three years) and to vote on the question: "Shall license be granted to sell intoxicating liquors? Yes or No!"

Art cle 7. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs of ways and bridges.

Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the road between the Taunton line and Freetown line running through the town, pass Berkley Common, and known as the Old Stage Road, providing the Massachusetts Highway Commission under the Acts of 1908 will make an allotment for this purpose. Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, transportation of scholars and repairs on public buildings.

Article 10. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of poor, salaries of town officers, state ald and incidental expenses.

Article 11. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the gypsy and brown tail moths, and care of public shade trees.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the cemetery and care of graves of soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish wars.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take, if any, with regard to the planting of shade trees, and to appropriate at least \$150.00 for this purpose in order that the town might enter the Shade Tree Planting Contest conducted by the Massachusetts Forestry Association.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to appropriate as a suitable site for the Carnegie Library a lot of land owned by the Town of Berkley on the west side of South Main Street being the lot formerly occupied by the Methodist Church or act anything thereon.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

In submitting our annual report we would first touch on the financial condition of the town as that is a matter of vital interest to us all. From our treasurer's report we find that we have cash on hand \$722.66 plus uncollected taxes of \$2,653.29, total \$3,375.95. In addition to this we have two funds amounting to \$2,375.00; there are no outstanding bills against the town that we know of. While this is a creditable showing it is a direct result of a very high tax rate, as taxes are levied to meet current expenses rather than to establish surplus cash accounts, it will be readily seen that it would have been possible to have paid our running expenses for the year with a considerable lower tax rate. This is a true statement of affairs. but in justice to the assessors we would state that there were certain laws that went into effect after assessments were made which increased the revenues that accrue to the town which could not be taken into consideration.

Last year the town appropriated \$1,500.00 and the Massachusetts Highway Commission made the town an allotment of \$1,500.00, all to be expended under their directions to improve the Old Stage road from the Taunton line to the Freetown line. After their engineer had looked at the road work was begun at the Taunton line and 6,500 feet of road was built under a contract furnished by the Highway Commission of which the following is an exact copy:

#### Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Town of Berkley.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT between the Town of Berkley, by its Board of Selectmen, party of the first part, and Z. L. Canedy, of Lakeville, party of the second part, relating to the improvement of a section of road in said town of Berkley.

In consideration of the sum hereinafter mentioned, to be paid by the party of the first part, and under the penalty expressed in the bond bearing even date with these presents and hereunto annexed, the party of the second part, hereinafter called the Contractor, hereby agrees to grade, surface with gravel and otherwise improve 6.500 feet of the road in the town of Berkley leading from Taunton to Freetown, locally known as the Old Stage road; the work to begin at the dividing line between the city of Taunton and the town of Berkley, at station 0, and extend in a southerly direction to station 65, subject to the following conditions, viz:—

Section 1. The Contractor shall furnish all labor and materials for the work herein contemplated. The work shall be done in accordance with and as specified in a contract between the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, by the Massachusetts Highway Commission, and the town of Berkley, by its board of Selectmen, executed under date of May 12, 1914; said contract being hereby made a part of this agreement.

Section 2. The work shall be commenced within fifteen days from the date of this agreement and shall be diligently prosecuted to completion, in such order as may be prescribed by the Engineer.

Section 3. The Contractor is to furnish, free of charge, all stakes and such temporary structures as may be necessary for marking and maintaining points and lines given by the Engineer for the building of the work, and is to give said Engineer such facilities and materials for giving said lines and points as he may require; and the Engineer's marks must be carefully preserved.

Section 4. If any person employed by the Contractor on the work shall appear to the Engineer to be incompetent,, or to act in a disorderly or improper manner, he shall be discharged immediately on the requisition of the Engineer, and such person shall not again be employed on the work.

Section 5. Whenever the Contractor is not present on any part of the work where it may be desired to give directions, orders will be given by the Engineer, and shall be received and obeyed by the superintendent and foreman who may have charge of the particular work in reference to which the orders are given.

Section 6. In all the operations connected with the work herein specified all state laws and town by-laws or ordinances controlling or limiting in any way the actions of those engaged in the work, or affecting the method of doing the work or materials applied to it, must be respected and strictly complied with; and during the performance of the work the Conractor shall provide such precautions as may be necessary to protect life and property.

Section 7. In the employment of manual labor under this contract, preference shall be given to citizens of the United States. No laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the Contractor, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by this contract shall be requested or required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, and eight hours shall constitute a day's work. Said Contractor or his agents or employees shall not, directly or indirectly, make it the condition of the employment of any person that he shall lodge, board or trade at any particular place or with any particular person; but every employee on the work to be done under this contract shall have full liberty to lodge, board and trade wheresoever and with whomsoever he may choose.

Section 8. Whenever the word "Selectmen" or "Board of Selectmen" is used in this contract it shall be understood to mean the Board of Selectmen of the Town

of Berkley, Massachusetts, all duly chosen, qualified and acting. Whenever the word "town" is used it shall be understood to mean the town of Berkley. Whenever the word "engineer" is used it shall be understood to mean the Chief Engineer of the Massachusetts Highway Commission and his duly authorized assistants. Whenever the word "contractor" is used it shall be understood to mean the person who has entered into this contract as party of the second part or his legal representatives.

Section 9. The said Contractor agrees to give his personal attention to the fulfillment of this contract, and not sublet the aforesaid contract, but to keep the same under his control. The subletting of portions of the work to be done under this contract may be done only upon the written consent of the Selectmen. The said Contractor shall furnish the necessary scaffolding, ways and all necessary means and conveniences for the transfer of the material to its proper place in the work. And it is also understood that the Selectmen shall not be held responsible for the care or protection of any material or parts of the work.

Section 10. It is further agreed that the Engineer and . his authorized assistants shall at all times have access to the work during its construction; and he shall be furnished with every reasonable facility for ascertaining that the stock and materials used and employed, and the workmanship, are in accordance with the requirements and intentions of this contract.

And it is further agreed that all the work contemplated and described in this contract and specifications shall be done to the satisfaction of the Engineer, and any materials condemned or rejected by him or his representatives may be branded or otherwise marked, and shall, on demand be at once removed to a satisfactory distance from the work.

Section 11. Said Contractor further agrees that he will pay all bills for labor and materials contracted for by him on account of the work herein contemplated, and that he will furnish the said Selectmen, at their request, with evidence, satisfactory to said Selectmen, that all persons who have done work or furnished materials under this contract, and all claims of private corporations or individuals for damage of any kind caused by the construction of said work have been fully paid or satisfactorily secured, and in case such evidence is not furnished, said Selectmen may retain out of any amounts due said Contractor sums sufficient to cover any such unpaid claims.

Section 12. The said Contractor further agrees that he will be responsible for any damage to any person or property resulting from defects or obstructions, or from any other cause whatsoever during the progress of the work or at any time before its completion and final acceptance, and that he will indemnify and save harmless the said town from all suits or actions of every name and description, brought for or on account of any injuries or damages received or sustained by any person or persons, by or from the said Contractor, his servants or agents, in the construction of said work or by or in consequence of any negligence in guarding the same, or in improper materials used in its construction, or by or on account of any act or omission of the said Contractor or his agents; and the said Contractor further agrees that so much of the money due to him under and by virtue of this agreement as shall be considered necessary by the said Selectmen may be retained by the said town until such suits or claims for damages as aforesaid shall have been settled, and evidence to that effect furnished to the satisfaction of the Selectmen.

Section 13. On the completion of said work to the satisfaction of the Engineer and of said Selectmen, the town of Berkley agrees to pay to the Contractor and the Contractor agrees to receive and accept the sum of THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000.00) as full compensation for furnishing all the materials, and for doing all the work contemplated and embraced in this agreement; also for all loss or damage arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from the action of the elements, or from any unforeseen difficulties or obstructions which may arise or be encountered in the prosecution of the work until its acceptance by the Selectmen; and for all risks of every description connected with the work; and for well and faithfully completing the work, and the whole thereof, in the manner required by the Engineer.

Section 14. And the said Contractor hereby further agrees that the payment of the final amount due under this contract, and the adjustment and payment of the bill rendered for work done in accordance with any alterations of the same, shall release the town from any and all claims or liability on account of work performed under this contract or any alteration thereof.

We would recommend an appropriation of \$1,500.00 this year providing the state will give an equal amount to continue this work. Good roads are a great advantage and credit to a town, and with the exception of our schools are in fact about all the taxpayer gets for his money. It

seems like good judgment to go as far as we can in this direction, especially if the state will pay one half the cost, we can make this appropriation and meet our current expenses with a considerably lower tax rate than last year.

It will be necessary for the town to make an appropriation this year to care for the graves of all soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish wars that are not under perpetual care; this is compulsory. See Acts 1914, Chap. 122.

There has been one case of ophthalmia neonatorum and several cases of scarlet fever reported to the Board of Health during the year.

As Overseers of Poor we have furnished aid to the amount of \$672.33.

#### REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Your Trustees beg to submit the following report. The new year opens with your Library still in the old, overcrowded quarters. We have for a small town a good sized, well chosen and very well patronized Library. The circulation per capita being about five, which is nearly twice as large as that of some of our neighboring cities. Last spring the town authorized the application for a "Carnegie Library;" such an application was made, but so far nothing has come of it.

The Trustees have made arrangements for placing books in what might be called a branch Library at Berkley Bridge, and will gladly do th's in any neighborhood that will furnish transportation for the books and care for them.

Mr. A. E. Dean has again given us a year's Harpers's for the binding. We have also received a gift of ten dollars from Mrs. Nancy Freeman for books. We have expended nearly all the appropriation for new books and repair on old ones.

We would again call your attention to the need of new quarters and to the fact that such a building might be built locally with but a litle aid from the town and without shouldering an increase in our tax rate of more than one dollar per thousand for all time at our present valuation. As to our financial standing, will refer you to the Treasurer's report, and ask for the same appropriation as last year.



### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

I have the honor and pleasure in presenting to you this my fourth annual report. In this brief statement an effort has been made to indicate, in a slight degree, what has been accomplished and also what is desirable for the future.

It is our constant purpose, in all the methods pursued and plans formulated, to give the pupils the best the town has to offer, and to so train them that they will take pleasure in rendering the nation their highest service.

The opening of the fall term found four new teachers in charge of schools. One had had some years of successful experience. Two were graduates of Normal schools. The other two were inexperienced high school graduates. We think that all the teachers are earnestly endeavoring to secure the best results. There has been a marked improvement in the school that last year had such a poor record of attendance. Two factors have been very largely contributed to securing this success: namely, a teacher of long and successful experience and the conference that three of the parents, who did not send their children to school, held with the judge in Taunton.

Efficiency in the school room can usually be measured by the instructor's training and experience. Fortunate is the school that receives good instruction and is well disciplined by an inexperienced teacher of limited attainments. We continue to hold the opinion that the school should not be an experiment station. The teacher should be paid a living wage and not less than two years training beyond the high school required. But to education and training, must be added certain natural qualifications without which, success is impossible. It would be wiser to have the services of a live well trained teacher for a year and at the end of that time accept a city position than to retain a less desirable teacher for several years.

One commendable feature of our school work is apparent in the increasing number of those who are either attending the high school or looking toward that institution. It is a pleasure also to recall that several others are either in college or aiming at such a course. The high ideal of. life and service as a compensation to those who seek the higher education is finely expressed by Dr. Lemuel H Murlin, President of Boston University, in these words: "The truly educated man will feel that he owes such a debt to society, that he must give back to it the service of all the years of his life after leaving college. Many reasons are given to justify the time and money spent in securing an education. The opportunity for social recognition and enjoyment, the better preparation for a special profession, or trade, or calling in life, the greater appreciation with which the work of life is accomplished-all these are the by-products of the educational process. and not its end and aim."

A table prepared by the Massachusetts State Board of Education several years ago says that the average child leaving school at fourteen years of age began work at \$4 per week and at the end of the 26th year received \$12.75 per week. The high school graduate began with \$10 per week and when twenty-six years old received \$31 per week.

For some time there has been quite a free discussion relative to the best length of school year, in the grades below the high school. Opinion has fluctuated between the extremes of six and nine years. Local conditions, labor movements, and educational perspective have entered into the discussion as largely as personal opinion. but in the final analysis these are and ever must be a secondary consideration. The first thought must be given to the welfare of the pupil, not only the present but the future. Furthermore, the parent has the right to insist that the child's interests shall be most highly conserved. Again the city with its thoroughly graded schools, fine equipment and forty weeks of compulsory attendance can accomplish more during the school year than the rural towns with its thirty-six or less weeks of attendance and its many limitations. Considering the demands made upon the country school and comparing it with the city school. it seems never to have seriously occurred to the proper authorities to increase the number of weeks in the country school to forty, so as to equalize it in one respect with the city. Under best conditions, the pupil from the rural district on entering the city institution is handicapped, at first at least, by not being in possession of so complete a fit as his city classmate. As time passes he partially outgrows this by developing a vigor of thought. The plea that the ninth grade is largely given to reviews, and in rare cases to the marking of time, proves nothing. If the criticism were true, the remedy lies not in shortening the course but in broadening the instruction. Under a real live teacher it is impossible for the pupil to mark time, only. More evidence is coming to the front continually, that in all schools, vocational, continuation, trade, and special. more time is needed for a better preparation for any of the duties of life. Already the pressure is being felt, from those who employ large numbers of men and women, for more thorough training, not only in the technique of the work that is to be performed, but for the cultural knowledge that ever must form the foundation of most successful employment. The public school should be a place where the child should be prepared without haste and without waste, for the public duties of life. The child that can complete a course in eight or even seven years need not mark time at any stage of his training. The grades should always be flexible enough to allow such bright pupils to advance as rapidly as possible. It is not an especial honor to complete a nine year course in seven years, nor is it a disgrace to take nine years to perform the same task. Like speed in any department of life, it is an advantage and little else. In any school the greatest danger is to the pupil that thinks he can do the work in half of the required time. This produces indolence and it is to be expected that the patient, persistent toiler will pass such on the road of life.

To express appreciation of the cordial relations that have existed between members of the school committee. superintendent, and teachers is a pleasure. This spirit is very essential in maintaining high standards and securing proper advancement,





# TOWN WARRANT

#### For March 6, 1916

Article 1. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for care of shade trees.

Article 2. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library.

Article 3. To act on report of town officers.

Article 4. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

Article 6. To choose all necessary town officers (one selectman for three years, one assessor for three years, one school committee for three years, trustee of library for three years, burial ground commissioner for three years), and to vote on the question: "Shall license be granted to sell intoxicating liquors? Yes or No."

Article 7. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs of ways and bridges.

Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the road between the Taunton line and Freetown line running through the town, pass Berkley Common, and known as the Old Stage Road, providing the Massachusetts Highway Commission under the Acts of 1908 will make an allotment for this purpose. Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, transportation of scholars and repairs on public buildings.

Article 10. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of poor, salaries of town officers, state aid and incidental expenses,

Article 11. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the gypsy and brown tail moths.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the cemetery and care of graves of soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish Wars.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to payment of taxes, and what rate of interest is to be charged after a certain date for uncollected taxes.

Article 15. To see if the town will give the Monuumental Association a permit to place in the new library a bronze tablet to the memory of the soldiers and to finish the basement for a lecture room, no expense to the town.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

Caucus Monday night, Feb. 28, at 8 o'clock.

Town meeting March 6, at 10 o'clock A. M.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

The appropriations as recommended by your board to cover the running expenses of the town were voted at the annual meeting with the understanding that it could be done with a tax rate that would not exceed \$15.00 per thousand. The money has been raised and the town's expenses paid with a tax of \$14.50, but we have had to carry over a note of \$2,000, because some of the taxes have not been paid. This may give the impression that the town can not be run on a \$15.00 rate, but it can and should be in 1916, if the taxes are collected when due. To illustrate this we would call your attention to these facts: at the end of the year the town owes \$2,000; to offset this we have about \$700 cash on hand and outstanding taxes of nearly \$2,000. It will readily be seen that the town should take some action towards a closer collection of taxes. If we are to close our fiscal year free from debt the taxes must be paid during that year, or else we shall have to establish a higher rate so that the amount paid by those who do pay their taxes in the year that they are assessed will be large enough to meet the current expenses. If the latter course is to be followed our rate for this year would have been \$18.00 instead of \$14.50. This is a matter that should interest every taxpayer.

The town raised \$1,500 and the state made an allotment of a like sum which was expended to improve the old stage road, so-called. This money was spent under the direction of the Mass. Highway Commission and 6,200 feet of road built; the same has proven to be an exceptionally good job. We shall have an article in the warrant so that another appropriation can be made to continue this work if the town so desires.

The Monumental Association have offered to place in the new library a bronze tablet to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War who served to the credit of Berkley or who have lived in the town, and also to finish the basement for a lecture room, they to bear all the expense.

There was an appropriation of \$200, made this year to care for the graves of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish Wars. It was voted that whatever part of this money was not used for that purpose should be spent to make general improvements in the cemetery. The money was spent under the direction of the trustees of the cemetery with very good judgment; all the soldiers graves that were not being cared for have been put in proper shape and the balance of money has been used in laying out a drive through the grounds from one entrance to the other and clearing out bushes and briers. While they have made great improvements it will take considerable more money to finish this work and make the grounds respectable. This work should be carried on to where the cemetery shall become a credit to the town and then kept so.

As Overseers of the Poor, we have to report that the amount of aid furnished this year has been considerable more than usual, owing to having a very expensive case on our hands. Your board has recovered nearly \$600 of the money spent on this case so that our net expenditure will be about \$578. We still have this case to take care of.

A law that goes into effect Aug. 13, 1916, will relieve the town of all cases that have been absent from the town five years; this will mean considerable to us for we get rid of a family that has been on our hands a good part of the time since 1886.

There have been but few cases of contagious diseases, with the exception of measles reported during the year.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

I have the pleasure of presenting through you to the town and state my fifth annual report. It signifies that another school year has past, successfully, in ways not always definable. The work has been continued along the same general lines as in the past. We think it is effective, from the rank that our children are taking in other schools that they attend. We realize that we are handicapped in several ways; the training of those who speak a foreign tongue at home, the crowded condition of one of our school rooms and the few pupils in some other schools, the low wage paid and because of this the compelling necessity of employing those teachers who are without experience and professional training. Since consolidation of schools has never strongly appealed to the citizens of the town, one road to success, only, is open: namely the strengthening of each individual school. One way is to establish a minimum and maximum standard of salary. If the minimum were made ten dollars per week and the maximum at the end of two years twelve dollars per week, some very desirable teachers might be retained for several years. This also would command the attention of trained and experienced teachers. Since the town has no expensive departments to maintain apart from its roads, the slight increase in appropriation for schools ought to meet with a ready response. There is yet another reason for increasing the efficiency of our schools. At present there is no central graded school that the pupils may attend for a year or two prior to entering the city high school. To have pupils enter such a school, whose only training has been in a rural school

demands excellent teaching. Furthermore it is a sort of a survival of the fittest, inasmuch as some pupils that now fail would enter the high school if they could have more thorough preparation.

As was anticipated, the demands of the Teachers' Retirement Board has led to a slight increase of salary. However, there seems to be more reluctance to raise the wage of the teacher than of the domestic, although thirteen years is the minimum training of the former and frequently absolute ignorance the possession of the latter.

At times the desirability of making rather radical changes in the management of the schools is presented to the superintendent. He always welcomes these suggestions with pleasure, because they come from those who are thinking of the welfare of the child. The parent who keeps in close touch with the future of his child is worthy of consideration. Among the suggestions presented are those relating to the different systems of reading, the desirability of admitting children to grade one at both opening of the school in the fall and also at midyear, the semi-annual promotion that would follow such admission, change of text books of various subjects, whether there should be eight or nine grades, the adoption of different vocational subjects, vacation schools, playgrounds and others. Some of these are permissible where schools are closely graded and many pupils are under one roof. But when schools are chiefly or entirely rural and the homes furnish instruction in some of the common duties and these same homes, in their environment and aspirations, are far removed from others that send their children to graded schools, then the problem becomes complex. Under such conditions wisdom apparently points to the road that is progressive and yet conservative. In connection with this whole scheme it must be remembered that we all are creatures of habit and that the school has the child for less than six hours a day for

one hundred eighty days per year, while the home and the world has him for the remaining time. Furthermore in a large number of the homes a foreign language is spoken and even that not in its purity. Can the public wonder that in many an instance a child of fourteen years scarcely qualifies for an employment certificate? I fear the gravity of this problem is not fully comprehended by those to whom it should appeal with force. At this very hour the nation is made to realize very keenly that it is one thing to give a foreigner a set of naturalization papers and quite another affair to make him an American citizen in truth. The chief work of our schools is to make real American men and women in respect to education and morals. To accomplish this the educational plant must be thoroughly equipped with up-to-date machinery.

Attention is called to the appended reports of the School Physician and Attendance Officer. The cordial sympathy and co-operation of teachers and all school officials have greatly aided us in securing whatever success we may have attained.



#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

To the citizens of Berkley:

Three years ago the town started road improvements under the Small Town Act; since then over four miles of bituminous gravel road has been built. It has cost \$12,000.00; of this amount the town contributed \$4,500.00, the State \$6,000.00, and the County \$1,500.00.

The valuation of the town a year ago was \$571,277.00, now it is \$595,797.00, showing an increase of \$24,520.00. We present these facts for your consideration, as to how much of this increase in valuation is due to road improvement and as to whether it has been a good proposition for the town.

Your Board called the attention of the County Commissioners to the poor condition of Berkley and Dighton bridge and also filed a petition and bill in the legislature for a new one. The county employed an expert to examine the bridge and his report condemns same. The bridge has been closed to vehicles with a gross weight, loaded, of more than a ton and all vehicles restricted in speed to not more than five miles an hour while crossing same, temporary repairs will have to be made to make it safe pending the building of a new bridge.

The contract for the lease of our oyster grounds expires in 1918; if the State Board of Health enforce their order to take the sewage out of the river, there is a possibility that the grounds may become valuable again.

As Overseers of the Poor we report that the town brought suit and will probably recover \$624.00 the amount expended on one case this year, the court has decided in the town's favor.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

Each year many commendable statements might be made relative to individuals schools. These would be of small value. The larger outlook should be briefly and forcibly stated. That is the view point of this resort.

The schools as a whole have grown smaller. This is especially noticeable at Myricks. Time will prove whether this condition is permanent. Because of this Nos. 4 and 5 should be closed. Pupils from the former transported to No. 5 and from the latter to No. 1. There is no commendable reason for keeping them open.

Again we affirm that our schools should not be taught by inexperienced high school graduates. There should be a minimum and maximum standard wage that would secure experienced or trained teachers.

To say that the children attending rural schools are less healthy than city children attending city graded schools sounds startling. Yet statistics gathered by experts prove the assertion. Various factors contribute to this condition. Both the rural home and the rural school house are not constructed from a sanitary view point. Nearly every country school house is a one room building improperly and poorly lighted with no system of ventilation except doors and windows. Furthermore most of the buildings have sinks without traps that discharge the water under the school building. No doctor would approve such a disposal of refuse water. Again the sanitary conditions of the outbuildings justly invite criticism when viewed from both moral and sanitary standards. The average location, the absence of all

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screens, the smallness, the lack of proper construction, the dilapidation, the absence of reasonable care render these buildings a menace to health and a source of moral contagion. On this question dollars cannot be weighed against health and morals. Just as cleanliness arises from clean surroundings just so does clean thinking come from clean environment.

The statement that those who do not share largely in the common expense of human uplift ought not to have a large share in its benefits is misleading. The solution of that problem is not to be in the deprivation of the poor and inefficient, locally, but in so grappling with the larger social problems at the chief seat of government that lesser and easier problems only will be given the average community to solve. It is too late to halt the line of immigration when once it has broken ranks and scattered to the boundaries of the nation. The only thing to do is to rise to the occasion, for it is a man's work, and with mighty effort build up such a system of educational environment, without regard to cost, that will insure national safety and produce the highest development. Thinkers in all professions, social workers without respect to creed or clan, statesmen of vision agree, that, in this generation the mighty problem of human development must be well defined and outlined, if the world is to be safe and sane. Efficiency is the demand: and a man either measures up to it in taking his place among men or becomes a part of the human scrap heap. This is true in both professional and industrial life. Plenty of red blood is demanded. Men are in demand who are trained for a man's work not for the place of an idler. The inefficient in brain and hand become driftwood. The man of training has more than several chances to one, compared with the untrained. Innate talent is not sufficient. It must be developed, educated, fitted for

life's duties if it is to serve a useful purpose. Wild theories, that magnify the efficiency of ignorance, are extremely deluding. The deeds of men in all fields of endeavor are such a large part of human history that undeniable proofs are within easy reach of him who would honestly know the truth.

We take great pleasure in expressing our thanks to teachers and school officials for their aid and cordial support in the work of the year.

Article 1. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library and make what other appropriation that is necessary.

Article 2. To act on report of town officers.

Article 3. To fix compensation for collector and treasurer for ensuing year.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, transportation of scholars and repairs on public buildings.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of poor, salaries of town officers, state aid and incidental expenses.

Article 10. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the cemetery and care of graves of soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish Wars.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to improve Myricks street, providing the State will make an allotment of an equal amount.

Article 14. To see if town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a school house at Berkley Bridge.

Article 15. To act on any other business that may come before the meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

Our fiscal year has closed, the town has no indebtedness except one note of \$1,000, due in March. There is \$2,370.73 of uncollected taxes. Our tax rate was \$1,700. per thousand.

3,350 feet of road has been built in Myricks under the Small Town act. The state making an allotment of \$1,500 and the town appropriating an equal amount. We can probably get help from the state this coming year if the town will make an appropriation to continue this work, they also paid one half of the bill for oiling roads.

Berkley and Dighton bridge has been practically rebuilt by the County and is about as good as new. The Selectmen of Dighton petitioned for a reapportionment of the cost maintenance. Your Board appeared at the hearing and protested against having any more put on to Berkley it was finally settled that Dighton should pay 7/10 and Berkley 3/10 which is the same as it has been.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORΓ.

To the School Committee of Berkley:

The number of pupils enrolled during the past year is very nearly the same as that of the previous year. The noticeable decrease in one school is compensated for by slight additions in several others.

On the evening of November 19th, the school department of the town met with a serious loss in the complete destruction of No. 3 building. Fortunately the books, supplies and most of the furniture were saved. The building was in very good condition and cannot be replaced for \$3,000. After a delay of less than a week the pupils were comfortably provided for in a former school house that was near. Both teacher and pupils are apparently doing their work as successfully as ever. Considering the price of labor and material, even if both were available, the smallness of the school, 12 pupils, and more than all else, the possible consolidation of schools by the state in the near future it would not be good business to rebuild at present. So great has been the success in the middle west and west in consentuation of pupils in buildings where all the pupils can have an equal opportunity and so successful have been the efforts of some towns in this state in securing these advantages, that the time cannot be very remote when parents will insist upon having the best for their children, here.

At various times the superintendent has voiced his opinion in favor of bringing pupils together when classes may be larger and teaching periods longer. The consolidation of schools admits of additional opportunities for helping the children in modern vocational methods. When there are a dozen or less pupils to a school the efforts of teacher and superintendent are of little avail in developing modern educational theories, even though these theories under other surroundings are decidedly workable.

Apparently, at present, the only course persuable, for those who are thoroughly interested in child welfare, is to patiently wait for some opportunity to put the schools on the proper basis.

Too much praise cannot be given the teachers who have remained loyal to their work, when other fields of employment, inviting in time and character and paying a far higher wage are attainable. Loyal to their profession, honorably keeping their agreements, where multitudes disregard compacts made, losing opportunities for just advancement merited by years of advancing usefulness, these and more will all be forgotten by the masses. But for the present it must not be forgotten that in the restless condition of society added care and strain fall to the lot of the instructor in order to maintain the Standard of educa-Additional work, increases expense, helping in tion. some form of war calls put a stress on the loyal patriotic teacher in both her professional and citizen capacity. Furthermore the great and unprecedented call of men from this profession to the field of arms has created a hitherto unheard of demand for teachers. Every town in making up its financial budget for the coming school year *must* substancially increase its appropriations.

The national and state governments at frequent intervals stress their opinions relative to education in all its phases. It is practically a national edict that children under 14 years of age shall not be removed from school to exploit any personal or selfish plans. There are not wanting those who would take advantage of the present state of affairs to forward their own mercenary motives. In connection with the whole school problem the Commission of Education has expressed his position in these words, "It is timely to re-emphasize the importance of carrying forward the work of public education at every point at the highest possible standard of efficiency." "Needless to say, the common desire of school officers, as well as citizens, is that the schools shall at once perform their present duty to the nation and protect the interests of the children with respect both to themselves and to the future citizenship of which they will be a part."

As the children of today are the men and women of tomorrow, the practical place for proper citizen training is the public school. Even today after being and having for three and one half years a great part in the awful world conflict, our nation does not fully sense its duty. The only remedy for this is to teach the children that not only is there such a thing as democracy but that they now are and in the future will be a part of that democracy. That its characteristics are unselfishness, justice and sympathy; but that it also demands that individuals and nations shall both give and take in all their relations. To teach the children to take, only, is to found another and greater autocracy and thus defeat the efforts of men and women who are giving their all to make the world safer The war will leave scars of bitterness that and saner centuries cannot efface. Education must be so broad and sane that peace will abide forever and that there will be no room for the traitor. On this issue the school must give no uncertain sound. Official and teacher must be loval.

With pleasure we express our thanks to all who have aided in making the school work of the year successful.



# For March 10,1919

Article 1. To see if the town will appropriate any part of the dog fund to the Public Library and make what other appropriation that is necessary.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of poor, salaries of town officers, state aid and incidental expenses.

Article 10 To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 11 To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths.

Article 12 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the cemetery and care of graves of soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish Wars.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to improve Myricks street, providing the State will make an allotment of an equal amount.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to improve Berkley street providing the State will make an allotment of an equal amount.

Article 15. To act on any other business that may come before the meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee of Berkley:

#### Loss of Time.

No statement of the school year's work would be complete without a mention of the loss caused by closing of the schools for four or more weeks. To some this does not appeal because thay are not in close touch with the schools or think that in some mysterious manner the pupil will absorb enough education to get through the grade or complete the year's work. But to the teacher and school official as well as a few homes, loss of time is a source of anxiety. Time can never be made up, neither can it be substituted. We either move along with the current of the stream or are left behind with all the connecting results. Although some localities are conditioned more than we are, yet our position is serious, because so many of the homes depend upon market gardening for an income. After a careful survey of the whole subject it was decided to shorten the winter vacation and lengthen the school year in June. Even under these conditions some time will be lost, Although teachers and pupils will intensify their work yet it will be impossible in some cases for pupils to complete the grades. Some work must be left over to the following year and the loss charged to the debit side of life's account.

#### School Attendance.

This is a perennial topic. It must remain such until a reasonable degree of perfection has been attained. That degree is the inalienable right of a child to an education that comprises the first fourteen years of his life. Since that child is to become an American citizen it is not within the province of the parent to say when or how much his child shall attend school. That prerogative belongs only to the state and nation. During the past two years, while home labor has been in great demand, the child has been sacrificed to the greed of the home. The large wage attainable in the mill has so preyed upon the cupidity of many a parent that he has forced the older child into the factory and kept the younger one to work at home during school hours. When appealed by the attendance officer, such a parent will present a variety of excuses, frequently based upon an overdrawn imagination, and continue to cheat his child and the nation. This procedure is radically wrong no matter by whom practiced. Until every man, voluntarily or by compulsion, obeys the laws of the state a stable democracy is theoretical only. To give a child only a half opportunity for an education is failing to give him an opportunity to become an American citizen. Far more frequently than is thought pupils leave school when in the 5th or 6th grade. Such a child, because there are neither books nor papers in the home to maintain school standards, relapses into a degree of ignorance that prevents him from becoming a man among men in any business way. When the national census shows that in Bristol County, of this Commonwealth, there is an illiteracy of 10.8 per cent., it is time that the children were given a chance to attend school instead of being cheated year after year of their rights by their ignorant parents.

Any sane citizen need only look at present European conditions to fully realize which is the safer element in any country, educated or uneducated.

#### Work or Play.

It is not a very uncommon practice to have a pupil in the high school so neglect his work that he fails to receive a passing mark. Perhaps a slight margin should be allowed for extenuating circumstances for which the home is responsible; but in the main, it is a personal affair with the boy or girl. He does not appear to sense the fact that the high school is far different from the country school that he last attended and which sent him out to try his fortune with scores of others. In the high school, mark ing time is not enough. Being in faithful daily attendance is not sufficient. Faithful thorough preparation of all lessons and good recitations must be added to such attendance. Furthermore there must be an ambition to reach higher rank by hard work no matter how many hours the preparation of a lesson requires. It is not just to the town that pays the tuition and transportation, nor to the state that may or may not in part reimburse the town for such expenses, to allow undue shirking. Such a practice encourages an obtuse view of rights and privileges by pupils and leads them to think that they have an inalienable right to disregard all responsibility at their own pleasure. Occasionally the home will encourage such a pupil to change from one high school to another, which for the major part is of doubtful benefit, in order to prolong the day of final failure. Such procedure is wrong for the pupil, who if he will not do his full duty at school should be placed at some useful occupation. If a parent is determined to indulge his child in this manner, after a

fair trial of one year in the high school and the failure of such pupil to maintain a passing rank, he should pay all bills and take the consequences with good grace.

#### Consolidation of Schools.

With the opening of the schools last autumn Nos. 3 and 5 were closed and the pupils transferred to No. 1. This called for an expenditure of \$20 per week as compared with \$28 per week if those schools were maintained. On this basis a saving of \$288 was made for the year. Furthermore by this combination No. 1 has only 23 pupils; a medium sized school. The monetary statistics are given on the basis of a \$12 wage for the teacher, which is not sufficient if anyone except an inexperienced high school graduate is to be secured. Again the outlook for securing teachers is far from being hopeful. Since we cannot pay a wage that will hold our teachers when offered city positions, we cannot do better than to consolidate our schools. reduce the number of teachers, and by paying a larger wage secure the services of a trained or experienced teacher. Too frequently, when this subject is under discussion, the child's interests are not considered equal to those of the parent who has nothing but his own personal opinions to present. At present there is no reasonable expectation that with a change of prices in respect to commodities there will come a reduction of teachers' wages thus enabling the town to return to the little school with its handful of children and a school keeper at the desk. That day has passed. The wage of the teacher is steadily increasing and will tend in that direction until she receives annually a worthy compensation in dollars. Also the day is rapidly approaching when the state will decide who is properly

trained to teach school. Under these conditions it appears to be wisdom to unite schools and hire the best teacher available.

With pleasure we express our thanks to all who have aided in making the school work of the year successful.

Article 8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools, including supplies, high school tuition, salary of superintendent, transportation of scholars and repairs on public buildings.

Article 9. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of poor, salaries of town officers, state aid and incidental expenses.

Article 10. To choose a memorial committee and appropriate a sum of money for same.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose of exterminating the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in the cemetery and care of graves of soldiers and sailors of the Civil and Spanish Wars.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to improve Myricks street, providing the State will make an allotment of an equal amount.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to improve Berkley street providing the State will make an allotment of an equal amount.

Article 15. To act on any other business that may come before the meeting.

# SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The cost of running the town is rapidly increasing, with a tax rate of twenty dollars per thousand and our valuation increased approximately ten percent. Our revenue was not enough to pay our expenses. The town owes a note of two thousand dollars and a tuition bill of seven hundred. In addition to this we shall have to pay the County \$1,752.60, our proportional part of construction of the new Tuberculosis Hospital and ninety-one dollars for maintenance of same from Sept. 2, 1919, to Jan. 1, 1920, making a total indebtedness of \$4,543.60. There is due the town about \$2,400 in uncollected taxes.

The town appropriated \$3,000.00 for road construction under the Small Town Act, the state making us an allotment of the same amount. Half of the money was expended in Myricks and the balance on Berkley street.

The sum of \$400.00 was appropriated to be used in giving a welcome home to our returning soldiers. Joseph Howland was appointed chairman of the committee.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

# To the School Committee of Berkley:

# Teachers

In school history, this year is prominent for at least one characteristic, the shortage of teachers. This cannot be attributed to continued war work nor to a shortage of workers in any special field. Doubtless the increased prices of nearly every commodity and the low salary of the teacher, compared with the wage of the so-called laboring man or woman, are the chief factors. There is a serious fault somewhere when one hundred forty-three thousand teachers leave the profession in a single year, as they did during the past twelve months in the United States. As yet, the fact that a teacher must support herself fifty-two weeks each year, has not impressed the public deeply enough to secure a merited wage. Too often the salary is estimated upon the number of weeks that the school is in session. Furthermore, it is not considered necessary to give any thought to the fact that when a teacher is compelled to spend her vacation working in some factory, that teacher returns to her school work of the next year less efficient than she would have been, had she been given the weeks for study and some thought upon her approaching school problems. As never before the teacher must be better educated, have some degree of professional training, give more thought to her work, read more widely for assistance and culture, attend more educational meetings, in short be a member of a profession that is the foundation of all educational training.

That the teacher has the deciding vote whether she will accept or reject any offered position is not to be considered out of present day order. The expecta tion is not to be fostered that in a few years the schools, with all their environment, will return to prewar conditions. Wisdom indicates that all school workers must be received on a par with the best that any community has to give; because the work that is done inside the school, and the influence exerted there by the teacher is equal to, or exceeds, any other influence that makes for stable democracy. Without reasonable contradiction it may be asserted that there is no other profession or association that has as high a percentage of loyal men and women as the teachers' profession. Real dependable loyalty to things that are right and pure, at this hour, is worthy of consideration.

Hundreds of schools throughout the country are closed for lack of teachers. This applies to all grades. The normal schools have less pupils, by comparison, than many other educational institutions. Furthermore the increased number of graduates from colleges and technical schools would not fill the depleted ranks of the teaching profession even if they entered the work in large numbers. This, in conjunction with the wage problem, becomes the determining factor as to who must teach school. Had not married and single women, who years ago voluntarily left the profession, thinking never again to take up the work, listened to the appeals of the superintendent and committee and realizing the unusual need for school workers, returned to their former work, very many more schools would have been closed permanently. The age when

applicants are waiting in line to teach rural schools. perhaps under unpleasant conditions, is forever past. All angles having been considered, what must be done to keep the schools on a proper working basis? First, the teacher must be received as a member of society suitable to her profession and be given comfortable working conditions. Second, she must receive a salary that will afford her a good living for the whole year; and again, this salary must be large enough to lay aside a fair amount for the years of less active life. No so-called pension can compensate for a wage that half starves a teacher. The teacher is surely coming into her inheritance, social, educational, financial. The financial side must be met in a spirit of fairness and justice to all concerned interests or the schools will be limited in their usefulness.

With pleasure we express our thanks to the teachers and all others who have aided in making the school work of the year successful.
