We cannot imagine any possible shadow of an excuse for the manifest indifference shown by the people of this county, on the subject of improvements—the introduction of water from the Merced or Joaquin, for instance. This project is admitted by all parties, to be of the utmost importance to the interests—directly or indirectly—of every man, woman, and child in the county. It is not the miner alone, who will reap the advantages to be derived from this much talked of enterprise. With a plentiful supply of water, will come also an immense addition to our population, and what is evident to every person, an increased demand for the services of all classes and professions.

It requires no argument to demonstrate the immediate and urgent necessity of a supply of water, or to prove that without it, we shall lose what importance and advantages we do possess, and our residents find their way to other more favored portions of California.

It is not to be expected that the large amount of money, necessary to carry on an enterprise of such magnitude, can be spared from other pursuits in this immediate vicinity—scarcely in the county. All that is required is to make a start, organize an association composed of energetic business men, who possess a little of the go-ahead spirit; raise a portion of the requisite capital to show those who have the capital and are willing to invest it, that we are in earnest, and that the project is known to be important and valuable as an investment alone, by those who are, from their residence in the county, best qualified to judge.

The Miners' Advocate, (Diamond Springs) in speaking of canals, says: "If the plan should be exhausted, (which cannot happen in a century,) the sale of the water for manufacturing and agricultural purposes, will pay a large percent on the original outlay."

Every day that this subject is postponed, only defers that "good time coming" to the people of Mariposa. Considerable has been said lately on this subject, but it should be agitated and discussed until something is done. Let every body contribute according to his ability to the success of the good cause.

The trial of Senor Del Valle the Mexican Consul in San Francisco has, after a great deal of arguing and noise, at last been brought to a close and the Senor found guilty. During the trial it was found necessary to have the evidence of the French Consul Mr. Dillon, and a polite request was sent to him to attend the Court—this he refused to do, and Judge Hoffman issued an attachment to compel him to appear. The arrest was made, after a protest of the part of the Consul against the authority of the Court, and Mr. Dillon conducted to the court room where he still refused compliance. The whole matter was reconsidered by the Court and it was finally decided that the Consul was right, and that the Court had no power to compel him to testify.

Mr. Patrick Dillon gave a loud cry, struck his consular flag and awaits the action of his government.

Some of the San Francisco papers affect a terrible fear, lest the Emperor of the French may take it into his head to demolish Uncle Sam's whole establishment! A committee from the Peace Society should wait on him at once and avert, if possible, the threatened "wrath to come."

Another Lump—We were shown on Wednesday last, a piece of yellowish looking metal weighing 11 oz. and \$5, which together with about 3 oz. of fine gold, was taken out in one day from the claim of Messrs. Broadhead, Crippin & Westfall, on the Mariposa. The lump is nearly two inches square and about three eighths of an inch at its thickest part, and contains not a particle of quartz. This is not the only lump ever found in this particular neighborhood either, as the following, found within one mile of this town will show:

One lump of 52 oz.; one of 50 oz. and \$1. one of quartz and gold, which contained 147 oz of gold; another of quartz and gold weighing 192 lbs., containing about 180 oz.; besides smaller ones of twelve ounces and less, too numerous to mention. The mines are worked out—entirely exhausted—of course they are.

STANISLAUS COUNTY.—At the election of officers for the new county, which takes place on the 10th of next month the sovereigns will have some difficulty in choosing a Sheriff, there being only about eight candidates in the field for that office! At the same time, a location for the county seat is to be selected by vote. Those interested in Empire City offer to build the necessary public buildings gratis, if that place is selected. The offer is a liberal one, and Empire City being a central location, will doubtless be the future county seat of Stanislaus county.

The first Quarterly Meeting of the M. E. Church South, will be held in Mariposa on the 13th and 14th insts. A general attendance is requested.

Legislative Proceedings &c.

SACRAMENTO, May 1st 1854.

Legislative business at the Capital, still "drags its slow length along,"—although but a few days more will elapse before a general stampede of the assembled wisdom of the State, will take place.

A bill has passed the Senate, appropriating \$1723 for the relief of D. D. C. Ilen, for services in pursuing and bringing back to the State,—from Missouri—a fugitive from justice. The crime committed, was stealing two yoke of oxen, worth about \$300!

Mr. McFarland thought this a very fine plan for franking a man from one State to another. Debate elicited the fact that after all the expense, the man was not arrested at all. Also an act to exempt certain property from forced sale,—an amendment to which provides that the Court House, Jail and land necessary for public purposes shall be exempt in each County.

In the Assembly, the Committee on Claims reported unfavorably to the passage of the bill for the relief of John Boling, Sheriff of your County.

Also passed the Assembly, a bill for the protection of owners of drift timber and logs.

Also, to authorize J. R. Beals and others to build a toll-bridge across the Pajaro river.

Also, requiring the State Treasurer to keep the Public money under his own immediate control.

Also, to amend the act for the security of State Prison Contracts, which reduces the mileage for transporting prisoners, to one half the present rates.

Also, a bill to prevent duelling, and preventing the testimony of Chinese being received in Courts of Justice, when white men are concerned.

Also, a bill for the protection of game, and a bill providing for the appointment of Dept. County Treasurer.

The following bills have passed both houses and are waiting the signature of the Governor:

Defining the boundaries of Stanislaus County. To fix the place of residence of State officers at Sacramento. To create the office of State Printer, and providing for his election at the general election in 1855 and every two years thereafter.

This bill makes important reductions in the cost of public printing, by which a large saving will be made annually.

The Governor has signed the following bills:

To provide an office for the County Surveyor of San Francisco County.

To fund the debt of Solano Co.

To legalize affidavits taken before County Recorders.

To amend the City charter of San Francisco.

The above particulars include the whole of the most important business transacted since my last. A number of bills, many of them of importance have been introduced, however, but as far as final action is concerned, nothing has been done with them, further than referring to Committees, where they will remain until the last day or two of the session, when the whole batch will be called up and passed in a lump. Another grand attempt to entrap the opponents of an election this session was made 1st week. The plan was pretty well arranged, but didn't win. The enthusiasm of the Broderickites has about fizzled out.

A GREAT SCHEME—A project has been started again to unite Lake Michigan and the Mississippi, by steamboat navigation.

A writer in a Chicago paper suggests that by turning the water of Lake Michigan through the south branch of the Chicago river to Bridgeport, thence by the north branch of the south branch to Mud Lake, and by a channel to be dredged through that lake to the Des Plaines to the distance that might be found necessary, a sufficient supply may be obtained to prevent any interruption of navigation of the Illinois and Mississippi rivers on account of low water. The distance from Chicago to the Des Plaines, by the proposed route, is only fourteen miles, and it is estimated that the deep excavation would not exceed twenty-five feet.

We have received the first number of the "Golden Hills News," a Chinese newspaper—the only one ever published in America. The number of Chinese in California, is estimated at about 30000, and a newspaper devoted to their interests which they can read, would be of incalculable advantage to themselves and others.

The publishers are Messrs. Howard & Larsen, San Francisco.

WHALE IN THE BAY.—A dead whale, says the S. F. Herald, of monstrous size floated through the Golden Gate on Tuesday, and was carried by the tide up the Bay. It was seen by the workmen engaged on the Government works at Fort Point.

The squat-on-town-lot-fever, which raged so furiously not long since in San Francisco, has at length broken out in our usually healthy and quiet town, although in much milder form.

The first victims were a couple of distinguished gentlemen, both of whom have been, for a long time, afflicted with a peculiar constitutional infirmity, which renders them unfit for any extraordinary physical exertions.

Each commenced fencing in the same lot, having both (by a strange coincidence!) been seized with a desire to possess it, at about the same moment. There appeared to be an understanding—rather implied than expressed, that whichever fenced to a certain point first, should be declared the winner.

The manner in which the dust was made to fly, and the streams of perspiration to flow, just about that time, must have been painful to a tired man to witness.

Bets ran high on the different parties, and when our devil (who reports all of our City items) left, the moon was high up in the heavens, one of the parties had become a squatter, and the other was digging post-holes by "moonlight, alone." [COMMUNICATED.] MARIPOSA, April 27, 1854.

Messrs. Editors:—I would like to ask through your columns, a question, and that is—for what do we pay our taxes? is it to support a set of men who return us no equivalent for the high salaries we pay them? and have we no right, after having paid our taxes, to claim through these organs of the law, protection for our lives and property?

Last evening just at dusk, a man near the mouth of the Agua Fria was driving his animals into camp, when he received a volley of arrows, one of which sunk into his breast and came very near killing him. Was it for this he had paid his taxes? About two weeks since several fine animals at Guadalupe were stolen, and one of them came into camp to die with an arrow half buried in his body.

For what, did the owners of these animals pay taxes on them? About two months since, a part of an ox team was stolen from this neighborhood, and tracked by Mr. Earley as near to an Indian encampment as he considered safe to go alone. I might fill your sheet with like samples of evils, which people are subjected to who do not live in Mariposa street, and what answer do we get when we call for protection from those laws for which we have paid our taxes? Bring in the Indians and prove them guilty of shooting and stealing, and the law will punish them. Has the law no power to protect us, miners and working men though we are?

MARIPOSA. P. S. April 28—First rate time for the Joaquin gang to murder and steal on Indian credit. Four more animals stolen last night—two from Buckeye, and two from Guadalupe. "All right"—"Let'er Rip!" M.

SANTA CLARA VALLEY.—THE SALINAS PLAINS.—The Evening News furnishes an interesting account of a region of country passed through in a recent trip of the editor to Monterey: After leaving Juan Bautista, we crossed a spur of the Coast Range Mountains, and entered the finest valley in the world—the Salinas Plains. This tract of country, which is watered by the Salinas and its branches—formerly called the Buena Ventura river—is about 200 miles in length, by about seven or eight in breadth. Every foot of it is susceptible of cultivation, and the soil is fully equal, if not superior to that of the Santa Clara Valley. These plains are carpeted with wild flowers of every hue, and roved over by immense herds of stock; the soil is still virgin; scarcely a fence is to be seen in any direction, and yet the whole valley could be thrown into a wheat field by the simple process of plowing and sowing. These plains alone, producing at an average of only sixty bushels of wheat to the acre—although it is well known that oftentimes over a hundred have been reaped—would supply a population of over a million inhabitants.

THE OWL.—A small paper with the above title has lately been started at Jackson, Calaveras county. In one of its articles on the introduction of water into the town of Jackson, it holds forth in a strain decidedly rich. We make the following extract: As a beverage it is insipid, tasteless, and colorless. This we can state of our own knowledge, for we distinctly remember imbibing a glass of it in our school-boy days. And yet, so strong is the influence of some of the vices contracted in youth, that we know, and if necessary can point out many adults here in Calaveras county, who still indulge in the use of this detestable liquid, to an extent that must eventually shatter their constitutions and cost them their lives, to say nothing of their immortal souls.

A mail stage line has been established between the port of San Pedro and the Mormon Settlement of San Bernardino, direct.

A SCENE IN THE ASSEMBLY CHAMBER.—During the calling of the yeas and nays yesterday, says the Union, the "Widow" who keeps a private drinking saloon opposite the State House, entered the Assembly Chamber, leading one of the pages by the collar, and brandishing a cow-hide over his head. Stopping in front of the Speaker's chair, she held up a note, which this page had caused to be delivered to her from a Member of the Assembly, through a negro boy, and which she declared to contain obscene language, grossly insulting to her character. She demanded of the page to point out the author of the note, which he refused to do. She was then about to chastise him for his obstinacy, as the Sergeant-at-Arms took her in charge and led her from the hall. The scene occasioned no small degree of excitement for the moment, and the page was beset on all sides for a disclosure of the name of the guilty party. His discretion was to be relied on for betrayal, however, and he reserved the secret for the benefit of the member who had intrusted him with it. To say the least, the affair was exceedingly shabby, and it would have been well, perhaps, if the lady could have had the satisfaction of administering a few blows, well laid on, over the guilty member's back.

FROM OREGON.—We are indebted to "Chips," of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express, in Stockton, and Mr. G. W. Stelle of this place, for files of Oregon papers, from which we make the following extracts: We have information, says the Oregonian, that there is considerable gold being taken out on the Yakima, by some parties who have been in that region during the winter. It has long been known that gold existed in that part of the country, but as examinations have been limited, little has been known of its extent.

The Yakima heads near the Cascade Mountains, on the east side, and runs east for nearly one degree, when it turns in a southerly direction and embosoms into the Columbia near Walla-Walla. The country is inhabited by Indians, who appear to have used every effort to prevent the whites from examining it. In some instances they have driven the whites out of the country, when informed that they were in search of gold. Three years ago, an Indian brought to this city a quantity of gold dust which he obtained there; but said the chiefs would not permit the Bostons to come there, as they would be their land and drive the Indians off, if they found out there was "dollars"—meaning gold—there. Those who have traveled over the country, represent that it has every appearance of a gold region for a great extent.

DISCOVERY OF GOLD ON PUGET SOUND.—A correspondent of the Pioneer and Democrat, published at Olympia, writing from Steilacoom, under date of April 4th, says: The most intense excitement that has ever been created in this town, or any other in Washington Territory, was caused here to-day by the unmistakable discovery of gold! One of our citizens, Dr. P. M. Muse, took his spade and pan at an early hour this morning, and repaired to a spot at the head of high water, dug out a pan full of the earth, washed it, and found it to contain a handsome quantity of beautiful, real, simon-pure ore! Soon the news spread like wild-fire over the entire length and breadth of Steilacoom, and men and boys were seen hurrying to the spot, armed and equipped with shovels, picks and pans. All went to work with high hopes and hearty good will, and none without success. Some twenty-five dollars, probably, have been washed out to-day, from a hole some two feet square. One man washed out a beautiful specimen of virgin gold, weighing two dollars. Claims are already being taken and companies formed, and every thing promises that the work will be prosecuted vigorously and with success.

LATER FROM THE INDIAN RESERVATION.—Capt. Howard reached Stockton on Friday, with later intelligence from the Tejon. He informs the Republican, that affairs at the Reservation wear a most auspicious appearance. All is quiet, and the Indians are delighted at their prospects. The crops look fine, permanent improvements are in progress, and accession to the Indian population arrive daily. The Indians are now engaged in the construction of a large adobe "mission" building, a residence for the family of Lieutenant Beale, and huts for their own occupation. They have opened an excellent road from Los Angeles to the Tejon Pass. It was expected that the Indians of the Indian Chief Juan's tribe, some 5000 in number, would come in, but there was no certainty about it. No incident of particular interest had occurred. Capt. Howard represents that the country on King's, Kern, and Tulare rivers was fast being settled. The population has doubled within six months. An immense breadth of grain has been sown, and the crops have the most promising appearance. He says that the Tulare country is better adapted for the raising of hogs than any region he ever saw, there being an abundance of acorns and tule bottoms. The journey from Stockton to Los Angeles can be easily made with pack animals in ten days. The road is good, and there is an abundance of water and grass all the way.

Major Gordon has established a ferry on Kern river the boat being large enough for the passage of freighted wagons. The emigration to the State of Sonora is becoming surprisingly large. Parties of from three to twenty are continually passing to the southward. Capt. Smith and his mining company passed the Reservation a few days ago, bent on the same errand as the rest.

Week before last, six mules were missed from the Reservation, and it was supposed they were stolen. Capt. Howard with a company went out after the thieves and traveled some 300 miles. They went from the Tejon Pass to Lake Elizabeth, thence in a southeasterly direction to a point within sight of the Mohave river. They crossed the Tehpi Valley, which is some 30 miles in extent, and one of the richest spots on the continent. It is well watered by numerous streams, the pasture is rich, and wood plentiful. Near the Tehpi Pass, the party encountered a grizzly, which they killed. Passing on, they encountered three more of these formidable animals. One of them made an attack on Capt. Howard, and seized his stirrup. A well directed shot, however, broke one of its fore legs, and as the animal rolled on the ground, two other shots entered its body and all was over. Three bears were killed in all. One of the paws measured ten inches across.

A Telegraphic communication to the S. F. Herald says as follows: San Jose, April 27—10 1-2 P. M. The largest political meeting ever held in this county has just adjourned. It was gotten up by the Broderick clique on the Senatorial question, with the short space of forty-eight hours notice, but has resulted in their most overwhelming defeat—every motion made by them being voted down by more than a two-third vote. The motion to adjourn till the 1st of January was carried almost unanimously.

ADVENTURERS FOR THE RIO VIRGIL.—The Star of the 15th, says the prospecting party, under the guidance of Capt. Thomas Smith, left Los Angeles on the 10th, in search of gold in the region of country on the Colorado, near the mouth of the Virgin. They have taken provisions for three months, and left the city in good spirits, sanguine of success. The party numbers twenty-one men, and among them were several from the city of Napa, viz: P. D. Bailey, D. C. Tripper, I. O. Sweet, W. Pocher, I. L. Forts, P. Heinsinger, Handcock, and others. Several gentlemen joined the party on Los Angeles.

MERCED RIVER, April 23, 1854. Messrs. Editors.—Last evening we were visited by a very severe frost, which nearly destroyed all the melons, beans and cucumbers, and injured the potato vines and corn. I have not heard from low down on the river, but if the frost has been as severe generally as it was here, the injury will prove of serious magnitude. Barley and wheat looks exceedingly well. S
