THE TAX RATE IS SET AT \$1.50

Trustees On Monday Decided On Matter Of Civic Financing

The board of trustees of South San Francisco on Monday night set the tax rate for the year at \$1.40 per \$100 assessed valuation on the old town and \$1.40 per \$100 on the new portion of the town. The difference between the two rates is brought about by the fact that a portion of the city could not be included in the 1913 sewer taxation.

The rate is made up as follows: General taxes, \$1.00; 1913 sewer bonds, 10 cents; library, 7 cents; 1919 improvement bonds, 20 cents; and 1923 improvement bonds, 13 cents; total, \$1.50 per \$100 assessment. The general running expenses of the city government is about \$28,000 per year.

It is realized by the city fathers that the coming year will necessitate considerable extra expenditure, but it is intended to keep the tax rate as low as possible, using the leeway as between the current expenses and the sum total as judiciously as possible.

Western Pipe Company Building Is Progressing

Work on the large building of the Western Pipe and Steel Works is progressing in a gratifying manner and as soon as the foundation for the big structures are completed more men will be employed on the buildings, which it is intended to rush to completion. As stated some months ago, provided that certain large contracts materialize, several more similar large units of buildings will be added to this progressive plant. Also, in the event that the contracts are secured, several hundred more men will be employed.

Granted His Vacation Time

William Ely, former member of the South San Francisco fire department, sent in a communication to the South San Francisco board of trustees on Monday night requesting that in lieu of not having taken his two weeks' vacation prior to tendering his resignation, in fact having worked overtime at the time that he was entitled to said vacation, that he be given two weeks' pay in lieu of the vacation. On motion of Trustees Blank and Cunningham his request was granted.

No More "2 o'Clock" Dances

Following out a rule set at the last meeting of the South San Francisco board of trustees, it was voted to grant permission for Tippacanoe Tribe, I. O. R. M., to hold a dance on Saturday, October 24, provided that dancing cease at 1 a. m. The request was for dancing until 2 a. m. The board also granted a permit for a 1 o'clock dance to be given by the Abalon Club on Saturday, October 17.

Station Already Listed

Radio Entertainment Corporation, the company now arranging to establish a large radio broadcasting station in South San Francisco, is already listed in Radio Age. The official designation of this station is KFWL.

This District Is In Second Place

The Pacific Telephone Magazine for this month has some very interesting figures recording the increase in telephone stations and of special interest to our readers is the increase noted for the South San Francisco telephone exchange, which includes San Bruno and Loma Park, as well as South San Francisco.

The percentage of gain for the South San Francisco exchange since January 1 of this year is 9.62. On January 1 there were 873 stations, while on August 1 there were 957, a gain of 84 or a percentage of 9.62.

Further study of the station development records that South San Francisco ranks second in the list, with Redwood City recording a percentage of 11.75. Next comes South San Francisco with 9.62, followed in the following order: San Mateo, 8.35; Mountain View, 6.54; Palo Alto, 5.63; San Jose, 3.86; and San Francisco, 3.16. In the larger city, however, a total of 6,361 new phones were installed from January 1 to August 1.

DALY CITY GIRL KILLED SUNDAY

Starting on a pleasure drive with friends, Estelle McAvoy, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank McAvoy of Daly City, was killed Sunday within a few minutes after she had left the home of her parents, when the automobile in which she was riding was hit by a San Mateo interurban street car.

The automobile was driven by William J. Graves of San Francisco and contained his three young sons, Joseph, Thomas and Charles Graves, all of whom escaped serious injury. Graves had been calling at the McAvoy home in Daly City and volunteered to take the children for a spin.

Turning northward into Mission road, after leaving the McAvoy home, the automobile was struck head-on by a southbound San Mateo car. The girl was pinned beneath the wreckage and died from internal injuries, police reports said.

A charmingly appointed home wedding of Sunday afternoon, September 20, was that of Miss Gladys Helen Cameron and Mylan Clegg Watson.

R. Dunlop, and Hilliard Cameron acted as best man. Rev. Asa P. Beall of St. Paul's Methodist Church officiated and was assisted by Dr. White of Los Angeles.

After a daintily served buffet luncheon the happy couple left by motor for Los Angeles and other points of interest in the south and upon their return will reside in their new home on Commercial Avenue.

Big War Trophy Arrives

South San Francisco will soon have the big two-ton war trophy ordered some time ago through Adjutant General R. E. Mittelstaedt and for which the city forwarded a check for \$42.20 to cover transportation charges. The freighter Munidies, which brought the large gun, together with hundreds of others from the New Jersey yard, docked at San Francisco the forepart of the week.

The official description of the big war weapon allocated to South San Francisco is a 150 mm. mortar and carriage (none-recoll). Upon arrival in this city the local American Legion boys will attend the unloading, cartage and placing.

WANT SUGGESTIONS FOR MEMORIAL

The present site of the county courthouse at Redwood City and the grounds surrounding it were presented in the early days to the people of San Mateo County by the late S. M. Mezes, one of the good old pioneers. It is considered no more than fitting that some sort of fitting tribute to the shape of a memorial should be provided in honor of this public-spirited citizen of the earlier days.

The matter was brought up at the meeting of the board of supervisors on Monday and these gentlemen have suggested that the citizens of the county offer suggestions as to the best steps to be taken to perpetuate his memory and show proper appreciation of his services to the county.

Enterprise and Recorder Merged By Corporation

Announcement was made today of the merging of two weekly newspapers, the South San Francisco Enterprise and the San Bruno Recorder, by Sam H. Winklebleck, newspaper and advertising man of San Mateo County. The two papers will be included in a corporation in which are associated with Mr. Winklebleck four other newspaper publishers and a number of business men of northern San Mateo County. Mr. Wiedemann is still in editorial charge of both publications.

The Enterprise, which is the pioneer newspaper of South San Francisco, was founded in 1895 by H. W. Martin and the late E. E. Cunningham. It was purchased by Wiedemann from George Morell last April. The San Bruno Recorder was established in 1922 by Wiedemann.

Associated in the deal with Winklebleck are Horace Amphlett, publisher of the San Mateo Times, and George F. Morell, publisher of the Palo Alto Times.

In discussing plans today, Winklebleck said:

"All advertising will run in both papers, thus giving the advertiser complete coverage in northern San Mateo County, the combined circulation of these papers being over 2,300.

"The managing of these publications will in no way affect my peninsula-wide advertising service, of which I will retain active charge.

"The most comprehensive news service obtainable will be developed for these papers. Besides complete coverage of local affairs, county news, items from neighboring communities, special editorial features will be included in each issue. I understand that San Mateo County has more newspapers per capita than any other county in America. It is my intention to make The Enterprise and The Recorder reflect credit on this large family."

No Agreement On Bottleneck

No agreement was reached in regards to the breaking of the bottleneck at Colma at what was scheduled to be the deciding session in San Francisco on Tuesday, and the matter is again deferred for several weeks. In the mean time the state highway commission, the board of supervisors, San Mateo County officials and the Market Street Railway Company will conduct separate and independent investigations.

Harvey M. Toy, chairman of the state highway commission, at the meeting presented an ultimatum to the effect that unless some definite agreement is reached by the first of the year, the highway commission will withdraw all co-operation.

There was absolutely no agreement reached at Tuesday's session and several lively verbal tilts were recorded between members of the joint committee and Vice-President A. L. Black of the Market Street Railway Company. Black declined to commit his company to anything that might tend to favor a plan which would route the cars over the old Southern Pacific right of way.

Colonel John H. Skeggs of the highway commission accused the Market Street Railway Company with "stalling." There will be another meeting on Tuesday.

The Proper Move

The board of trustees of South San Francisco gladly granted a permit to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company to run a conduit under San Bruno Avenue, after referring the matter to the streets committee. In fact, it was intimated by members of the board that it would be an excellent move if all wires could be placed underground.

Great Demand for Homes

Real estate men in South San Francisco are unable to supply the demand for homes in this city and especially in the last month have inquiries for houses to rent been numerous.

PERMIT FOR GUN IS REFUSED

Contending that it would set a very dangerous precedent, the South San Francisco board of trustees on Monday night declined to issue a permit to Mr. Smoker of the Empire foundry to carry a gun.

A letter from the Empire foundry requesting this permit for Mr. Smoker, who is employed there, was read and Mr. Smoker was himself in attendance at the meeting.

It appears from the statement made by Mr. Smoker that last Friday a man in an auto carrying a saw-off shotgun took several shots at him and it was only by good luck that Mr. Smoker escaped being shot.

The board requested the opinion of the chief of police on the matter of issuing a permit and that official advised against it. His opinion was that the trustees would be swamped with similar requests and with his opinion the members of the board agreed.

Recovered in Thirty Minutes

Just a half hour after it was stolen from in front of his theater in South San Francisco, City Trustee Al Eschelbach had possession of the car again, thanks to the quick work of the local police force. The car had been abandoned and the thieves made good their escape.

Permit for Two Garages

The board of trustees of South San Francisco on Monday night granted the permits for two garages to be built on lot 15, block 39, facing the alley, to Andrew Sorrenson.

A Police Car Is Sanctioned

Chief of Police Louie Belloni suggested to the South San Francisco board of trustees on Monday night that it might be a good investment for the city to buy a car for the police department. In fact, he asked the president of the board if that body could not see its way clear to buy a car.

Mayor McNellis stated that as the city had to pay for the upkeep, etc., of a private car used by the police that it might be good business to have a city car. In this contention he was upheld by practically the entire board.

Also it was generally conceded by the members of the board that a Dodge car would be the proper machine. This will cost around \$1,000.

It was voted to leave the matter in the hands of the purchasing committee for investigation with the chief, and with power to act. It is also understood that cash will be paid for this car rather than paying off on the installment plan.

Board Wants Some Action

Trustee Cunningham, at the meeting of the South San Francisco board of trustees on Monday night, brought up the matter of the wig-wag at the Orange Avenue crossing over the Southern Pacific railroad tracks and those of the Market Street Railway.

It developed that this wig-wag, which the railroad company would install, but which the city must pay for, will cost \$960 without the connections to the Market Street Railway.

Attorney Davis suggested to the board that the city clerk write to the two transportation companies requesting immediate action in connection with easements over these crossings.

The railroad commission has granted the crossing and the city has just a year from the date of granting to establish the same.

Daly City Tax Rate

Taxes in Daly City are lower this year than they were last. The board of trustees set the following rate for 1925-26 taxes: General, \$1.00; water works and redemption on bonds, 53 cents; library fund, 17 cents; special street improvement and bond redemption, 10 cents; for improving water system and redemption of bonds, 10 cents; total, \$1.90.

Fire Chief in Seattle

Fire Chief B. H. Truax is in attendance at the big fire chiefs' convention being held in Seattle. Quite a delegation of fire chiefs from California cities went as delegates, and judging from past conventions, the local chief, together with other fire chiefs of the county, will bring back valuable data in connection with fire fighting.

Little Damage by Fire

According to the report of Fire Chief Truax, there were about a dozen calls answered by the fire department in the month of August, mainly grass fires, and the sum total of damage done was \$50. Fire calls were answered on the 3rd, 4th, 7th, 21st, 24th, 26, two on the 30th and two on the 31st.

Redistricting Is Deferred for Time

The proposed redistricting of San Mateo County in order that supervisory representation will be apportioned more in accordance to population, when brought up at the meeting of the county supervisors by Barlow Ferguson on behalf of the Burlingame Chamber of Commerce on Monday, was postponed until October 19 on a motion carried by Supervisors Thompson, Francis and MacBain, with Supervisors Rosalie M. Brown and Thomas L. Hickey opposing.

Supervisor MacBain stated that he desired the opinion of District Attorney Swart in the matter before further action was taken. Supervisor Hickey favored quicker action and moved an amendment that the matter be taken up on next Monday, October 5. In this he was upheld by Supervisor Rosalie M. Brown.

The two coast side supervisors, with President of the Board MacBain defeated the amendment and the original motion carried by the same three votes.

Golden State

News of Interest to All

A new high mark for visitors in the Yosemite national park was reached when the official records showed that 204,499 persons had entered the park this season.

The Union hotel in San Mateo has been selected for the new San Mateo postoffice and work has been started to remodel that structure to fit the requirements.

Work upon the Davis-Woodland highway and the road from the Davis Y toward Dixon, Yolo county, was announced as completed by officials of the paving company.

After a long session, the Placer county board of supervisors set the county tax rate for 1925-1926 at \$2.97 per \$100 assessed valuation outside of incorporated cities and \$2.57 inside.

The first carload of an order for from twenty to twenty-two carloads of hollow gypsum tile left Los Angeles for Bakersfield, where it will be used in the erection of the new Community hotel.

San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley and San Jose continue to lead California cities in building activities, according to the industrial employment survey report of the department of labor for August.

With a bullet from a 22-caliber rifle imbedded in his brain between the eyes, Delbert Goby, 14, of Redding, Shasta county, has a good chance for recovery, according to physicians who are attending him.

The automobile has replaced the range horse to such a degree that a sale of 143 head gathered from the national forest range at Alturas, by Deputy Sheriff Frank B. Van Horn netted an average price of only \$9.57 each.

A real estate transaction in which the Sego Milk Products Company of Utah, manufacturers of canned milk, have purchased various parcels of property in Galt, was filed in the office of the Sacramento county recorder.

City Manager John N. Edy of Berkeley was delegated by the Northern California section of the State Association of City Managers, meeting in Berkeley, to represent them at the national convention of city managers, to be held in Grand Rapids, Mich., on November 17.

An agreement was approved at a meeting of the creditors of the old San Maid Raisin Growers, of Fresno, by which claims against the defunct concern will be paid over a term of years and 7 per cent interest given on the obligations outstanding. The claims total \$4,250,000.

Stockton has been selected by the Scouts for their state convention November 5 and the Stockton Pyramid is outlining a program for the biggest gathering of the kind ever held in California. The convention will be held in the new \$600,000 Civic Memorial auditorium.

More than one hundred men were set to work by rice growers of the Willows, Glenn county, section shooting blackbirds that have descended in great swarms on the rice fields to feed on the grain while it is "in the milk." The men will use \$100 worth of shells daily in the campaign.

Following the example of virtually every other town in Marin county, the town trustees of San Anselmo announced that a reduction of 4 cents in the tax rate of the community would be in effect during the fiscal year of 1925-26. The rate will be \$2.12 on the \$100 assessed valuation.

A. Dunham, owner and operator of the Dunham stage lines, has been authorized by the railroad commission to extend his Sacramento-Jackson service between Ione and the site of the dam of the East Bay Utility district on the Mokelumne river, a point approximately six miles from Ione.

Sausalito's tax rate has dropped 13 cents. Marking the lowest rate established in the last twenty years, the town board of trustees lowered the rate from \$1.49 to \$1.27 per \$100 of assessed property. The assessed valuation of the city was placed at \$3,700,000. Reduction of the rate was brought about by a lengthy survey ordered by the board of trustees and an economical city administration.

Representative leaders of the state's mining industry met at Grass Valley, Nevada county, September 15 when over one hundred delegates from all parts of California attended the meeting under the auspices of the California Development Association. Readjustment of the homestead, sheep raising and railroad land grants to enable the modern prospector to successfully carry on his work was discussed at the conference. Co-ordinated development of the mineral industry was the theme of all meetings.

Hearing on the application of the East Bay Municipal Water District to divert water from the Mokelumne river, twenty-five miles east of Lodi, for its \$39,000,000 project was held in Sacramento before Edward Hyatt, Jr., chief of the division of water rights, and E. W. Kramer of San Francisco, representing the federal power commission. The East Bay district has applied for permission to divert 200,000,000 gallons of water daily to be used in providing a domestic water supply for the city of Oakland and other Eastbay and San Joaquin and Sacramento valley towns.

A Southern Pacific surveying crew, camped on the Happy Camp mountain, west of Canby, Modoc county, is engaged in running a preliminary survey to the Pit River valley. This is believed to indicate that this company is planning an extension from Cornell, in the northwest part of Modoc county, to Alturas at an early date.

A special road tax of 20 cents for the construction of a county road through the North Fork canyon of the Feather river is included in the tax rate of \$2.50 set by the Plumas county board of supervisors. Another road levy of 20 cents was made to cover the cost of replacement of bridges and building of several new roads.

The Lake county board of supervisors tonight affirmed its action of some weeks ago determining not to join the Golden Gate bridge district. Lake county originally signified its intention of becoming part of the district which will finance the bridge. The supervisors later rescinded their action.

The new Lions' clubrooms at Fairfield, Solano county, were dedicated with approximately a hundred visitors from a dozen dens in this region, representatives attending from Oakland, Berkeley, Lodi, Richmond, Santa Rosa, Woodland, Walnut Creek and Sacramento.

Earl S. Gardner, prominent in business circles in southern California and as secretary-treasurer of the Federal Farm Loan Association, died at the Santa Monica sanitarium after a lengthy illness. He was 39 years old.

Reports from the California state fair, which closed at Sacramento, show that there were 425 rabbits, 340 chickens, 175 bantams and 375 pigeons on exhibition.

Plans are being prepared for a 3-story addition to the present San Jose hospital. The improvements will cost about \$70,000.

Fay Lanphier, "Miss California," the Alameda girl who won the Atlantic City beauty contest when she was declared the most beautiful girl in America, is to become a motion picture star at once. This has long been her ambition, but she had expected to wait several years before having it gratified.

Arthur N. Bierkle of Petaluma, Sonoma county, accompanied by Mrs. Bierkle, has left for Nanking University, China, where the couple will study the languages and will later take charge of a missionary district in the Orient.

Lemon Juice and Spuds

FEDERATION MEETS AT PESCADERO

The San Mateo County Federation of Parent-Teacher Associations met on Friday, September 18, at Pescadero, the Pescadero association being the hostess association for the day. A luncheon was served in the community house.

A hallowe'en party will be given by the federation on October 30 in the gymnasium of the San Mateo branch of the high school. Mrs. Fred Clark of San Mateo has been appointed chairman by the federation president, Mrs. L. G. Owens of San Mateo. The following advisory board, appointed by the president, was ratified by the federation: Mrs. W. H. Kimball, financial secretary; Mrs. Beulah C. Schindler, press chairman; Mrs. A. J. McLellan, membership and extension chairman. Mrs. Holt was appointed to represent the federation at the meetings of the California Development Association for a street and safety campaign. Mrs. W. H. Kimball was appointed financial secretary for the federation.

Three minute projects were outlined by the presidents or representatives of the nineteen associations in the county. Many new ideas and helpful suggestions were presented.

The next meeting of the federation will be held on Friday, October 16, at Menlo Park.

The speaker of the afternoon was Rev. Harvey M. Miller of the Alameda Congregational Church, who spoke most interestingly on "Factors That Control a Community."

DEMANDS INCREASE FOR CHEVROLETS

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 25.—Sustained demand and a growing list of unfilled orders has caused the Chevrolet Motor Company to increase heavily its production schedule during September.

The schedule revisions involves an increase of more than 16 per cent over the production program originally planned for September. The new schedule calls for 53,165 motor cars and trucks in September, a Chevrolet record for that month and only 3,078 less than the highest production month in the history of the company.

Both day and night shifts have been augmented to maintain the new schedule. The company shipped 4,234 cars to dealers on August 31, establishing a new record 600 higher than the largest previous shipment for one day.

The company, which recently made its two millionth car, attained during August a greater production thus far for 1925 than the entire production of 1924.

Several factors have contributed to the unprecedented demand, according to C. E. Dawson, assistant general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company.

"The August 1 reduction of \$40 to \$50 in the closed model prices, together with the announcement of the improvements on all models, caused a still further increase in the unfilled order list," said Mr. Dawson. "The great demand at present appears to be for the Chevrolet coach. Increased popularity also has been gained by the

new utility express 1-ton truck, which has replaced the former truck of the same name.

"Another factor in car demand is the rapid economic recovery of the south and the southwest, where purchasing power is now on a par with the remainder of the country."

MOOSEHEART IS WONDERFUL PLACE

MOOSEHEART, Ill., Sept. 25.—One of the positions of which Secretary of Labor John J. Davis is most proud, not excepting his place in the cabinet of President Calvin Coolidge, is that of mayor of this children's city of Mooseheart, owned by the Loyal Order of Moose.

At the time of the last national elections, the 1,250 children of Mooseheart decided to go to the polls themselves and elect a head for their city government. Mr. Davis, founder of Mooseheart and director-general of the Moose order, won by an overwhelming majority, the citizens not voting the Davis ticket being the ones who were too young to know what it was all about. The first that Mr. Davis knew about the election was after he was notified that he had been elected to the office of mayor.

Mooseheart is probably the best governed city in the world. Discipline cases are handled by the children themselves in council and penalties meted out to offenders. Corporal punishment is unknown.

For minor offenses there is the "work line," corresponding somewhat to kitchen police duty in the army. Offenders placed on the line are allotted certain tasks and deprived of taking part in any of the amusements or entertainments provided for the others.

Each worker is accredited with an hourly rate of pay, but the wages divert to an amusement fund, which is used to buy motion pictures and other forms of entertainment for those who are not on the "work line."

Records for good behavior are kept, certain offenses being punished by giving demerit marks, which in turn, may be worked off. Even the babies have their chance to work for credits in the shape of daily gold stars, a certain number each week bringing reward in the form of chocolate bars and pennies deposited in the bank to their credit.

Beef Eaters

Englishmen continue to earn the name of "beef eaters" for Great Britain is the largest consumer of the surplus meat production of the world.

Lamps Without Filaments

Through the invention of an electric light bulb that requires no filament, Conrad Schicklerling of Newark, N. J., claims that municipal lighting bills may be cut in half. A 500-watt lamp of the new type, he says, will burn twice as long as filament lamps and consume less than half the current now required. The inventor also has made lamps of two-watt size for use on signs, and auto lamps of two candle-power and higher, without filaments, says Popular Science Monthly. Still another of his inventions is a vacuum tube filament or grid, designed especially for alternating current rectification in radio B-battery eliminators.

Wool Grown in a Hurry

An invention which makes sheep's wool grow faster was described by Professor Barker of Leeds university at the international conference of sheep breeders at Chester.

He said a Japanese doctor had placed on the market a fluid which, when injected in the veins of a sheep, say, every two days, promotes rapid growth of wool.

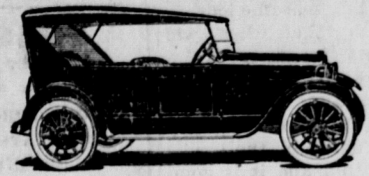
"So rapid is the growth said to be," Professor Barker continued, "that two months' injection produces twelve months' growth at the ordinary rate. Thus two or three shearings each year are possible."—TH-Bits.

Woman Fertile Inventor

Among the many interesting things on show at the Exhibition of Inventions held recently in London, few attracted more attention than an apparatus designed by a woman inventor, Miss Verena Holmes. It is a device enabling an important operation in the treatment of consumption to be carried out in the home, and it is regarded as a great boon by the medical profession. Miss Holmes, who is a qualified engineer has a number of other inventions to her credit. One of the most promising is a new type of diving apparatus.

New Salvador Railway

A contract has been signed and approved by the President and the national assembly of Salvador for the construction of a branch railway line, 10 kilometers (10 miles) in length, from Ahuachapan (in the department of the same name) to the Guatemala frontier, north of El Naranjo. Construction is to be completed before April 24, 1930. It is intended ultimately to connect the line now in the course of construction between Santa Ana and Ahuachapan with Guatemala City.—Commerce Reports.

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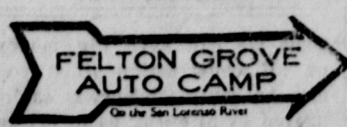

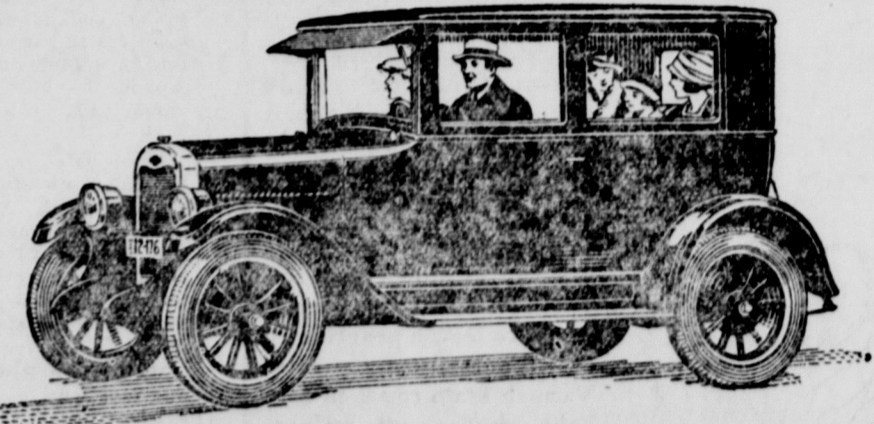

Idea of Piano Is Old
