## CHILDERS PAYS PENALTY FOR HIS TREASONABLE ACTS

### IRISH BILL NOT PARAMOUNT ISSUE BEFORE COMMONS

#### Discussion of Unemployment Question Forced by Labor New Members Conflict With Speaker in Violent Speeches

London, Nov. 24.—The opening of the business session of Parliament quickly revealed what is likely to be the paramount question in both Houses, apart from Irish legislation, for which the session was especially called.

The keynote of this was struck in the King's Speech—unemployment.

As soon as the time-honored ceremonies incident to the State opening of Parliament was concluded and before the new Parliament really settled down to its duties, it became evident that the Government's hope of limiting the discussions to the Irish Bill would be disappointed. Labor, through the mouth of its new parliamentary leader, J. Ramsay MacDonald, immediately fastened onto the Government the confession in the King's Speech that it has no new policy with respect to this important question, and depends only upon an examination of the late coalition Government's proposed remedies.

The tenor of the opposition speeches in the debate on the address was to press the Prime Minister to receive an "unemployed" deputation. This, however, Mr. Bonar Law seems determined not to do. In a further reply to a renewed request by the deputation for an interview last night he refused again on the same ground, namely, that orderly administration will become impossible if every group desiring to raise a departmental question ignored the responsible Minister.

### PREMIER MUSSOLINI RETURNS TO ROME

Rome, Nov. 24.—Premier Mussolini, back in Rome to-day from attendance upon the opening sessions of the Near East Peace Conference, at Lausanne, received a warm greeting on his arrival. At the station he was met by Cabinet Ministers, Senators, Deputies and black-shirted Fascisti. He was congratulated upon what he had accomplished at Lausanne, to which he responded with the statement that whatever successes he had accomplished were not his own, but Italy's.

### ITALY MOURNS DEAD STATESMAN

Rome, Nov. 24.—Italy mourned to-day the passing of Baron Sonnino, who was twice her Premier and her Foreign Minister during the war. Death came last night after an apoplectic stroke earlier in the day. News that the Baron had been stricken came as a surprise, for only a few days ago he was seen on the streets apparently in the best of health. Word of his illness brought anxious inquiries from many state nobles, including King Victor Emmanuel.

### DIVISION CARRIED BY GOVERNMENT

#### Majority of 103 Against Labor Opposition

#### Bonar Law Introduces Irish Bill in Commons

London, Nov. 24.—The first division in the new House of Commons which took place this afternoon was carried by the Government by a majority of 103 against the Laborite opposition.

When Premier Bonar Law moved that the Government be empowered to take all the time of the House for Government business during this session, the Laborites opposed it. The motion, however, was carried 235 to 132.

### ASSERT NEW CITY TAXATION WOULD BREAK BUSINESS

#### House Committee Rejects New Theatre Tax; Theatres Could Not Pay

#### Told Rent Levy Would Close Stores or Raise Prices

British Columbia merchants and theatre owners opened their fight on Victoria's new taxation scheme before the Private Bills Committee of the Legislature this morning with the emphatic warning—that additional taxes on theatres and on retail stores would close amusement places and force retailers to go out of business or raise prices.

After the committee had listened to the arguments of Rowe Holland, representing the theatre owners of the Province, committee members made it clear that they were opposed to the city's request for powers to levy an amusement tax. The committee's attitude on the proposed taxation of business establishments on the basis of rental values, however, was not indicated.

### ERSKINE CHILDERS WAS EXECUTED IN DUBLIN TO-DAY

#### Lieutenant of De Valera Pays Supreme Penalty For Treasonable Acts Against Irish Free State; Execution Removes Important Figure In Republican Movement; Surprise In England.

Dublin, Nov. 24.—Erskine Childers was executed at 7 o'clock this morning for having had an automatic pistol in his possession, it is announced in an official bulletin given out by the National army.

Erskine Childers, a lieutenant-commander in the Irish Republican Army and one of the right hand men of Eamonn de Valera, was placed on trial before a military tribunal in Dublin on November 17 on a charge that he had a pistol in his possession when arrested at Wicklow by Free State forces on November 10. The trial lasted two days. Childers, who was fifty-two years old, appealed through counsel for a writ of habeas corpus, which was denied yesterday by the Master of the Rolls.

### ANNE MACSWINEY, FASTING AT PRISON GATES, IS REMOVED

Dublin, Nov. 24.—Annie MacSwiney who had fasted outside the gates of Mount Joy prison since last Friday as a protest against imprisonment of her sister Mary, was removed by friends last evening to a private nursing home. She was in a very weak condition but refused to take food and only drank some water.

In a letter to the newspapers Annie MacSwiney, who has been on a hunger strike for twenty days, says that her sister received the Sacrament on Wednesday and was given Extreme Unction.

Mary now refuses visits from the prison doctors and nurses. She is attended day and night by her fellow prisoners.

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### CONSUL RESIGNED

New York, Nov. 24.—Joseph Connolly, consul-general here of the Irish Free State, has resigned by cable and sailed for Ireland to protest against the imprisonment of Mary MacSwiney and the other measures of the Government which resulted in the recent execution of four adherents of the de Valera republicans.

### PREMIERS DISCUSS BRUSSELS CONFERENCE

Paris, Nov. 24.—A conference here yesterday on the possibility of convening an International Financial Conference in Brussels before the end of year failed to reach a definite decision. The utmost secrecy was maintained with regard to the conversations which took place in the Foreign Office between Mr. Poincaré, the French Premier; M. Theunis, Premier of Belgium; Foreign Minister Jaspar of Belgium; the British Minister of Finance, and Liberated Regions and all the French and Belgian members of the Reparations Commission.

### Appeal Denied

He then appealed to the Court of Appeals for Southern Ireland. Childers was an ardent proponent of an Irish Republic and strongly opposed to ratification of the Treaty setting up the Irish Free State on grounds that it meant "absorption of Ireland in the British Empire."

He was defeated last June in the elections for the South Irish Parliament, receiving fewer votes than any other candidate in the whole election. Early in the next month he was reported to be organizing a band of insurgents in the Dublin hills, and later in the Summer commanded the band of irregulars who cut the cable in Valentia Harbor.

Childers was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. He served in the European War as a lieutenant-commander of the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve between January and May, 1916, and won the Distinguished Services Cross for his service with the anti-submarine force.

### DEFICIT WIPED OUT, NOW GOOD SURPLUS

#### Upward Trend of Trade Reflected in Post Office Revenues

QUAWRA, Nov. 24.—(Canadian Press)—The upward trend of Canadian trade is reflected in the increased volume of business and the steadily mounting receipts of the Post Office Department.

At the end of the last finance year, the Department had a deficit of slightly over \$1,500,000. The business done by the Department from that date up to the present time indicates that not only has the deficit been cancelled, but that there is likely to be a surplus of \$1,000,000 at the end of the current finance year.

### FORMER CHAPLAIN NOW EXECUTIONER, SENDS MAN TO ETERNITY

Fort Madison, Ia., Nov. 24.—Orrie Cross was hanged at 7.30 a. m. to-day in the walled enclosure at the State prison here where his partner in murder, Eugene Weeks, died ten years ago.

The trap was sprung by Sheriff Robb of Polk County, who during the war was chaplain of the 168th Infantry overseas, and also, until recently, was pastor of the Ubandale Federated Church in Des Moines. Robb also sprang the trap which caused the death of Weeks on September 15.

### LABOR ON SCOTTISH HOME RULE QUESTION

#### Propose Amendment to Address in British Commons

#### Regret Expressed No Mention Made of Proposals

London, Nov. 24.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Scottish labor members have decided to propose an amendment to the Address, expressing regret that no mention was made of proposals for conferring Home Rule on Scotland.

### TURK BOUNDARIES HOLD CONFERENCE

#### Demilitarized Zone on Both Banks of Maritza Favored by Powers

#### Plan to Hold Two Distinct Conferences Abandoned

Lausanne, Nov. 24.—The problem of Thrace and the Western boundary of Turkey still occupied the attention of the Lausanne conference to-day. The sub-committee of the full Commission on territorial questions, comprising a group of experts was wrestling with the boundary question. The establishment of a demilitarized zone on both banks of the Maritza River, which seems to be the boundary favored by the great powers, is one of the topics of discussion in the sub-committee.

### LOVE MARRIAGE IN BALKAN STATES

Lausanne, Nov. 24.—The Turkish delegation opened the subject of communication this evening by the brigade of newspaper correspondents and provided by far the most amusing press conference since the Lausanne Conclave inaugurated its proceedings.

### BULETS FLEW IN STREETS OF DUBLIN

#### Believed Demonstration Was Against Execution of Childers

Dublin, Nov. 24.—The concerted machine gun and rifle firing in several districts of the city last night, believed to have been staged as a demonstration against the execution of Erskine Childers, exceeded in intensity and duration all of Dublin's previous experiences of this nature. No casualties have been reported.

### CHIEF JUSTICE LAMOTHE DIES AT MONTREAL

Gustave Lamothe, of the Court of King's Bench, died at his home early to-day. He had been in failing health for several months, but until a fortnight ago had continued his duties at the courthouse.

### WOMAN IS ELECTED TO ROYAL ACADEMY

London, Nov. 24.—The Royal Academy for the first time in its history has elected a woman to its ranks, choosing Mrs. A. L. Swinerton, who is a member of the International Society of Sculptors, Painters and Engravers as an associate. The Academy was founded in 1768.

### BRITAIN STANDS BY WASHINGTON TREATY

#### Will Not Be Influenced by French Attitude

London, Nov. 24.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Great Britain stands by the Washington Treaty whatever France does. That is the statement of official quarters here, reflecting both the Admiralty and Cabinet opinion. The same officials believe that the statement ascribed to Georges Leygues, chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Deputies, Minister of Marine in the Clemenceau Cabinet and himself an ex-Premier of France, that France will not ratify the treaty, is a serious mistake in policy. But in view of the delicacy of Britain's relationship with France, now apparently improving, it is not likely that London will attempt to exercise any influence on Paris.

Constantinople, Nov. 24.—Abdul Medjid Effendi, newly-elected Caliph, was formally invested with power to-day. The ceremony took place in the Topkapou Palace.

### FORMER PREMIER OF ITALY DEAD

#### Baron Sonnino Succumbs Following Stroke

Rome, Nov. 24.—Baron Sidney Sonnino, twice Prime Minister of Italy, and Foreign Minister during the Great War, died last night. His death was preceded by a stroke described by the baron's physician as a cerebral apoplexy.

He was 75 years old, and twice Premier before the war, but it was through his service as Foreign Minister during the war and the Peace Conference in Paris that he won his greatest prominence in international affairs. He was distinguished as an authority on financial and economic questions.

**Silent Statesman.**

Baron Sidney Sonnino, "the silent statesman of Italy," disliked to talk, but could be fluent in five languages. He was Prime Minister of Italy in 1906 and again in 1910. From 1914 to 1919 he was Minister of Foreign Affairs. He also served as Minister of Finance, as Minister of the Interior, and as a member of Parliament. He brought to the Paris peace conference the reputation of "the first financial expert in Europe," the man who had probed the economic life of the world to the core.

"I do not shine, I do not glitter," he said on one occasion in the Chamber of Deputies. "I leave that sort of thing to my political opponents. I am satisfied if I can reveal an occasional gleam of common sense." At another time, addressing his indifferent colleagues, he said: "I propose to put a little knowledge of the state of the nation's revenue into your heads, whether you feel interested or not."

While Minister of Finance he was credited with having laid the foundation for his country's stability from the revenue standpoint, and for his establishment of budget surpluses.

Baron Sonnino was one of the most abstemious of men in spite of his wealth. Even before the war he practised the most rugged economies. Italy could not borrow favorably in the London market by reason of her enormous public debt. Sonnino lowered it by vigorous taxation, by reducing public salaries and expenditures, and dismissing needless employees. The politician, therefore, hated him.

"I would not think of having a fire in my bedroom," he protested to the deputies on one occasion. "Our Italian Winters are too beautiful to be spoiled in that fashion." When a Sicilian deputy complained of the food supply in a crisis of the war, Sonnino grimly responded: "I have tasted no meat for a week."

**Of Jewish Parentage.**

A Jew by race, a Protestant by faith, and a native of Egypt, the man who was one day destined to handle the Italian ship of state was born of an Italian Jewish father and a Scottish mother on March 11, 1847, on the banks of the Nile. He was educated partly in England and at the University of Pisa.

Sonnino's grandfather migrated from the ghetto of Leghorn, Italy, to Egypt, where he built up an enormous fortune as a banker, a fortune which the future Premier of Italy enjoyed.

Before entering politics he was editor of the magazine *Rassegna*, which he founded, and in which for years he aired his political and economic views. He also wrote and lectured on Dante and Petrarch, of whose works he was a close student. Later he became one of the proprietors of *The Giornale d'Italia*. Baron Sonnino was always interested in the welfare of the Italian farmers. His book, "The Peasants in Sicily," was a notable contribution to public knowledge of agrarian conditions in that country. One of his aims, he said, was to revive Southern Italy economically and morally. He also built local railways, but isolated regions in touch with great markets, strengthened the farm banks, and assisted villages and towns in fighting illiteracy. He possessed a wonderful library. The Baron never married.

### CANADA'S MILITARY EXPENDITURES SMALL

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 24.—Canada's expenditures per capita on military activities during 1922 will be \$1.56, compared with an expenditure of \$14 per head for similar purposes in the United States. Canada trained 27,284 men this year to November 1. These figures were given in an official statement obtained yesterday from the Department of Militia and Defence.

Quite recently the United States Secretary of War made a public statement that Canada trained 100,000 men during the past Summer. According to figures available, the exact number trained appeared to be 27,284, all ranks as at November 1, 1922.

In this connection it should be remembered that the United States maintains a standing army of over 150,000 men, all ranks. Canada, on the other hand, has no standing army, but only a small permanent force of instructors numbering less than 4,000.

The best method of gauging the military activities of the two countries in matters of defence is by comparing these annual expenditures. That of Canada during the present year will be approximately \$1.56 per capita. That of the United States, so far as can be ascertained at present, will be in the neighborhood of \$14 per capita.

### NO BRITISH HINT OF CHANGED POLICY ON CATTLE EMBARGO

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—Neither Hon. W. R. Meighen nor any other official of the Department of Agriculture has received any intimation that the legation for removal of the embargo against Canadian cattle will not be introduced during the present British Parliament. It was stated at the Department yesterday in reply to questions based upon a cable report that the Bill would not be proceeded with.

Duncan Marshall, of the Department of Agriculture, remained in London when the other members of Canada's delegation left for home, in order to keep in touch with developments and inform the Government here if there was to be any deviation from the programme laid down during the recent conference. Thus far no hint has been received either from Mr. Marshall or the High Commissioner's office of the plans of the British Government having been

### Switching of Beer Orders Denied Before Legislative Committee

For every bottle of whisky purchased at a Government liquor store the Federal authorities receive \$1.67. A. M. Johnson, chairman of the Liquor Control Board, informed the Public Accounts Committee this morning when R. H. Pooley, Esq., was delving into figures connected with the purchasing end of the liquor business.

The inquiry into the Liquor Board activities before the committee today was very much "underfoot," the Opposition enquiry being conducted for the most part by R. H. Pooley, Esq.

Mr. Pooley was again informed that purchases of liquor were made direct.

Suggestions by Mr. Pooley that there had been switchings in beer in carload lots from the brands ordered brought out the fact that while this might have been done neither Chairman Johnson of the Board nor Purchasing Agent Paterson knew of any case.

"It is possible," said Mr. Johnson, "All the beer costs the same, and we would naturally ship in to the receiving point from the nearest brewery as a matter of course in freight charges. It might happen, although I know of no such case personally."

He afterwards pointed out that the districts served by each brewery as a rule ordered the beer of that brewery.

H. G. Crumplin, accountant at the Vancouver warehouse, will be called by the committee on Monday and will be followed by H. A. Urquhart, manager of the warehouse, and Mr. Clark, Government blender.

## CLOSING HOURS OF INSURANCE TRIAL PROVIDES THRILLS

### Allegations of Arson and Blackmail Heard by Court

### Sutro Bancroft Awarded Judgment in Burnside Inn Case

Judgment for plaintiff in the sum of the settlement, namely \$5,000, and costs was handed down by Mr. Justice McDonald at the close of the action of Bancroft vs. The British Crown Assurance Corporation, Ltd., in the Supreme Court this morning.

H. A. Maclean, K. C. for Sutro Bancroft, the plaintiff, and Frank Higgins, K. C. for the defendant firm, reached a settlement yesterday, but Mr. Higgins re-appeared asking for permission to present new evidence just brought to his attention.

The hearing re-opened in court this morning with fresh evidence for the defence. Mr. Higgins said he would call evidence to the effect that a conversation had taken place in which the plaintiff, it would be alleged, had made references to the future of the Burnside Hotel. Mr. Maclean objected that this was new matter, and had not been pleaded.

Would Mr. Higgins add to the pleadings that the plaintiff burned the hotel? Mr. Higgins countered by stating that no such allegation would be made, but that evidence of a conversation in question would be given with a view to showing that the plaintiff had entered into the insurance policies with fraudulent representations and intent.

Mr. Justice McDonald, commenting on the serious turn taken by the nature of the evidence, advised Mr. Higgins to either plead the point directly or abandon it. The defence then called the evidence in question.

Alleges Fake Lease.

Alfred Richard Williams, formerly employed by the plaintiff, between April and October last year, alleged he had held a "Fake Lease" from the plaintiff, so drawn that if anything happened the plaintiff could deny ownership. Witness stated he had been fined \$50 in the police court for the presence of unsealed liquor, and that the plaintiff had paid the fine out of the takings of the Burnside Inn. Witness stated all the best tables and chairs from the dining room had been removed previous to the fire, and taken to the Palm Garden Cafe, also owned by the plaintiff. The plaintiff, Walter Adie, and the witness had carried out this moving of furniture, alleged witness.

A Curious Conversation.

Witness asserted the plaintiff had told him in conversation previous to the fire that the place was "nothing but a white elephant," and that he would "wipe it out." Witness asserted the plaintiff, alleged witness, continued by stating that he was thinking of bringing a man from Montreal for the purpose of burning down the hotel, but was not sure whether it would be worth while or not, alleged witness.

At this stage of the proceedings His Lordship stopped the cross-examination, stating he did not believe the witness, and counsel for the plaintiff need not proceed with the cross-examination.

Mrs. Margaret Bella Hunter was next called by the defence. She stated she had been employed as a housekeeper at the Burnside Inn between April and October last year. Witness alleged she heard the plaintiff make reference to the place being a "white elephant," and a "wishing it would burn down," and alleged also that she heard him say he was considering bringing a man from Montreal to do the job.

On cross-examination witness gave her occupation as a waitress. Witness admitted living in the same house as the former witness. Here again His Lordship stopped the proceeding, stating he could not believe the story of the witness.

Walter Adie, called next, stated he helped the plaintiff to move two chairs and a table from the Inn to the Palm Garden Cafe. This was before the insurance policies had been renewed.

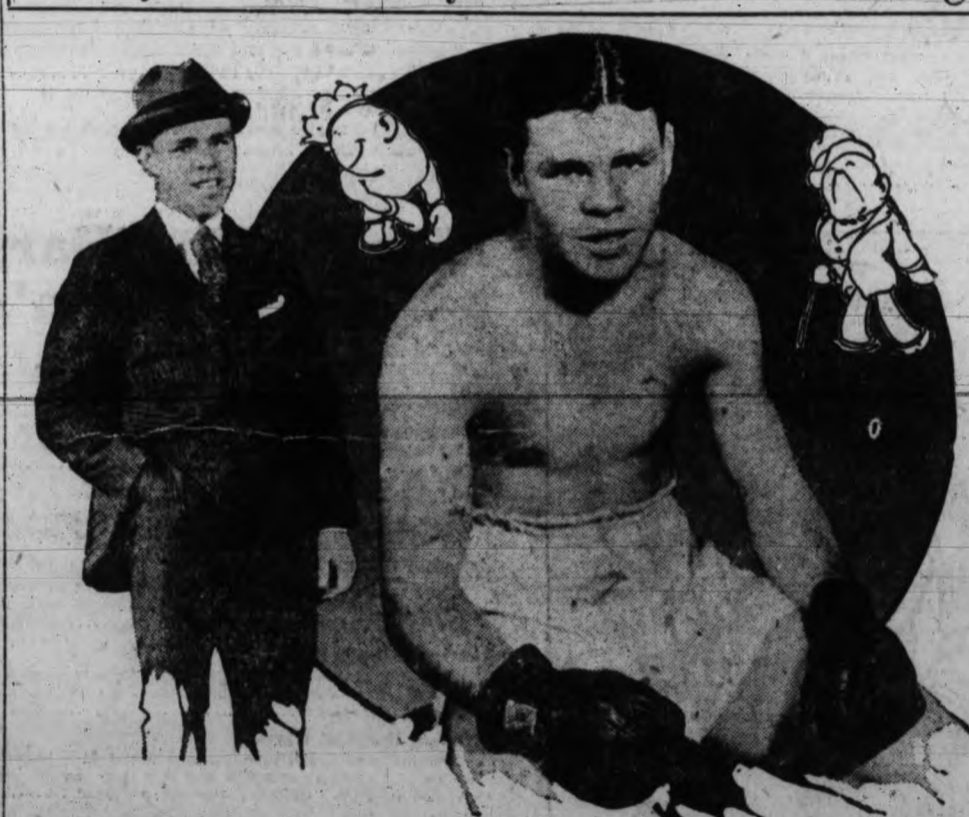

### G.W.V.A. MEETS

Prepares For Provincial Convention; Other Business.

M. G. McLeod was chosen by the Great War Veterans' Association last night as its delegate to the Provincial convention which will be held in Princeton November 30 to December 3. A special meeting will

be held next Tuesday evening when instructions will be given the delegate. A number of very important matters relating to ex-service men will be discussed.

The total of the receipts from the Poppy Day campaign was \$1,250.11, and H. W. F. King who managed the drive was complimented on the results of his efforts and those of his assistants.

A resolution was adopted strongly protesting against the appointment of Fred Mellor a merchant of this city, to the post of Sergeant-at-Arms of the Provincial Legislature as it was contended that there were many disabled veterans who needed the position more and were more entitled to it.

### GEOLOGY OF CANADA'S NORTH

The Summary Report of the Geological Survey for 1921, Part B, has

been published. It presents the results of geological investigations made by Dr. D. B. Dowling, Dr. G. S. Hume, Dr. M. Y. Williams, and E. J. Whittaker on the geology of Mackenzie River basin, by A. E. Cameron on the geology of that part of the Northwest Territory lying in the vicinity of Hay and Buffalo rivers, and by J. R. Marshall on the coal fields of the Kananaskis Lakes-Palliser River map area. A copy of the report may be had on application to the Director, Geological Survey, Ottawa.

## LABOR RENEWS APPLICATION FOR LEGAL CHANGES

Poll Tax Removal, Unemployment and Similar Issues  
Public Works for Relief on Piece Work System

Urging the Provincial Government to abolish the poll tax, to re-adjust the attitude of the community to hospital service by a better system of hospital financing, to extend the operation of the Workmen's Compensation Act, and to deal vigorously with the problem of unemployment, a delegation from the Provincial Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada waited on the Provincial Executive yesterday, headed by W. J. Bly every, Thomas St. Macdonald and E. S. Woodward, secretary. A memorandum on the whole subject was presented, and the members of the Provincial Legislature were submitted.

On the important issue of unemployment, the memorandum suggested a protection against imposition and inefficiency of that all public works projects should be computed at full trade union wages and that the cost thus determined should be met by a rate of monthly and that more regularity should be observed in their dispatch.

**Poll Tax.**  
An attack was made in the memorandum upon the poll tax on the ground that "it has been unparagonably condemned by every thoughtful objection being raised as to its continuation as part of the revenue system."

The memorandum set the reasons why the Royal Commission of taxation of 1911 were against the tax. Further arguments were used from the report of the Board of Taxation named by Premier Brewster. Next the argument was used from Professor Haig when called in to advise the government on matters of taxation, that there is little enough excuse for the existence of the poll tax.

The memorandum continued: "As wage workers we ask no special privileges. We only ask that an impost which the before mentioned authorities have condemned as unjust, oppressive, unscientific, unethical and unprincipled, and which they have described as 'class legislation of the worst kind' be forthwith abolished in British Columbia."

**Education.**  
The memorandum next made an allusion to the reasons advanced against the abolition of the exemption in regard to the income tax as a preliminary to the plan of transferring the cost of education from Municipal shoulders.

"We should like," said the delegation, "to reaffirm our belief that it is in the public interest to impose no tuition fees in the higher institutions of learning, but to seek economy by the rigorous elimination of the unreciprocated and the idle. Every child of promise should be encouraged to rise by merit from the elementary schools to the University regardless of the financial ability of the parents. But pupils who waste their time and give no indication that they regard their studies seriously should not encumber the University even if the parents—in the shape of a tuition fee—make a small contribution to the total cost of the University's maintenance. A system of scholarships applicable to rich and poor alike would appear to us to be a reasonable method of sifting desirable from undesirable pupils and of thus conserving public funds."

"We take this opportunity of congratulating the Government on its decision to proceed with the construction of a University at Point Grey which shall be a credit to the Province of British Columbia."

**Unemployment.**  
The problem of unemployment is again assuming serious proportions and is causing embarrassment to the Municipal Councils of the Province. But 'embarrassment' would be a very mild term to apply to the effect produced upon the unemployed worker and his family. A complete breakdown of the means of life in the home of any human being who is willing to perform useful social service, in a condition which demands the attention of all governmental authorities. We feel there should be greater co-ordination of effort between the Federal, Provincial and Municipal bodies and that the restrictions against utilizing the energy of these men in useful channels should be entirely removed. In order that the public may be protected against imposition and inefficiency we would suggest that all public works projects in relief of unemployment should be computed at full trade union wages, and that the cost thus determined should constitute the contract price at which the work should be performed by groups of unemployed men.

"We are persuaded that 'piece work' under the conditions outlined would prove an efficient safeguard of the public interest. We strongly urge upon Ministers the desirability and the necessity of taking all steps necessary to bring relief to the homes of the involuntary idle. We would point out that the loss to the nation, to our merchants and manufacturers from recurrent periods of unemployment would alone justify the nation in taking any steps, however drastic, to deal with the causes of the evil. Other nations have found insurance a necessary part of the governmental machine, and we regret to notice that the Federal Government has not yet availed itself of this well tried expedient."

**The Hospitals.**  
The prevalence of unemployment and low wages make imperative a re-adjustment of our attitude to hospital service. We strongly urge an extension of the functions of the Workmen's Compensation Board to cover occupational diseases and hospital service, not only to the worker himself but for all members of his family. An increase in present contributions would doubtless be necessitated, but the protection afforded against the day of sickness and accident would be ample justification. We would point out that by means of insurance the financing of the hospitals might

be placed upon a more satisfactory basis."

**Text Books.**  
The memorandum next recommended that the printing of school text books should be done at the Government printers.

"The Cooks and Waiters' Union request us to call attention to the urgent need for medical inspection of all persons who prepare food for public consumption. The prevalence of venereal and other diseases in our cities seems to justify a rigid inspection of all who serve the public in this respect," the deputation said.

**Workmen's Compensation.**  
"The amendments to the present Act," continued the deputation, "desired by Labor have already been presented to you by the representatives of the Railroad Brotherhood. These we desire to heartily endorse. In addition we request your favorable consideration of our plea that the benefits of the Act be extended to cover all workers so that all workers who suffer injury in the pursuit of their calling may be protected. There is also very urgent need for insurance to cover occupational diseases. Large numbers of men are debarred by technicalities from participating in the benefits intended by the Act. Thus cases of strain, rupture, hernia and similar serious disabilities suffered in the pursuit of duty are invariably refused. We strongly urge that the Act be forthwith amended in order that all such cases may be cared for by the Board. Another amendment which we regard as necessary is the right of appeal from the decisions of the Medical Referee of the Board to a body appointed by the Medical Society that the choicest of the workman at the mercy of the decision of any one man is calculated to work hardship. Finally we desire to express our view that the checkers of the Board should be forwarded fortnightly instead of monthly and that more regularity should be observed in their dispatch."

**Other Matters.**  
The memorandum reaffirmed the principle of the eight-hour day and opposed any change in the Minimum Wage Act as recommended by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

**Chauffeurs' Licenses.**  
"At the request of the Teamsters' and Chauffeurs' Union, we direct your attention to the lack of uniformity in the collecting of chauffeurs' license fees. This fee should either be abolished or should be enforced on all who drive cars or trucks for industrial purposes. The drivers of trucks are usually forced to pay, but the drivers of light cars used by

commercial travelers and others are usually exempt. It is also requested that a more rigorous examination be enforced on all who drive autos on the public streets and that the age limit be raised from 16 to 18. The employment of mere boys in driving trucks and other autos is fraught with extreme danger to the public and should be stopped," the deputation said.

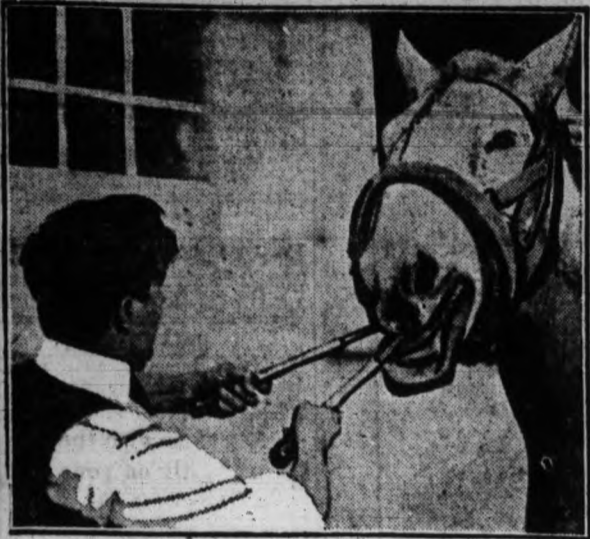

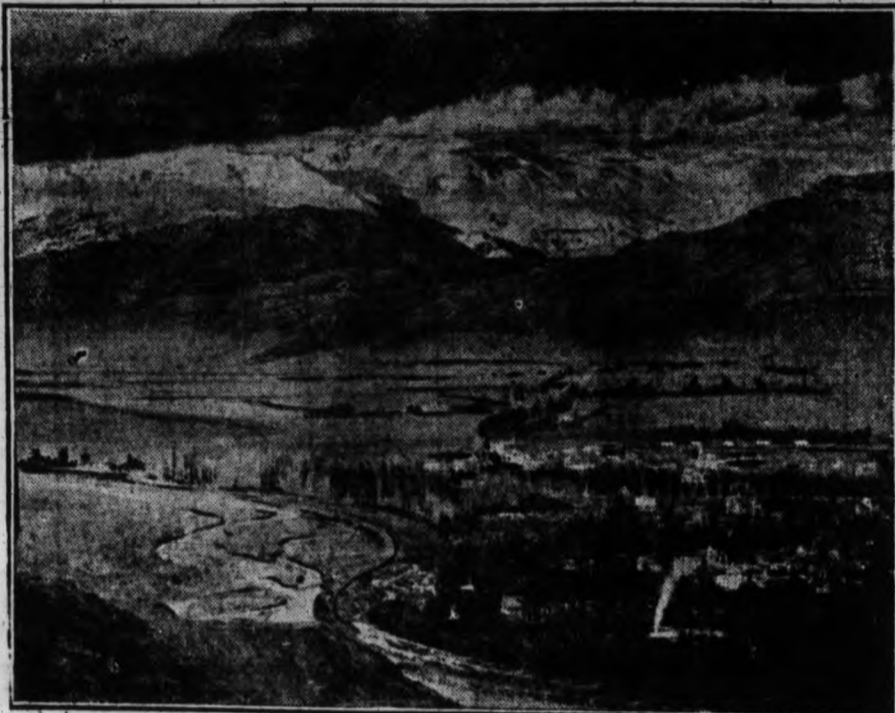

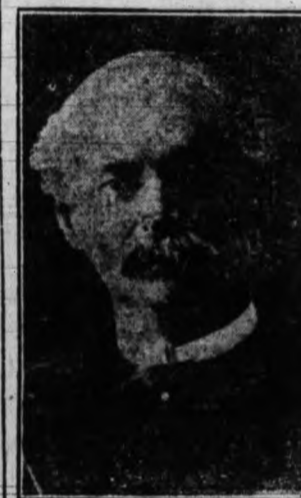

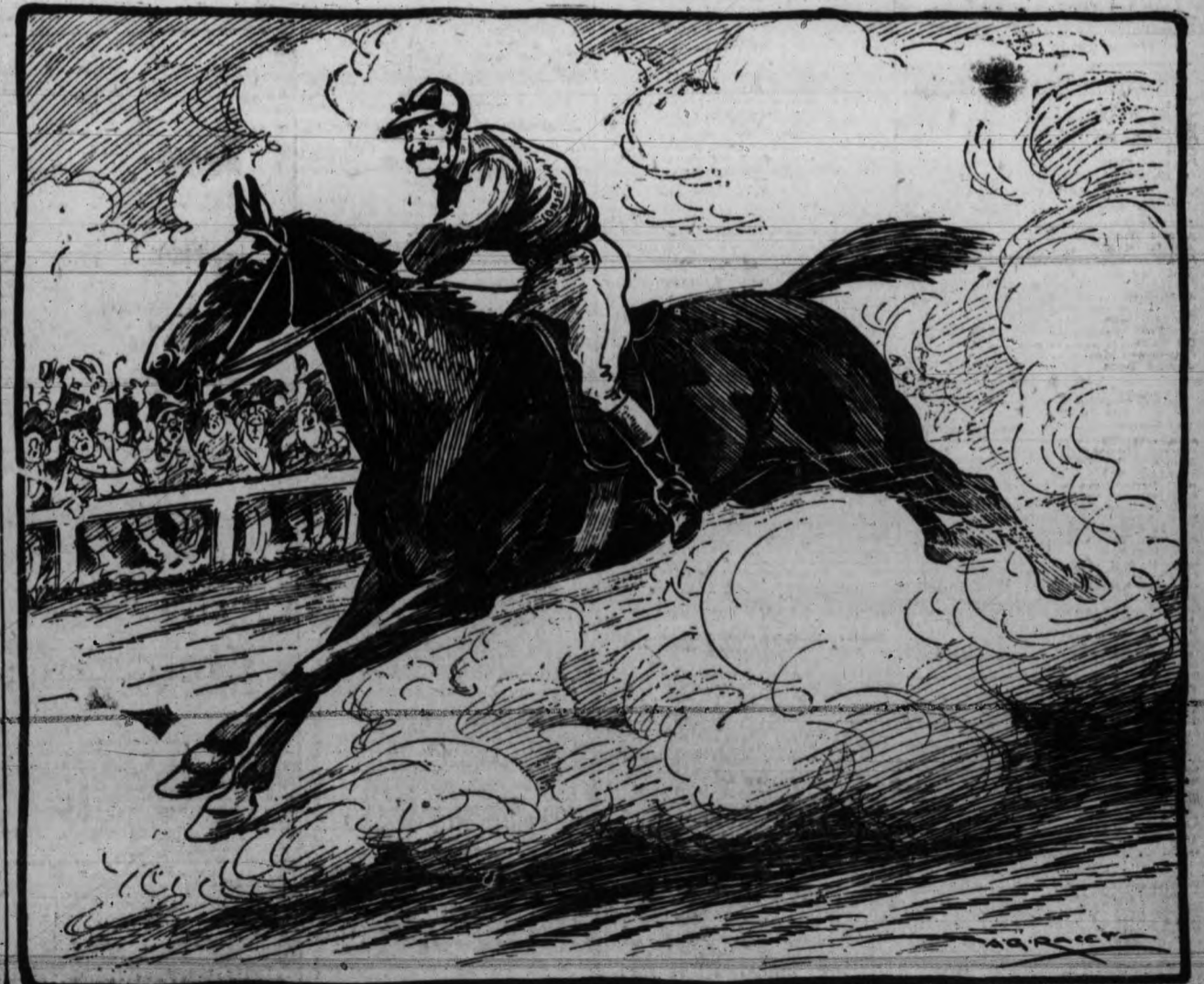
