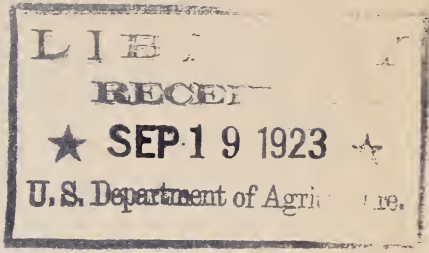

## Bechtel's Double Flowering American Crab.

(*Pyrus Angustifolia.*)

This most remarkable and beautiful of all ornamental trees (of which the enclosed lithograph is but a poor representation, the limited time consumed in its production having been inadequate to insure an exact *fac simili*: a second edition being now in preparation, which we hope will do the subject justice), originated near Staunton, Ill., and was first introduced and offered for sale in the fall of 1891 by us. It is destined to take its place at the head of the list of ornamental flowering trees as soon as it becomes known. The tree is a sturdy, though not a very rapid grower, hardy and entirely free from disease. It grows to be a medium-sized tree, and when in bloom presents the appearance of being covered with delicate pink roses, scenting the atmosphere for a long distance with a perfume equal to that of any rose. Unlike many other flowering trees, it does not bloom until the foliage is fully developed, which adds greatly to its beauty. It begins to bloom while very young—often when only two years old from root grafts. A small tree when in bloom might be compared with a tree rose better than anything else, the blossoms having often been mistaken for roses when in a boquet.

A lady having given her order for a collection of choice rose bushes, was afterward shown a boquet of the Double Flowering Crab, whereupon she exclaimed: "Oh, aren't those beautiful roses! Do I get some plants of those in my collection?"

Much more might be said of this beautiful flowering tree, but we deem it unnecessary, and will point out only the special merits claimed for it, namely: **First, perfect hardiness**; second, **great beauty of blossom and leaf**; third, **delicious fragrance**—being the only sweet scented Double Flowering Crab in existence; fourth, **great adaptability to various soils.**

As stock is yet very limited, scions have been cut more or less from all grades offered in this circular. Our first class trees are 4 to 5 feet, and will caliper 7-8 to 1 inch. Nearly all will bloom this spring.
