# **Transition Time**

n recent travels I've been asked many questions and heard numerous comments by employees relating to the upcoming "changing of the guard" in the Northern Region. I'd like to encourage you to keep this change in its proper perspective. Look at it more like getting a new car—we're still headed down the road in the same direction to our destination; we'll just arrive in a different vehicle!

There have been many regional foresters over the years—Dave Jolly will be the 15th for the Northern Region. Changing regional foresters from one individual to another shouldn't result in dramatic changes in management.

However, our emphasis in managing the National Forests changes as concerns, interests, and priorities continue to change through time.

If we look back at the two previous regional foresters we see that Jim Overbay's mission was to build the Forest Plans and get them approved. John Mumma's mission was to implement the Forest Plans and develop a related integrated review process.

I see Dave Jolly's emphasis continuing to be directed toward Forest Plans. We will be turning to monitoring and evaluating the Plans, and making changes as needed. Our job will be to revalidate these Plans and make them as realistic as possible.

Putting this in perspective, we entered unchartered waters when we built the Forest Plans. In implementing the Plans we remained in unchartered waters. And we'll continue to be in uncharted waters as we make the necessary changes in our Plans.

We'll always be faced with new situations. We have active and diverse publics truly interested in the management of the National Forests of the Northern Region. Controversy has been, and will continue to be, part of our daily operation. And change will always be part of the Forest Service, regardless of who our regional forester is.

Dave Jolly comes to us with a broad background and a wealth of experience. He will be depending on all of you. Your challenge will be to take our Forest Plans and make them better than what they already are. Times will dictate that we be more effective and cost-efficient in our management of the Northern Region.

We have much to accomplish in the coming year, but I know we have the skills to get the job done in a professional manner.





# American Indian Heritage Month

resident George Bush recently signed a joint congressional resolution proclaiming November as National American Indian Heritage Month.

In honor of the resolution and to improve understanding between the Forest Service and Native Americans, a conference was held November 26 at the R-I Regional Office in Missoula.

Sponsors included the R-I Regional Office, Lolo National Forest, and the University of Montana Native American Studies Department. It was planned and hosted by Ira Jones, Native American program manager for the Regional Office. Jones, a member of the Nez Perce Tribe, has organized an annual Native American conference for R-I since 1986.

About 200 people filled the room to hear the eight speakers. Acting Regional Forester John Hughes gave the opening remarks. He stated the Forest Service presently has "a unique opportunity to open and sustain communications with the tribal people of this region," which comes at a period when the agency is taking a long, hard look at how it manages its land. It is an appropriate time "to draw upon the Native Americans land use ethic, to incorporate the best of what it has to offer."

Among the Native American speakers was Allen Pinkham, tribal coordinator on the Clearwater National Forest and a member of the Nez Perce Tribe. Pinkham cited land management issues as a special concern to both the Forest Service and Native Americans. Indian liaisons/coordinators have helped, he said, as a link between Federal agencies and various Indian tribes.

Pinkham endorsed on-going discussions on major concerns, despite any initial disagreement. "Let's talk before we go to Federal court to resolve these issues," he advised.

Reuben Mathias, member of the Salish-Kootenai Tribe, described his role as Kootenai National Forest liaison. He works closely with forest archaeologists, a cooperative effort that he said does honor to Native Americans and their culture.

Given the diversity of cultures, there is the potential for misunderstandings, stated Marcia Cross, a Salish-Kootenai tribal member and archaeologist with the Lolo National Forest. For this reason we must listen, she said, "and hear each other's words."

Efforts by the Kootenai National Forest to recognize the importance of Native American cultures were outlined by Rebecca Timmons, forest archaeologist. She described the

program developed to increase involvement of the Kootenai and Salish Tribes in cultural resource and land management planning.

Of major significance was the creation in 1982 of the position for a Native American to serve as a liaison between the tribes and the forest.

There is hope, Timmons concluded, that it will be understood that the aboriginal past is a critical link to the land we now manage. She ended her talk with the Blackfeet words which could be considered a theme of the conference, "Peigan Kunaitupii"—coming together.

Also addressed by Native American speakers was the issue of cultural identity. "It is hard to walk the Indian road," Reuben Mathias explained, with all the diversions and obstacles offered by the modern world. Indians often must live in two worlds, causing problems that must be faced and overcome.

Woody Kipp, a journalism instructor at the University of Montana and a member of the Blackfeet tribe, stressed the need for Indians to know their history.

Kipp revealed he had not always been knowledgeable of his own heritage. Following military service in Vietnam, he returned home to Cut Bank, Montana to embark on a personal search to learn more of his Indian past. At times Kipp felt tremendous bitterness and anger.

Kipp spoke movingly of his experiences as a child in dealing with racism. As a youngster who loved to read and write, he found it difficult to gain the recognition and support of teachers because he was Indian.

But Kipp found that "to live with anger is no good....No matter what happened in the past, (you) have to leave it in the past."

Closing remarks were made by Deputy Forest Supervisor Christopher Risbrudt, who endorsed agency support of actions that foster understanding between the Forest Service and Native Americans and meet the intent of Federal law.

America is entering a new era, Risbrudt said, one that does not force homogenization of cultures. To insure a respect for cultural diversity on a professional level, he recommended the development of multi-cultural strategies. On a personal level, "we must chart our course as individuals, one on one."


The conference ended with a special treat for the audience, a luncheon that featured smoked and baked chinook salmon. The food was prepared by Nellie Axtell and Cassandra Kipp, Nez Perce tribal members from Lapai, Idaho. Indian tacos were prepared by Ed and Gladys Brown of Arlee, Montana, members of the Salish-Kootenai and Navajo Tribes. The long line of people formed to be served made it obvious—the food was well worth the wait!

# Celebration at Trapper Creek

he Trapper Creek Job Corps Center held a variety of activities in November in honor of National American Indian Heritage Month. In celebration, a large, brightly colored banner was displayed for the entire month in the center's dining hall. Also, every Tuesday evening videos relating to Indian culture were available for viewing.

On November 22, staff members and students of the center's culinary arts program, with the assistance of other Job Corps students, prepared and served a Native American meal, which included such traditional foods as Indian tacos and fry bread.



The meal was not only enjoyable but educational as well, adding significantly to the cultural experience of both students and staff. The extra time and effort required of the culinary arts department was very much appreciated.

On November 25, a presentation on the effects of traditional culture on contemporary society was given by Woody Kipp, a Native American and instructor at the University of Montana. Kipp spoke of his own family history, personal changes he went through, and his participation in the American Indian Rights Movement.

In 1987, after a 14-year absence, Kipp returned to the University of Montana to resume his college studies. He graduated this year with a degree in journalism. He is now a counselor with the university's Native American Studies Program and an instructor in the journalism department.

In his message to Trapper Creek students, Kipp stressed the importance of knowing one's cultural heritage. This identity can become a stabilizing force in today's fast paced world and can bring about a tolerance for other people and their ways.

The contributions of those involved and the activities conducted during National American Indian Heritage Month at the Trapper Creek Job Corps Center provided an opportunity for improving our world by increasing the understanding of a different culture.

# **Forest Gets Name Change**

On November 20, President George Bush changed the name of Nezperce National Forest to Nez Perce National Forest by Executive Order 12781 to bring it into uniformity with spelling of the Nez Perce Tribe. The Northern Region has been actively trying to have the name officially changed since the early 1980's.

Former employees, CCC workers celebrating at Savenac. Ellen Vollmer is at far right, first row.



he recent celebration at the Savenac Nursery paid honor not only to the founding of the Forest Service but also to its own history. The period of operation extended from 1909 to 1969 when operations were transferred to the Coeur d'Alene Nursery.

The administrative site was established in the spring of 1909 by then Forest Supervisor Elers Koch, making Savenac one of the first nurseries in the Northern Region. During the summer of 1910, the newly constructed nursery was totally consumed by fire. Reconstruction began the following year.

By 1915, Savenac had become the largest nursery in Region 1, capable of producing 3 million seedlings annually. During the 1930's, seedling production increased from 3 million trees per year to over 12 million.

Among the tasks assigned to CCC workers in the '30's at Savenac, including those who attended the June 14 event, were to assist with nursery operations and building construction. Fortunately many of the historic structures built by the CCC workers still stand.



# The Free Life of a Ranger--Archie Murchie Tells His Story

fter literally thousands of hours in the saddle, on snowshoes, fighting fires, or otherwise contending with the forces of nature, veteran Forest Service Ranger Archie Murchie tells his story in the recently published *The Free Life of a Ranger: Archie Murchie in the U.S. Forest Service, 1929-1965.* 

Murchie served in Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho and Nevada. Described here in dramatic detail are memorable experiences such as the Hells Canyon fire; mustang hunts on the old Nevada National Forest; life among the tie hacks on the Wasatch Forest; harrowing expeditions on snowshoes and with pack animals; and numerous other experiences that were once almost routine in the life of forest rangers.

Carson District Ranger Guy Pence, Toiyabe National Forest, states that, "This book tells the story of where we came from, why we are what we are, and will be of help in deciding where we need to go in the future.... Every Forest Service employee should read this book."

# "Lumbering" Through Time

Panning for gold, watching stone dart points being made, touring a Native American mat lodge—all were part of the experiences shared by participants of the Journey Past Heritage Celebration held in Spokane, Washington, on November 13-17.

Part of the celebration was a cultural resource exhibit sponsored by the Colville National Forest and the Spokane Office of the Bureau of Land Management, in partnership with three Region 1 National Forests, area museums, and businesses. Over 10,000 people toured the exhibit, including 4,000 school children. Past lifeways was the underlying theme of the event, designed to evoke a sense of stepping back into time.

The Kootenai, Idaho Panhandle, and Clearwater National Forests combined efforts to build and host a display on early logging in the Inland Northwest at the event. Included was a photo and video display of early logging scenes and life-size reproductions of a flume and springboard stump. Working models of a steam donkey engine, a Shay locomotive, and a 1922 Bulldog Mac truck with a log loader were also

on display, loaned by an area Spokane resident. Region 1 archaeologists and several Forest Service volunteers were on hand to answer questions and give tours.

The exhibit was part of an ongoing effort by Forest Service cultural resources staff to provide the public with new and innovative opportunities to share in the knowledge gained through cultural resources management programs on agency lands.

The response from the public was overwhelmingly positive, with visitors frequently commenting that they were unaware that the Forest Service offered this type of educational opportunity. Many of the cultural resource displays will be available for loan for future events.

he wood shavings flew at the Nez Perce National Forest Headquarters during the Forest Service Centennial celebration held July 5. With Bruce Dreher's log hewing, Randy Borniger's cross-cut sawing and Ed Lavin's shake making, there were many opportunities for guests to make sawdust using primitive tools and skills.

The open house activities, scheduled to coincide with Grangeville's annual Border Days festivities, attracted about 200 people. There was definitely something for everyone: llamas to pet and pack, an antique telephone to crank and call, a cross-cut saw filing "how to" by Warren Miller, a low impact stock camp demonstration by USFS Partners and much, much more. There were old hand tools, cumbersome (as in HEAVY!!) chainsaw prototypes, and historic photos bearing witness to another era and the birth of an agency.

### Partners in Success

ne of the major trailhead facilities serving the Bob Marshall Wilderness got a major overhaul this past summer. The project, known as the Owl Creek Packer Camp Challenge Cost-Share Program, was also one of the most successful partnership programs for improving recreation facilities in the history of the Flathead National Forest.

The project had six major partners: the Montana Logging Association; the Back Country Horsemen of the Flathead; the Mission Valley Back Country Horsemen; the Citizens for the Awareness of Resources and the Environment; the Montana Outfitter and Guide Association; and the Condon Sign Shop.

Contributions totaling \$63,000 from the challenge partners were matched with \$52,000 from the Forest Service. The Forest Service provided technical advise and all materials, while the partners donated heavy equipment, power tools, hand tools, and countless hours of volunteer labor.

The trailhead facility, located on the south side of Holland Lake, consisted of eight corrals and water facilities. Heavy use over the years, combined with normal aging and weathering, had left it in a deteriorated condition.

Enter the resource forestry branch of the Swan Lake Ranger District, headed by Remy Pochelon. Early in 1990, Ponchelon envisioned the challenge cost-share program and began soliciting interest in the project.

In May 1991, a formal agreement was signed and work began immediately on the packer camp. The work included construction of 1,200 feet of new road with overnight camping pullouts, reconstruction of eight spanking new corrals. Ten huge combination feed bunks and hitch racks that had been built over the winter were installed.

All the work was done by volunteers, who also dug 2,000 feet of waterline ditch, installed the  $1\,1/2$  inch PVC waterline, and plumbed in the eight new stock watering tanks that had been provided.

In addition to the formal partners, the project was assisted by donated equipment, supplies, and labor from a number of area businesses, individuals, and youth groups.

# MCC Crews to Work in Montana Forests

he Montana Conservation Corps (MCC) and the Forest Service's Northern Region have announced the signing of a formal agreement paving the way for MCC crews to work in the 10 Montana National Forests next summer.

The MCC is a newly-created, private, non-profit organization dedicated to providing young Montanans with opportunities to work on conservation-related projects. The program is modeled after the original Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930's.

Next summer 8 to 10 MCC crews will work on such projects as trail construction, wildlife enhancement projects,



campground improvements and historical restoration projects.

"The Forest Service is an ideal partner for the MCC,"

stated Steven P. Nelsen, executive director of the MCC, "because of their experience working with conservation corps dating back to the 1930's and 1940's."

The program will be open to men and women, ages 16 to 21. Application can be made through the Summer Youth Employment programs of the Human Resource Development Council. Recruitment will begin in March 1992.
