In January 1978 there were an estimated 301,011 inpatient beds¹ in psychiatric facilities in the United States which were distributed by facility type as follows:

Table 1 shows the distribution of psychiatric beds by Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Region and State for all facility types with the exception of CMHCs.

The data on which this report is based were derived from information collected in various inventories of mental health facilities conducted by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) in January 1978.⁸ The estimates for CMHCs, which are given in the table above, were derived from information obtained from a national probability sample of 131 CMHCs out of the 563 CMHCs which were operating for 6 or more months as of January 1978. Consequently CMHC beds are available only for the United States and are not included in detailed tables which show beds and bed rates by State and/or geographic region. Whenever comparisons are made with information from years prior to 1978 (e.g., tables 5-9), data for these years have also been adjusted to exclude CMHC beds.

CHART A. Total psychiatric (excluding CMHC) beds per 100,000 population by State: United States, January 1978





CHART B. State and county mental hospital beds per 100,000 population by State: United States, January 1978



The reporting of beds for each facility type (excluding CMHCs) was virtually 100 percent. For the few facilities for which beds were not obtained, either the figure from January 1976 was used or if this too were unavailable, the average for the same facility type in the same region was used. Table 2 gives the total number of facilities by type within State for which beds were either reported or estimated.

Availability of Psychiatric (excluding CMHC) Beds by Geographic Area --January 1978 The States varied considerably in the availability of psychiatric (excluding CMHC) beds as measured by the number of beds per 100,000 civilian population. As shown in Chart A and table 3, 15 States in addition to D.C.⁹ had 150 or more psychiatric beds per 100,000 population. New York and D.C. had rates of 200 or more. At the other extreme 14 States had less than 100 psychiatric beds per 100,000 population.


State mental hospital beds were the predominant type in each State and accounted for 70 percent or more of the psychiatric beds in 20 States and over half the psychiatric beds in all but 11 of the remaining States (Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Utah, Wisconsin, Wyoming) (table 4). Of these 11 only Kentucky had a large proportion of CMHC beds compared to psychiatric beds in other facility types.

The number of beds in State mental hospitals per 100,000 population also showed variation by State. Chart B shows that 15 States as well as D.C. had over 100 State mental hospital beds per 100,000 population; including two States (New York and Rhode Island) and D.C. which had rates of 150 or more. On the other hand, 14 States (predominantly in the West) had less than 50 State mental hospital beds per 100,000 population (Chart B and table 3).

The proportion of total psychiatric beds (excluding CMHC beds) provided in specific types of psychiatric facilities other than State mental hospitals also differed according to State. For example, 15 States had no private or nonprofit psychiatric hospitals and consequently no beds in this facility type, whereas such beds accounted for 20 percent of the psychiatric beds in Vermont and 19 percent in Kentucky (table 4). It should be noted that in Kentucky, unlike most States, CMHC beds account for a large proportion of total beds. In January 1976, when data on CMHCs beds were available by State, such beds in Kentucky accounted for 24 percent of the total number of beds while private/nonprofit psychiatric hospitals accounted for only 11 percent.¹⁰

Seven States had no V.A. psychiatric beds while such beds accounted for 44 percent of total beds in Wyoming and 38 percent in Louisiana (table 4).

Beds in residential treatment centers for emotionally disturbed children (RTCs) comprised only 7 percent of the total psychiatric beds (excluding beds in CMHCs) in the United States compared with 36 percent of such beds in Idaho, 25 percent of such beds in Maine and 24 percent of such beds in Wisconsin (table 4).

Recent Trends

In 1970, 1972, 1974, and 1976, NIMH collected information on the number of psychiatric beds by type of facility and geographic region and has published a series of reports based on these data.¹⁰ The report based on information collected in January 1970 presented data by geographic region only. For this reason, only changes between 1972 and 1978 are presented in Charts C-E and tables 5-9 in this report. The information for 1972, which included information on the number of beds in CMHCs and was previously published¹⁰ has been adjusted to exclude CMHC beds in order to be comparable to the 1978 information.

The table given below examines the changes between 1972 and 1978 in the number of beds for the United States, by facility type, both including and excluding CMHCs.

Between 1972 and 1978 the number of psychiatric inpatient beds (including CMHC beds) decreased from 471,800 to 301,011, (36 percent). If CMHC beds are included the percent decrease in this time span is only 38 percent because, although the number of beds in CMHCs increased 40 percent between 1972 and 1978 these beds comprised only a small proportion of total psychiatric beds in both years.

Nationally, as shown in the above table, substantially all of the decrease in the number of psychiatric beds between 1972 and 1978 was attributed to State mental hospitals rather than other facility types. This phenomenon was true for each of the HHS regions as well. As shown in Chart C, for each of the regions the bed rates for State mental hospitals were substantially less in 1978 as compared with 1972 while the bed rates for all other types combined (excluding CMHCs) in 1978 changed only slightly.

CHART D. Percent change in the number of beds in all types of psychiatric facilities (excluding CMHCs) per 100,000 population between 1972 and 1978, by State.




CHART E. Percent change in the number of State and county mental hospital beds per 100,000 population between 1972 and 1978, by State.




Table 5 and Chart C give the changes in the number and rate per 100,000 population of inpatient beds set up and staffed for use in psychiatric facilities (excluding CMHCs) in the United States between 1972 and 1978. Between these years the rate decreased for the United States and for each State as well (table 5). In 37 States and District of Columbia the percent decrease equaled or exceeded 30 percent and in 11 States the percent decrease in the rates exceeded 50 percent.

Table 6 shows the change in the bed rates per 100,000 population for various types of psychiatric facilities (excluding CMHCs) between 1972 and 1978. While the number of beds per 100,000 population decreased in V.A. hospitals and was the same for RTCs in 1978 as compared with 1972, the rates for non-V.A. general hospital psychiatric units and private/nonprofit psychiatric hospitals increased (table 5). Similar results were found in most of the geographic regions as well.

Table 7 and Chart E explore the changes in the number of beds and bed rates for State mental hospitals by State between 1972 and 1978. For the United States the decrease in the rates was 51 percent. By State, 22 States and D.C. had percent decreases of 50 percent or more and of these, 8 had percent decreases of 60 percent or more between the two years (Chart E).

In general, the distribution of psychiatric beds by geographic region within type of facility showed relatively little change between 1972 and 1978. However, there were some exceptions. For example, 22 percent of all beds in State mental hospitals were located in Region V in 1972 as compared with only 16 percent in 1978. Only 17 percent of all beds in psychiatric units of non-Federal general hospitals were located in Region II in 1972 as compared with 14 percent in 1978 (table 8).

Psychiatric Beds (Excluding Beds in CMHCs) as a Percent of Total Hospital Beds

As shown in table 9, the total number of non-Federal hospital beds (psychiatric and nonpsychiatric) also decreased between 1972 and 1978, but at a slower rate than did psychiatric beds. Whereas total non-Federal hospital beds decreased 8.8 percent from 1,429,769 to 1,303,578¹¹ in this time interval, psychiatric beds (excluding CMHC beds) decreased from 417,147 to 252,399 (39.5 percent)(table 9).¹² As a result non-Federal psychiatric beds (excluding CMHC beds) comprised 29.2 percent of all non-Federal hospital beds in 1972 as compared with 19.4 percent in 1978 (table 9).¹³ Furthermore, non-Federal psychiatric beds (excluding CMHC beds) comprised a lower proportion of total non-Federal hospital beds in 1978 as compared with 1972 in all ten HHS regions and in all States except two (Oregon and Utah) and the District of Columbia.¹³

Combined Footnotes for Text and Tables

1/ The number of beds given are for the number of beds set up and staffed for use as of December 31, 1977. These figures may differ from the "rated bed capacity" calculated on the basis of one bed per so many square feet. Since definitions of the rated bed capacity vary from State to State, comparisons between HHS geographic regions may be slightly distorted by using the rated bed capacity. Similarly, distortion is introduced by counting beds set up for use as of a given time, due to seasonal variation. Neither source of error is large enough to account for the interstate and interregional differences shown in this report.

2/ Definitions of facility types included are as follows:

Psychiatric hospital. -- A public or private psychiatric hospital in which the primary concern is to provide inpatient care and treatment to mentally ill persons.

General hospital with psychiatric inpatient service. -- A hospital that knowingly and routinely admits patients to a separate psychiatric inpatient service for the express purpose of diagnosing and treating psychiatric illness. A separate psychiatric service is an organizational or administrative entity within the hospital which provides treatment for patients with a known or suspected psychiatric diagnosis and is specifically established and staffed for use by such patients. In a separate psychiatric inpatient service, beds are set up and staffed specifically for psychiatric patients in a separate ward or unit. These beds may be located in a specific building, wing, or floor, or there may be a specific group of beds physically separated from regular or surgical beds.

Residential treatment center for emotionally disturbed children. -- A residential institution, not otherwise classified, that primarily serves children who by clinical diagnosis are moderately or seriously disturbed emotionally and provides treatment services usually under the supervision of a psychiatrist.

Federally funded community mental health center (CMHC). -- A legal entity through which at least the following mental health services are provided to a delineated catchment area: inpatient, partial, outpatient, emergency care, and consultation and education. Further, one of the component facilities of the center is the recipient of Federal funds under P.L. 88-164 (construction) and/or P.L. 89-105 (staffing) or amendments thereto.

Multi-service mental health facility. -- A facility, not elsewhere classified, which provides inpatient treatment and any combination of outpatient treatment, day treatment and other partial hospitalization services and which does not receive Federal funds either under P.L. 88-164 or P.L. 89-105.

- 3/ The population used in calculating the rates for the United States and by State is an estimate of the civilian resident population based on unpublished estimates provided by the U.S. Bureau of the Census as of January 1, 1978.
- 4/ Since county mental hospitals exist in only a few States (notably Wisconsin) and function as though they were part of the State mental hospital system, the shorter term "State mental hospitals" will be used throughout the remainder of this report.
- 5/ Most of the psychiatric inpatient units in the general medical and surgical hospitals of the Veterans Administration closely resemble short-stay psychiatric hospitals both in size and operation. For this reason, these units are grouped with the V.A. neuropsychiatric hospitals and only one category "V.A. psychiatric hospitals" is shown.
- 6/ Federally funded community mental health centers (CMHCs) may provide inpatient care either in beds under the direct control and administration of the CMHC or through affiliation with another agency. In the latter case, only those beds for which center clients have priority or exclusive use are counted as CMHC beds.
- 7/ Beds in general hospitals outside of those in psychiatric units are excluded. These beds are used on an as-needed basis and are not specifically set aside for psychiatric patients.
- 8/ The Division of Biometry and Epidemiology, NIMH conducts annual and biennial inventories of facilities, the purpose of which is to provide basic data on each mental health facility in the country relating to its caseload, staffing and expenditure patterns, and services provided. State and county psychiatric hospitals and community mental health centers are surveyed annually. All other facilities are surveyed biennially, i.e., they were surveyed in January 1978 and will be surveyed again in 1980.
- 9/ The District of Columbia has a substantial number (estimate of 15%) of out-of-State residents, primarily from Maryland and Virginia in its "State" hospital. Such use of the State mental hospital system by nonresidents is not true to such an extent in other States and explains in part why the number of beds per 100,000 population in D.C. vis-à-vis the 50 States is high. It should also be noted that although the major psychiatric hospital in D.C. is operated by the Federal Government, it is classified as a "State mental hospital" throughout this report.
- 10/ In addition to the present report, NIMH has prepared four other reports which show the distribution of beds in January 1970, January 1972, January 1974, and January 1976, respectively. The titles of these reports are as follows:

- 11/ For the purpose of the calculation, the total beds in all non-Federal hospitals (Source: Hospital Statistics 1978 Edition, American Hospital Association (AHA), Chicago, Illinois, 1978) was adjusted by adding to this the number of beds in residential treatment centers for emotionally disturbed children (RTCs) since data for RTCs are not included in the AHA figures. Analogous information was calculated for 1972.
- 12/ V.A. beds are excluded for both 1972 and 1978 in the count of psychiatric beds since the total number of beds (psychiatric and non-psychiatric) as given by AHA and shown in table 9 is for non-Federal hospitals only.
- 13/ If CMHC beds had been included, for the United States, the proportion of total beds which were psychiatric would have been only 29.9 percent and 20.5 percent in 1978 and in 1972, respectively. Furthermore, with the exception of Kentucky, it is probable that the inclusion of CMHC beds, if these were available by State, would raise the proportion of psychiatric beds to total beds only slightly for a given State.


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
