I Madam,

I have ascertained that we can have Chapel Hall in Wynans Exchange building cor. of Merrimac & Central Streets, for an Anti-Slavery fair on Thursday & Friday next week (days & evenings) of the 6 & 7th April. I have consulted some about holding it on Fast-day evening & find that there seems to be no impropriety in it but rather that it would be one of the best evenings we could have — Should you conclude to convene at that time please send me notice to be published this week —

I cannot know whether we can have the City Hall for a discussion before the 10th & 11th or not & have therefore thought best to have the fair previous — we had a discussion last Thursday evening & adjourn to next Thursday evening —
