TWO MORE ATTEMPTS MADE TO BURN BRIDGE

Efforts of Incendiaries to Destroy Vancouver Structure Were Frustrated

Vancouver, May 3.—Granville street bridge was on fire on two separate occasions yesterday, and all the evidence points to the existence of a plot to destroy this structure and other bridges in the city.

The draw was the point aimed at last night, but the arrival of the firemen on the scene in record time prevented the flames securing a good hold.
