

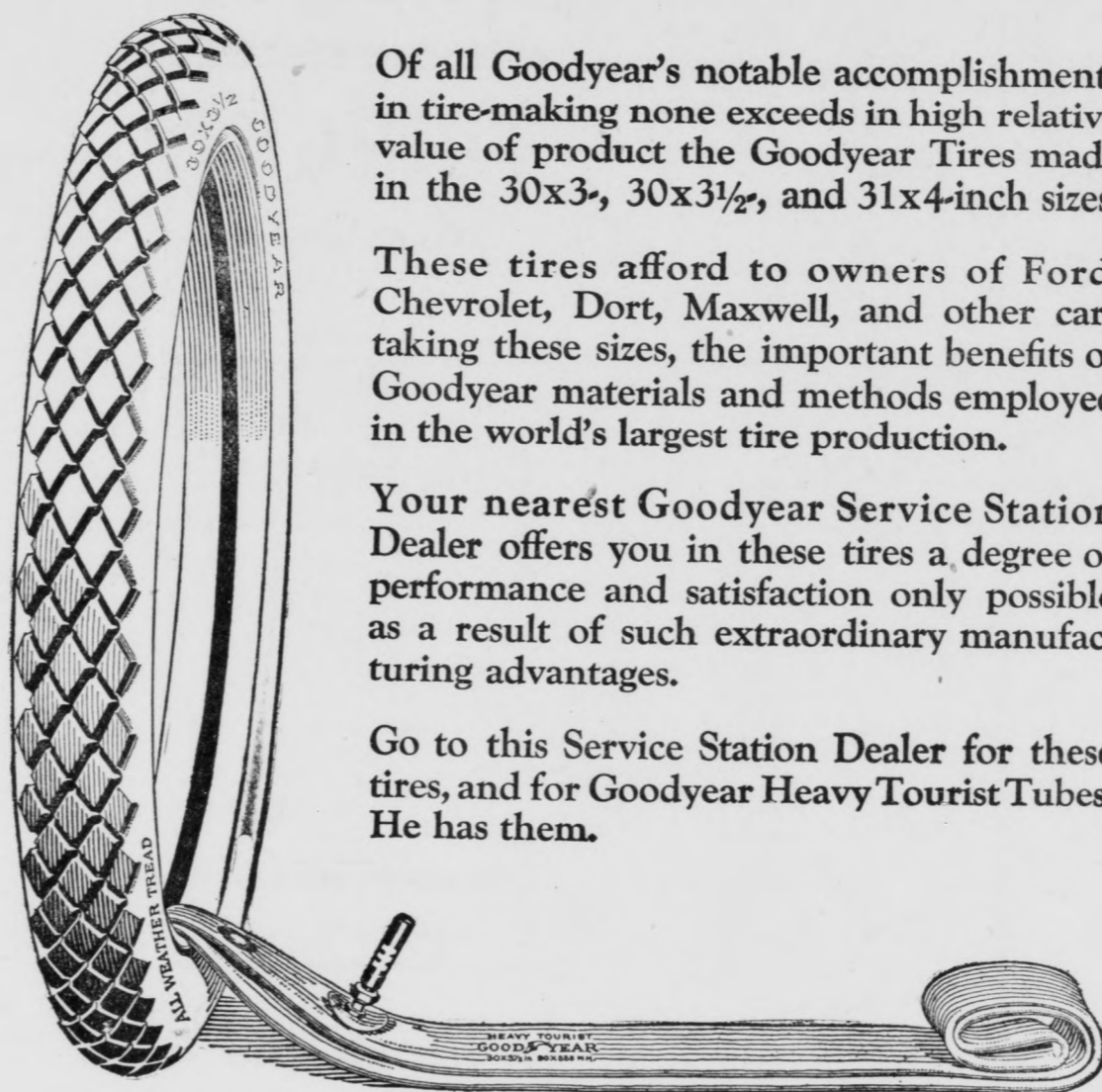

tion which would expire July 1st, to purchase the three lots for \$6500, and turn in to apply on the purchase price the two lots now owned by the club at \$3000, leaving a balance to be paid of \$3500, on property measuring 152 by 138 feet. There appeared to be no division of sentiment and after voting on the motion of Mrs. Ella Richardson to rescind the previous action of the club in instructing the Board of Directors to buy at Brand and California, the members present to the number of 134 voted by ballot for the purchase of the Lexington and Brand lots. The club also gave a vote of thanks to Mr. Joseph for his kind offices in the matter.

Mrs. Charles Hutchinson suggested that members purchase some of the club's Liberty Bonds at par and thus enable the organization to make complete payment for the lots. As it will be necessary to secure ballots from ladies not present in order to obtain a two-thirds vote of the membership, Mrs. Clyde Bott agreed to keep a petition setting forth the purpose of the ballot at the Glendale Book Store on Brand boulevard for members to sign.

A very delightful program of unusual descriptive music was then given by Miss Anne Thompson, who came to California a few months ago from Oklahoma, fell in love with the state and has adopted it as her place of residence. She has studied in Chicago and New York. The session closed with the singing in unison of "A Perfect Day" with Mrs. Hagood at the piano and a whistling obligato by Miss Thompson.

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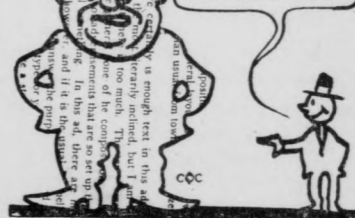
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
