REPORTS REVOLT IN KU KLUX KLAN

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 3.—A widespread "revolt" within the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, in which approximately 2,800,000 members voted to withdraw from the national organization, was described here in a statement made public by Henry J. Norton, exalted cyclops of the Nathan Bedford Forest klan.

\$26,000,000 PUBLIC DEBT REDUCTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.-A reduction of \$26,371,410 in the public debt was announced today by the treasury department. The gross public debt on December 1 was \$22,055,461,230. The treasury refunding operations have cut the debt down by \$908,235,519 since December 1, 1922.

FLOOD TOLL IS NOW ESTIMATED AT 700

MILAN, Dec. 3.—Seven hundred dead, it was estimated today, was the toll of the flood from Gleno lake, which inundated the valleys for twenty miles to Lake Iseo. The flood was caused by the breaking of the dike at Gleno lake. King Victor Emmanuel, accompanied by Under Secretary of the Interior Finzi, is on his way to the scene of the disaster.

Refuses to Abide by Party Decisions: Democrats Pick Their Senate Leader

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The house today adjourned without organizing. After fruitless ballots had been taken and it became apparent that no decision could be obtained on a speaker, Representative "Nick" Longworth, the Republican leader, arose and said that the situation was obvious and no good purpose could be served by continuing the balloting. He moved to adjourn until noon tomorrow and the motion carried over the protests of the Democrats. The result of the fourth ballot for the speakership gave Gillett 197, Garrett 196, Cooper 17 and Madden 5.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The sixty-eighth congress convened here today, thirteen months after its election, amid conditions that are unique in the legislative and political history

Few congresses in the past have been confronted by a more monumental array of domestic problems, nor been so torn with factional strife, and few have started the long session grind with less hope of constructive accomplishment.

Two obstacles stood out at the opening today as barriers to any smooth running, workmanlike program:

First, the fact that neither Republicans nor Democrats have a working majority in the house and.

Second, the fact that the new session is going straight into a heated presidential campaign, now only a few months away, with all factions striving for ical advantage.

Both houses were called to or-der sharply at noon. There was few vacant seats on either side and the galleries were choked to capacity, with scores crowding the doorways and corridors.
