ROSE CULTURE

In deep, rich, heavy soil, even inclined to adobe, Roses are strong, vigorous growers with flowers of great substance. But even in a light, sandy soil, Roses can be made to grow well, and they flower, as a rule, earlier than in heavy soil. To improve light soils, add clay, peat or adobe, and use our **Sunset Special Fertilizer**. See page 44. Do not apply strong fertilizers to the roots, but dust it on the surface and rake in slightly after the bushes are planted.

Frequent cultivating is absolutely necessary. Plant each bush so that the point where it is budded is 2 to 3 inches below the ground. Do not sprinkle the tops in the late afternoon as it causes mildew and other fungous troubles.

Add 10 per cent for postage to points outside of California.

PRUNING

This should be done during December, January, and February, as at that time the bushes are dormant. Cut just above a prominent dormant bud that points outward.

Remove all small, twiggy growth, eutting back to strong, well-ripened eanes which are well furnished with dormant eyes. As a general thing, the entire top of the plant should be removed. See illustration.

NOTE. Our Roses are used by the U. S. Government. We supplied hundreds of bushes to the Letterman General Hospital at the Presidio, Fort Mason, Navy Yard, Mare Island, and other posts. Our Roses have the quality required by rigid Government inspection.

How to Raise Flowers Successfully from Seed

It is better, in most instances, except hardy annuals, to start the seed in shallow boxes about 4 inches deep, using very sandy soil with leaf-mould, so that it will not bake, and provide for drainage by boring some holes in the bottom of the box. Set the boxes in a warm, sheltered place, but protect from direct sunlight. When the plants have made the fourth leaf, they should be pricked out, reset in another box or in pots, and when well started they should be transplanted into the garden. If the sced is to be sown directly in the garden, it should be done after the soil is well worked and fertilized. A slight depression should be made with a stick, the seed sown, and then covered with sharp sand about twice the depth of the diameter of the seed. The sand will prevent the crusting over of the soil after watering.

A common mistake in sowing flower seed, as well as other seed, is covering too deep. As a general rule, cover only to the depth of the thickness of the seeds. Always press the earth down firmly after sowing all flower seeds, else there is a danger of their drying up before the roots can get firm hold of the soil.

After the ground is thoroughly worked, roll it before seeding, to prevent it from settling unevenly, and then rake the surface lightly. Sow the seed so as to cover the ground thoroughly, and then cover it lightly with soil. Roll again so as to press the seed in firmly. If you have no roller, use boards and tramp on them so as to pack the ground firmly, but a roller is preferred. New lawns should not be allowed to dry out, not

even for a half day. For the first 15 days the lawn should be watered twice a day if necessary.

A lawn should be fertilized after the first cutting, and at least twice a year. Water well after applying.

Sow the seed thick chough at the start and save yourself a lot of unnecessary work. Use 1 pound to a

space 10 x 10 feet.

Warning. Do not use the so-called rotted manure. It is full of wild clover and other weed seeds. Pests, such as slugs, snails, beetles, etc., get a start through eggs and larvæ in such manure. A few pounds of good fertilizer is equal to a sack of manure. If you want a moisture-holding material for top-dressing use peat; it



inches apart each way. They should be planted in part shady or shady locations, and do very well outdoors; can also be grown as pot-plants indoors. One bulb in a 6- or 7-inch pot is the general practice. Several bulbs can be planted in larger pots. Remember, the north side of a building, a north wall, or other shady spot is just the place for these beautiful plants.

Giant Single-flowered. These often have flowers that measure 7 inches across. Plants grow as high as 18 inches. The blooms have a waxy texture, and a glowing sheen not found in any other flower.

Crispa. (Ruffled Type.) This is a large-flowered sort with ruffled and fluted edges.

Giant Fimbriata. (Carnation-flowered Type.) Double flowers like carnations.
