SAMUEL KELLEY was born in Pulaski county, Ky., March 2, 1823. He was the subject of religious awakenings from childhood. He joined the M. E. Church in the eleventh, and was happily converted to God in the thirteenth year of his age. He joined the Kentucky Conference at Maysville, September, 1841. In 1842, he traveled the Greenupsburg Circuit; in 1843, Little Sandy Circuit. In September of this year, he was ordained deacon at Louisville, and returned to the same work. In the spring of 1845, he was married to Miss Rice, of Carter county. In the fall of the same year, he was ordained elder, by Bishop Soule, at Frankfort, and appointed to the Burlington Circuit; in 1846, to the Flemingsburg Circuit, remaining two years. In 1848, the Western Virginia Conference was organized, and he was appointed to the Guyandotte District, remaining four years—then to the Parkers-burg District four years. In 1856 and 1857, he was stationed in Parkersburg; in 1858, in Lew-isburg, Va., and in 1859, in Charlestown, Va. In 1860, he was again stationed in Parkersburg, but at the end of nine months, on account of the war troubles and the health of his wife, he removed to Carter county, Ky., where he remained eighteen months. In 1862, he was transferred to the Kentucky Conference, and appointed to Cynthiana, where he remained two years, and where he finished his useful ministerial career. In 1854, he represented the Western Virginia

Conference in the General Conference held in Columbus, Ga., and again in the General Conference at Nashville, Tenn., in 1858. The Sabbath previous to his illness, which was the third in August, 1864, he preached three times, and administered the sacrament twice. Two of these services were to his colored congregation. On Aug. 22, he was indisposed, but could not be prevailed upon to call in a physician for several days. Though his sufferings were indescribable, yet he uttered not a word of complaint. These days of suffering passed into weeks, yet he complained not. His friends often met and had prayers with him. On one occasion his affectionate wife asked him if Brother E. should pray with him; and though suffering greatly, he responded, "O yes, my dear; always have prayers." Brother Bickers said to him, "Brother Kelley, shall I tell your friends that the same gospel you have preached to others sustains you in your present deep affliction?" He replied, with earnestness, "O yes, yes!" He often referred, during his illness, with pleasure, to his connection with the Western Virginia Conference. Indeed, during his nightly dreams, and his daily mental aberrations, he was ranging over the hills and valleys of this, his cherished field of former labor, indulging the hope, to the last hour, of again cultivating this fruitful field of Christian toil and suffering. A few hours previous to his death, his wife said to him, "My dear, do you not feel that your work is well-nigh done on earth?" "O no!" said he, his hopeful spirit ruling even in death; nor did it yield till his physician assured him that he must die. Again his wife said to him, "If this should be your last hour, you are not afraid to die?" He seemed to think it strange that such a question of the strange that such a question o tion should be asked him, but responded with animation, "O, certainly not!" adding, "My leaving you, my dear, troubles me more than any thing else." Thus, on Sept. 21, 1864, at a quarter past seven o'clock, P.M., Samuel Kelley closed his eyes in death, leaving a wife and four children, with many converts and friends, to weep his departure. His remains rest in the new cemetery at Cynthiana. Brother Kelley had but few equals in the pulpit. Sound in the ology, bold in conception, and often brilliant in fancy—appealing no less to the heart than to the head—he stood a prince among pulpit men. In his varied ministerial relations, he proved himself wise in counsel, earnest in life, and successful in preaching Christ and him crucified. Kind and obliging to all, he had many friends. As a husband and father, he was all a man should be; and the fidelity with which his memory must ever be cherished, by those who knew him best, is a more durable monument to his many virtues than marble column or sculptured

investigation. Withdrawn, J. W. Ridgell. L. D. Huston and C. W. Miller, against whom there were complaints, were present, and, upon satisfactory explanations being made, the character of the former passed, and of the latter, the case was dismissed from the records, he having been transferred by Bishop Andrew to the Alabama Conference.

SILAS LEE was born in Franklin, Duchess county, N. Y., Dec. 25, 1799. His father lived afterward in Ontario county, N. Y., and then settled in Hardin county, Ky. Here Silas was converted, during the glorious revival that swept over the country in 1820. He soon united with the M. E. Church, and felt himself called of God to preach the gospel; but, being timid and retiring in his temperament, he resisted the call, until he lost the enjoyment and power of religion, and, in his own language, "sought refuge in infidelity," though still retaining the form of godliness. In speaking of his call to the ministry, and his unwillingness to bear its responsibilities, he said to Brother Crenshaw, during his last illness, "I thought to excuse myself from the work by getting married; hence I married, in my twenty-first year. My wife was a pious member of the Church. She discovered the state of my mind, and urged me on to the performance of my duty. She was a true help-meet in my itinerant career." In 1826, the Kentucky Conference convened in Louisville, and Silas Lee was admitted on trial. For twelve years he labored on the different fields, with fidelity and success. At the Conference in Danville, in 1838, he located, and remained local for twelve years. This was in after life a subject of much regret. He said to Brother Crenshaw, "This was the great error of my life. My health was feeble; but in locating I yielded to temptation. Brother Crenshaw, I would say to you, and to all preachers, never locate." In 1850, he was readmitted into the traveling connection, and as long as health lasted he went to his work, and boldly held forth the word of life; and when he could no longer go forth with the host and shout to the battle, he cheered and urged on those who could go, still retaining his place in the Conference as a superannuated preacher. He was a firm believer in the doctrines and discipline of the Church, and an able defender of them, and lamented on his death-bed that the Church had so much neglected the class and prayer-meetings. The end of Brother Lee was peaceful. He said, "I can now see that I have

been a great way out on the borders of time, but the Lord has always been with me. I am now hovering between time and eternity, and grace is still sufficient." He died Aug. 12, 1865. As a man, he was beloved by all who knew him. Perhaps no man enjoyed more perfectly the confidence and esteem of all his acquaintances. As a preacher, he was extensively and favorably known, and was altogether a superior manclear, earnest, eloquent, and often overwhelming in his utterances of divine truth. The Church has lost much in the death of this holy man and able minister.

WILLIAM G. CAPLES, the great leading spirit and light of the Conference, died from a wound received in his own house, from a shell fired during the battle of Glasgow. Brother Vincil was with him from Saturday (when wounded) till Tuesday night, when he died. His last message to the Conference he loved so much was: "Tell my brethren, for me, to cleave unto their work." As visions of the bright future swept before the eyes of his great soul, he, with uplifted hands, raised the grand acclaim, "O what I am gaining, GAINING! I am going, going!" These were the last earthly utterances of him who had charmed, moved, and convinced the thousands of auditors that always hung spellbound upon the gracious words he spake, for more than twenty years.

Edwin Robinson, for many years a Presiding Elder and "captain of the hosts" of our Israel in Missouri, fell by the hand of military ruffian-

ism soon after our beloved Brother Caples. He was shot from his horse while quietly riding along the highway, simply because he was a Southern Methodist preacher. A good man and true, we mourn his tragic end, and pray for his cruel murderer.

WILLIAM KETRON, Presiding Elder of the Gallatin District, a veteran itinerant and indefatigable servant of the Church, has passed away. He fell at his post, his face to the foe, with his armor on. He died as he lived, full of faith, exclaiming—the last words he spoke—"All is well!"

John F. Young, an old and deeply-afflicted superannuated preacher, has ceased to suffer within the last few weeks. His sweet-spiritedness while living, his resignation when dying, and desire to depart and be with Christ, but illustrate the power of that religion he professed and taught for so long.

GEORGE L. SEXTON, a member of this Conference of a few years' standing, a young man of ability and promise, has fallen, far from home, and among strangers. The circumstances attending his death are to us unknown.

DAVID R. SMITH, a probationer, sweetly fell asleep in Jesus one month after receiving his first appointment.

BENJAMIN F. SMITH was born in Hardin county, Tenn., Oct. 28, 1830. He was brought to a saving knowledge of Christ in October, 1848, and admitted into the traveling connection, in

the Tennessee Conference, in 1857. He was appointed successively to the Swan, Wayne, Centreville, and Linden Circuits, and to the Sparta Station. During the year 1862, he enlisted in the Confederate Army, and was killed at Jackson, Tenn., July 13, 1863. He was a promising young preacher—a man of sound judgment, generous heart, and deep piety. He was everywhere acceptable and useful as a minister of the gospel. We mourn his early death, and regret that one, of whom so much was expected, should be cut down in the morning of his life; yet we rejoice in the hope of meeting him in a land of peace, where war and conflict shall be unknown for ever.

ABRAHAM OVERALL belonged to a large and respectable family, noted for their piety and devotion to the cause of Christ and of Methodism. When he was a young man, he was awakened under the ministry of the distinguished Sterling Brown. He was converted in the year 1820 or 1821, and soon after entered the Tennessee Conference, where he traveled till his physical system gave way. He, however, continued among us as a supernumerary till he had passed perhaps his three-score years. He was remarkable for his plainness of manners and originality of style. He was a bold advocate of the doctrines of the Bible, and his rebukes of sin made him a terror to evil-doers. He ever maintained his consistency of character, and had the confidence and esteem of the Church and the world. They respected and reverenced him as a man of God. He died suddenly in 1862, after having, in an evening prayer, commended him-self and family to God. He was a good man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost, and has left to his family and the Church the savor of a good name. The committee regret the absence of dates and facts, but present this brief memorial of a highly esteemed brother and fellowlaborer.

Moses Montgomery Henkle, a distinguished servant of God, was a native of Virginia. The time of his birth is unknown to the committee, yet we suppose at the period of his death he had passed his sixtieth year. He entered the ministry at a very early age. He soon rose to eminence, and for many years held a high rank as a preacher. He occupied many important positions, and always did his work with ability. Dr. Henkle's mind was highly cultivated. His literary attainments were superior—a ripe scholar, a profound theologian. He was deeply read in the Scriptures, and was an accomplished historian. He contributed greatly to the literature of the Church, and has left several works of much merit—besides his labors as an editor, and his contributions to the periodical literature of the times. For many years he was a member of the Conference, and was always regarded as one of the most able debaters and wise counselors of the body, and we remember his words of wisdom with much pleasure. For many years he struggled with pecuniary difficulties and family afflictions; but amidst all he preserved

his integrity, and continued steadfast in the faith till his work was accomplished. He died in Richmond, Va., in 1864, whither he had been sent, from Baltimore, by the military authority of the Federal Government. He died amidst the commotions of the land which agitated the whole country in the late unhappy war. We have few particulars connected with his last illness and death. We learn, however, that after a brief confinement to his bed, he died in much peace, leaving a brilliant testimony in favor of the divinity and power of that gospel he had so long proclaimed. In person Dr. Henkle was commanding. He was tall and athletic, with broad and strongly marked features. His manner in the pulpit was calm and deliberate, his enunciation clear and distinct, his discourses often powerful and impressive. One filling so prominent a place in the Church of God should have a more extended record than can be included in this brief memoir; and we hope some skillful hand will, in the future, present to the Church an extended "biographical sketch" of one so worthy and so highly esteemed by his fellow-laborers in the kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ.

JOHN KELLEY, son of Dennis and Elizabeth Kelley, was born in Wilson county, Tenn., Jan. 26, 1802. He professed religion in September, 1820, and was licensed to preach the gospel Oct. 18, 1821; was admitted on trial in the traveling connection in November, 1821, and was appointed to Knox Circuit, East Tennessee. The following year he was appointed to Beech River Circuit, which was a very large and laborious work. In the fall of 1823, he was ordained deacon by Bishop George, at Huntsville, Ala., and was sent to Carter's Valley Circuit, in East Tennessee, where four hundred and fifty persons were added to the Church. In the year 1824, he was sent to Giles Circuit, in Western Virginia. In the fall of 1825, at the Conference in Jonesboro, East Tennessee, he was ordained elder by Bishop Soule, and sent to Greenville Circuit, where several hundred persons were united to the Church. In the fall of 1826, he was sent to Hiwassee Circuit. In 1827, he volunteered to go to the Missouri Conference with Brother Peery. He traveled successively the White River and Hot Springs Circuits in Arkansas. From the Conference of 1829, he was sent to the White River Circuit again, and in the following year he traveled Cape Girardeau Circuit in Missouri. At the Conference of 1831, he was appointed to Washington Circuit, in Arkansas. During this year he was transferred back to the Tennessee Conference, and was appointed to Smith's Fork Circuit. The following year, 1832, he traveled Caney Fork Circuit, and in 1833, the Lebanon Circuit. On Jan. 25, in this year, John Kelley was married to Miss Lavinia Campbell. Then for two years in succession he was appointed to Fountain Head Circuit. In the year 1836, he labored on the Mill Creek Circuit; and the following year, on the Sumner Circuit. From the fall of 1838 to about the year 1848, he was variously employed on the effective

list—on circuits, stations, and districts. In the fall of 1848, he took a supernumerary relation, on account of infirmities and declining health. This relation he held to the day of his death, which occurred May 16, 1864. Much might be said of our beloved brother's usefulness through He was forty-three years of ministerial labor. remarkable for his zeal, industry, and integrity, in all his official relations to the Church. His house was ever a home for God's ministers, and his hands were full of blessings for the poor. During the many years of his life, he endeared himself in a peculiar manner to his extensive list of acquaintances, by his sympathy, extending to every physical and spiritual want of the people. His calm judgment, and the confidence of the public in his unswerving principles, brought scores of all classes to him for advice and aid. They found him ready with both. During his last illness, these people thronged the house and yard from the beginning to the close. He talked camly of his condition, confident of his speedy departure to his immortal home. He died peacefully, commending the weeping throng around him to the care of the Lord, in whom he had trusted.

Daniel H. Jones was born Dec. 25, 1813; professed religion and joined the M. E. Church in 1832; was licensed to preach the gospel, and admitted on trial in the Tennessee Conference, in 1838. In this holy work he remained until the Lord removed him from us. When dying, a brother minister kneeled by his bedside, and asked the Almighty, in view of Brother Jones's long devotedness to his cause, to spare his life. To which the dying saint responded, "Yes, Lord, for thirty and six years I have tried to serve thee faithfully, and thou hast never once forsaken me!" He died in full triumph, rejoicing in the Holy Ghost, Aug. 19, 1863.

SAMUEL S. Moody was born in Powhatan county, Va., May 1, 1810; professed religion in Henry county, Tenn., at Chapel Hill, four miles from Paris, in the fall of 1828. Three months previous to this event he became the subject of awakening grace, and united himself, as a seeker of religion, to the M. E. Church. This event he regarded as one of the most important acts of his early religious history, and has left on record, in his diary, the following interesting item: "I would say, as my last advice to all truly awakened persons, join the Church of God as soon as circumstances will permit;" advice not only ap-proving the policy of our Church, but demonstrating its great utility in the experience of thousands. In the fall of 1850, Brother Moody was recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Sandy Circuit, to the Tennessee Annual Conference, to be received on trial in the traveling connection; and, as he records, "to my astonishment I was received and appointed to the Wesley Circuit." In 1831, he was appointed to the Lebanon Circuit; in 1832, to the Sandy Circuit; in 1833, Nashville Station; in 1834, Memphis Station; in 1835, Florence Station; in 1836, to Montgomery Circuit; in 1837 and 1838, to

Lebanon District; in 1839 and 1840, to Mur-freesboro District; in 1841, at the earnest solic-itation of Bishop Waugh, he was transferred to the Memphis Conference, and appointed to Jackson District; in 1842, to Memphis Station; in 1843, to Jackson Station. In 1844, he was transferred back to the Tennessee Conference, and appointed to Murfreesboro Station; in 1845, 1846, and 1847, to Huntsville District; in 1848, to Nashville District. On this work his health failed, so that he thought it prudent to desist for awhile from the labor of the regular work, but submitting his case to his more experienced brethren, he was induced to take light work, and was appointed, in 1849, to Athens Station; in 1850, to Florence Station. Here he records the following melancholy fact: "At the close of this year I was compelled to ask to be stricken from the effective list. I have traveled twentyone years, and feel that I have been a very unprofitable servant." Through all these years of labor and travel our dear brother experienced those vicissitudes incident to the life of Methodist traveling preachers. Often, in early life, they find a crisis in their history, which, when suc-cessfully passed, they learn "to endure hardness as a good soldier." A period of this kind occurred early in the first year of Brother Moody's ministry, where he found, by contrast with the comforts and ease of his paternal home, that the life of a young itinerant Methodist preacher was far from being spent in an earthly paradise. Hungry, cold, wet with the falling rain, sitting upon his horse, after having rode many miles, and preached to a cold and hard-hearted congrega-tion, who gave him neither friendly salutation, food, nor shelter, he felt like deserting a work for which he felt he had neither adaptation nor encouragement. In this tempest of emotion, his mind balancing between riding ten miles, in the rain, toward his next appointment, where he might be as coldly received as at the one he had just filled, and his father's house, where he would find warm hearts, cheerful faces, and "enough and to spare," reason, conscience, piety, and perhaps a sense of duty, preponderated in favor of one more trial, and so urged his way to the hospitable home of Dr. Dunn, of whose family Brother Moody records the following: "A man of wealth and hospitality, whose family were among the best friends I ever found in this selfish world. After a good meeting the next day, I took courage, blessed God, and went on." Now, fully over the shoals, and out at sea, our brother moves on without the slightest difficulty on that subject ever after. Brother Moody was among the most pious and popular ministers of our Conference; wherever Providence cast his lot he moved as an angel of light and love. His calm spirit, meek deportment, and benignant conversation, always opened a way to the inward warm affections and confidence of all who knew him-perhaps no man of our Conference was more universally beloved; indeed, the virtues of this holy man will live in the memories of thousands as long as life shall last: he never had an enemy; our Church has seldom produced so pure a specimen of our holy religion. His

very appearance, his calm and heavenly countenance, clothed, as it was at all times, with gentleness and love, disarmed all opposition. When he rose in the pulpit, before he uttered a word, saint and sinner united in believing that "he was a man sent of God." In business life, in the social circle, around the domestic hearthstone, the purity of religion never ceased to shine. For many years he was the subject of much bodily affliction; his pale face and his hectic cough often called for and received the sympathy of his brethren, regarding them as sure indications of a speedy exit from our midst; but God, in goodness to the Church and to his family, kept him a long time in sight of heaven before he called him home. After years of wasting affliction, in which he had many sudden and alarming attacks, and from which his recovery was an astonishment to his family and friends, his wasted and worn body at last yielded to the invasion of the grim messenger, and calmly and gently met the foe: here his faith and confidence became stronger as his body became weaker, and his Christian graces shone with supernal beauty. The holy eloquence of this dying saint even exceeded in confidence, comfort, and hope, the even and uniform tenor of his previous piety, until wound up to visions of rapture and joy, he cried out in ecstasy, "'T is the hope, the blessed hope, which Jesus' grace has given!" After giving the expressions of his piety in terms of confidence and love, followed by many exhortations and much advice to his many friends and family, as well as his faithful domestics, he cried out, "O, the hope of a blessed immortality!" At length, finding his end at At length, finding his end at hand, he called his family to his bedside to give them his last exhortation; but sinking fast, he called for water to enable him the more readily to speak; but no—the mournful group waited, but no word was uttered, no voice was heard, neither text nor sermon came; the Master called, the chariot was in waiting, the spirit fled, all was silence, and naught was left of this gifted, pure, and devoted minister of God, but the lifeless form of the beloved Moody upon his bed of death. Many interesting expressions of happiness and comfort were uttered by him to his family and friends, which will be long preserved as jewels of heavenly brightness in the casket of memory; and the older members of this Conference will long cherish the memory of his many virtues, and class him among the brightest, and best, and most beloved of its members. He departed this life on the 5th of May, 1863. The funeral-sermon of our beloved brother was preached by Dr. McFerrin, on the 7th, to a large and sympathizing audience, from Matt. xxv. 23.

JOHN KERR was born in the town of Minola, county of Mayo, Ireland. county of Mayo, Ireland. His parents were members of the Methodist Church. In a brief statement which Brother Kerr has left of himself, he says of his parents: "From a child they instructed me in the principles of religion, which, under God, brought me to a saving knowledge of the truth at an early period of my life. From that time it was impressed on my mind that I should one day be called to stand on the walls of Zion and declare the love of God to a fallen In 1817, Brother Kerr arrived in America. So deeply was he impressed with a sense of duty to preach, that he could not get his consent to engage in secular business; and in 1823, after, as he says, "counting the cost," he offered himself to the Tennessee Conference, and was received on trial. In 1825, he was graduated to deacons' orders, and in 1827 was ordained an elder. Having been transferred to the Virginia Conference, he continued to travel, and, with great success, to preach the word, until the feeble state of his health required him to take a supernumerary relation to the Conference. Brother Kerr was a quiet, modest, humble man of God. He was a great sufferer. During the last years of his life his sufferings were at times most severe, yet he bore them with Christian fortitude. None but those who knew him very intimately were prepared to appreciate him. He was unobtruite, and shrank from everything library. thing like notoriety. It was not often that he spoke of himself, and only in conversation with special personal friends were his private feelings disclosed. In the month of March, 1865, it became obvious to his friends that in a short time he must close his earthly mission. In conversation with his family, and with Christian friends, as his end drew near, he gave clear evidence of his unshaken faith in Christ, and his well-sustained hope of eternal life. On March 31, 1865,

death terminated his labors and sufferings, and his spirit passed away from the Church on earth to the Church in heaven.

George W. S. Harper was born in Harford county, Md., in February, 1796. In early life he found the Saviour. Some time after his conversion he became seriously concerned for the salvation of others, and, being fully persuaded that he was called to preach, he entered the traveling connection, March, 1821, and was transferred to the Virginia Conference, and appointed to Hanover Circuit. In 1822, he was sent to Amherst. In 1823, he was ordained a deacon, and in 1825 an elder. For many years he continued to labor as an effective, itinerant minister, and was very successful in building up the Church and leading sinners to Christ. He was earnest, diligent, and faithful. For a number of years before his death his health was feeble, and he sustained a supernumerary relation, living in the county of Louisa. During the last year of his life he was paralyzed. He died during the month of June last. His mind was peaceful, resigned, ready to depart. In his own language, a few weeks before his death, he was "faint, yet pursuing."

THOMAS Y. CASH was born in Warrenton, Fauquier county, Va. The son of pious parents, he was led in early life to see the necessity of religion, and while yet a boy he gave his heart and dedicated his life to God. After several years of piety and usefulness in the private walks of Christian life, he was licensed as a local preacher, by the Rev. S. T. Moorman, and received on trial in November, 1848, in the Virginia Annual Conference. In 1850, he was ordained deacon, and in 1852 was graduated to elders' orders. Though in feeble health, he was faithful in his work. During the last two years of his life he was in the pastoral charge of Din-widdie Street Church, Portsmouth, where his presence was a constant joy and his labors a blessing and edification to the Church. Brother Cash exhibited that phase of Christian development and labor which is rarely fully appreciated on earth: he was pious, but quiet and unobtrusive in his piety. Sound and clear in his exposition of Scripture, firm and fearless in the application of the truth, there was nevertheless so little of personal manifestation, such absence of all obtrusion of self, that the man himself seldom arrested the attention. As the leaven noiselessly transfuses its own nature through the whole mass, so his earnest and sound piety, his faithful and fearless publication of the truth, quietly, unobtrusively, exerted a power whose potency for good eternity alone will fully reveal. He lived well, bravely battling for the truth, and fell asleep as a conquering hero. He died Feb. 11, 1865, at the house of Brother F. D. Redd, of Prince Edward county, where he was cared for with the kindness of a brother indeed. Perfectly rational, supremely calm, troubled by the one fear alone, that he was too eager to depart, in possession of a strong and victorious faith, he entered into the rest of God's people.

JOHN W. TINNIN was born in Orange county, N. C., July 28, 1817. He embraced religion at a camp-meeting in his native county, Sept. 13, 1839, and was licensed to preach in May, 1841. He was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference at its session held in Raleigh, in 1841, and was appointed to the Randolph Circuit, with the Rev. W. M. Walsh; 1843 and 1844, he trav-eled the Neuse Circuit; 1845, the Mocksville Circuit; 1846 and 1847, the Duplin Circuit; 1846 and 1849, the Snow Hill Circuit; 1850, the Franklinsville Circuit. In 1851, he was stationed in Pittsboro. In 1852, he traveled the Deep River Circuit; 1853 and 1854, the Fayetteville Circuit; 1855 and 1856, the Raleigh Circuit. He then located until the Conference in 1858, when he was readmitted and appointed to the Cape Fear Circuit In 1859 and 1860, he was appointed to the Hillsboro Circuit; 1861, to the Cape Fear Circuit; 1862, to Pittsboro nominally; 1863, to the Fayetteville Circuit. In 1864, he again received a nominal appointment to the Haw River Circuit. Brother Tinnin was a good preacher. He was earnest and faithful in his ministrations. He was a man of great purity of character, and sincere in his love for his brethren. His labors were greatly blessed on the different fields of labor which he occupied, especially on the Neuse and Snow Hill Circuits, where many souls were converted under his ministry. He died at his home in Pittsboro, N. C., of typhoid fever, April 10, 1865. He was conscious of his approaching death, and ex-pressed himself as feeling fully prepared for his removal from earth. In a conversation with the Rev. O. J. Brent, he assured him of his preparation for death, and asked him to tell his brethren of the Conference that he "bore toward them nothing but love, and desired that they should meet him in heaven."

JOSHUA BETHEL was a native of Nelson county, Va. Having received an early religious training from a pious father, he was impressed at a very early age with the necessity of converting grace. He was not, however, converted until he arrived to manhood. This blessed change of heart was experienced at a camp-meeting in his native county in 1825, under the ministry of the Rev. Moses Brock, the Rev. L. Skidmore being

Presiding Elder. In June, 1828, he left his father's house, in company with the Rev. M. Brock, and commenced his labors on the Greenville Circuit with the Rev. G. W. S. Harper. At the last quarterly-meeting for that circuit, in that year, he received license to preach, and in February, 1829, he was received on probation in the Virginia Conference, at its session held in Lynchburg, Va. His first appointment was to Campbell Circuit; thence to Yadkin, N. C., with S. Winbourn; thence to Iredell, with J. Carter; thence to Guilford, in 1832 and 1833. He then traveled the Halifax Circuit, the Person Circuit, the Caswell Circuit, the Stokes Circuit, and the Davidson Circuit two years, after which he sustained supernumerary and superannuated relations for ten years in consequence of bad health. In 1850, he resumed the effective work, and again traveled the Stokes Circuit; the Patrick Circuit two years; the Rockingham Circuit two years, and the Guilford one year. After this year, (1856,) in consequence of ill-health, he was unable to preach, and was appointed steward of the Greensboro Female College, where he re-mained until the destruction of that Institution by fire. His health never justified his taking active work again, and he remained in Greensboro as a supernumerary until his death. Brother Bethel was a good preacher, and in some respects a very remarkable man. He was endowed with good natural sense, and so blessed with grace that he was greatly beloved wherever he labored. His ministry was greatly blessed in the conversion of souls, and many will rise up in eternity to call him blessed. He was not only greatly useful as a minister, but when too feeble to perform the duties of a pastor, in the stewardship of the College he occupied a field in which he manifested such decided business talent as to induce the trustees, faculty, and patrons of the College to believe him to be almost indispensable to its success. He did not merely exert himself to provide for the temporal comfort of those under his care, but exercised a fatherly and godly oversight over all the students. Perhaps the name of "Uncle Bethel" was the next dearest to the young ladies of this lamented Institution to the name of each one's own father and that of their beloved President. No man was more solicitous for the welfare of the College than he, and perhaps none felt more keenly the loss which the Church had sustained in its destruction. Brother Bethel's beloved companion, who had been in feeble health for years, was during the past year called to her rest in heaven. This severe affliction, added to those caused by the calamities of the war, was more than his feeble constitution was able to bear. He declined slowly but constantly, until the 31st day of October last he entered into that rest which remaineth to the people of God. He died full of faith and in great peace.

SAMUEL TOWNSEND was born in Marlboro District, S. C., Oct. 29, 1814, and died in Philadelphia, of inflammation of the bowels, July 31, 1865, after an illness of forty-eight hours. Brother Townsend joined the Church in 1832, and, it is believed, was converted about the same time, at a camp-meeting in Marion District, the place having been recently pointed out to the writer by the Rev. Thomas Munnerlyn, who had kindly taken the young stranger into his tent, and was rewarded for his thoughtful hospitality by his happy conversion. He entered the Conference as a traveling preacher in the beginning of the Conference-year 1836. In his fifth year he was stationed in Camden, during which year he was happily married to Miss Martha Julia, eldest daughter of John Veal, Esq., of Columbia. He served many of the most important charges of the Conference during the thirty years of his ministry, in all of which his labors were blessed more or less—in most of them he was favored with gracious revivals. For three years he was missionary to the people of color on the Congaree River, and during three years he served the Conference efficiently as Tract Agent. In his regular itinerant work, Brother Townsend contracted a ruling desire for the circulation of books. This he carried out still more largely as Tract Agent, and it was during this latter term of service that he laid the foundation of what afterward became an extensive book-store in the city of Columbia, and by which he conscientiously believed he was accomplishing much good. How much he will be missed in this capacity among us, as in other relations! Our beloved brother was a thorough Methodist in his faith, both as to doctrine and usages, as well as to Christian experience; and yet his views were large and liberal in regard to progress and Church extension. He was an earnest, sound, and practical preacher, and was preëminently a practical man. He wrought results. The charges served by him evidenced to his successors-to all-that a wise, zealous, practical, acceptable, and successful Methodist preacher had been there; so that it has been often remarked of him that he always left his charge improved; and though he was not in the regular work for several years past, it is believed that he acted from a firm conviction of duty. And was he not always the fast friend of the brethren of the Conference, aiding them in every possible way, and entertaining them with a warm and large-hearted hospitality? It will never be known how much he has done in this way. His greatly-bereaved widow tes-tifies that he bore the death of his noble son in the war, and the subsequent loss of the largest portion of his earthly goods, with Christian for-titude, frequently saying, "It is all for the best." Brother Townsend was on his way home from the North, where he had been on business, when he was arrested by a disease which baffled the skill of several physicians. He was soothed, in the absence of family and brethren at home, by several ministers and friends in Philadelphia. An attached friend, of another faith—a Jewish Rabbi—was with him in his last hours, and writes that, though very feeble, he said, "I confide in my Saviour, and put my trust entirely in him." And in his last lucid moments he exclaimed, "O my Saviour! O Jesus, my Saviour!"

Daniel A. Ogburn was born in Chesterfield, S. C., June 5, 1833. He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Oct. 10, 1846, and was converted near Fork Creek Meeting-house, in the same District, May 10, 1847. He was licensed to preach, and admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference, in 1853, and passed regularly to the orders of deacon and elder. Brother Ogburn was reappointed to the Society Hill Mission, but early in the year, it being found impracticable to preach longer on the work, he accepted a chaplaincy in the South Carolina State service. In a few weeks his health proved inadequate to the hardships of army life, and after four or five days of severe illness, during which he was utterly unconscious, he passed, as we believe, to that state where the smoke and din of battle are never known. Brother Ogburn was fortunate in securing the regard and affection of the people among whom he labored—was unassuming and quiet in his deportment, a good preacher, and a good man.

WINDSOR GRAHAM was born in Richmond county, N. C., but was for many years a citizen of Jackson county, Ga. His early years were not blessed with religious or educational advantages. About the year 1820, he was soundly converted to God, when he consecrated his soul fully to the Lord, and was for many years an earnest exhorter in our Church. He became a member of this Conference in January, 1834, and for more than twenty years was an effective, zealous preacher. For some eight or ten years he has been superannuated. During these last years, he has resided in Henry county, Ga., where he died in great peace, Jan. 21, 1865. Brother Graham, in some respects, was no ordinary man. While his educational advantages were limited, consequently limiting his preaching abilities, yet such was the holiness of the man, such his burning zeal, such his earnest, consecrated life, such the melting tenderness of his heart, that he was remarkably successful in his ministry. He carried the holy fire with him, and kindled all the Churches into a blaze where he preached. If any circuit had declined in religion, he was chosen, as one of the best men of the Conference, to revive and save it. "His heart was made of tenderness;" hence he wept over his people with an earnest solicitude for their welfare, and sought to win them to Christ by love, and many are the stars that shine in the crown of his rejoicing.

W. W. Robison was born in Washington county, Ga., Nov. 20, 1809. He lost his mother when five years old, but, in after life, believed it was the influence of her piety and prayers that led to his conversion in his seventeenth year, when he made a profession of religion and united with the Church. He was for several years a class-leader and exhorter, and in July, 1833, was licensed to preach. In 1834, he joined the Conference, and was appointed to the Crawfordsville Circuit. From that time until 1848, he served successively, with credit to himself and usefulness to the Church—sometimes with great success—the following charges, viz.: Savannah River Mission, Hamilton Circuit, Covington Circuit, Macon, Thomaston Circuit, Talbotton,

Lumpkin, Perry Circuit, Forsyth Circuit, Culloden Circuit, Greenville Circuit, and Forsyth Circuit, again. At the close of 1848, he located and removed to Columbus, Ga., where he lived and labored as a local preacher for twelve years, continuing all the while zealous, consistent, faithful, and earnest in his ministerial duties, laboring as occasion and opportunity offered, being always the true and staunch friend of the itinerant, and the Church he loved so much. During these twelve years, he was constantly dissatisfied and regretting his seemingly necessary relation of local preacher—his preferences and heart all being in the undivided work of his Master, and he often said that this was the direct cause of barrenness and religious decline in his soul. Feeling thus, he yielded to his convictions, and returned to the Conference in 1861, where he remained in the regular work until death released him from work in his Lord's vineyard on earth, and he was admitted to the com-panionship and joys of the redeemed in heaven. His illness was short, his death sudden and unexpected, but calm and peaceful. On Sabbath, the 22d of October last, he was taken with a congestive chill, from which he never reacted, but continued to suffer until Tuesday, the 24th, when he quietly fell asleep in Jesus. His intense suffering, from congestion of the lungs, prevented his talking, except with extreme difficulty; but being told by a friend that he could not survive long, and being asked if he had any business, earthly or spiritual, to which he desired to give attention, he answered readily, "No; I have trusted God for thirty years, and can trust him to the end." Again, being asked if he felt the arms of his precious Saviour around him, and supporting him in his severe trials, he answered emphatically, "Yes!" Brother Robison was an amiable, kind-hearted, modest, sweet-spirited, Christian gentleman and minister, full of charity, benevolence, and true, ardent friendship, spiritual and consistent in his piety and manner of living, and to a more than ordinary extent, an exception to the rule, "that a prophet is not without honor, save in his own country, and among his own people;" for he was respected and loved, and useful in the city where he had lived and preached for so many years. He had an even, well-balanced mind; a sound judg-ment; a good stock of what we call common sense, and more than ordinary ability and power as a preacher, and at some places and periods during his ministerial life, he was eminently useful. The image of his smiling, genial face is still before us, and the memory of his simple, fervent piety, and Christian, brotherly kindness, is still fragrant and pleasurable to our hearts, and stimulative of gracious purposes, to a life of faith and duty. He leaves a widow and two children to mourn his loss.

WILLIAM JEREMIAH SASNETT was born in Hancock county, Ga., April 29, 1820. He graduated at Oglethorpe University, in 1839. After graduation he studied law, but, being called of God to the work of the ministry, he did not hesitate, but readily and heartily gave himself to the work of his Master. He very early connected himself with the itinerant work, and never left the ranks until he was taken to his reward. His active itinerancy, however, continued but a few years. Rheumatism of the acutest character bowed his manly form, and rendered it entirely impracticable for him to travel as a preacher. But his heart still beat to be "about his Master's business." He therefore directed his attention to the instruction of the youth of the land, and especially of the Church. Accordingly, in 1849, he accepted the chair of English Literature in Emory College, which he filled with distinguished ability and usefulness till 1858, when he was called to the Presidency of La Grange Female College. His theory of female education, that the develop-ment of the affections and sensibilities is of paramount importance, gave him a wide-spread celebrity, and called forth an interesting and profitable discussion on the subject, in which he, as the champion of his own views, made so favorable an impression on the public mind as greatly to increase the patronage and prosperity of the institution over which he presided. his career as a teacher of woman was of short duration. The trustees of East Alabama Male College, duly appreciating his great abilities, called him to the work of shaping and directing its fortunes. As the field was the widest and most important he was ever called to occupy, he accepted the position, and in September, 1859, opened the college. His well-known name having gone forth in connection with the college, at a very early day its halls were filled with the youth of the land; indeed, the number of students was so large as to excite general comment and astonishment. Perhaps no college in the country ever commenced with so great a patronage: simple justice requires us to say that Dr. Sasnett was the main instrument in pro-curing and retaining that patronage. But, the war coming on, the country called for its young men, and the college exercises were necessarily suspended. Being without pupils, and unable to travel, Dr. Sasnett retired to his farm in Georgia, where he remained until his death. While here his time was occupied in superintending his large temporal interests, preaching

the gospel, and ministering to the needy in his neighborhood. As a scholar, the attainments of Dr. Sasnett were varied and extensive. Possessing by nature great strength of intellect, he felt it his duty to God, his fellow-man, and himself, to cultivate it as far as possible, and to give the world the full benefit of all his powers; hence he was ever active in the pulpit, lecture-room, and with his pen, in dispensing among men the fruits of his labors. In 1855, he published his work on Progress, which was much appreciated by a large class of intelligent, discerning readers. It is a book of no ordinary merit and power, and deserves a place in every well-selected li-brary. In 1860, another—Discussions in Literature—was given the public from his fruitful pen, which fully maintained his reputation as a critical scholar and forcible writer. For twenty years the periodical press has teemed with his productions, on various subjects. In an eminent sense, he wielded the pen of a ready writer. Though enfeebled in body by disease, he was nevertheless a great worker; and his distinguished success in the various important positions he filled clearly showed his heart was in his work, and that he was looking forward to the rewards of the future. He never shrank from responsibility, nor avoided labor. As a preacher, his gifts were far above ordinary. His theory, that it was the special duty of the preacher to preach, was practiced whenever a door was opened. This was his loved employ, and never was he so happy or so completely the master of his strength as when preaching on his favorite themes—the love and providence of God to his people. Long will his memory be cher-ished by thousands who have been instructed by his teachings and comforted by his words. In his death the cause of education, the Church in all its interests, and the world of mankind, have sustained a loss that no language can properly express. Kind in heart and genial in manners, he was the joy of his friends and the comfort of all about him. Wherever he went, he was esteemed. respected, beloved. Truly, a was esteemed, respected, beloved. Truly, a great man in Israel has fallen; but we have hope and joy in his death. The religion he professed and preached was no vain faith. This was his testimony in his last hours. As God holds the death of his saints precious in his sight, he visited and quickened the energy and spiritual power of this his devoted servant for weeks before his death. His friends write that the greatest zeal was manifested in his preaching, and unusual fervor characterized his devotions at home, for some time before he was taken sick; and when he lay down to rise no more, his heart seems to have overflowed with gratitude to God that his work was done and his reward at hand. On Nov. 3, 1865, he fell asleep in Jesus, and as his spirit left the body, he sent back a shout of triumph to comfort his family and cheer his brethren on the way.

He was stationed at Albany, Ga., at the last Conference, where he labored until disease caused him to seek relief at the Sumter Springs, Sumter county, Ga., where he breathed his last in peace with God and man.

JOHN W. KINNEY was born in 1799; died Jan. 9, 1865. In 1818, he was admitted on trial in the Ohio Conference, but on the organization of the Kentucky Conference he became a member of that body. In 1821, he was ordained a deacon by Bishop Roberts; an elder by Bishop George, in 1823. After about eight years' itinerant labor in the Kentucky Conference, he located, and removed to Illinois. There he fought through the Black Hawk war, as captain of a company. While Texas was yet a Mexican province—in 1833—he removed to this new country. Though the Roman Catholic religion was established by law, Brother Kinney occasionally preached; and, in company with the Rev. Henry Stephenson, held the first camp-meeting ever held in Austin's colony. Before the revolution of 1836, a meeting was held in Austin's colony of those who had been official members of our Church, and Brother Kinney was employed to preach. The population was sparse, and the times hard, and Brother Kinney has been known to walk twenty-five miles to fill his appointments. When Brothers Ruter, Fowler, and Alexander, and other missionaries, arrived in Texas, they were received with open arms by Brother Kinney and his newly organized societies; and that organization has expanded in Middle and Western Texas, until it comprehends stations, circuits, districts, and

conferences. In 1842, Brother Kinney was readmitted into the traveling connection in the Texas Conference, but located again at the close of the year, and continued local until five years ago, when he was readmitted and placed on the superannuated list. Though nominally local, he was really itinerant. When Brother Alexander arrived here as a missionary, Brother Kinney traveled with him sometimes for six or seven consecutive weeks, assisting in protracted meetings. He was often sent for to dedicate churches, and preach special sermons, and attend camp and protracted meetings at distant points; and, while nominally local, his labor extended from the Trinity River to the San Antonio, and from the Gulf of Mexico almost to the extreme western frontier of Texas. He was willing to labor. He was then physically able to do an immense amount of traveling and preaching. Nature had endowed him with rare gifts, which close study had improved. On a certain occasion, at a protracted camp-meeting held at the Cedar Creek Camp-ground, near Chappell Hill, after the arduous labors of the day, he had retired to his tent, late at night, to rest. At a still later hour, a gentleman at the altar requested that Brother Kinney should be sent for to give him some instruction. He went out and commenced a talk to the mourners. He soon became animated, and, elevating his voice, he poured forth such a torrent of eloquence as perfectly electrified the crowd of worshipers that still hung around the altar. Many penitents were converted, and loud hosannas of praise rent the midnight air. Few who witnessed that scene will ever forget it; nor were such exhibitions of his wonderful power unfrequent in the palmy days of his ministry. Those who heard him fifteen or twenty years ago, will call up many instances in which vast multitudes were swayed to and fro under his irresistible appeals, as the forest trees are bent by the sweeping tor-nado. Brother Kinney was well skilled in the-ology. He understood and was well able to defend our doctrines and usages. His disease was pulmonary, and he lingered on the confines of the eternal world many months. For a time occasional clouds hung over his spiritual sky, but as the time of his departure drew near, the mists cleared up. Faith, with undimmed vision, beheld the glories of the future opened to him, and he died in triumph. How many weary itinerants have found vast instruction, sympathy, and comfort in the hospitable and intelligent family circle of our deceased brother! To her who has been the life-long companion of his labors, the cheerful sharer of his sacrifices, and who now survives, with us, to mourn his loss, we offer our sincere sympathies and condolence.

Daniel Carl, son of Jacob and Phebe Carl, was born in New York, May 6, 1808; and died in Victoria county, Aug. 16, 1865, aged fifty-seven years. While yet a child, his parents removed to Tennessee, and settled near Franklin. At the early age of twelve years he professed religion in his father's family, and joined the

Church. At an early period in life, he felt it his duty to preach, but was extremely reluctant to assume the ministerial office. In hope of relieving his mind of the impression that it was his duty to preach, he came to Texas in 1837, and engaged in teaching school in Washington county. But his conscience was ill at ease, and in a teachable state of mind he met Brother Lyttleton Fowler, then Superintendent of the Texas Missions, at the house of Brother William Kesee, near Chappell Hill. They went out to a corn-crib for conversation and prayer. At this interview Brother Carl gave his consent to do the duty long impressed on his mind. He was admitted on trial in the Mississippi Conference, in the fall of 1839, and traveled the Montgomery Circuit in Texas, in 1839, employed under the Presiding Elder. When the Texas Conference was formed, he fell in its bounds, and was present at its organization twenty-five years ago. So long as his health permitted, he attended every session of our Conference; and when prevented by disease, he always sent salutations to his brethren. The Minutes show that he has filled many of our important circuits and districts, and always acceptably and usefully. In the early part of his ministry in Texas, he labored much on the western frontier, which was greatly harassed by Indians and Mexicans. common with others, he carried arms for his own safety, and to repel those invasions; and many stories are told by the early settlers of his coolness and courage in danger, showing that he possessed, even in battle, the same quiet firmness that characterized him at all times; and not only was his arm potent for the defense of the country, but his presence—his example and earnest ministry—was a living power for good, the fruit of which is to be found even until this day. Though leading a life so rugged and varied by contact with the fierce and daring spirits of the frontier, he maintained unsullied his ministerial character. While on the Victoria District, in 1852, he married Miss Martha C. Davidson. He leaves her and five children to the care and sympathy of the Church. He died in great peace, after an illness of some weeks, strong in faith, and full of the hope of eternal life. Daniel Carl was a man of genial temper, of unsullied reputation and strict integrity. He was an able expounder of the Holy Scriptures—a faithful administrator of Church discipline. He was one of the first licensed to preach, and recommended in the traveling connection, in Texas: after more than a quarter of a century of labor his toil ends, and his mortal remains sleep in hope of a better resurrection in Victoria Cemetery, on the banks of the beautiful Guadaloupe.

WILLIAM B. OWEN.—We regret our inability to give an account of the early life of our dear, beloved brother. However, it was while he was preparing for the practice of medicine that God's spirit touched his heart, and he was convinced that a far more important work was required of him. He soon entered the ministry, and for eight or ten years filled various appointments in the Memphis Conference with acceptability and usefulness. In April, 1861, he joined the Confederate Army, and was appointed Chaplain of the Seventeenth Mississippi Regiment, and he now entered a field which required more of service than even his ardent and active spirit could

perform. Unappalled by the magnitude of the work or its hardships, he steadily, patiently, and faithfully labored on, preaching, praying, exhorting all to seek the great salvation—visiting the hospitals and ministering to the wounded and dying even in the very whirl-wind of battle. Untiring in his labor of love, he remained with the wounded of his regiment at the battle of Gettysburg, and shared imprisonment with them, to strengthen and cheer our sick and wounded there; and by his devotion to them in his one work of a minister of Christ, he extorted the admiration and praise even of his enemies. Brother Owen had returned home, weary and wounded, to see his father and to recruit his health; and after spending a short time there, he started on his return to the army. On his way he called on Bishop Paine to ask that he would appoint a fast-day for the Church, and spent his last night on earth in company with the Bishop. The next day, passing through Aberdeen, he called on several friends, who remembered afterward that they saw in him some slight signs of mental aberration—an affliction with which years before he had suffered to some extent. He soon took leave of them and went his way, never, alas! to be seen by them again on earth. He seems to have entered the Tombigbee River and been drowned—though a most laborious search failed to recover his body.

WILLIAM B. RAMSEY was born in Rutherford county, Tenn., March 12, 1831. His father, Jefferson Ramsey, removed to Gibson county, Tenn., in 1833. He embraced religion in 1846, in his fifteenth year, and joined the M. E. Church, South. He was licensed to preach in 1853, and was admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference in the fall of that year, and appointed to Cageville Circuit, where he labored acceptably. In the fall of 1854, he was appointed to Coffeeville Circuit, where he labored a few months, until his health became so feeble that he yielded to the advice of friends and went home. After returning home, Brother Ramsey entered Andrew College and pursued a regular course of study, and graduated in 1858, with a class of nine young men—taking the first honors of the class. He was readmitted into the Memphis Conference in the fall of 1858, and appointed to the Panola Circuit; the next year to Beulah Circuit, and thence to Camden Circuit, and in the fall of 1861, to Paris Station. At the Conference of 1862, he was granted a su-pernumerary relation, in which he served the Church till his death. In the spring of 1863, Brother Ramsey left a flourishing school at Conyersville, Tenn., and volunteered in the service of the Confederacy, serving as chaplain for four months, when his health failed, and he returned home anxiously desiring to gather strength and return to his labors in his regiment. But the destroyer, consumption, had fastened upon him, and gradually the strong man wasted, till death ended the struggle in July last. Brother Ramsey was a sweet-spirited man, modest and unassuming, and was much

beloved by his fellow-students, and equally so by his brethren in the ministry. He died in peace, full of faith and the Holy Ghost. He leaves a wife and three children.


