There is, however, in this no conflict with the statement previously made, for though the Chinese givernment did so appeal to the United States government, the only reason why Great Britain was not immediately addressed on the subject when the other powers were being approached, was that the department previously had satisfactory assurances from London on the point.

The facts are that the Chinese authorities on July 1st requested that Minister Win would kindly ask the government of the United States, which had pursued a just course from the beginning to the end, and maintained an attitude of great fairness, to consult at once the other powers, with a view of causing instructions to be sent to their representatives in China, for a speedy transfer of authority, without any more delay. This request was repeated on July 5th, The action taken by the United States in pursuance of the request resulted in the ascertainment of the fact that all of the principal powers concerned were in regard to the question of gracuation under terms less

the fact that all of the principal powers concerned were in regard to the question of evacuation under terms less rigorous than those suggested by the military authorities in Tien Tsin. As it was known beforehand to the government of the United States that the British government shared United States views in the matter, no representations and no inquiries were sent to London on the subject.

WU RECALLED.

He Will Compile a New Code of Laws For China.

Washington, D. C., July 16.—Minister. Wu has received official confirmation of his recall to Pekin to assume a connection with the new Chinese foreign office. He had previously received a copy of the official decree naming himself, with Isen Chai Pen, as compiler of a new code of laws for China, but he was not certain that the new duty would not be discharged in Washington without the surrender of his mission.


