TO: Commanding General, I Corps, APO 301

1. The two installations referred to in basic communication were turned over to the Japanese Home Ministry on 6 May 1946.

2. On 2 June 1946, acting on information furnished by the 43rd CIC Battery "A", 90th Field Artillery Battalion, informally received the Susuka Naval Arsenal for the purpose of destroying 125 machine guns and ammunition hidden in one the warehouse and informally returned the Susuka Naval Arsenal to the Japanese Home Ministry on 15 June 1946.

3. The present status of the Susuka Naval Arsenal and Susuka Naval Air Bases are Reparations Installations under the provisions of Operational Directive No. 5, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 18 January 1946. The informal receipt and return of the Susuka Naval Arsenal referred to in paragraph 2, supra, is not considered by this headquarters as affecting its status as of 6 May 1946.

4. The investigation of the status of the Susuka Naval Arsenal and the Susuka Naval Air Base revealed that both the 25th Division Artillery and the 43rd CIC procured supplies and equipment in an unauthorized manner.

5. The Commanding General, 25th Division Artillery, has been instructed to return to the Susuka Naval Arsenal all of the equipment procured by unauthorized requests from the Susuka Naval Arsenal.

6. It is requested that the 43rd CIC be instructed to return to the Susuka Naval Arsenal the following items procured by unauthorized requests: 1 paper cutter and 94 electric fans. It is further requested that the 43rd CIC be instructed to follow the authorized procedure for procuring supplies and equipment as set forth in Operational Directive No. 33, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 26 March 1946. True copies of hand receipts are inclosed (inclosures 1-9).

1. The Sankyo UYushi (Oil & Rosin) requests permission in its application to use a part of the Suzuka branch of the Second Naval Depot. The Suzuka branch is listed as Plant No. 11 in Mie Prefecture on inclosure 11 in Mie Prefecture on inclosure 1 of Operational Directive No. 5/2, Headquarters Eighth Army, 7 June 1946.

2. The Sankyo UYushi Company is a private corporation of individuals and appears to have not formal connection with the Osaka Imperial University, which is referred to in its application. The company was formerly in operation in Yokkaichi, but its factory was destroyed as a result of the war. The building which it desires to use were formerly occupied by the Mitsubishi K.K., although they are completely vacant at present.

3. The application of the Sankyo Uyushi Company is supported by the Chief of the Nagoya Finance Bureau as well as by several similar letters of recommendation. The company anticipates the production of liquid oil, medicine, alcohol, toilet articles, paint and the variety of articles listed in its application.

4. The Mie Military Government Team states that approval of the application will not in any way interfere with control of reparations machinery. In view of the admitted need for the products which this company contemplates manufacturing, it is the recommendation of this headquarters that favorable considerations be given this application.

1. The following paragraph from the Weekly Activities Report of the 83rd Military Government Hq & Hq Company, Mie Ken, dated 29 June 1946, is quoted for your information:

"Uncertainty as to the status of the Suzuka Naval Air Base and the Suzuka Naval Arsenal makes it virtually impossible to effect compliance with OI #7 and paragraph 13g of OD#28, Hq Eighth Army, dated 16 Nov 45. Although these targets were officially returned to the Japanese Home Ministry on 6 May 46, they have been informally seized and returned several times by the tactical troops, without previous advice being given to the Tsu Detachment, which assumed responsibility for the arsenals pursuant to OI #7, Hq I Corps, dated 6 Apr 46. Clarification is awaited".

2. Information is desired as to the present status of the Suzuka Naval Arsenal and Suzuka Naval Air Base. In the event these installations have been returned to the Japanese Home Ministry, control and custody of these arsenals is the responsibility of the Mie Military Government Team.

1. The two installations referred to in basic communication were turned over to the Japanese Home Ministry on 6 May 1946.
2. On 2 June 1946, acting on information furnished by the 43rd CIC, Battery "A", 90th Field Artillery Battalion, informally reseeded the Suzuka Naval Arsenal for the purpose of destroying 125 machine guns and ammunition hidden in one of the warehouses and informally returned the Suzuka Naval Arsenal to the Japanese Home Ministry on 15 June 1946.
3. The present status of the Suzuka Naval Arsenal and Suzuka Naval Air Base are Reparations Installations under the provisions of Operational Directive No 5, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 18 January 1946. The informal reseed and return of the Suzuka Naval Arsenal referred to in paragraph 2, supra, is not considered by this headquarters as affecting its status as of 6 May 1946.
4. The investigation of the status of the Suzuka Naval Arsenal and the Suzuka Naval Air Base revealed that both the 25th Division Artillery and the 43rd CIC procured supplies and equipment in an unauthorized manner.
5. The Commanding General, 25th Division Artillery, has been instructed to return to the Suzuka Naval Arsenal all of the equipment procured by unauthorized requests from the Suzuka Naval Arsenal.
6. It is requested that the 43rd CIC be instructed to return to the Suzuka Naval Arsenal the following items procured by unauthorized requests: 1 paper cutter and 94 electric fans. It is further requested that the 43rd CIC be instructed to follow the authorized procedure for procuring supplies and equipment as set forth in Operational Directive No 33, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 26 March 1946. True copies of hand receipts are inclosed (inclosures 1-9).

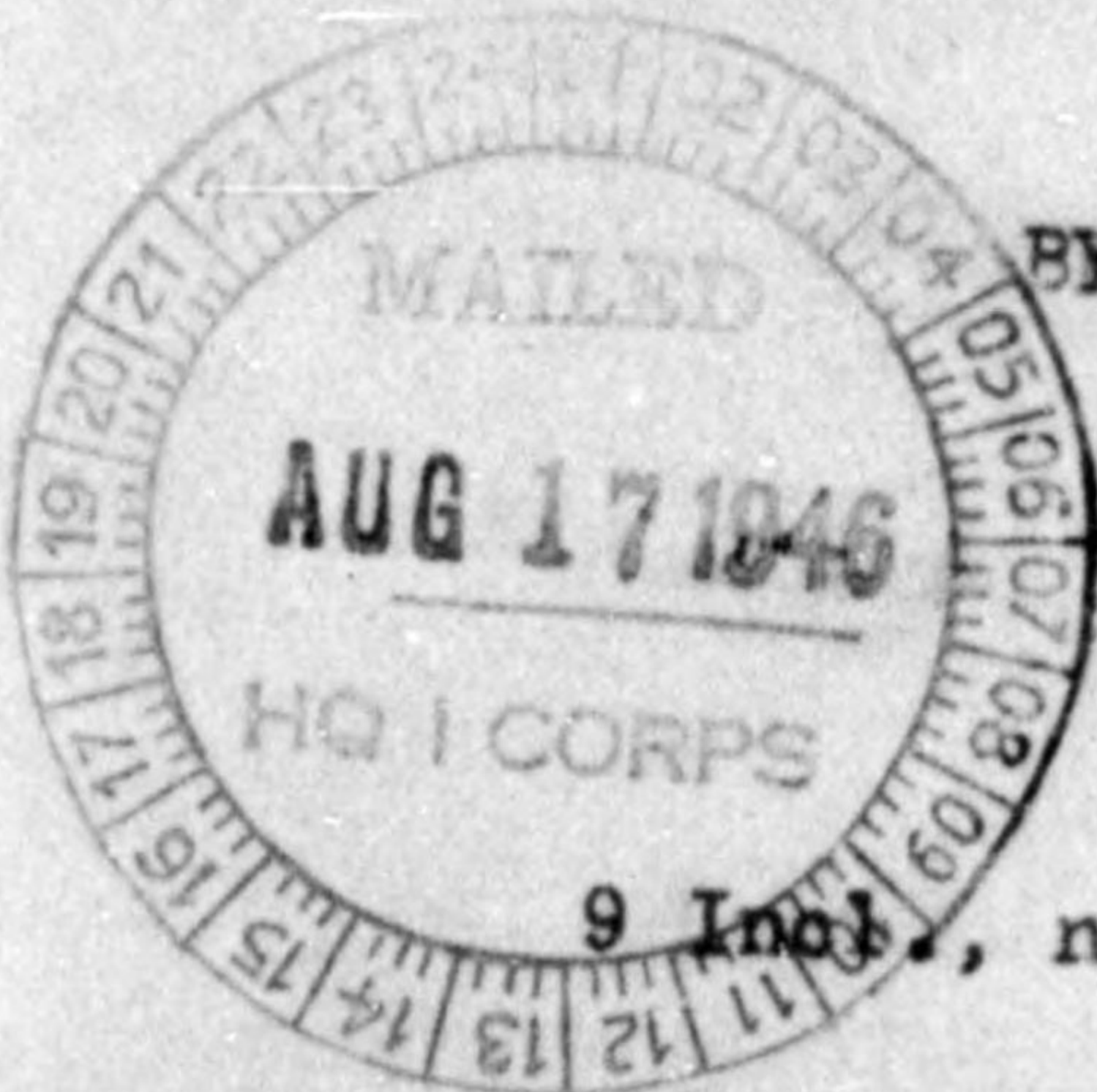

2. Procurement demands are being received by this headquarters for supplies or services which have preemptorily seized or demanded from Japanese sources in violation of directives contained in reference cited in paragraph 1, above.


3. Preemption of, or the taking possession of, Japanese Property without regard to prescribed procedures is prohibited except in cases of tactical necessity.

4. The term tactical necessity will not be used as a license for the indiscriminate preemption of Japanese property. Very careful consideration will be given before exercising the authority for seizure as a tactical necessity.

5. Procurement Demands for any supplies, equipment services which have been preemptorily seized or demanded will be forwarded with a letter explaining, in detail, the necessity for the preemption.

6. No preemptory procurement demand will be approved by this headquarters until the necessity for the preemptory procurement has been substantiated.
