"BEAUTIFUL OHIO"

BEAUTIFUL OHIO

Introduced by Heberling's Gladiolus Fall 1935; originated by J. A. Hullibarger, Route 1, Bowling Green, Ohio.

Commercial type of a beautiful Terian pink with a touch of Tyrian rose in throat. almost a self color. It opens from five to eight florets at once from four and one half to five inches in diameter. Spikes are about forty four inches tall and flower head and flowers are of the Minuet type with eighteen to twenty open flowers and buds to the spike.

This variety comes with a straight clean spike and generally good placements. does not crook and stands heat well. Is a great favorite with Florists wherever it is known and harmonizes with Minuet and Golden Lancer especially well in makeup work. It also works in well with rose shade of roses. It is destined to go places commercially. It should be exhibited in the decorative class.

It produces a fair amount of bulblets from young bulbs and they germinate well. This season our germination was about 90%. The larger bulblets making size two and three bulbs. Stock is small as yet. Bulbs clean and healthy.

We predict that this variety will be eventually grown by all commercial growers. "Why not now."

GOLDEN LANCER

THE WONDER YELLOW

Introduced by Heberling's Gladiolus Fall 1936.

Golden Lancer is the one yellow which has size and yet the shade of yellow which will successfully harmonize or contrast with many other varieties. (This point is most necessary if a yellow is to be popular commercially and sought after by Florists.) Florists are the ultimate market. If they like it, enough said.

The rose red lines in the throat are one reason why this variety is easily blended. Another reason is that the yellow of Golden Lancer is that soft yellow which goes well with lavenders, blues and pinks.

Golden Lancer is one of the most outstanding yellows for commercial use introduced in many years. Florists ask for it and prefer it above all other yellows available for makeup work.

Description—Pinard Yellow, with short delicate lines of rose red in throat, produces spikes forty-four to fifty-four inches tall. The florets measure four and one half to five inches in size with four to six open flowers.

The spikes carry from eighteen to twenty-one buds and flowers which are well placed on a long flower head. It is a strong, sturdy grower with healthy foliage and produces clean healthy bulbs. A good producer of bulblets which germinate almost 100%.

Golden Lancer is destined to go places in a big way and I predict things for this variety commercially.

In our last Spring Gladiolus Show in November, 1934, the most conspicuous bloom was a huge Orange Scarlet Seedling.

This magnificent Grandiflorous, with seven eight-inch blooms, perfectly placed, simply dwarfed such varieties as "Queen Mary" and "Mrs. S. A. Errey." TUNIA'S BLUE

A medium dark blue of clear color and exceptionally large florets. It does not open as many at one time as Blue Wonder but the florets are larger often measuring six inches and more in size. It produces the largest florets that I have ever seen in a blue. It stands erect and makes a grand spike. This variety has a record of florets measuring seven and one half inches in diameter at the testing grounds of Melbourne, Australia. It is a grand spike and flower but only a moderate producer of bulblets. The color is lighter than Pelegrina.

I regard Tunia's Blue as one of the most outstanding blues to date with the largest blue florets I have ever seen. It is well worth trying.

NOTES

Soil and Fertilizer

Any good garden soil is ideal. Glads do well on most any soil if they are planted in the open garden where there is plenty of sunshine and a reasonable amount of moisture. Soil should be well drained. If your soil is not strong, you may apply manure and turn under in the fall, or you may work well rotted manure into the soil in the spring. If manure is not available you may use pulverized sheep or cow manure by putting into the bottom of your planting trench, then covering with an inch of soil, then planting your bulbs. Vigoro is also good. Two or three applications of commercial fertilizer may be made on the surface along the rows during the growing season and before the plants bloom. Any fertilizer should be kept from direct contact with the bulb or foliage. If you wish to grow immense spikes you must fertilize heavily but your plants must also have at least an inch of water every three or four days. Heavy fertilizing with insufficient water will make your spikes a disappointment.

Treating Bulbs

We treat all of our stock before planting with Corrosive Sublimate. One ounce to ten gallons of water. Soak bulbs or bulblets over night in wood container. This treatment is a preventative against scab and rot and also is said to be a sure killer of thrip. We have never had thrip.

Planting

Work soil to a depth of eight inches, or ten inches will be better. For large bulbs they should be covered with not less than four inches of soil and many cover them with six inches. The deeper planting helps keep them upright when blooming. Smaller bulbs should be planted more shallow but not less than two inches. You may regulate your distance apart in the row by the space you have. Plant rows anywhere from twelve inches to two feet apart in garden, depending on space. Plant in rows from two to six inches apart, depending on space and number of bulbs. They do well planted close together, making fine spikes but require more water. Also you should have richer soil or more fertilizer to get large spikes if planted close. You may, of course, plant in beds, spacing the bulbs about six inches each way.

Bulblets

In planting the rare kinds it is quite common to remove a part of the hard shell first, then keep in moist cloth or damp sand until bulblets sprout, then plant, covering with about two inches of fine soil. They should not be allowed to dry out during this process of germination. Temperature about 70° F. The commercial varieties are generally put in cloth bags and soaked in water for a day or two or three, then taken out for a day and then put back to soak. This process may be repeated several times until bulblets sprout, then plant.

Digging and Storage

With us our early stock is taken up in late September and from that time on we are busy digging until about November first. The bulbs should be taken up within six weeks to two months after blooming but before the tops begin to get brown. Even if tops are green, bulbs should be taken up before the ground freezes deeply. After digging cut off tops close to bulb and put in screen bottomed tray to cure. They should have plenty of ventilation while curing and must not be put in containers more than three or four inches deep. Stir them every few days and keep in dry, well ventilated place. In two or three weeks they will be cured so that old bulbs may be removed from the bottoms. With a few more days to dry they may then be placed in storage.

Bulbs should be dry and free from moisture when placed in storage. The storage temperature is best at 40 to 45 degrees F. However, they do very well at 50 degrees F. if you cannot keep it cooler. Your storage room should be dry, cool and ventilated and as near uniform as possible as to temperature. It is well to look at your bulbs every two or three weeks and see what the condition is, if they are showing signs of too much moisture or looking mouldy, dry them out and give better ventilation. Keep them in small containers and spread thin.

If you have had thrip, use Naptheline flakes in stored bulbs but not too heavy nor for more than ten days at a time. When your shipment of bulbs arrives unpack at once and open bags, letting in the air. If they appear moist allow them to dry before storing.

DESCRIPTIONS OF VARIETIES

- ABABA (Ellis) A very tall bronze red with many open. This is one of the finest of the new varieties. We predict that Ababa will make many new friends. We recommend this variety very highly. Fairly prolific and bulblets good germinators.
- ABE (Ellis) A very tall and stately variety of rich apricot salmon. An excellent commercial variety and outstanding in every respect. A good producer of bulblets for us which germinate well.
- AFLAME (Hornberger—1925) A giant, flame red primulinus grandiflorous variety. Both the individual florets and the spike of this variety are huge.
- AIDA (Pfitzer—1926) A dark violet blue variety. The florets are blotched with red in the throat. It is very early.
- ALBATROS (Pfitzer—1926) A massive pure white. The spike is very tall, the florets large and the color perfect. This is undoubtedly one of the finest whites.
- ALIGHT (Hornberger—1932) A Sport of Aflame, a wonderful new variety a shade lighter in color than Aflame, and with its large white throat blotch makes it a very distinctive and charming variety; easy to propagate. As this is a color Sport of Aflame, it has all the habits and qualities of its parent, except the difference in coloring.
- ALLEMANIA (Pfitzer) A giant bright red. Deep in color but more bright and lustrous than Com. Koehl, and has better facing usually than that variety. Probably the largest in its color class. Sometimes crooks in adverse weather. Good propagator.
- AMADOR (Kingsley—1931) A new glowing red glad that glistens and sparkles and glows with spectacular brilliance, whether in the sunlight or under an electric lamp. The form, substance and placement are all that can be desired, and, unlike many reds, it does not burn in the sun. The florets are large, and the spike is always straight. I cannot recommend Amador too highly.
- AMAZON (Gilrey) A tall lavender pink with a white throat. Very large florets.
- APRICOT GLOW (Palmer—1928) A very fine, clear, apricot prim. grand.
- AVE MARIA (Pfitzer—1927) A large light blue with purple blotch. This is a favorite of Pfitzer's earlier light blues with many people. It has substance that is above the average for its color, and its spike and placement are good.
- BAGDAD (Palmer—1930) A magnificent smoky old rose, deeper to petal edges and lighter in throat. Many large, unusual colored florets are open at one time on the tall, straight, fine spike. Bagdad is a good propagator and a truly outstanding variety.
- BEAUTIFUL OHIO—See page 3 for description.
- BELLA DONNA (Pfitzer—1931) A new, delicate, light blue from the gardens of the most prolific producer of good blues. Bella Donna is one of the best of its color
- BEOWULF (Nitchman) A very good late blooming lavender rose with fine tall spikes. This is our second season in growing this variety and we have watched it carefully and find it to be a very worthwhile variety. It is a good producer of bulblets and they germinate well. We feel sure this variety is destined to become an outstanding commercial.
- BERTY SNOW (Mair—1918) A fine large lavender. Although the florets sometimes fleck, they seem even more beautiful because of this fact.
- BETSY BOB-UP (Canine) A light creamy apricot sport of Betty Nuthall. This appears to have excellent commercial possibilities, some liking it better than its parent. Very prolific.
- **BETTY NUTHALL** (Salbach—1928) Undoubtedly one of the finest varieties ever originated. The florets are of the richest salmon orange shading to yellow in the throat. The spike is extremely tall and straight, and it carries twenty or more buds. Eight to ten perfectly placed flowers open at once.
- BILL SOWDEN (Fallu—1929) A huge, deep, rich red. This variety frequently produces six inch flowers; it is considered by many to be the best red. Its spikes, although not unusually long, are very good.
- BLEEDING HEART (Brown—1927) Fine light pink with large red blotch. To those fanciers of blotched glads who mourn the passing of Pendleton, Bleeding Heart will be a delightful acquisition. The spike is tall and straight, and it carries many well placed open flowers and buds.

- BLUE ADMIRAL (Christ—1932) In my opinion this variety is one of the best blues ever to have been introduced. Its color is a most pleasing medium blue. It frequently produces florets five and one-half inches or more across. The spike is unusually tall and straight and the placement is very good.
- BLUE DANUBE (Pfitzer—1929) A very fine light blue. The color is a shade lighter than Mrs. Van Konyenburg, and the placement is better. The spike is exceptionally tall.
- BLUE PEACOCK (Salbach—1932) A relatively new blue by the originator of Betty Nuthall. Blue Peacock is more nearly a true blue than most so-called blues; there is less violet in the ground color. The dark purple blotch in the throat is surrounded by cream, giving the appearance of a peacock eye for which the variety was named.
- BLUE ROYALE (Vaughan—1931) A tall, dark violet blue. The throat of the floret is blotched with cream. This variety produces a long, well proportioned spike and flower head.
- BLUE TRIUMPHATOR (Pfitzer) A very large light blue with six to eight large flowers open at one time. Substance appears light. This variety was brought out a few years ago at \$100.00 per bulb.
- BLUE WONDER (Both, Aus.) Described in front of catalog.
- BONNIE BLUE (Christ) A new medium blue with darker throat.
- BREAK O' DAY (Bill—1924) An early, light pink, commercial of great merit.
- CADILLAC (Vaughan—1929) A tall, rich yellow. The florets are a golden apricot yellow, and have no marking in the throat. The spike is unusually fine and it carries as many as seven open flowers.
- CANBERRA (Errey—1927) Tall, outstanding yellow of good substance. The length of spike, size of florets and excellence of color make Canberra a fine show variety.
- CANYON VIOLET (Vaughan—1932) Deep violet blue, small purple plume. Very tall with from four to six well placed florets open at a time. It has been a slow propagator with us.
- CARA MIA (Miller—1927) An early, deep shrimp pink primulinus grandiflorous.
- CHARLES DICKENS (Pfitzer—1925) A large aster purple variety. The spike, which is usually long, carries many buds and open flowers.
- CHRISTABEL (Mitsch) La France pink with sulphur yellow throat. Tall, slender spikes with seven to ten large flowers open at once.
- COMMANDER KOEHL (Pfitzer—1928) A massive blood red. The florets of this fine variety are often six inches across. The spike is exceptionally long and straight It produces huge spikes even from small bulbs.
- COPPERFIELD (Australia) An outstanding exhibition variety. A blend of deep coppery bronze and slate with a large rich velvety cherry colored blotch, beautifully edged with bright copper. The edges of the ruffled petals are heavily flecked with mulberry. The spike is extra long with ten to twelve immense flowers of splendid form open. Unusually good.
- CORONATION (Palmer—1932) Soft, light salmon shading to cream and creamy yellow in throat. Many large, well placed blooms open on moderately tall, strong spike. This is a beautiful exhibition variety.
- D. A. HAY (Whitely, N. Zealand) This very popular variety has won many champion-ships in N. Z. Color is pink, with a creamy white throat. Opens 10 on a tall, straight spike.
- DANNY BOY (Julyan) Brownish slate, with deep orange throat. Many open and a beautiful spike. One of the most admired in our garden. Outstanding. Good propagator and germinator.
- DEARBORN (Vaughan—1930) A tremendously large orange yellow. The throat is marked with a feathering of deep crimson. Tall, straight spike carries twenty or more buds with many huge florets open at once.
- DEBONAIR (Palmer—1932) LaFrance pink to shrimp pink in throat with creamy throat mark. The tall, strong, always straight spike carries six to eight large open flowers. Debonair is truly excellent.
- DECEMBER SNOW (Nitchman) A large creamy white.
- DO X (Pfitzer) A large amber yellow variety. Said by the originators to be the largest yellow gladiolus in commerce.

- DR. A. C. McKILLOP (Mair, N. Z.) A large lavender from New Zealand.
- DR. DURR (Pfitzer—1930) An early light yellow of much merit. This variety opens six to eight beautiful, creamy yellow flowers at once on a tall straight spike. It is unquestionably one of the finest glads of this color.
- DR. F. E. BENNETT (Diener—1921) An immense, brilliant scarlet. Dr. Bennet is, in our opinion, the finest exhibition and commercial scarlet on the market.
- DR. MOODY (Kinyon—1926) An excellent lavender.
- DR. NELSON SHOOK (Kunderd—1925) A very rich rose red. The large, strong spike carries many buds, and from six to eight beautifully ruffled open florets.
- **DUNA** (Palmer—1931) A soft, light pink and buff variety. The general color effect is distinctly new and different. Five to six large blooms open at once. The color of Duna is unusual.
- EARLY DAWN (Briggs—1933) A new early geranium pink. Makes a tall spike, with large flowers well placed and it makes a very gorgeous spike. It propagates well and the bulblets are good germinators, increasing rapidly. Spike generally straight and we believe this variety has a great future as a commercial and it will qualify for exhibition when well grown. Try it.
- EARLY PEACH (Pruitt) Peach-red blending to ivory in the throat of upper petals. Lower petals blotched a warm buff. A very beautiful decorative variety with a tall spike. An excellent commercial.
- **EDITH MASON** (Vaughan—1929) A delicate geranium pink. The color is most exquisite—even in the bud.
- E. I. FARRINGTON (Rowe) Very rich, soft yellow, no markings. Good commercial.
- EMILE AUBRUN (Lemoine—1910) A fine, standard, smoky rose red. The throat is blotched with deeper rose and the entire flower is overcast with bronze and gray.
- **ERICA MORINA** (Pfitzer—1930) A most distinctive scarlet. This variety is vigorous grower; it resembles Pfitzer's Triumph in color but produces a superior spike and is earlier.
- **ESME DESAILLY** (Errey—1928) Salmon pink with reddish lines on cream tinted lower petals. Eight or more well placed medium size blooms open. A good exhibition variety.
- EUIDES (Errey) An ivory white with cream center and very lightly flushed toward the outside edges with lilac pink. Makes a fine spike with eight to ten open with fine form and placement. A great exhibition variety with prospects of becoming a leading commercial variety. Winner of high awards in Australia.
- **EXCELLENCE** (Kunderd) A tall flashing light red with large flowers. Splendid commercial or for home garden.
- FLAMING METEOR (Mitsch) A large bright deep red self. One of the very best new reds introduced and if you like red glads you will love this one. It has real merit.
- FLAMINGO (Christ) Rose pink with white throat blotch.
- FRANK J. McCOY (Briggs) A very large tall pink. The spikes are not always of perfect placement but when they come with from ten to fourteen open flowers they are sure prize winners. I do not believe that any variety has more championship awards to its credit than this variety the past few years. One of the best exhibition varieties.
- GABRIEL (Errey) Salmon flecked slate and gray. A good variety producing fine spikes.

 GAY HUSSAR (Salbach—1928) Orange-red, shading to strawberry pink. Fine place-
- ment and very attractive.
- GEM OF SPARTA (Ellis) A tall apricot of heavy substance.
- GERTRUDE SWENSON (Swenson) An exhibition lavender opening from ten to twelve flowers. Flowers not large but of good placement.
- GIANT NYMPH (Coleman—1921) An excellent standard pink variety. One of the best commercials.
- GOLD EAGLE (Austin) Earliest yellow, slightly ruffled. Very good commercial.
- GOLDEN AMBER (Salbach—1927) A most excellent amber yellow prim. Unlike most primulinus varieties, this one produces a fine spike with many buds and open flowers.
- GOLDEN CHIMES (Ellis—1929) The large florets are a delightful medium yellow, and are ruffled. It is one of the finest yellows we know of.

- GOLDEN CUP (Palmer) A very deep yellow self. Good commercial.
- GOLDEN DREAM (Groff—1923) An extremely tall, rich yellow.
- GOLDEN FLAME (Kingsley—1933) Dark orange salmon with yellowish lip and midribs. Orange feather. Tall, straight spike with 6 to 8 blooms of heavy substance seen at a time.
- GOLDEN FRILLS (Kunderd—1925) An unusual yellow primulinus variety. The color is deep daffodil yellow with flame red blotch.
- GOLDEN GODDESS (Salbach—1933) The first patented gladiolus. Nine to twelve of the twenty to twenty-one florets open at once in a deep rich golden yellow color, with buds as yellow as the flower itself. The placement is as perfect as one may conceive. The spike is exceptionally straight with an unusually long flower head, consequently we do not hesitate to give it the highest recommendation possible.
- GOLDEN LANCER (Heberling's Gladiolus) See page 4 for description.
- GOLDSTAUB (Pfitzer) Extra early yellow of merit. Propagates well and bulblets are good germinators, should be good commercial.
- GRAND SLAM (Salbach—1933) A bright salmon-orange sport of Pfitzer's Triumph. The spike is longer than P. T., and has large, slightly ruffled, well placed florets. Grand Slam is truly one of the leaders of its color class.
- GYPSY LASS (Herborn-Salbach) A very distinctive new scarlet with carmine blotch. Good size, form, and placement with large florets. Very brilliant and outstanding. Feel sure it will make a place for itself.
- HEATHFIELD (Errey—1930) Grenadine red with pomegranate blotch. A very large, fine exhibition variety.
- HEILIGTUM (Pfitzer) A pure white with a slightly greenish cream throat. Flowers are large with five to seven open on good flower head and long spike. This variety appears to have merit.
- HINEOMA (Doney—1925) Probably the most unique glad in our gardens last summer. The color is rose red, flecked darker red, and with a large blotch of cream in the throat.
- HYACINTH (Gilrey—1929) A very large shell pink.
- IRENE (Mair—1928) Salmon rose base which is flecked old rose. The edges of the petals are bluish gray; the flowers are cream in the throat. This is considered by many to be one of Mair's finest originations.
- ISOLA BELLA (Pfitzer) Light pink lavender. Good spike and flower head with ten to twelve open. Strong grower and good producer of bulblets.
- JANE ADDAMS (Prestgard—1926) An excellent lavender. The flowers, which are exceedingly large, are white in the throat.
- JOERG'S WHITE (Joerg—1924) A huge white with a small crimson feather in the throat. This is one of the most popular whites.
- JOH. S. BACH (Pfitzer—1930) Fine orange salmon, somewhat lighter in the throat, with white median lines on each petal. It is an early exhibition variety, and a strong grower.
- JOYFULL (Crow) Tall willowy spike of golden orange. Very heavy substance and a good producer.
- JUBILEE (Kemp—1926) A massive lavender pink. From large bulbs. Jubilee consistently produces flowers that are more than six inches across. It was originally introduced at \$100.00 per bulb.
- JUNE ROSE (McClure—1930) A good commercial rose red.
- KASSELL (Pfitzer) A very rich scarlet self. Placement not always good, but a grand tall spike of rich red with immense flowers.
- LADY EATON (Palmer—1932) Pale vinaceous to venetian pink and almost white in the throat which has a violet marking. Purple penciling and peppering on cream ground. Very tall spike which opens 6-7 large wide open blooms.
- LA PALOMA (Dusinberre—1929) A fine, tall orange primulinus grandiflorus variety. The color is most attractive, and the spike is exceptionally good.
- LIBELLE (Pfitzer—1929) A fine, light violet blue. The florets are large and beautiful. The spike and placement are good.
- "The Cream of the Stock Goes to the Early Buyers"

- LIGHTS OF GOLD (Hornberger) Intensely ruffled bright salmon pink with large throat blotch of golden yellow. A wonderfully harmoniously blended flower possessing much beauty. Grows rather tall but florets are not overly large. However it is a strong grower and good producer of bulblets which germinate well. We think this variety a great commercial.
- LITTLEJOHN (Stevens—1929) A beautiful ruffled rose. The spike is tall and consistently straight. The flower head is well proportioned. This is a very worthwhile variety.
- LONDONDERRY (Christ) A giant spike and flower of rich orange with a touch of carmine in the throat. This wonderful variety is a giant in both plant and flower. As I write this description I have before me a spike grown from a bulblet this season which is thirty-six inches long after being cut with an eighteen inch flower head and two open florets more than five inches across. It has excellent placement, head good substance, and the florets open wide. Very outstanding.
- LOTUS (Prestgard—1929) A daintily colored glad of soft light pink with a cream throat. The shape of the spike and florets combined with this beautiful shade of pink make it truly exquisite.
- LOUIS D'OR (Pfitzer) Bright orange yellow prim.
- LOYALTY (Austin—1928) An excellent deep yellow. Very popular.
- LUCIFER (Errey) Bright orange with amaranth crimson blotch. Nine to eleven large flowers of fine form and substance are well placed on an exceptionally tall spike
- MAC (Both) See page 6 for description.
- MADAME NORENA (Prestgard—1928) A large, beautiful buff. The color is most pleasing, and the florets are well shaped and nicely ruffled.
- MAID OF ORLEANS (Pfitzer)—1929) Milky white with a distinctive light cream shade in the throat. Large flowers, consistently good spike and placement, and a beautiful color are among the merits of this variety.
- MAJOR BOWES (Stewart) A very large bittersweet pink overlaid with a slightly deeper tone, with pinard yellow throat. This is a massive plant and spike with heavy foliage and strong tall spike carrying eight to twelve large open flowers. It is a good producer and the bulblets germinate well. Major Bowes should become a very popular commercial variety. It has all of the points required for a good commercial and a good exhibition variety as well.
- MAMMOTH WHITE (Pfitzer—1922) It has a massive flower, frequently more than six inches in diameter, and is of the purest white.
- MANU (Burns) A New Zealand decorative variety of much merit. It received the F. C. C. award in New Zealand in 1936 and appears to be going places. Color, rose doree with small majenta-purple stripe.
- MARCHEN (Pfitzer—1932) A soft La France pink of the purest shade imaginable. The florets, which are over 6 inches in diameter, are of good substance and well placed on a strong stem.
- MARGARET PETER (Errey) An early Errey variety of white flushed pink with large crimson blotch. Placement nearly always perfect with eight to ten open flowers. A good producer and bulblets germinate well. A coming commercial we feel sure.
- MARMORA (Errey, Australia—1926) A gigantic silver gray with a rose throat. A paragon of exotic beauty, Marmora, at the time of introduction, was widely acclaimed as the most unusual glad ever to reach the American glad fan.
- MARNIA (Kemp—1925) A rich, brilliant orange. Spike and substance are good.
- MAROCCO (Pfitzer—1927) The darkest red we have ever seen. The flowers possess a wax-like texture and fine substance that is most striking.
- MARY ANSTEEN (Young) A splendid deed begonia rose with lighter throat. A very rich and pleasing color. This variety has received many compliments from growers and test gardens and all are agreed that it is a very worthwhile commercial. Strong grower and a good producer of bulblets which germinate well and make good size the first season.
- MATADOR (Christ) Large lavender red with darker blotch.
- MAUNGA (Burns) A new gigantic white from New Zealand which leaves nothing to be desired as to size, color, and substance. It is one of largest and best whites that we have ever grown. If you grow it we feel sure it will please you.

- MAX REGER (Pfitzer—1932) A light lavender blue with darker throat markings ending in small sharp almost white points, giving the flower the semblance of a beautiful blue butterfly. This variety, which is more graceful and attractive than most we know, is doubtless one of the best of its color class.
- MAYFLOWER (Pfitzer) A sparkling, flaming pink that is outstanding. The edges of the petals appear frilled and this variety is most striking as to color and attractiveness.
- MILDRED LOUISE (Wentworth—1932) The color, a warm salmon pink, is delightful. The spike and flowers become tremendously large, but retain their grace and beauty in spite of that fact. A very good commercial and exhibition variety.
- MILFORD (Rides—1932) We consider this outstanding variety to be one of the finest recent New Zealand originations, not excepting Takina and Miss New Zealand. It has a tall, straight spike, large flowers with excellent substance and placement. The color is clear azure, with inconspicuous throat markings. It is great improvement over Heavenly Blue, being much larger and deeper in color. It is truly a sensational variety and the best light blue we know.
- MILKMAID (Gilrey) Very large milky white with a mauve feather. Tall spike, about ten open, very well recommended in Australia.
- MILLIE PARKS (N. Zealand) This variety is an improved D. A. Hay and has created a large following in New Zealand. The color is light salmon, flaked with rose and yellow throat. A very pleasing combination of harmonious shades. We believe this variety will soon become very popular.
- MINUET (Coleman—1922) Easily the most popular of all purpose lavenders. The spike is a model of excellence, and the placement is always good. The florets are large and well shaped. At shows Minuet is a sure winner in the lavender without marking class.
- MISS GREELEY (Briggs) Very similar to its parent, W. H. Phipps, but not quite so massive. The outstanding feature in favor of Miss Greeley is that it is approximately three weeks earlier. This is a tremendous asset in making it a good commercial variety.
- MISS JOY (Blake—1929) A delicate pure pink shading to cream in throat. It produces a lovely spike.
- MISS MARION (Fischer) An early mauve lavender with cream throat.
- MISS NEW ZEALAND (Julyan, N. Zealand) Shrimp, grading into begonia rose, with a medium-sized blotch of tyrian rose. The spike is tall, at times reaching over six feet, with massive well rounded florets. The 7½ inch florets come well placed with 8-10 open at a time. Miss New Zealand has been a big winner wherever shown. We have never been able to grow this variety as large as grown in Australia.
- MOTHER MACHREE (Stevens—1927) A beautiful golden lavender smoky that defies description. Mother Machree was introduced at \$100.00 per bulb. It is immensely popular with our customers.
- MRS. CALVIN COOLIDGE (Kunderd—1927) An exquisite salmon pink prim, with a rich yellow throat.
- MRS. E. J. HEATON (Heaton—1933) The color is a deep salmon pink with a cream throat. No markings of any kind, and it does not fleck or fade. It has good placement and substance, and is a strong grower. It is an excellent commercial or exhibition. Bulblets germinate well.
- MRS. E. J. TOON (Toon) A very new white of merit from New Zealand. Our first year in the garden but looks very good.
- MRS. LEON DOUGLAS (Diener—1920) Under proper conditions this variety develops spikes that are more than six feet in height, and that carry many six inch salmon florets.
- MRS. P. W. SISSON (Coleman—1924) A beautiful light pure pink.
- MRS. RAY P. CHASE (Miller—1930) A white with a yellow throat blotch that is unsurpassed when well grown. Its good form and placement, and its wax-like texture and fine substance are unexcelled.
- MRS. S. A. ERREY (Errey) A very large orange variety which has won many awards both in Australia and the U. S. Flowers are five to six inches across with generally good placement on a very strong spike which is straight. A large, splendid variety.
- "The Cream of the Stock Goes to the Early Buyers"

- NETHERLAND PRINCE (Stevens—1930) Bright salmon pink, white throat. This very tall, straight spike carries from six to eight large open flowers. A good exhibition variety, with great possibilities as a commercial.
- NEW ERA (Ellis) A beautifully ruffled rich pink which has caused much favorable comment the past two years. Good propagator and bulblets germinate well. It will undoubtedly become a great commercial when stock is more plentiful. You can't go wrong on this one.
- NINTH SYMPHONY (Pfitzer) An immense exhibition variety with giant flowers of a vivid salmon red. One of Pfitzer's largest and best introductions.
- OLIVE MARIE BROWN (Indian Hollow Farms) A small decorative with graceful spike forty to forty-five inches tall. Color a rich apricot orange with petals of a beautiful irregular form. It is different and outstanding.
- ORANGE BUTTERFLY (Salbach—1927) A glowing, bronzy orange prim. Unlike many primulinus varieties, this one opens many florets at once.
- ORANGE KING (Steves—1932) Very lightly flaked salmon orange, fine red lines in throat. Eight or nine are open at once with twenty to twenty-two buds on a tall, slender, straight spike often over six feet tall. A good prim. grand.
- ORANGE PRINCESS (DeGroot—1932) Purest salmon orange, slightly lighter in throat, small crimson feather deep in lower petals, wide open flowers of wonderful form and perfectly arranged, slightly ruffled. Fine cut flower and exhibition variety.
- ORANGE QUEEN (Pfitzer-1919) A tall orange yellow primulinus grandiflorus.
- ORANGE SOVEREIGN (Steves—1932) Light orange buff, slightly suffused salmon toward tips of petals. The color does not fade or burn in hot sunshine. This tall spike has 8 to 10 slightly ruffled, large blooms open at one time. Received an Award of Merit in England.
- ORANGE WONDER (Kemp-1927) A fine, rich orange.
- OUR SELECTION (Ball—1928) A large smoky salmon with red feather edged with yellow.
- PAUL PFITZER (Pfitzer—1924) A tall velvety purple. It is the most popular variety of this class that we grow.
- PELEGRINA (Pfitzer—1930) The richest and deepest of Pfitzer's blues. Pelegrina has the same fine color as Aida—without its red-throat blotch.
- PENSACOLA (Christ) Pure scarlet without markings. A scarlet of outstanding merit.
- **PFITZER'S TRIUMPH** (Pfitzer—1925) A gigantic scarlet. Huge, wide open flowers open flat against the strong spike. It does not stand the heat well.
- PHYLLIS McQUISTON (Stewart—1933) The color is a beautiful shrimp pink with a slight pencil line of rose in the center of the white throat. The spike is long and erect, carrying well five or more of these beautiful large flowers open at a time. It has the best of substance and is a good propagator. Phyllis McQuiston is rapidly being recognized for what it really is—a wonderful glad.
- PICARDY (Palmer—1930) Truly immense spikes carry as many as eight huge open flowers. The color is so rich a salmon pink that an average vocabulary is unable to describe it.
- PINK SELECTION (Australia) A sport of "Our Selection" and when grown under favorable conditions in the late Fall this variety produces the largest and finest pink florets that I have ever seen produced barring none. A very large straight spiked pink with ten six-inch florets. Believe it does best in cool weather.
- PIRATE (Palmer—1930) Shades and tints of pomegranate purple. Lighter in upper throat. Good placement on a tall spike makes it a real dark beauty.
- **POLAR ICE** (Pfitzer) A pure white of good size and very early. We consider it a good commercial, and it should make a very good exhibition.
- PRAIRIE GOLD (Corrington—1934) A very deep yellow. It has a tall, straight spike with good placement. Prairie Gold has won numerous firsts since it was introduced. A first for vase of three spikes at both the National and Illinois shows, also it was awarded the blue ribbon as champion decorative spike of the Illinois Gladiolus Society show.
- PREDOMINATOR (Kunderd) A tall salmon scarlet that has received many prize awards.

- PRIDE OF PORTLAND (Ellis—1926) A very large plant with tall spike producing large well formed begonia rose florets with white throat. The spike is usually well formed and spike and flower head are well balanced and of good length with flowers of large size. This is an outstanding variety.
- PRIMROSE PRINCESS (Salbach—1927) A large, stately, wide open yellow.
- PURE GOLD (Dehnhoff) A pure yellow of commercial value.
- PURITY (Christ) A tall decorative white of good substance and an altogether attractive variety of merit.
- PURPLE VICTORY (Gilrey) A strong growing purple making a good spike with many large purple florets open at once.
- QUEEN HELEN II (Salbach) A light geranium pink of clear color and tall spike. An excellent variety.
- RAMSEY McDONALD (Pfitzer) A new purple self color that stands at the top of its class. Probably the best purple to date.
- RAPTURE (Palmer—1931) Medium light salmon with diffused yellow blotch. 5 to 7 very large blooms well arranged on a straight tall spike. A good late cut flower.
- RAQUEL (Nitchman) Tall white with faint pencilings in throat.
- RAYSHEAN (Australia) See page 6 for description.
- RECOVERY (Blake) Tall salmon rose overlaid with red. This variety has made a splendid record the past two years and seems destined to become a great commercial. Many flowers open and a good producer of bulblets which germinate well.
- RED LORY (Errey, Australia—1928) This variety produces tall, graceful spikes carrying many buds and flowers. The color is a most desirable rose red. As high as ten florets open at once.
- RED PHIPPS (Briggs—1932) Tall spike with six to ten brilliant flowers. The color is a most desirable red. As high as ten florets open at once.
- REVERIE (Palmer) Light safrano pink shading to a cream throat. A splendid variety and good commercial.
- REWI FALLU (Fallu) A very large deep blood red variety. This variety although new has already many stanch friends because of its large size, good color, and splendid substance.
- ROBERT BURNS (Christ—1935) Color slightly lighter than Pelegrina, but much nearer a real blue. No throat markings. A tall spike with 8 to 10 of the 21 buds open at once. 5 to 6 inch florets—all perfectly placed. Gives good increase, and easy to germinate.
- ROBERT THE FIRST (Wilkus) A huge, tall spike, strong and sturdy with ten to fourteen large ruffled pale rose-purple florets open.
- ROSE LADY (Christ—1931) An outstanding new smoky rose. Tall spike with large flowers of very heavy substance.
- ROSE STANDISH (Kinyon—1935) Beautiful clear shade of light rose pink. Five or six wide open ruffled blooms of good size, well placed on a straight slender spike of eighteen or more blooms. Has been exhibited twice, previous to this summer, and won both times.
- ROYAL OMAR (Christ—1933) A delightful salmon rose with a lighter throat. The florets are beautifully shaped, ruffled and well placed. The spike is tall and straight and carries many buds and open flowers.
- SALBACH'S ORCHID (Salbach—1930) A fine lavender pink. It is similar in form to Minuet, but pinker, and retains its color under artificial light.
- SALBACH'S PINK (Salbach—1929) A large, wide open, glowing geranium pink, with soft carmine tongue and throat markings. The tall, straight spike carries many buds and open flowers.
- SCHUBERT (Pfitzer—1930) A very lovely creamy yellow with vivid scarlet blotches.
- SENORITA (Salbach—1928) A large, warm orange with carmine feather. The plants are sturdy and of medium height, and the substance is excellent.
- SHIRLEY TEMPLE (Pruitt) An immense new heavily ruffled cream with deeper throat color. This variety was the wonder of the West coast last season and again this summer. A sturdy grower making spikes five and six feet tall with six immense flowers open at once. It is a good propagator of bulblets and the bulblets germinate well. Shirley Temple is truly a sensational variety.

- SMILING MAESTRO (Christ—1932) One of the foremost of the almost new introductions. The color is a rich orange salmon of unusual beauty. The spike is straight and tall, and it carries many open flowers. This is a seedling of W. H. Phipps which is a credit to its parent.
- **SONATINE** (Pfitzer—1932) Color Atlas-rose with small cherry-red blotches. The florets are exceptionally large, having very broad petals. It often grows to the height of 6 or 7 feet. The originator predicts a wonderful future for it as a cut flower.
- **SOUTHERN CROSS** (Whitely, Australia) Deep red self. The spike is tall with good placement, and is considered by some Aust., N. Z., growers to be one of the best cut flower varieties yet produced, especially in a hot climate, because it will not burn easily.
- SPANISH CAVALIER (Ellis) A large bright red with cream throat.
- ST. LAWRENCE (Christ—1934) A magnificent brilliant scarlet with a rose red blotch. The florets are huge, well placed, and of unusually heavy substance.
- SUPERWHITE (Ellis) A large pure white. Good spike.
- SWEETHEART (Prestgard) Lovely decorative white with pink edges.
- **SWORD OF MAHOMET** (Ellis—1926) A tall, smokey, brownish rose. It produces a fine spike and flower head.
- TAIAROA (Miller, New Zealand—1932) A large salmon pink, flaked with slate with rose blotch in throat. This variety has been very fine in our garden. It stands at the very top of the list of the New Zealand varieties we have imported the past few years. Taiaroa is much lighter in shade than Mother Machree and has a softness and richness of color most outstanding. It has long flower head with eight to ten large well placed flowers open at once. Don't fail to try this one. Personally I prefer Taiaroa to Miss New Zealand.
- TAKINA (Burns, New Zealand—1933) The report comes from "down under" that it is the largest gladiolus grown. Massive spikes seven to nine open florets, eight inches across. Color, Ridgeway's rosaline purple, lightly flaked a darker shade. We have never bloomed it from large bulbs, but we do know that it received the Award of Merit in the Mammoth Class at the Ballaret Test Garden.
- THE BOUNTY (Nitchman) A new dark red which seems to have merit.
- THE MOOR (Crow) A splendid deep rose red bloom opening eight large well ruffled flowers. Spikes are a little short at times but really I regard The Moor as an outstanding and beautiful variety. One of the best in its color class.
- TIP TOP (Pfitzer—1931) The finest of Pfitzer's 1931 introductions. This variety usually produces six inch flowers, even from medium size bulbs. The color is a brilliant scarlet with a darker feather in the throat. The spike is tall and fine. This is truly a magnificent variety.
- TOA (Miller—1933) I would call this variety a large improved Pfitzer's Triumph. It has much better and heavier substance than Pfitzer's Triumph and better healthier foliage. The placement is unusually good. The color is very similar to P. T. being a rosy salmon with darker blotch. It is strong grower, a good producer of bulblets that germinate well. I consider it as an outstanding exhibition and commercial variety.
- **TOBERSUN** (Austin—1929) A large rich yellow. The tall straight spike carries many well placed flowers.
- TRAUMERI (Pfitzer) A very large new light lavender. This variety belongs in the giant class with immense spike and flower head. Opens six or seven large blooms. Good producer and germinator.
- TREVONIAN (Hornberger) A large fine variety that wins much favor with garden visitors. A very large heavy plant producing immense spikes of large white flowers splashed rosy red on edges of petals. Trevonian will open eight to ten of these large florets under favorable conditions and one spike is a magnificent bouquet. Should be in every garden. You will like it.
- TRUE BLUE (Christ—1933) A medium blue by the originator of Blue Admiral and Smiling Maestro. The color is nearer real blue than many so called blues. The florets are not unusually large.
- TUNIA'S BLUE (Both) See page 6 for description.
- TUNIA'S TRIUMPH (Both) See page 5 for description.

- VEILCHENBLAU (Pfitzer—1922) One of the finest and most popular of the standard blues.
- VIENNA WOODS (Christ—1933) A large violet blue similar to Blue Admiral.
- VIRGINIA A flaming red, old but still a wonderful color. Spikes are rather short when grown out of doors.
- VIRGINIA SKELLY (Kunderd-Skelly) A tall, dainty, graceful and well ruffled decora tive and commercial variety. Pink and cream of color, delicate yet rich. A pastel variety of merit. Prolific and a good commercial.
- WARATAH (Errey—1930) A brilliant orange scarlet, the center is crimson touched with cream. An outstanding exhibition red. Length of spike, number open, placement, and size of floret were all good.
- WASAGA (Palmer—1932) A glowing iridescent buff, distinctly beautiful. The color is beautifully clear, the spike good, and the florets are nicely ruffled.
- W. H. PHIPPS (Diener—1921) The exhibition king. The enormous spikes and flowers of La France pink have been the sensation of flower shows for years.
- WHERO (Burns—1933) A very brilliant scarlet-red with darker flecks at the outer edges of the petals. The blooms are large and of good substance. 8 to 10 open at one time. An outstanding exhibition variety.
- WHITE ORCHID (Purple) A splendid small decorative white. Very early.
- WHITE TRIUMPHATOR (Holland) A large fine white from Holland. This new variety won much favor at the Haarlem Show. Also Trial Garden awards.
- WINGED VICTORY (Briggs—1928) A very large clear pink. The flowers shade to white in the throat.
- WINGS OF JOY (Christ—1933) A massive Phipps type glad. The color is an unusual blend of flesh and light salmon. Many massive florets open at once.
- WINGS OF SONG (Ellis) A very large shrimp pink, shaded lighter in throat, which is a rival of Picardy. Being a Picardy seedling it has a just right to such rivalry. Giant spike and flower of a beautiful pink. A sturdy grower and a splendid producer of bulblets which grow. We like it and think it will go places.
- WURTEMBERGIA (Pfitzer—1929) A brilliant scarlet with cream blotch. Although the contrast in colors is not as marked in this variety as it is in Victor, Wurtembergia has much better growing habits.
- YELLOW EMPEROR (Ellis—1931) A beautiful rich soft yellow with an extremely good flower head. Florets of good size and well placed. We regard it as very much worthwhile.

The bulb sizes are as follows: No. 1 (over $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch), No. 2 $(1\frac{1}{4}-1\frac{1}{2})$, No. 3 $(1-1\frac{1}{4})$, No. 4 $(\frac{3}{4}-1)$, No. 5 $(\frac{1}{2}-\frac{3}{4})$, and No. 6 $(\frac{1}{4}-\frac{1}{2})$.

LARGE size bulbs are one and one quarter inches in diameter or more. This size makes the largest spikes and flowers. Sizes one or two.

MEDIUM size bulbs are from one inch to an inch and one quarter in diameter. They should make excellent spikes and flowers often as large as made by the larger bulbs. Sizes three and four.

SMALL bulbs are about one half inch in diameter and often bloom but do not make as large a spike as the larger sized bulbs. Under favorable conditions they generally bloom. They often however make a better increase than the larger bulbs. Sizes five or six.



Prior to 1933 Heberling's Gladiolus had been exhibited at two American Gladiolus Society Shows and four Illinois Gladiolus Society Shows.
