New Orleans dates are to the 12th .-Gen. Banks has issued a proclamation for a State election for Governor, etc., of Louisiana, on the 22nd of February.

The 8th of Jan. was observed in New Orleans by a salute at meredian, by order of Gen. Lanks. A great Union mass meeting was held in the evening.

In the order of a State election Gen. Banks says: He is fully assured that more than one-tenth of the whole population of Louisiana desire the earliest possible restoration of But State into the Union.

Slavery was denounced as an evil in its self, and the cause of the rebellion.

The meeting recommended the reorganization of the State government by Constitutional Conventions, composed of delegates pledged to the immediate and universal emancipation; commended the integrity of Gov. Johnson, and recommended him to call the said Convention.

Boston, Jan. 23 .- A correspondent writing from Newburn, says information has reached there that a call has been made at Ruleigh, for a State Convention for the purpose of seceding from the allegiance to the Southern Confederacy. The North Carolina papers continue to demand peace.

The shelling of Charleston continues day and night, at intervals of ten minutes, and the city is gradually rumbling under the incessant bombardinent.

Beauregard has expressed an opinion that he could not hold Charleston much longer, as Gilmore's guns are in a position to reduce it to ashes in a few hours if he intends to do so.

Washington, Jan. 27 - Efforts towards reconstruction of the State Government are extending along all parts of the counties of Middle Tennessee, but there was little hope of its return to the Union. The radicals with Gov. Johnson at their head, are in favor of calling a convention to nullify the Constitution and form a new one on the Emancipation principle.

A Cincinnati special says that Captain King, bearer of dispatches, arrived yesterday from Knoxville. He seems to have undoubted information that Longstreet has been reinforced by 20,060 men, and that he had concentrated his forces preparatory to a movement on Knoxville. His column is BRY 6005, GRILLIES, HARDWARE, about 23 miles of that place, with a front of 10 miles.
