CANADIAN MINISTER AT WASHINGTON

French Premier and Minister of Finance to Go to Folkestone

Will Leave Paris Friday, Says Paris Temps; At Meeting Basis of Discussion With Germans at Spa Will Be Determined, It Is Stated

Paris, May 10.—Premier Millerand and Minister of Finance Francois Marral are expected to leave here next Friday for Folkestone, where they will meet Premier Lloyd George, according to The Temps.

It has been forecast that financial questions would be discussed by the Premiers at this conference and that an agreement might be reached regarding the basis of the discussions to be held with German representatives at Spa.

According to the programme the French Ministers will return to Paris next Sunday evening.

WATSON SENT TO PRISON FOR LIFE

Bigamist-Murderer Was Sentenced This Forenoon in Los Angeles

Los Angeles, May 10.—James P. Watson, who confessed to the murder of seven women, was sentenced today to life imprisonment at San Quentin prison by Judge Frank R. Willis, of Los Angeles County Superior Court. The sentence followed Watson's plea of guilty to the murder of Nina Lee Deloney, entered last week. Sentence was pronounced at 11.25.

Watson applied for a stay of execution until May 15, which was granted by Judge Willis. The sentence was passed on the recommendation of District Attorney Thomas Lee Woolwine, who told the court that conviction could not have been secured, a view in which the judge said he concurred. He complimented the sheriff and the district attorney on their conduct throughout the case.

BORDEN BACK IN OTTAWA WEDNESDAY

Will Leave New York Tuesday; Prairie Members Hold Caucus

New York, May 10.—Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, will be back in Ottawa on Wednesday, it was announced here this morning. Sir Robert accompanied by Lady Borden arrived here from the South on Friday. They will leave for Ottawa Tuesday evening. It is said the Prime Minister finds himself greatly improved in health as a result of his sojourn in the South. The visit to New York was merely for the purpose of breaking the return journey to Canada, and while in this city Sir Robert refused to make any statement on public affairs. His party includes George W. Yates, his confidential secretary, and J. W. Pugsley, of the Canadian Department of Railways.

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press)—Western supporters of the Government held a further conference today to discuss their attitude in regard to budget matters, particularly in respect to the method of raising additional revenue during the coming year. While the excise tax is strongly favored, those most in favor of it now express some doubt on its being adopted to any great extent this year. Tariff reduction, the natural resources of the prairie provinces, and income tax were also discussed at some length to-day.

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press)—Western supporters of the Government in caucus to-day practically decided to favor the principle of continuing the Canadian Wheat Board. Members who represent large farming constituencies contended that as the Federal Government was buying on a co-operative or controlled basis, the only safe course was for the farmers of Canada, through the Government, to adopt a similar course. Another matter taken up to-day was the plea of rural postmasters and mail carriers for increased pay. A committee was appointed to take the matter up with the Government.

KILLED ON TRACKS. Winnipeg, May 10.—John Cowal was instantly killed this morning while bidding goodbye to a friend on Canadian Pacific Railway train No. 2, eastbound. He slipped and fell under the wheels.

DELEGATION WILL VISIT RUSSIA

Two British Socialists to Go; Bolsheviks Bar Some Allied Delegations

London, May 10.—The Foreign Office has withdrawn its objection to granting passports for Delegates Quelch and McLeane, named by the British Socialist Party, to visit Russia. Therefore, the delegates will start at the earliest possible date for an investigation of Russian Soviet conditions.

Soviet's Attitude. London, May 10.—The Central Soviet, a Moscow wireless message says, announces that in view of the fact that certain members of the League of Nations are actively supporting Poland and the Ukraine in warring on Russia, it can not, by reason of military considerations, admit into Russia any delegation which includes representatives of those nations, although the Soviet supports the principle of the League's decision to send an investigating delegation into Russia. The statement complains that the League has failed to protest against Poland's action, declares that Russia will admit newspaper correspondents after they give guarantees that they will not abuse the hospitality of the Russian people, and will afford facilities to the British trade union delegates as guests of the Russian trade unions.

PRINCE THANKS MOUNTED POLICE

Heir-Apparent Sends Message to Canadian Force From Australasia

Ottawa, May 10.—Hon. N. W. Rowell to-day received the following cablegram from the Prince of Wales, who is Honorary Commandant of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police: "Wellington, N. Z.: 'Please convey to all of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police my sincere thanks for their telegram of good-wishes, sent from their first dinner, which I much appreciate. (Signed) 'Edward P.'"

GOVERNOR-GENERAL RETURNS TO OTTAWA

Takes Up Residence at Government House After Trip to England

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press)—The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire arrived at Government House this morning on their return from London, where they had spent the last few days of their trip. They were accompanied by Lady Maud Mcintosh and her infant daughter, Lady Ann Cavendish, Lady Blanche Beresford and Captain The Earl of Dalkeith, A.D.C., together with Lord Richard Neville and Captain Blair, who joined the party at Quebec.

Pirates Held Up French Ship in the Black Sea

Constantinople, May 9.—Via London, May 10.—(Associated Press)—Pirates held up the French packet Souira, which left Batum May 6 en route to Marseilles, and after robbing the passengers of the steamer went ashore in boats which they compelled members of the crew to man. Among those on board the vessel were Mrs. Haskell, wife of Colonel William Haskell, Director-General of American relief in the Near East, and Mrs. Daly and Mrs. Booth, whose husbands are connected with relief work in Armenia. They were fleeing before the Bolshevik advance and were forced to give up their valuables.

The pirates boarded the steamer at Batum, either as passengers or members of the crew. On the night of May 6, fifteen men sprang from various parts of the ship, covered

Spread of Strike Fails to Paralyze Paris To-day

Paris, May 10.—Leon Jouhaux, the leading spirit of the French Federation of Labor, apparently has failed to strengthen the movement for nationalization of public utilities by ordering a strike on transportation lines, subways and tramways in Paris. Omnibuses are going about as usual, but there are only a few cabs to be seen.

Frequent clashes occurred between taxicab drivers who were ready to run their machines and strikers. The tramways are working regularly, but the cars remain within the walls of Paris and do not enter the suburbs. The men operating them are not attended, as on May Day, by police or soldiers.

Auto-buses continue to circulate and there have been no attempts at violence against them. Interest now centres on whether Jouhaux will decide to let his electrical plant workers shall be called out. The executive committee of the Labor Federation is in continuous session.

Opinion Last Night. With the strike call issued to the additional unions and seeking to strengthen its position, the Federation of Labor issued a statement last night declaring that all indications showed that the additional unions ordered to strike were inspired with as strong a determination as those already on strike and urgently appealed to the strikers not to allow themselves to be distracted by other aims such as more pay and less work, which would only belittle the movement and scatter its strength.

The Federation of Telegraph, Telephone and Post Office workers, at a mass meeting held yesterday for the purpose of discussing means to support the workers on strike, adopted an order of the day declaring their readiness to respond to a strike order in sympathy with the strikers if the Federation officers should ask their co-operation.

VILLA HAS QUIT WORK AS BANDIT

Laid Down Arms and Put Men Under Revolutionary Commander

Juarez, Mex., May 10.—Francisco Villa's days of banditry and constant menace to all attempts to establish stable government in Mexico and to the relations between this republic and the United States are ended, according to reports reaching here. Leaders of the new revolution displayed visible relief at the announcement that Villa had laid down his arms and turned his men over to the Federal Government.

The announcement that Villa had laid down his arms and guided his followers into the ranks of the revolutionists came from General J. G. Escobar, commander of Juarez. Villa also notified the Mexican Central Railway, Escobar said, that guards of soldiers no longer would be necessary on trains.

U. S. DREADNOUGHT WILL REMAIN NEAR MEXICAN WATERS

Washington, May 10.—The dreadnought Oklahoma was ordered to-day to proceed from New York to Key West, Florida, for possible duty in Mexican waters. The Nevada is armed with ten 14-inch guns.

Lim On's Plane Crashes at Saskatoon and He Is Injured

Saskatoon, May 10.—Lim On, a Chinese aviator, suffered a double fracture of the right leg and a broken arm when his Curtiss plane crashed down 250 feet near the aerodrome here Saturday afternoon. He was taken to a hospital suffering several other minor injuries, but retained consciousness. It is expected he will recover.

Lim On was stunting at the time and was attempting to drop 1,500 feet to within 100 feet of a circumscribed patch, as required by the Government Board of Aero Science.

Dominion Will Be Represented. Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press)—The Dominion Government will have three representatives at the financial conference which will open in Brussels on May 28 under the auspices of the League of Nations. The representatives will be Sir George Perley, High Commissioner in London; J. H. Gundy, Toronto; and G. C. Castles, manager of the Bank of Montreal, London, Eng.

GERMANS TRIED TO SINK WARSHIP IN HANDS OF FRENCH

Cherbourg, France, May 10.—A serious leak was discovered on board the German dreadnought Thuringen, which recently was allocated to France and is in port here. The leak, it is stated, was due to the act of the German crew of the warship. The influx of water was stopped by a French naval squad and the damage repaired.

OFFICER IN CARIO WAS MURDERED

In Addition to British Lieutenant Assassins Killed Four Egyptians

Cairo, May 9.—via London, May 10.—The British troops in Cairo are restive under recent attempts at assassination, culminating last week in the murder of a lieutenant and four young Egyptians in one of the main thoroughfares. The assassins fired pointblank at a range of a few feet.

The police recently arrested a student agitator, and his confession led to the arrest of others, who are believed to be directors of the so-called "Vengeance Gang," which is sending out "black hand" letters.

ENGINE PLUNGES DOWN INTO RIVER

Canadian National Engineer and Brakeman Lose Lives in N. B.

Fredericton, N. B., May 10.—The locomotive of a way freight train on the Canadian National Railway (Canada Eastern division) plunged into the Nashwaak River off what is known as the Penniac bridge, two miles north of Marysville, early this morning, and dragged the tender and one freight car into the river with it.

The engineer, J. Gillis, of Newcastle, lost his life. Clifford Hughes, fireman, was badly but not fatally scalded, and John Estabrooks, brakeman, is pinned under the tender, with only his neck and head out of the water, died, though while frantic efforts are being made to lift the tender and thus release him.

Gillis's body was found under the boiler of the engine, but can not be removed until the wrecking crew are able to move the engine. Gillis was married, and resided in this city, but had no children.

Following a heavy rain on Sunday, a dam on the Nashwaak River owned by the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company gave way and the rush of logs thus released tore away the embankment so that when the train came along, the locomotive tender and one freight car rolled down the embankment of almost fifty feet into the river.

Traffic on the Canada Eastern division is tied up.

KILLED HIS LITTLE SON AND HIMSELF

Mind of Man in Alberta Unbalanced by Wife's Illness

Lethbridge, May 10.—Murder and suicide, the most shocking double tragedy in the history of Cardston, were committed on Saturday afternoon as a result of the deranged mental condition of George Leavitt, of that town. Leavitt, after having first hanged his son Royce, aged nine, hanged himself, life being extinct in both cases when the bodies were found.

For some time Leavitt's mind had been unbalanced, due, it is believed, to the illness of his wife, who has been in the hospital for a long time. On Saturday morning Leavitt told his wife he thought he should offer his son Royce, who was deaf and dumb, as a sacrifice, but this was the only inkling of his intentions.

ASQUITH'S SCHEME FOR IRELAND VOTED DOWN IN COMMONS

London, May 10.—An amendment to the Government's Irish Home Rule Bill offered by Mr. Asquith, providing for one Parliament instead of two in Ireland, was defeated in the House of Commons this evening after a short debate, by a vote of 259 to 55.

Mr. Asquith's amendment would have provided one Parliament, with county option for Ulster, for a period limited to six years, as proposed in 1914.

PARTY OF BRITISH FARMERS NOW ON WAY TO CANADA

London, May 10.—(Canadian Associated Press)—The liner Caronia, which sailed from Liverpool for Halifax and New York on Saturday, carries over 200 young British farmers and their wives who are going to settle in Canada.

FREED HUNGER STRIKER DIES

Eule Redmond, Sinn Feiner, Succumbs in Dublin After an Operation

London, May 10.—Eule Redmond, one of the hunger strikers recently released from the Mount Joy prison, Dublin, died in the hospital here yesterday, according to a dispatch from Dublin.

Attacks. London, May 10.—A dispatch from Dublin said that two organized attacks were made by raiders on small police barracks in Ireland at early hours Sunday morning.

At Cloyne, County Cork, the small garrison of seven, after a prolonged fight, was compelled to surrender, one of the men being wounded.

The other was more serious. It took place at the village of Newtown Hamilton, South Armagh, where 300 Sinn Feiners attacked the barracks garrisoned by five men. The fight lasted two and a half hours. The building was sprinkled with petrol and burned, the garrison being driven into an outhouse, where the men committed their gallant defence. The raiders ultimately retired.

The authorities are continuing the policy of shutting down the small police barracks in the rural districts and sending the men to the larger centres.

Wounded. London, May 10.—A dispatch from Dublin yesterday said a sergeant of detectives named Revell was shot and seriously wounded Saturday morning on Phibsborough Road, a business thoroughfare, while on his way to report for duty at Dublin Castle. Two men shot the detective from behind and escaped.

Revell was wearing a steelplate under his waist coat, but the bullets struck unprotected parts of his body.

ELECTIONS SOON IN VLADIVOSTOK AREA

Provisional Government Says Provincial Parliament Will Be Set Up

Vladivostok, May 9.—The Provisional Government has announced that elections shortly will be held for a Far Eastern Provisional Parliament. The declaration announcing the elections lays stress on the friendly relations between the people and the great powers based on international law and existing treaties and calls for development of the national resources and industries with Russian and foreign capital and maximum freedom for Russian and foreign enterprises.

The Japanese have installed a complete telephone system, both military and industrial.

There is a marked shortage of foodstuffs in the maritime district contiguous to Manchuria.

NOVA SCOTIA THUGS ESCAPED WITH \$3,200

New Glasgow, N.S., May 10.—The police here are searching for two men who on Saturday held up and robbed Cashier Campbell of the Greenwood Coal Company and got away with \$3,200 in cash. One bullet from a highwayman's gun penetrated Campbell's ankle, badly fracturing the bone.

Bolshevik Russia and Georgia Sign a Treaty

London, May 10.—A peace treaty has been concluded between Soviet Russia and the Republic of Georgia, according to a wireless message from Moscow. The treaty provides that Russia shall recognize the independence of Georgia and undertake not to interfere in Georgia's internal affairs.

The republic will comprise the Tiflis, Kutais and Batum governments and districts of Sukhum and Zakatsky and a portion of the Black Sea government.

Georgia is to disarm all its military forces, groups and persons hostile to the Soviet Government and intern them in concentration camps to be handed over subsequently to Soviet Russia, whose Government undertakes to spare their lives. All their military supplies, valuables and funds, however, will be confiscated without compensation. Georgia undertakes to relieve from punishment and from further prosecution all those at the present time under prosecution for acts committed in favor of Soviet Russia.

Ottawa Will Choose Minister to U. S. Not Later Than the Fall

New Official Will Speak Directly for Canada at Washington; In absence of British Ambassador He Will Speak for the Whole British Empire

Washington, May 10.—A Canadian Minister to the United States will be appointed. Formal announcement of the purpose of the British Government to place the Canadian relations with the United States completely in the hands of Canada was made to-day in a statement read in the Canadian Parliament at Ottawa by direction of the Governor-General and the British Parliament in London and made public here through the British Embassy.

Unusual powers are to be conferred upon the Canadian Minister. In the absence of the British Ambassador he will take full charge of all British diplomatic relations with the United States. The name of the Canadian Minister will not be announced until some time during the approaching Summer or Fall, in order to insure perfect sympathetic co-operation between the new Cabinet and the Minister.

Accommodations for the Minister will be found in the present Embassy building here for purely official purposes. Whether the United States shall be represented at Ottawa by a Minister under the new order will have to be decided soon. Congress alone has the power to create new legations and embassies. It is understood, however, that the British Government has been acting with the view that diplomatic exchanges with Canada beyond those had directly with the resident Canadian Minister will be entrusted to the United States Consul-General in Ottawa.

FLOUR PRICES UP ON WHEAT ADVANCE

Canada Wheat Board Jumps Price Forty Cents Bushel

Flour went up \$1.65 a barrel of 196 pounds to-day on the announcement that the Canada Wheat Board had raised the price of wheat from 35 to 40 cents a bushel. This makes the price of No. 1 Northern \$3.15 a bushel on the Fort William and Port Arthur basis.

To-day's increase brings the wholesale price of flour to \$14.55 a barrel. It has been \$12.00. With the announcement of the increase, all local flour dealers received orders that no one must sell flour below the new minimum price. All stocks on hand must be sold for at least \$14.55 a barrel, no matter at what price it was bought for.

Importation Prohibited. The Canada Wheat Board has also issued orders that no grains containing wheat shall be imported or exported from Canada, without special permission from the Board.

Board's Order. Winnipeg, May 10.—The Canadian Wheat Board has issued the following orders, effective from May 8: "The price of wheat grown in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, sold locally from country elevators in the said Provinces, or for use as seed or feed, shall be \$3.15 a bushel based on No. 1 Northern in store in public terminal elevators at Fort William and Port Arthur, and licenses of the Board selling such wheat shall pay to the Board the sum of \$1 a bushel for each bushel of wheat sold.

No mixed grains containing wheat grown in the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia shall be exported out of Canada with a license or permit of the Board.

Licenses Needed. "No mixed grains containing wheat shall be imported into Canada without a license or permit of the Board. Each mill licensee who grinds wheat for farmers or other owners thereof and returns to such owners the whole of the actual product of such wheat shall not be required to issue participation certificates or to remit to the Board the \$1 a bushel on such wheat, provided, however, that each mill licensee must furnish weekly statement showing the names of the farmers or other owners of wheat gristed, quantity of wheat gristed, and quantity of flour, or of other product returned to the owners of the wheat gristed."

A WINNIPEG DEATH.

Winnipeg, May 10.—Andrew Caldwell, editor of The Grain Trade News, died Sunday after a long illness. Mr. Caldwell came to Winnipeg ten years ago and was well known to the grain and livestock men of Western Canada.

WANT HIGHER PAY.

Toronto, May 10.—The employees of the Toronto Railway Company have decided to demand 85 cents an hour at the expiration of their agreement with the company, June 16. The present rate of pay is 55 cents an hour.

HEAPS AND DUNN IN NOVA SCOTIA

Sydney, N. S., May 10.—Alderman A. A. Heaps and F. H. Dunn, of Winnipeg, arrived in Sydney on Sunday morning. Owing to the fact that the proper arrangements had not been made, a meeting to have been held in this city in the afternoon was postponed. In the evening Alderman Heaps and Mr. Dunn addressed a large gathering of labor men at Gloucester Bay.

The proposed civic welcome which aroused so much comment proved a fiasco.

TREATY PUT INTO CAMPAIGN IN U. S.

Democrats, Governed by Wilson's Attitude, and Republicans Will Fight

Washington, May 10.—The Treaty of Versailles as it came from Paris was to-day thrown into the coming presidential campaign. President Wilson formally has called upon the Democratic Party to "endorse and support" the treaty and "condemn the Lodge reservations."

Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, the Republican, in the House of Representatives, has accepted the President's challenge and political observers here regard the issue as clearly drawn.

FIRE AND SMASH CAUSE DEATHS

Three Persons Killed in New York; Eight Killed in Oregon

New York, May 10.—Three persons were burned to death and one probably will die as the result of a fire in an East Side tenement house here early yesterday. The fire, the origin of which is unknown, started in a hallway on the ground floor.

Eight Killed. Portland, Ore., May 10.—Eight persons were killed and thirty-eight injured, eight miles south of here yesterday, when two electric trains on the West Side line of the Southern Pacific collided head-on. Railroad officials said disregard of orders by the crew of the Portland-bound train led to the disaster.

## SEVENTEEN AERIAL TAXICAB CONCERNS

Scott, Back in Ottawa, Speaks of Coast and Prairie Progress

Ottawa, May 10.—No fewer than seventeen aerial taxicab companies are being formed in Western Canada and a number of these have been already licensed by the Board of Aerial Navigation. Lieutenant-Colonel Scott, who has active charge of the certificates branch of the Air Board, has just returned from a tour of inspection in the west and reports great activity and possibilities for very real development of commercial flying in that part of the Dominion.

Six routes for transcontinental flights are established. The building of aerodromes is the important detail which has been neglected in Canada. Four commercial flying companies have been floated in Winnipeg, and one will be formed in Brandon. An aerodrome is to be built at Virden, Man. There is one commercial flying company in Regina, one in Moose Jaw, two in Saskatoon, two in Edmonton, one in Hana, Alberta, one in Calgary, one in Lethbridge, one in Banff and two in Vancouver.

Commercial flying has been developed to a high standard on the Pacific coast.

### ISSUES BULLETIN ON POISON PLANTS OF THE DOMINION

Some years ago the Federal Department of Agriculture published an excellent work on the farm weeds of Canada, splendidly illustrated with colored plates. Now the Experimental Farms branch has just issued a bulletin on the subject of poison plants by Faith Fyles, B.A., the Assistant Botanist. Miss Fyles has succeeded not only with careful pen descriptions, but with fine drawings in imparting clear-cut data on injurious plants.

The information has been gathered for the purpose of giving to farmers a means of recognizing and identifying noxious plants, with the symptoms of poisoning, and methods of treatment.

The principal types of the well-known poison plants like nightshade, henbane, and water hemlock, are illustrated, and plants like the ragwort and corn cockle, which are often not considered in that class, are carefully described with notes of the experiences of harmful results to stock where they have been eaten in large quantities.


Some plants are so poisonous that even after the hay has dried, their noxious properties continue, cases being quoted by Miss Fyles.

## FIGHT DISEASE AMONG ANIMALS

Dominion Department Starts Campaign Against Bovine and Hog Tuberculosis

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press).—Further steps toward insuring Canada of as large an output of livestock and livestock products as possible are to be taken right away by the Federal Department of Agriculture, it was learned here today.

A Dominion-wide campaign in an effort to control and ultimately to eradicate tuberculosis among Canadian livestock is outlined in an announcement by Dr. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture. During the last ten years, this trouble has been increasing both in cattle and in hogs at a more or less uniform rate, according to the Minister. Tuberculosis of swine, which is closely related to tuberculosis of cattle, has increased from an average of ten per cent to slightly more than twenty per cent during that period.

Ecrement, who had been living here under the name of C. E. Arthur, also was said to be wanted in Montreal and Buffalo in connection with an alleged \$125,000 wire tapping swindle.

William Carter, of the Canadian Dominion Police, was in Chicago today conferring with the state attorney's office. He said he would return to Canada to learn if the Canadian authorities desired to ask extradition papers for Ecrement.

## FOREST RESERVES NOT TRAPPERS' AREAS

Edmonton, May 10.—Notice has been given to all game guardians in Alberta that in the future there is to be no more trapping within the forest reserves. Hitherto the reserves have been free to trappers on the same terms and restrictions as other parts of the country, but under the newly amended Game Act all such trapping will be prohibited except by special permit.

## \$28,000 FOR TEN CARS OF POTATOES

Edmonton, May 10.—Twenty-eight thousand dollars seems a fabulous price to pay for ten carloads of potatoes, but such a sum changed hands when a dealer of Yankima, Washington, purchased approximately 7,000 bushels of Edmonton-grown tubers at \$3.50 per bushel, the highest on record for such a large shipment. The potatoes are to be shipped to various points in the State of Montana.

## SAYS LIGHTS TOO DEAR IN BRITAIN

Manufacturers of Electric Bulbs Are in Combine, Declares Committee

London, May 10.—Post-war growth of trusts and monopolies in this country is being investigated.

A profiteering committee which has been looking into the activities of electric light companies and lamp bulb manufacturers, in a report made public, says that "a trade combination does exist among electric light manufacturers in this country and exercises a powerful influence over the conduct and development of the industry."

It is known as the Electric Light Manufacturers' Association, the report says, and has been created primarily in the interests of three firms—the British Thomson-Houston Company, the General Electric Company, and Messrs. Siemens Brothers. It is reported to include from ninety to ninety-five per cent. of the industry, to fix prices and regulate output, says the profiteering committee.

Standard. The prices fixed by the Association, the report says, become the standard for all lamps sold in this country, whether made by Association or non-Association manufacturers, or imported from abroad. Because of this standard price policy the general public reaps no benefit from lamps of cheaper manufacture, the advantage going wholly to distributors.

Standard vacuum lamps, now sold to the public for three shillings, states the report, could be sold at two shillings, at which price the manufacturer and distributor would still have a satisfactory working profit.

"One and a quarter million half-watt lamps," adds the report, "sold to the public in 1919 at twelve shillings and sixpence each, were purchased in Holland by three associated manufacturers at about three shillings a lamp. They could have been sold at not more than eight shillings, which would still have left a ample margin for the importers and distributors. Importers and distributors between them made profits on these lamps of some £1,400,000 over and above what would appear to us reasonable."

Americans. "Since the largest of the three dominant firms," continues the report, "is under the majority control of an American electrical concern, there is some danger that the interests of the British lamp industry may be subordinated to American interests."

"There is a possibility of an international combination comprising British, Dutch and American manufacturers which would be able to control supplies and dominate prices over a considerable part of the world. The operations of an association which so effectively controls an important industry," concludes the report, "should be subject to public supervision and control."

## ATTACK MADE ON ONTARIO PREMIER

Toronto, May 10.—M. M. McBride, M.P.P. for South Brant, has issued a statement in which he criticizes the United Farmer Government for its refusal to increase the members' indemnity as requested in a recent round-robin, characterizes Premier Drury as a dictator and refers to Andrew Hicks, member for South Huron and United Farmer whip, as having given to Ontario public life the best example of hypocrisy paraded under the guise of sincerity that ever has come to his notice.

## WOMAN APPOINTED.

Regina, May 10.—Miss Isabelle Cummins has been appointed secretary of the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture, having the distinction of being the first woman in Canada to be appointed to such a position.

## HOUSEBOATS AS CHICAGO HOMES

Hundreds of Families Living Afloat; Measures to Overcome House Shortage

Chicago, May 10.—This city is attempting to prevent rent profiteering by regulating increases in rates and by organizing a \$100,000,000 corporation to build homes and sell them on easy payments. Meanwhile Chicago's flat dwellers have been forming unions to wage war on alleged profiteering landlords and committees of the City Council have been investigating increases in rents ranging up to 100 and even 200 per cent.

Several hundred families have solved their individual housing problem by mooring their homes in houseboats moored in the branches of the Chicago River, the Calumet and lakes in south Chicago. One in possession of a house boat, the owner only has to pay \$1 a month for the privilege of mooring his craft. If he does not like his location he can move his home boat elsewhere. Many of these boats cost \$1,000 each and have five rooms—parlor, dining room, kitchen and two bedrooms.

In some cases groups of tenants have solved the rent problem by forming co-operative companies and buying the apartment houses in which they live.

Models. The Housing Corporation, which has been financed by banks and business men, has under consideration a plan to build a row of model homes in Grant Park, on the lake front. Examples of many types of standardized homes would be erected, furnished and surrounded by settings of trees and shrubbery so that a prospective purchaser of a new home could look over the styles before placing his order.

Attempts have been made to check rent profiteering by co-operation of the City Council and the Cook County Real Estate Board, which investigated complaints and, when increases were found to be excessive, advised the landlord to withdraw his demands. In general the investigators have allowed an increase of about thirty per cent. over last year's rentals.

A proposal was made to erect scores of portable houses, but the carpenters' union declared its opposition to that plan even if the houses came from union factories.

The recent tornadoes, which destroyed 100 houses and damaged 400 more in Chicago and its suburbs, have augmented a housing shortage which had already become acute through suspension of building operations in the war and long-drawn builders' contracts.

## TO SHOW ANIMALS.

Regina, May 10.—The proposal to organize a joint Saskatchewan exhibit of purebred animals to show at the International Exhibition in Chicago the last week in November and the first week in December met with general approval at a meeting of the Saskatchewan Livestock Board.

Practically the entire Board was present and it was decided to request the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture to co-operate with the Board by assuming transportation charges and assisting in organizing the exhibit.

## NEWSPAPER FAILS.

St. Catharines, Ont., May 10.—The Journal, an evening paper in this city, which suspended publication a week ago, made an assignment on Saturday.

## IMPORTS GREW AND EXPORTS FELL OFF

Canada's Trade Record For Fiscal Year Ended With March Last

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press).—Canada's imports for consumption during the twelve months ended with March, 1920, and upon which duty had to be paid, show an approximate increase of \$169,000,000 in value over the previous twelve months. For the year just ended, the total was \$693,643,211, as against \$524,475,717 for the previous year, and \$542,319,623 for the fiscal year of 1918.

Free goods in the last year totalled \$370,872,958, or a total of imported goods for consumption of \$1,064,516,169.

Total exports of merchandise were \$1,286,658,709, of which \$1,239,492,098 was classed as Canadian and \$47,166,611 as foreign. This did not, however, reach the 1918 total of exports, which was \$1,588,169,792. A noteworthy fact, however, is that while exports to the United Kingdom are still falling away, those to the United States are still largely on the increase.

Imports from the old land, however, continue to show a marked increase over those coming from across the line. The figures show an increase of forty per cent. in imports from Great Britain over 1918, while from the United States the increase was less than two per cent.

Articles for the army and navy imported during the fiscal year of 1918 totalled more than \$130,000,000 in value, while for the year just ended, the aggregate was a little more than \$1,500,000.

## "MOUNTIES" ARE TO TRAIN AT REGINA

Regina, May 10.—Regina will be a special training depot where every man who enlists in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police force will get his training. It was believed that another training depot would be established at Ottawa, but according to officers of the force Regina will be the only training depot.

**SIR ROBERT RETURNING.**

It is generally agreed at Ottawa that the Union Government is stronger with Sir Robert away than it would be with the Prime Minister at his post. This view implies no reflection upon Sir Robert Borden. On the contrary it is something of a compliment to him, for it means that as long as he is away endeavoring to recover his health the Government is being treated with undue leniency from without as well as from within its own ranks because of its comparative helplessness. Certain questions charged with political dynamite are carefully wrapped in cotton and placed on the shelf owing to the absence of Sir Robert Borden. Further, with Sir Robert still leader of the party although away from it, competition for the leadership remains in the air, all interests being content to serve under the senior Minister, Sir George Foster, who is becoming more patriarchally benevolent every day. Sir Robert Borden, however, will return to the capital on Wednesday. Whether that will mean his return to work remains to be seen. If it will, the question of the next leadership, of course, will have to be wrapped up carefully and placed upon the shelf, but those matters which have been lying untouched pending his absence will have to be taken down and dealt with.

Among them is the decision of whether an effort will be made to create a permanent Unionist party or not, and if not, in what guise will the Government go to the country next year? In any case, it is not expected that Sir Robert Borden himself will be a factor in the next contest, since it is well known that he desires to retire from the political arena and would have retired months ago had it not been for the inability of his followers to agree upon a successor. The Prime Minister's return, therefore, is fraught with more than ordinary significance.

**HIS \$50,000.**

The estate of the late Sir William Osler has been probated at \$50,000. Such a sum is not enough to classify its owner among men of wealth nowadays. It cannot properly be designated a fortune. Sir William delivered from death and suffering many people whose incomes were equal to that amount a month, and some whose incomes exceeded \$50,000 a week. Sir William Osler was a world-renowned figure in medical science. But he was talented beyond that and was, in fact, a great intellectual force who would have been an important factor in influencing the mind of his generation in other ways if he never had followed the medical profession. If he had devoted his great mental gifts to the accumulation of wealth he could have amassed millions so easily that much of his time would have hung heavily upon his hands; as easily, in fact, as he often saved the life of some multi-millionaire whose wealth in itself could not gain for him one moment's respite from suffering, and could not even purchase preference in the consideration of his case above the case of the poor man who beat him to Sir William Osler's consulting room. But if Sir William had devoted his great intellect to the accumulation of money he would have spoiled it, and the world would have been vastly the loser.

**"PRACTICALLY SETTLED."**

In a special dispatch from Ottawa to one of the Vancouver newspapers there is an admission that as a result of the "hard battle" which has been "going on between the Vancouver and Victoria members" with respect to the location of the Government's drydock, "the capital seems to have won the day." This is a somewhat belated analysis of a piece of Governmental policy laid down nearly ten years ago and which would

have followed its logical course long ago if war conditions had not imposed other and, for the time being, more pressing considerations upon the country as a whole. However, it is satisfactory to learn that the "long fight"—as the dispatch describes it—over the location is "practically settled." We are afraid our enterprising neighbors must waive any further claim to this undertaking and they may as well remove the word "practically" from their speculation upon the decision. The suggestion for a different location, as our friends across the gulf well know, reached Ottawa via Vancouver.

**NOT IMPOSSIBLE.**

One of the provisions of the treaty with Turkey requires the annulment of all the conversions to Islam since 1914. At first glance this strikes one as a very far-fetched requirement, since it apparently aims at the accomplishment of the impossible. How can anybody who has been converted to Mohammedanism be forced out of that faith by treaty? Ordinarily the act of conversion implies a mental transformation and this cannot be undone by treaty any more than a sinner can be transformed into a saint by an Act of Parliament.

But actually this clause of the treaty is not intended to unconvert the true converts to Mohammedanism. Its object is the deliverance of those who were forced to pretend their conversion to escape persecution. Among the myriads who every evening at the call of the muezzin prostrate themselves in the direction of Mecca are thousands who do so because of outrage and death would be their portion if they did not. They are frail vessels than thousands who preferred torture and execution to Mohammedanism. If that provision is faithfully carried out by the temporal heads of Islam there will be a fairly substantial diversion from among the followers of the Prophet, including not a few who were believed to be exceptionally true to the faith.

**THE GOLF LINKS.**

Golfing enthusiasts and those who are desirous of plumbing the mysteries of this ancient and royal pastime will welcome the announcement that a referendum is to be submitted to the ratepayers towards the close of the present month. The re-submission of the proposal owes its origin to the fact that its disposition in January last, with such a narrow margin below the majority required to carry it, was due to an inadequate appreciation of the advantages of the scheme to all classes. It is worth while re-iterating, however, that an enterprise of this character is not for the benefit of any particular "set." Its ardent supporters already are members of the various clubs in the district and their chief aim—based upon an accurate knowledge of the increasing popularity of the game all over the American continent—is to assist the person who either plays golf or desires to learn, but who is denied the privilege because of lack of accommodation. It is, besides, a good business proposal. It should be able to pay its way and yield a return almost from the day of its opening.

**NOTE AND COMMENT**

United States Attorney-General Palmer is reported to have refuted any suggestion that specific promises have been made to the Manitoba Mennonites who are preparing to depart from this country to a colony in Mississippi. Nothing is known in Washington regarding the undertaking alleged to have been given to the representatives of this sect that their own schools and the use of the German language would be assured them in their new abode. The Mennonites will find that the new constitution of the world will not permit any of its people to take all the advantages of citizenship and give nothing in return.

Plans have been prepared for the largest hotel in the world to be constructed in the city of Chicago. Its cost is estimated at \$15,000,000 and one of its features contemplates a theatre capable of seating two thousand five hundred persons. The announcement is in keeping with the American idea of "the biggest yet," but it is not a fact that, like the mammoth liner and the giant battleship, the palatial hotel is giving place to less pretentious edifices whose prosperity is due less to the splendor than to the comfort of its arrangements?

**TOUR TO CONNECT WITH SOUTH WELLINGTON AND MT. SICKER.**  
 The object of the tour is stated as being a general examination of the industrial conditions of the island, with the idea of promoting greater trade facilities. The question of the advisability of daily train service to Albert and Courtenay is one that is to be discussed. The party will stop over at the larger towns for the night and will return to the city next Sunday.

**MOTOR IS STRUCK BY STREET CAR**  
 J. E. Rogers has reported to the police that his car was run into by a Fowl Bay street car this morning at the corner of Fort Street and Blanshard Street. Mr. Rogers alleges that the street car did not slow down at the corner, and in striking damaged the right side of the automobile.

The dory which was representative of the liquor traffic, when the police caught a large quantity of that commodity being shipped on board a steamer for the South some weeks ago, was sold last week by order of the Court. It will be remembered that the row boat was found deserted by its owners, but contained some 130 bottles of whiskey. In the absence of the offenders the dory was lodged in the court yard as evidence. Charles Leach has reported to the police that a valuable fox terrier dog belonging to him was run over by a car which he stated was traveling at high rate of speed, and kept traveling after the accident.

**WAS PREMATURE**  
 Mr. Hawthornthwaite Says He Has Not Yet Purchased "Burlieith"; Has Option on Property.

Bishop Moule was born in 1841. He held many important posts, being associated with both Oxford and Cambridge Universities. He was an honorary chaplain to King Edward. He was the author of many works dealing with the Christian religion.

**TO CALL TENDERS FOR BRIDGE ABOUT END OF NEXT MONTH**

Mayor Thinks Necessary Preliminaries Will Be Disposed of By Then

Tenders for the construction of the new Johnson Street Bridge probably will be called at the end of June, Mayor Porter announced today. "At the present moment," the Mayor stated, "all the preliminaries in the bridge question are going along very satisfactorily. The bridge plans have been approved by the C. F. B. and now are before the Public Works Department of the Dominion Government, whose formal consent to the construction of a bridge over tide water must be secured before installation can proceed. As soon as the approval of the Public Works Department is secured, we hope to hear before long that this approval has been granted—the plans will be forwarded to the Board of Railway Commissioners whose approval also is necessary. "After getting all these matters straightened out we shall be in a position to call tenders. Judging by all present indications we are hopeful that we shall be able to call tenders about the end of next month. In this way we shall get the bridge under way before September, when construction must start under the terms of the by-law."

**MAKING PREPARATIONS FOR GOLF REFERENDUM**

Rotary Club to Start Campaign to "Put Over" Project

Active preparations for the holding of the plebiscite on the Municipal Golf Links Bylaw and preparations for a whirlwind campaign in support of the golf links project are now under way. The City Council members of which, with one exception, are solidly behind the plan, and the Rotary Club, which was chiefly responsible for bringing the matter before the electors before, are confident that this time Victoria will decide in favor of municipal golf. Mayor Porter, whose views may be taken as reflecting those of the Council in the present instance declaring to-day, "I have every hope and every confidence that the golf links plan will receive the necessary support from the electors to put it over. It would be a very great pity if the project should fail this time. However, I haven't the slightest doubt of its success." The Rotary Club is just as enthusiastic over the golf links scheme as ever, and is planning to wage a vigorous campaign in its support. The Golf Committee, under Gordon Jameson, is making preparations to this end now.

The question to be asked the electors in the referendum is as follows: "Are you in favor of the corporation paying from its current revenue any amount up to the sum of \$6,666.66 in each of the years 1920, 1921 and 1922 toward the construction, development and equipment of a Municipal Golf Course, such golf course to be situated on the Hudson's Bay Company's property in the vicinity of the 'Islands,' subject to approval of the City Council, and to be entered into by the corporation with another municipality, or other municipalities, and with a duly incorporated Municipal Golf Links Association?"

**WHAT THE CLUBS ARE DOING**

**Definition of Labor.**

Noticing that W. F. Best of the company, had told The Times Saturday that such an agreement had been reached, the Mayor stated: "We considered the scheme, but we made no bargain at all. We shall, of course, consider any other proposition that the company may care to put before us in the future, but we have agreed to nothing so far."

**NEWS AND NOTES OF THE MINES**

**Hope Diamond Group**  
 Frank Fritz is negotiating for the obtaining of outside capital for development work on the Diamond group prospect, near Hope. The Diamond is on the Hope-Princeton trail, at 23 mile, opposite the Silver Dike. Fritz prospected the Diamond in 1910 and has been working on it ever since. There are three mountains in that locality, all heavily mineralized, copper and silver chiefly. At the Diamond they have an open cut 10 ft. to 30 ft. wide, with five leads. Assays have been made which show rich results. At present preparations are being made for Summer work, but the difficulty of the trail and the absence of anything like a good road are serious handicaps. The property is on the Skagit river, near Red and Gold Top mountains.

**To Re-open Lead Prospect**  
 Robt. Wood and Clement Vacher were developing on the lake shore at Penticton, a mineral claim some 20 years ago, which was regarded as one of the most promising mining ventures in the province. Lack of capital and inadequate transportation facilities caused the original promoters to suspend operations, but a new company has been formed to open up the property.

**Forty-two Mines**  
 At the present time there are forty-two coal mines located on the lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, practically all of which are located west of Edmonton. The production from these mines is gradually assuming large proportions. During the period from September 1, 1919, to April 21, 1920, these mines produced and shipped 27,753 cars or approximately 900,000 tons of coal, which includes commercial as well as coal for railway purposes.

**Wild Horse Diggings.**  
 Developments have started on the gold diggings of Wild Horse, Fort Steele, a few men starting to work for the Wild Horse Dredging Company. Later on something may be done with the Gamble claim, but nothing definite has been decided yet, although they made some good cleanups last year. Steady work has been going on in connection with the Niagara, operating company, on Maus Creek, which is operating the Victor mine.

**Director of Mines.**  
 Frederick G. Cottrell, prominent mining engineer of Oakland, Cal. and Washington, D.C., who was nominated by President Wilson yesterday to be director of the bureau of mines, has been with the bureau since 1912. He is a graduate of the University of California and for a time was an assistant professor of physical chemistry at that institution. He was known nationally for his work in developing the electrical precipitator to reduce dust and smelter fumes and for the discovery of a process to recover helium from the inflation of dirigibles. Mr. Cottrell served successively as chief metallurgist and assistant director of the bureau of mines.




So Uncle Wiggily hopped over the fields and through the woods to the nine and thirteen cent store.

## BREAD TRADE BACK TO HOME DELIVERIES; STRIKERS LOSE OUT

Masters Claim Business and Output Are Up to Normal

Despite the May Day strike of bakers and their attempt completely to tie up the bakers business in Victoria, bakery conditions were back to normal to-day with the strikers still out, their places filled and the open shop prevailing for the first time in recent years in the big bread bakeries of the city.

The "big three" bakers commenced their domestic deliveries to-day which were suspended last Monday. They declare they have achieved a complete defeat of the strikers.

During the last week the wholesale trade only was taken care of by the bread manufacturers. Housewives had to buy their bread through retail stores.

"Every customer is being called on to-day," announced Secretary Amphlett, of the Master Bakers' Association. "We are absolutely up to date in filling all our orders. From now on trade will run in its ordinary channels as if there had been no strike."

No Negotiations With Strikers. "The bakers who went out on strike are still out. We are not having any negotiations whatever with them. We are just carrying on our business and meeting the demand of the public for bread."

The "big three" are operating two plants, which are able to fill all orders. It is expected, however, that the third plant will be put into operation by Wednesday. By that time a number of other men will have been trained in to handle the machinery.

The master bakers will ask the City Council to-night to ease up for the time being on the enforcement of the law requiring the stamping of bread. This is because the stamping operation impedes the rate of output at this time of stress when two factories are doing the work of three.

The master bakers declare that they are not seeking to evade the law, but only want some of the difficulties they have to face lightened for a few days.

Deadlock at New Westminster. New Westminster, May 10.—The bakers' strike in this city still remains at a deadlock, the local parties to the controversy apparently awaiting some definite action in Vancouver by which they will be guided.

### HUSBAND ANGRY

Tries Again to Interrupt Court During Proceedings in Alleged Rape Case.

Crowds, including a number of women, jammed both upper and lower galleries of the Assize Court to-day to hear the details of the evidence given in the rape case, in which Ah Louie Moke is charged with attempting an improper assault on a Cook Street lady at her home.

Friday's scene in court, when the husband of the woman interrupted proceedings to criticize W. C. Moore by and R. C. Lowe, defending Moke, for the questions they were asking his wife, was nearly repeated to-day, when evidence was brought in, to which the husband desired to reply. Mr. Justice Macdonald ordered the examination to stop.

"It looks as if we are going to have another scene here," he said. "Here we have this husband down again."

The husband tried to break out again, but the sheriff and detectives rushed forward and kept him back. Finally they induced him to leave the court.

The defence is that the charge is the result of an hallucination on the part of the woman and mistaken identity.

## SPEEDING UPON THE SAANICH ROAD

Cases Are Heard in Police Court to-day; Over Measured Quarter Mile.

As a result of one day's activities on the road, Chief Brogan and his motorcyclist men to-day brought a large "bag" before Magistrate Jay in the Saanich Police Court. All the cases were for offences against the Motor Act, chiefly speeding. Mr. Tait acted as prosecutor.

S. Bell for driving without a tail light was fined \$10; J. W. Duncan for speeding, paid \$20, it being stated that he did a level 440 yards in 28½ seconds. W. B. Mitchell failed to appear and the case was stood over until May 14.

Dr. Holden, in spite of a spirited defence, was fined \$20 for speeding. The Brentwood Hotel car driven by a Chinaman, George Mow, belonging to Mr. Pearce, was the subject of a considerable discussion. The car was alleged to have come down the Tod Inlet road at an excessive rate of speed, and incidentally crashed into a standing car on the road. Eventually the charge was withdrawn.

Grimm and James Hill also fell to the charge of speeding. The police trap was set over a measured 440 yards on the Saanich Road at Elk Lake. For one afternoon alone over fifty cars were tested for speeding over the twenty-five miles allowed by the law for the country. The police gave evidence to the effect that many of the cars wobbled from side to side in addition to the speeding and swerved around corners in a over-daring fashion.

G. Masters was called on two charges, the cases being put to the foot of the list.

## GROWING TRADE OF PORT OF MANILA

Statistics of Cargo Handled and Number of Vessels Berthed

Manila is a port is constantly growing in spite of the inadequate facilities which are obtained there. This is shown by the fact that the amount of cargo handled at the port for the past year is 16,080 tons more than that of 1918. Cargo amounting to 340,740 tons, not including ship-side delivery, was handled last year at the various government piers and customs wharfs as compared with only 324,660 tons the previous year. Steamers and other vessels numbering 651, including boats in the foreign and coastwise trade and vessels belonging to the insular government and army and navy of the United States, berthed at the piers last year as compared with only 496 in 1918. These figures show that Manila, just because of her strategic position in relation with the trade of the far east, and in spite of the rather inadequate facilities which she is at present able to offer, is growing as a port. This growth, which is much greater in the near future when the big sums appropriated by the Legislature for port improvements and facilities are invested.

Following is a comparative statement on the amount of cargo handled at the piers of the government piers and the number of vessels of all kinds that were berthed at these piers, the Army piers and at the Pasig river:

He stated that it was the intention of the Government to use the tower-planning scheme at the site, and added that all the revenue from the sale of land would be devoted to higher education.

At the last session of the Legislature, hon. Mr. Harris' list had been ordered, and it would be necessary for all men and women in the Province to get on the new list within the next two or three months as many important questions were coming up soon such as the liquor referendum. Mr. Harris told of the Government's plan to place educational films in all picture houses in the Province, and stated that the Province was greatly lacking in these pictures. "These pictures will show the people the natural and commercial resources of the Province, and I hope that it will not be long before there will be inter-provincial picture shows here," he added.

### C. P. R. BOATS ARE OPERATING ON TIME

S.S. Princess Adelaide Signing Crew and Will Go Into Commission To-morrow

The crew of the C. P. R. steamship, Princess Adelaide is being signed on to-day and to-morrow night the vessel will sail for Vancouver, replacing the Princess Royal.

The C. P. R. has a full crew for the Princess Adelaide and, despite the strike, she is being put into commission as scheduled, following the completion of overhaul and extensive deck renewals.

All the C. P. R. vessels, with the exception of the coal burners, are operating on schedule. The Princess Macquima is posted to get away tonight for the west coast of Vancouver Island. On Saturday night the Princess Mary sailed from Vancouver for Skagway with 160 passengers and freight for northern ports, including Swanson Bay.

Swanson Bay is not in the itin-

ary of the Princess Mary but she has been ordered to serve that port owing to the disruption of other services through the seamen's strike. There is little indication of a seamen's strike at this port, all the daily vessels are operating in and out right on schedule. Small leaflets posted about the waterfront carry the following in bold type: "Strike on firemen and seamen on all ships. Don't scab. Keep away."

Prince Rupert Laid Up.

Vancouver, May 10.—Service between this port and Prince Rupert, Anyox and Stewart was cut off this morning when the steamer Prince Rupert, which returned from Seattle and Victoria after coming down from the north, was deserted by her crew and tied up at the G.T.P. dock to remain until the shipping tieup is broken. There will be a ten-day service to the northern port and Skagway, however, by the C.P.R. steamer Princess Mary which cleared on Saturday night for Prince Rupert and Skagway.

Every effort was made by Captain C. H. Nicholson, manager of the G.T.P. S.S. Line, to induce the men to take out the ship but he was only able on Saturday to secure a small crew to take the vessel to Seattle and return before she was relegated to the idle list. The Prince George is now the only G.T.P. ship operating and she will be tied up when she returns from the north on Tuesday. Ottawa, May 10.—Ottawa has notified the Esquimaux Naval Yard that the cruiser Rainbow is definitely to be sold within the near future. Tenders will be advertised from Ottawa.

The Rainbow has been lying alongside the wharf at the Naval Yard for some time past, having the stores removed. Her six-inch guns are to be removed before she is sold.

The machinery is said to be still in excellent condition, but the opinion seems to be that the old cruiser has completed her useful days afloat, and is likely to end her career at the hands of the junk man.

steamers to Howe Sound and Bowen Island, are not in the least affected by the strike. These ships will continue to operate without interruption as the men are satisfied with conditions. The small vessels running to Indian River and points up the North Arm will also be able to continue their service.

"Everything going along as usual," was the report of James McGowan, superintendent engineer of the C.P.R. coastal service. "All our vessels, with the exception of course, of the coal burners, are running as usual."

H. Beazley, manager of the Union S.S. Company, states that the steamer Venture will be in from the north to-night and will be tied up with the rest of the fleet. The Camosun will be in port on Tuesday and she will be the last of the fleet to be moored to the Union wharf to await a settlement of the dispute.

### KATORI MARU WILL MAKE BERTH EARLY

N.Y.K. Ship Reaching Quarantine To-night; Has Huge Local Cargo

Laden with one of the largest cargoes ever consigned to the port of Victoria by a Japanese ship, the steamship Katori Maru, of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha fleet, will make quarantine at 9 o'clock to-night from Hongkong and Yokohama.

For Victoria the liner has freight in four hatches amounting all told to about 1,400 tons. It is expected that the liner will be here two days discharging, as it will be out of the question for the longshore gangs to work continuously without a change of shifts.

The Katori Maru is expected to berth at the Outer Docks at 7.30 o'clock to-morrow morning. She has 300 passengers aboard, including thirty-seven cabin and fifty-four steerage for Victoria. The raw silk cargo stowed in the liner's strong room comprises 4,000 bales.

Mail for Victoria amounts to seventy-one bags, and for Seattle 785 bags. Cargo for Seattle totals 5,000 tons.

### IXION IS BRINGING CZECH TROOPS HERE

Three Thousand Men of Bohemian Force Being Embarked at Vladivostok

Three thousand Czechoslovak soldiers will be transported across the Pacific by the steamship Ixion, and will pass through quarantine at William Head en route from Vladivostok to Bohemia via Canada.

The Ixion is reported to have sailed from Hongkong on Saturday via ports in China and Japan for Vladivostok, where she will embark the Czech troops.

After passing through the William Head station these troops will enroute at Vancouver for the Atlantic coast.

The steamship M. S. Dollar is also reported to be crossing the Pacific with Czech troops aboard.

Agents of the Blue Funnel Line have been advised that Richard D. Holt, principal owner of the great fleets operated under the Blue Funnel houseflag, will arrive in Victoria, May 24, aboard the C. P. O. S. liner Empress of Russia. Mr. Holt is returning to England from the Orient after making a tour of the world.

### COLLEGE STUDENTS WORK CARGO AT SEATTLE WHARVES

Seattle, May 10.—More and larger crews of longshoremen were reported by the Seattle waterfront employers' union to be working to-day on deep sea terminals. Many college students worked Saturday and Sunday and were replaced to-day by fresh non-union men.

### ARABIA FORCED TO TACOMA BY STRIKE

Agents of Japanese Vessel Declined to Have Ship Worked at Seattle

As a result of the strike of longshoremen at Seattle the steamship Arabia Maru, of the Osaka Shosen Kaisha, shifted to Tacoma Saturday to discharge her \$8,000,000 cargo.

There is no strike in Tacoma and Seattle representatives of the Osaka Shosen Kaisha expected the liner to be working cargo soon after her arrival in that port. The vessel put ashore passengers, baggage and mail in Seattle.

The Arabia is the first vessel diverted from Seattle because of the strike. Plenty of men were available for handling the cargo, but representatives of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company, which operates Pier 6 and the Milwaukee Ocean Dock, refused to discharge the liner by using nonunion gangs.

More than 600 nonunion longshoremen were employed on the waterfront Saturday and nearly all the terminals were handling cargo. Approximately 2,000 men are needed to work the waterfront at full speed during normal times.

The first picketing since the strike began was attempted at Pier D when some of the strikers got inside to a number of young men who were handling cargo, in an effort to have them quit work. Guards on the pier ejected the strikers and no delay in handling cargo occurred.

### IRISH SATISFIED AT RESUMPTION OF QUEENSTOWN CALL

Queenstown, May 10.—The resumption of the calls at Queenstown of the Cunard and White Star liners is giving great satisfaction to Irish commercial circles. The outward service from Queenstown opened yesterday. The Cunard Caronia, embarking 220 passengers and 120 sacks of mail, sailed for New York yesterday.

Ottawa, May 10.—Before the end of the month, eight more vessels will have been added to the Canadian Government merchant marine, increasing the number of ships built and actually delivered to thirty-four. By the end of the fiscal year, it is said at the Marine Department, the shipbuilding programme will be practically complete.

### ALGERINE SENT TO SALVE SCOW

Tug Respond Broke Down in Gulf Yesterday and Aided by S.S. Methven

Notified by the Marine Department that a scow was adrift in the Gulf near Active Pass and dangerous to navigation on the regular steamer routes between Victoria and Vancouver, the Pacific Salvage Company this morning dispatched the salvage steamer Algerine to pick up the derelict.

The Victoria tug Respond, owned by Captain W. E. Gardiner, of this city, was in distress off Active Pass yesterday and was taken in tow by the steamship Methven, of the C. P. O. S. fleet, bound up the Gulf from the Orient for Vancouver.

When she broke down yesterday the Respond had a scow in tow, and it is believed that this is the derelict which the Algerine was dispatched to salvage.

### SHIP STEWARDS MAY STRIKE TO-MORROW

Report From Vancouver Says All Companies Will Be Affected

Vancouver, May 10.—A new phase of the strike, which, however, has been expected for some days, is the announcement that the stewards will go on strike at 8 a. m. on Tuesday. 

The ship made a high run of 14.118 knots with an average of 13.3. Mr. R. Pemberton, representative of the department of marine on all construction of ships on this coast, was highly pleased with the trials.

The Canadian Inventor will go to sea shortly with cargo for Australia, under command of Captain A. B. Watson. She will load lumber and charge at Vancouver and lumber at Chemsuana.

On the trials she was navigated by Captain Moody, as pilot, J. Maitland and Superintendent Bates of the Coughlan engineering staff were in charge of the engineering. The passengers on the ship included John Coughlan and Charles Coughlan; T. S. Skinner, representing Kincaid's, who built the engine; George McGowan of Lloyds; Captain W. Wingate, shore superintendent for the C. G. M. M.; Captain Watson, her

master; John Lockhart, general manager of Coughlans; P. Loudon, superintendent engineer for the C. G. M. M.

The Canadian Inventor is an 8,100 d. m. ton ship similar in type to the Canadian Importer and Canadian Exporter now on service on the Australian run. They also were built at Coughlan's and their performance on their maiden voyages have been very satisfactory. Both vessels, though freight carriers, kept railroad schedule in making the run to the Antipodes. Each reached the end of the 7,000-mile voyage within a few hours of the time estimated when they sailed from here.

### RAILWAY LABORERS NOW IN DEMAND

Opening of Summer Hotels Helps the Women Workers

The Employment Service of Canada, Provincial Government Office, corner Langley and Broughton Streets, reports for week ending May 8, that the call for employees out of town still continues. The unfilled vacancies are mostly in logging camps, lumber mills, coal and quartz mines and railroad construction camps. The contractors for the latter work are offering 50¢ per hour and guaranteeing one year's work to the employee.

The local or city situation is improving each week, the demand in this case being mostly for men registered in the building and construction trades.

The Choborg Shipyard have employed in their yard to date 107 employees, sixty-three of whom are returned soldiers and forty-four civilians. Other placements are as follows:

Cultural, placed, 1; building, placed, 5; commercial, placed, 2; domestic and personal, placed, 3; laboring, general, placed, 29; lumbering, placed, 6; metal trades, placed, 1; manufacturing, vehicles, placed, 11; quarrying and mining, placed, 1; shipping, placed, 2; miscellaneous, placed, 1; casual jobs, placed, 23.

**Women's Department.**

The week ending May 8, shows as usual a greater number of vacancies than applicants for work. On the whole the vacancies are in the domestic line, with a considerable demand for waitresses, pantry women, 2nd cooks and kitchen women in the Summer hotels of the Island and Mainland.

The summer hotel work is one which proves attractive to many unencumbered women, and there are still positions available in this work. During the week there were twenty-nine applicants for work, and thirty-eight vacancies registered. Of the twenty-nine applicants for work sixteen were placed in permanent positions.

There are still more good charwomen registered than can be kept busy every day. During the week there were twenty-six idle days reported of which twenty-three were filled in response to twenty-three vacancies reported.

### WINNERS IN "OVERALLS" DANCE POSTER COMPETITION

In connection with the forthcoming dance, which is being given on May 11 in the Lorraine Academy by the Island Arts and Crafts Sketch Club, a poster competition was held. Dr. Hasell, Mr. Bamford and Mr. MacMillan were the judges.

Some twenty posters were submitted, all of a highly artistic order. The competition was divided into two groups, the professional poster competition being won by Wm. Menzies, the well-known poster artist. Four prizes were offered in the amateur competition, the first being won by Mr. McEwan, who submitted a splendid charcoal drawing. The other prize winners were R. C. Stephens, Mr. Lee Yook Tong, the son of Lee Mong Kow, and George Fry.

On the night of the dance the posters will be used as decorations for the hall, and the dance is being given with the chief object of interesting the people of Victoria in the work being carried out by the Sketch Club, with a view to enlivening the classes and stimulating interest in art work generally among the younger people.

The chaperons for the evening will be Mesdames Pemberton, Hasell and Napier.

Tickets can only be obtained through members of the Island Arts and Crafts Club, but as this dance is proving so popular, it will soon be too late to get tickets at all. The young artists of Victoria apparently have fully determined to provide a most interesting and amusing entertainment.

### SOME OWNERS WILL SUFFER BECAUSE OF DATE OF TAX SALE

Feared Many Will Lose Property, As Sale Set Late in the Year

The recent decision of the City Council to hold the annual tax sale on October 5, it has been discovered by the aldermen, is going to have a most serious effect upon certain class of property owners in the city. If the date of the tax sale had been fixed any time before the end of July, however, this result would have been avoided.

It will be recalled that when the Victoria City Relief Act, No. 2, came into effect in 1918, it provided that the ten-year installment plan of payment was to be allowed to people who were in arrear in tax payments up to the end of 1917. It provided, moreover, that, after that date tax sales should be held every year if the Local Improvement Commissioners had finished their readjustment task. However, the final report from the Commissioners was not filed until the Spring of 1919 and, as a result, the Council secured power from the Legislature to extend the time during which people could take advantage of the relief plan to the day before the tax sale of May 28, 1919.

As a result of these negotiations, a large number of property owners who took advantage of the ten-year plan, in order to keep their land out of the tax sale this fall, will have to pay this year the second installment on their arrears, the 1919 general and local improvement taxes. Default in the payment of any of these will mean that the land involved will be sold at the tax sale.

This year's taxes are due July 31. Thus, if the tax sale were held before that time the owners referred to would not be in default on their 1920 taxes. Under the present arrangement, however, it is feared that the necessity of paying all three charges will force a number of owners to allow their land to go into the sale.

**Effect of Situation**

The time during which land sold at last year's sale can be redeemed by its owners will be over on July 31. As a matter of fact, as the tax sale was spread over one month, and as redemptions may be made during a year, the redemption period will end in the case of some properties long before the end of July. The tax sale started on May 28, so that some land will belong definitely to new owners, to the city even, on that day.

At the recent session of the Legislature, the city secured permission to enforce a system of tax discounts in order to encourage early payment of taxes. The Council has not decided yet, however, to put these into

### TWO VICTORIANS HEADED CONTEST

Staff-Sergt. Read and Major Fred Richardson, O.B.E., will be the British Columbia representatives to shoot for places on the Canadian team which will be sent to Bisley this year. The elimination contest was held at the Richmond ranges, Lulu Island, on Saturday. First place was won by Staff-Sergt. Read and Major Richardson was the runner-up. Both are Victorians.

The conditions of the shoot were seven rounds at the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges in the morning, and ten rounds at the same ranges in the afternoon with S.M. Lee-Endfields and open sights, as in service practice.

**Ten Bullseyes.**

Major Blair, of Vancouver, had a good lead at the 200 and 500-yard ranges, scoring 33 and 21 respectively, but failed to hold the first position at the 600-yard range. Major Richardson, who was nine points behind, overtook and led the field. He made no less than ten consecutive bullseyes at the 600 yards, a splendid performance, which gave him a lead of one point over Blair and four-points over Read.

"The afternoon provided plenty of excitement. Staff-Sergt. Read gradually forged ahead and nosed out Major Richardson, thus capturing first place. The final result was: Staff-Sergt. Read, 219; Victoria, Lieut. Smiler, 215; Vancouver. Major Blair, 214; Vancouver.

The scoring was of a very high order, with open sights. Almost any of above totals would have won first place in any aggregate last year at Bisley.



**LAST YEAR BUSIEST IN HOME'S HISTORY**

Mrs. W. L. Clay was re-elected President of the Committee of the Home for Aged and Infirm Women at the annual meeting of the Home. Other officers elected were as follows: First vice-president, Mrs. Vincent; honorary president, Mrs. H. Carne; Mrs. Helen Grant, who has so capably filled the office of secretary-treasurer for several years, declined re-election on account of health and Mrs. A. D. Whittier was elected to fill the office. The members of the committee are Mrs. Gould, Mrs. Kinney, Mrs. Helen Grant, Miss O'Brien, Mrs. Leiser and Mrs. Harold Grant. It was with deep regret that the committee accepted the resignation of Mrs. McTavish, one of the oldest members, who has been compelled to retire on account of her health.

Donations to the Home for April included the following: Papers, Mrs. Bruce; gramophone record, Mrs. Harold Grant; cut flowers, Mrs. W. Grant; tuning piano, Percy Cox.

**President's Report.**  
Mrs. Clay, the president, presented the following annual report:

**More Accommodation Needed.**  
"The year through which we have passed, with its world-wide unrest, has not left our Home, its staff, or its Committee of Management untouched by, at least, the spray of the surging disquiet. We have had our own anxieties, but through them all we have come without serious mishap.

The Home has been fuller this year than in any previous period of its existence. This necessitated, of course, additions to our staff, and the increased cost of every commodity purchased made necessary a corresponding increase in the salary of everyone of our employees and put an unusual strain on our financial resources, but partly by means of an increase in our rate the balance sheet of our treasurer will show that our financial standing is unimpaired.

With a number of women applying for admission to the Home and our capacity taken up, the Committee must see, not very far ahead, the serious problem of adding to our accommodation.

The Committee is fortunate in being able to retain the services of Miss Waldron, our efficient matron. Her work, always trying and exacting, has been rendered doubly so this year by the difficulty of securing competent help. At present our staff is complete and I am glad to say the members of it are giving satisfactory service.

tee who know the complexity of the matron's duties and the incessant demands made upon her strength, skill and patience by the care of so large a number of elderly women, she has sympathy and support in her arduous task; but I may be permitted to request those not so well acquainted with affairs in the Home to be good enough to judge the efforts of all who serve the institution and its inmates in the light of full knowledge and of that patient remembrance of what our loved ones demand of us.

Recently the Home was made the subject of a mild criticism in the public press. The strictures, while not severe, were evidently based on imperfect knowledge; and the secretary, through the same medium, answered the attack. Moreover, the Committee invited certain ladies who had voiced similar criticisms to come to the Home and by making their complaints to the full Committee, help us to rectify any condition that needed improvement. Two accepted our invitation and mentioned only one specific case of seeming neglect, which on investigation was found to be baseless.

**Open to Visitors.**

We are painfully aware that some matters in the Home are capable of improvement. What private homes of even the usual membership has reached the stage where improvement is impossible? The members are anxious that every comfort and happiness may be theirs, and their elder sisters. For this purpose alone the Committee exists. The Home is open to visitors at all reasonable hours. We invite all interested to avail themselves of this privilege, not only of seeing the building and its equipment, but especially of brightening the lives of those who, after all possible help, are bereft of them, have not too much of life's sunshine. Intelligent criticism and kindly suggestion will always be gladly received.

Our thanks are due to many kind friends in town and country who, as in past years, have generously aided us in our work.

The secretary's report is as follows:

During the year twenty-four entered the Home. Several stayed only a few months, some to recuperate after illness, others for a short time while their very kind friends were having holidays. The total number cared for during the year was eighty-two. The greatest number at any time being sixty-one, when the Home was filled to its capacity. The average per month was fifty-six. Within the twelve months there were seven deaths of inmates who had been sick for a long time prior to their decease.

**Personnel of Committee.**

The committee remains the same as last year, except for the addition of Miss O'Brien, who represents the Roman Catholic Church in place of the late Miss McDowell. The committee at present is composed of eleven ladies representing the different religious denominations. It meets the first Tuesday of every month at the Home. A committee of three, who serve for three months at a time, one retiring every month and another taking her place, have the management of the Home during the month. Twelve regular meetings have been held during the year, all of which have been well attended. All applications for admission should be made to the secretary-treasurer.

**Services and Entertainments.**

The usual services have been carried on by the Ministerial Association and Salvation Army. These services have been well attended and much enjoyed. The Young Peoples' Societies of the First Baptist, the Emmanuel Baptist, First Presbyterian, First Congregational, Metropolitan Methodist Churches, and the Girl's Club, have given entertainments from time to time, which have been much appreciated and have afforded the inmates a great deal of pleasure. During the Prince's stay in the city he very kindly paid a visit to the Home when he learned that there were a number of old ladies there who were very anxious to see him, and who were not able to get out. Needless to say, his visit was much appreciated.

In conclusion I would emphasize the fact that the Home is an incorporated institution, and that it is not in receipt of any public grant, but is dependent for maintenance on the board money received from the inmates.

The thanks of the committee are gratefully tendered to the many kind friends, who have in various ways remembered the Home, and have brought cheer and comfort to the sick and suffering.
