

At the close of the war the original members of the company, and some of the recruits, were mustered out June 5th; most of those who joined subsequent to August 22, 1862, and Lieutenant William A. George, were transferred to the 10th New-York Infantry, which was mustered out June 30th. Lieutenant Morris R. Blodgett was transferred to the 4th New-York Heavy Artillery.
