

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

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 1908-9

The past year has been a most successful one. The Club has grown in membership, having increased its list of members by 39 since the previous year, making a total membership today of 335. The Club has been able, largely through the success of its last exhibition catalogue, to have a financially successful year, with more in the Club Treasury than when the year started, in spite of increasingly large running expenses.

The atelier has been taken advantage of by an increasingly large and enthusiastic body of fellows, who have worked hard at the problems issued by the Beaux Arts Society of Architects, and have made a


gratifying record in the matter of mentions and places.

The library is constantly increasing through purchases made possible by the fund established by Mr. Arthur Rotch, and in the past year it has also received a gift of valuable books from the Rotch estate. Considerable work has been done towards the arrangement of material, the architectural magazine plates having been completely sorted, arranged, and placed in substantial files, where they should be of much use.

The usual club meetings have been held, and the Club members have had the opportunity of meeting members of the profession both in and out of Boston. It is hoped to have still more architects from other cities present at the various meetings of the Club in the future.


An exhibition of the work of the principal architectural schools of the country was held at the Club in December, 1908, comprising exhibits, from the architectural departments of the Carnegie Technical Schools, Columbia, Cornell, Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the University of Pennsylvania and the ateliers of the Society of Beaux Arts of Architects, and our own Club. It was an exhibition of very great interest, nearly two hundred entries being received, and such exhibitions in the future are to be most earnestly desired.

On December 5, 1908, at a regular meeting, the Club voted to establish a fund for the support of the educational work. This fund was to be known as The Education Endowment Fund, and was to be held by three trustees, under a deed of trust, a certain proportion of the income to be turned over to the treasurer of the Club for purposes to be designated by the trustees. Mr. Robert S. Peabody, Mr. Robert D. Andrews, and Mr. R. Clipston Sturgis accepted their appointment by the President as the first trustees. On October 2nd, at the annual meeting, a new article in the constitution was adopted, providing for this fund as a fundamental part of the Club organization. Of course a very small part of such fund can be subscribed by the Club members. and it is hoped that people who are able to give, and who are interested in such efforts along the lines of what is known as continuous education, will recognize the work along this line that the Club is striving to do, and will give it the substantial backing which it needs by contributions to this fund.




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
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


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


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

SCALP OF PERT




SCALE OF PEET.








ST. CATHERINE'S CHURCH IN SOMERVILLE, MASS. Maginnis & Walsh, Architects Showing Mathew's Graded Slate



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
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
TAPESTRY BRICK in Buildings of Monumental Character

In the succeeding pages we illustrate a few of the buildings in which "Tapestry" Brick has been used. The monumental character of these buildings and the high standing of the architects from whose designs they have been erected, is of itself sufficient proof that "Tapestry" Brick is in no sense a "fad," but that it has taken its place as a standard building material, combining in the highest degree, economy, utility and beauty. Had the designers of these buildings had the least doubt as to the real merit of the material or the ultimate success of its use, it would not have been chosen for work of such importance.

Lack of space prevents our illustrating further examples, but the excellent effects produced by "Tapestry" Brick in buildings of a similar nature in almost every large city east of the Mississippi River, warrants our statement that "Tapestry" Brick is preeminently desirable and particularly adapted not only for country and city houses but for churches, libraries, hospitals, clubhouses, schools, fraternal buildings and high grade apartments.

Even the careful description of the texture, bonding and selection of the brick which we present on the following pages can give but a slight idea of the beauty of "Tapestry" Brick; the only adequate impression is one gained from the buildings wherein it is used, and we cordially invite not only the inspection of those illustrated herewith, but of those in other cities, a list of which will be furnished to any one sufficiently interested to inquire.

Color of Bricks

A mixture of light red to extremely dark blue "Tapestry" Brick, with some sixteen to twenty intermediate shadings, many of which appear on a single brick.



General Effect

Gray, I" wide, rough cut flush.

At a distance, this building is of a reddish gray tint, the contrasting colors of the individual bricks being entirely eliminated by the great number of intermediate shadings and the relatively large size of the mortar joint. At a closer viewpoint, the different shades are very pronounced, although in perfect harmony—in fact, the more this work is studied, the more the impression grows that "Tapestry" brickwork has artistic possibilities far beyond our powers of description. The medallions which are shown in the upper story of this building are "Brickotta."

Color of Bricks

Cream gray, light brown and coffee, "Tapestry"

Bricks; shades 121, 122, 123, 124.

Size of Bricks

8" by 2 1-4" by 3 3-4".

Texture of Bricks

Rough.

Bond of Brickwork

Special, each multiple being made of four bricks laid with blind joints, to give a brick which appears to be 16 1-4" long by 4 3-4" high.

Mortar Joints

The blind joints gray, about 1-4" thick, the regular joints 7-8" to 1" thick, all tooled smooth.

General Effect

A soft, gray brown, with a tinge of faint violet in certain lights. The treatment of the brick being very unusual and the contrast of the polychrone terra-cotta being so effective, this building rivals in the color and character of the brick work, any building erected in New York during the past ten years.



Color of Bricks

Light brownish gray "Tapestry" Bricks; the diaper pattern of white headers; mosaic in top story blue, white, gray and brown; mosaic at fifth story of white, gray and brown "Tapestry" Bricks. At the intersection of the diapers and in the field of the upper story mosaic is a conventional lotos, in white on a brown ground. Over two thousand of these lotos bricks were used in the front.

Color is added by the high lights in the overhanging cornice and in the balcony at the fifth story, in both of which deep orange and dark blue are used. The soft tones of the brickwork, contrasting with the deep colors mentioned and with the dark green boxwood shrubbery in the windows, have been favorably commented upon by discriminating critics from all over the civilized world.
