CIA furnished us with information concerning its interviews of the subject. On 2/24/64 our Agents began interviewing Nosenko. He furnished considerable information concerning recruitments and recruitment attempts made against United States citizens and United States Government employees He stated that the Soviet Intelligence Service (KGB) has not infiltrated the FBI. Most of the information which Nosenko furnished is substantiated by facts already in our files. Concerning Lee Harvey Oswalc, Nosenko said the KGB considered him to be mentally unstable. When told that he could not stay in the Soviet Union, Oswald attempted suicide by cutting his wrists and was rushed to a hospital. Through the Red Cross or Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA), Oswald was permitted to stay in Minsk, Russia. Nosenko next heard of him when he visited the Soviet Embassy, Mexico City, and MFA made inquiry of the KGB and was told that he was of no value. Nosenko last heard of Oswald in connection with the assassination of President Kennedy. According to Nosenko, Marina Oswald was not a KGB agent. considered particularly intelligent and had been dropped from the Komsomol (young communist group) for nonpayment of dues.
