BOLSHEVIKI MUST PUT END TO HORRORS

Constantinople Is Called Problem For a Careful Decision

One Section of London Press Says Turkey's Future Must Not Be Settled on Sentimental Grounds Opposition to Other Papers

London, Feb. 24.—Agitation in favor of expelling the Turks from Constantinople, which has been a conspicuous feature in one section of the press during the last few days and which has had the support of religious and philanthropic bodies, met a counter-blast from another section of the London newspaper world to-day, which mature deliberations of the Supreme Allied Council.

In a lengthy argument The Telegraph asserted that British statesmanship has "neither the duty nor interest to expel the Sultan from Constantinople," and expressed the opinion that agitation to this end was "all inspired and ill-considered."

The Daily News, which has always been a staunch champion of the Armenians and a supporter of the Armenians and a supporter of Giadstone's demand to "sweep the Turks out of Europe," says the real question is the weight to be attached to warnings of Moslem unrest as a result of the expulsion of the Turks from their spiritual capital."

Revision Barred.

"The British Government, by mak-ing hasty announcement throughout India of the decision in favor of the Sultan, has barred revision of that decision."

The recent campaign in favor of the expulsion of the Turks is said by The Express to be based on a "per-rvid sentiment," and the newspaper argues there is not a single advantage to be obtained in drawing the Sultan away from Constantinople.

JAPANESE FIGHTERS WANT VOTING RIGHT

Delegation Placed Its Case Before Cabinet This Morning

Actuated by their patriotic response to the call for volunteers in the early days of the war and with the knowledge that they had done their bit in France, a delegation from the Cana-

France, a delegation from the Canadian-Japanese Association waited upon the Provincial Executive this morning with the request that its membership of some hundred and fifty be entitled to exercise the franchise in British Columbia.

Heading the delegation was A. M. Whiteside, as counsel, while the official support of the Vancouver branch of the Great War Veterans' Association for the plea of the Japanese was voiced by Captain Ian Mackenzie in his capacity as president.

Captain Mackenzie, in answer to a question from the Hon. William Sloan, as to what effect he expected the granting of such a request would have on the position of Hindus in British Columbia who had served with the Imperial Forces, replied that for the time being the Great War Veterans' Association was not so much concerned with the details as with the general principle upon which the plea of the Canadian-Japanese Association was based.

In his opinion these British subjects had vindicated the fundamental essentials of citizenship and an acceptance of that principle lay in the extension of the franchise.

MAJORITY OF RED TROOPS NOT RED

Bulk of Soviet Army Neutral or Czarist, Says Dutch Correspondent

Amsterdam, Feb. 24.—About eighty per cent. of the Red army in Russia is not "Red" at all, but is neutral, according to a staff correspondent of The Handelsblad, G. Nypels, who just returned from an extended tour through Soviet Rusgia. He says about sixty per cent. of the officers, who have been largely drawn from the trained military men of the old upper class, are "Czarist" in inclination. This leaves only about twenty per cent. of the soldiers and forty per cent. of the officers thoroughly attached to the Soviet regime, the rest being neutral or Czarists.

Nypels, one of the few neutral observers who was permitted to visit Soviet cities recently, writes in a series of articles that he was more courteously treated by the Bolsheviki than by the Poles, through whose country he passed.

Amsterdam, Feb. 24. — A correspondent of The Handelsblad has completed a tour of Soviet Russia and describes his impression in a series of articles.

Russia has been completely mobilized, he says, all able-bodied men up to thirty-five being in the army, with no age limit for officers. A deserter's family is held accountable for him. The correspondent found the soldiers politic and well disciplined.

A soldier gets 800 rubles a month, a company leader 1,200, and a regimental leader 4,200. Six former imperial generals on Trotaky's staff rereiva 6,000 rubles, while Lenine draws 8,000.

Gigantic Smoke Patch As Signal to Planet Mars

Bryn Mawr, Pa., Feb. 24.—Use of the Government's surplus of smoke-making material left over from the war in signalling Mars was suggested to-day by James J. Crenshaw, Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Bryn Mawr College, who served in the chemical warfare section of the American expeditionary forces. HUNGARY'S REPLY

Hungarians Find Fault With Boundaries Set in Peace Treaty

Paris, Feb. 24.—The final docu-ments annexed to the Hungarian reply to the Allied peace terms are in the hands of the Secretary of the

he hands of the Secretary of the Peace Conference.

The French press has intimated hat the London conference would take up the Hungarian reply but it is learned that no official notice to this effect has been given to the Hungarian delegation headed by Count Apponyl.

The Hungarian attitude has been represented as an uncompromising rejection of the proposed detachment of Transylvania and other territories and the econômic terms of the treaty. It became known yesterday, however. of Transylvania and other territories and the economic terms of the treaty. It became known yesterday, however, that the reply is based rather on the principle of self-determination. It questions the exactitude of the representations to the Peace Conference by neighboring countries regarding their ethnological, historical and territorial claims. It says that Hungary is willing that the population of all the contested regions should decide by an impartial plebiacite, not dominated by troops of occupation, whether they wish to remain Hungarian.

Called Unjust.

It is contended by the Hungarians

It is contended by the Hungarians in their answer that the boundaries proposed by the treaty are strategically and economically favorable to the adjoining countries but are unjust to Hungary. It is pointed out that in addition to Transylvania, the boundaries proposed leave outside of Hungary a strip of territory from thirty-five to forty miles wide and entirely surrounding Hungary, in which the Hungarian population is in an overwhelming majority.

It also is alleged that the treaty cuts off a large population in the Carpathians which in the past has depended for its existence upon the work given the people during the Summer on the Hungarian plains. These plains are to remain Hungarian.

The proposed boundaries, it is pointed out, likewise break up public works erected at great expense to fight the floods along the Theiss and the Danube, some dykes and pumping stations being allotted to one country, while connecting ones operated in conjunction with them are left to another country. Another point made is that the treaty lines cut the railroads winding through the territories until it will be impossible to operate them successfully.

One point on which the Hungarians appear to be most sensitive is detachment of territory in Western Hungary for annexation to Austria.

Conscription Will Be Abolished March 31; Army Vote Had Majority

London, Feb. 24.—Conscription will be abolished in Great Britain, March 31, and within a month from that date the last conscript will be entitled to be released, it was announced by Rt. Hon. Winston Churchhill, Secretary for War, in the House of Commons yesterday.

He stated that Great Britain had succeeded in raising a new volunteer army, which, when conscription ends will number about. 220,000, excluding troops serving in India.



THE TAXATION RESOLUTION.

Through the whole course of the debate or the Hawthornthwaite tax exemption resolution supporters of its provisions have found it very difficult to get away from the impression that the Government should be held responsible for taxes owed to the Municipalities by returned men. It should have been obvious to the framer of the motion at the outset that there is no law on the statute books of the Province which gives power to the Government to cancel the particular arrears of taxes to which the resolution has special

The matter is a municipal one practically in its entirety, and the Premier already has suggested that it might be possible for the Government to extend the scope of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission to the point where taxation difficulties could come properly within its purview. He also declared during the course of his observations on the resolution that he was favorably inclined to a proposed amendment to the Municipal Act which would give the municipality power to adopt easy conditions for the pay ment of tax arrears in respect of returned soldiers or their dependents. Without an Act, however, no progress can be made and it may be taken for granted that the Legislature-the Premier suggested as much—will devise some plan to meet the intent of the resolution fairly and equitably.



LADY MISSIONARIES REVIEW THEIR WORK


The Misses French and Cable of Hoh-Cheo, Spoke Here Last Night



Overhauls United States in Shipbuilding Output; Decline · in World Tonnage

London, Feb. 8.—An analysis of Lloyd's register returns for the quarter ended December 31, made by the American Chamber of Commerce in London, indicates that, for the first time since the United States became a shiubuilder on a large scale, British shipyards show signs of regaining their former supremacy.

The tonnage now building in the United Kingdom, says the American chamber, exceeds by 27,732 tons that under present construction in the United States, where the decrease in the building of new tonnage amounts to 504,000 tons, as compared with the figures for September last.

The American chamber remarks that the tonnage under construction may not be so good a basis for judgment as the amount of tonnage actually launched, and that the United States is putting ships on the water quicker than Great Britain.

He has an eye for a neighbor's need, a hand trained to help, and a heart for true men, good women and little children.

Origin

Rotary was born February 23, 1905. Four Chicago men, one a lawyer, one a mining operator, the third a coal dealer and the fourth a tailor, decided on that day to organize a club. These men, drawn together through mutual acquaintance, proposed a series of meetings at their respective places of business. The circle soon was enlarged by representatives from other lines of business, so that within a year a membership of fifty was reached.

As the time came for each to act the host, he gave a discourse on his own business so that his guests might learn something worth while regarding it, and thus broaden their own knowledge concerning various businesses outside their own.

Growth

In 1908, San Francisco, having learned of the Chicago Rotary Club, patterned one after it. This was in turn rapidly followed by others. Eventually, the National Board of Commissioners, a delegate body representing fourteen clubs, arranged the first National Convention. This was held in August, 1910, at Chicago. At that time the term "National Association of Rotary Clubs" was adopted, but a few years later was changed to "International" in recognition of a Canadian club represented and an application for membership from a club which had been organized in London.

Rotary is now established in the British Isles, in South America, Cuba, Hawaii, the Philippines, China and India.

All clubs seeking membership are carefully surveyed to insure proper calibre of personnel and adequate representation of sufficient lines of business to justify membership in the International Association.

The name "Rotary" was selected early in the life of the Chicago Club and was suggested by the early meetings which were held in "rotation" at the various members' places of business.

The Rotary Platform

RECOGNIZING the commercial basis of modern life as a necessary incident in human evolution, the Rotary Club is organized to express that proper relation between private interests and the fusion of private interests which constitutes society.

To accomplish this purpose more effectively the principle of limited membership has been adopted, the Botary Club consisting of one reppresentative from each distinct line of business or profession. Each member is benefited by contact with representative men engaged in different occupations and is enabled thereby to meet more intelligently the responsibilities of civic and business life.

The basis of club membership insures the representation of all interests and the domination of none in the consideration of public questions relating to business. On account of its limited membership the Rotary Club does not constitute itself the voice of the entire community on questions of general importance, but its action on such questions is of great influence in advancing the civic and business welfare of the community.

The Rotary Club demands fair dealings, honest methods, and high standards in business. No obligation, actual or implied, to influence business exists in Rotary. Election to membership therein is an expression of confidence of the club in the member elected, and of its good will towards him. As his business is an expression of himself, he is expected actively to represent it.

Membership in the Rotary Club is a privilege and an opportunity and its responsibility demands honest and efficient service and thoughtfulness for one's fellows. Service is the basis of all business.

The "objects" of the Rotary Club are to encourage and

High ethical standards in business and professions;

The ideal of Service as the basis of all worthy enterprise;

The active interest of every Rotarian in the civic, commercial, social and moral welfare of his community;

The development of a broad acquaintanceship as an opportunity, for Service, as well as an aid to success;

The interchange of ideas and business methods as a means of increasing the usefulness of Rotarians;

The recognition of the worthiness of all legitimate occupations and the dignifying of the occupation of each Rotarian as affording him an opportunity to serve society.

Membership

The Rotary Club is restricted to one member from each distinct line of business or profession. Such a plan makes for thorough representation by all branches of business, yet prevents an unwieldy number or the domination of any club by any one business or profession. Such a membership becomes an ideal forum for the consideration of public or civic questions. It prevents lagging interest, for if a lagger develops he is drepped for a new and alert member.

Contact and exchange of ideas with diversified business interests is broadening in every sense and tends to introduce fresh thought and new viewpoints into every business and profession represented.





VICTORIA ALONE OPPOSES PENALTY

Other Municipalities Want 15 Per Cent .Tax Penalty Continued

Victoria found herself aligned against practically every other municipality in the Province in her opposition to the retention of the fifteen per cent. penalty on tax arrears when the matter came before the Municipal Committee of the Legislature this morning.

Mayor Porter for the city argued strongly against the penalty, pointing out that the Victoria City Council desired that the penalty he limited to eight per cent. URGE NECESSITY FOR MEAT INSPECTION

Kiwanis Club Told That Present Unsatisfactory Conditions Must Cease

The necessity for more rigid inspection of meat in British Columbia and in Victoria was impressed upon the Kiwanis Club at its weekly luncheon to-day by Dr. A. J. Damman, a veterinary surgeon of Vancouver, and Alderman Albion Johns, chairman of the City Health Committee.

Alderman Albion Johns, chairman of the City Health Committee.

"Not all the meat sold in British Columbia by any means is fit for human consumption." Dr. Damman told the Club. "While meat from animals killed at abattoirs is inspected, a great many animals are killed promiscuously, anywhere, and are consumed by the people.

"It is impossible." declared the speaker, "to make a proper inspection of meat hanging on the hooks, because the unscrupulous butcher has taken the precaution before the inspection or meat hanging on the hooks, as the diseased portions. We want inspection when the beast is killed. In addition we want more sanitary, cleaner slaughter houses," Dr. Damman continued, telling of the fitthy conditions of some establishments in which animals were slaughtered.

In conclusion the speaker urged the Kiwanis Club to use its influence in urging upon the Provincial Government the necessity of inaugurating adequate meat inspection throughout the Province, and, failing that, to urge the City Council to introduce a by-law governing inspection. "You cannot eliminate all diseased meat" he remarked, "but you can do a great deal."

Situation Here.

"Conditions on the Island are some-

"Conditions on the Island are somewhat different from those prevailing on the Mainland," said Alderman Johns. "In Victoria only five per cent. of the meat we eat is produced on the Island. The other ninety-five per cent is inspected under a Federal Government Act, which makes unlawful the export of meat from one Province to another without inspection. Two per cent. of the five per cent. of the meat produced on the Island reacts to the tuberculin test. What part of that two per cent. we consume you can well imagine. Suffice it to say that little of it is destroyed. Very seldom is a tubercular cow destroyed. Besides, all the meat is not inspected. The Government would have to have far more inspectors than it does at present to carry out this work. The Health Department of the city does its best, but it is impossible to say at all times whether meat is good or bad merely by seeing the carcass."

Beneficial Effect.

The Alderman also told the Club of the by-law which the City Council passed recently and which will bring into effect a more rigid inspection of meat here. While this by-law would not bring about ideal conditions it was a step in the right direction, the Alderman declared.




