# COVERING THE BADGERS

**PRESS ROW:** Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse.

**WORKING TICKETS:** All requests for Press Row tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Gate 2. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

**RADIO:** Each station admitted for broadcasting will be issued three tickets. Radio facilities are located in the second balcony of the west side. Tickets are mailed upon acceptance. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports Information Office, or from the Press Will Call window.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Floor passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers. Photographers may work from either the north or south ends and the west side of the court.

**PARKING:** A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

**PLAYER INTERVIEWS:** Media representatives may interview Badger players in the dressing room fifteen minutes after each game. Players also are available for interviews or pictures on Monday and Friday. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office. Suggested time for appointments are 2:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

**COACHES INTERVIEWS:** Bill Cofield will meet with media representatives following each game after a short cooling off period. Meeting room will be the Reinke Room located at the north end of the fieldhouse. Best time to interview Coach Cofield on a daily basis is from 2:30 to 3:15 p.m. daily in his office (in person or by telephone), and following practice each day.

**YOUR HOSTS** in Wisconsin Fieldhouse and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

**Jim Mott** is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

**Jim** is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William 15**, **David 12**, and **Eric 10**.

**Bob Leu** joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

**Bob** is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films, does color commentary on the Badger hockey broadcasts, and is the producer-host of Badger Football which is seen each season on the state's public television stations.

## Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program



**Elroy Hirsch**

Elroy Hirsch is in his ninth year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969, and his original appointment as athletic director, slated to end in 1979, was extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984.

Professor **Frederick W. Haberman**, athletic board chairman, points out, **"Elroy richly merits our confidence. His dynamic personality has infused our entire operation with that indefinable quality we usually call spirit. He has heightened the total consciousness of the state and of our alumni throughout the country. He's taken the role of the leader."**

Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basket-

ball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had an highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

**Elroy** and his wife **Ruth** are the parents of a son **Win Stephen** 27, and **Patricia Caroline** 19.

## HEAD COACH BILL COFIELD

William L. "Bill" Cofield, a 37-year-old native of Carrier Mills, Ill., was named the head basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin on March 16, 1976.

Bill had been the assistant coach under Terry Holland at the University of Virginia for two years prior to accepting the position at Wisconsin. Virginia was the Atlantic Coast Conference representative to the 1976 NCAA tournament.

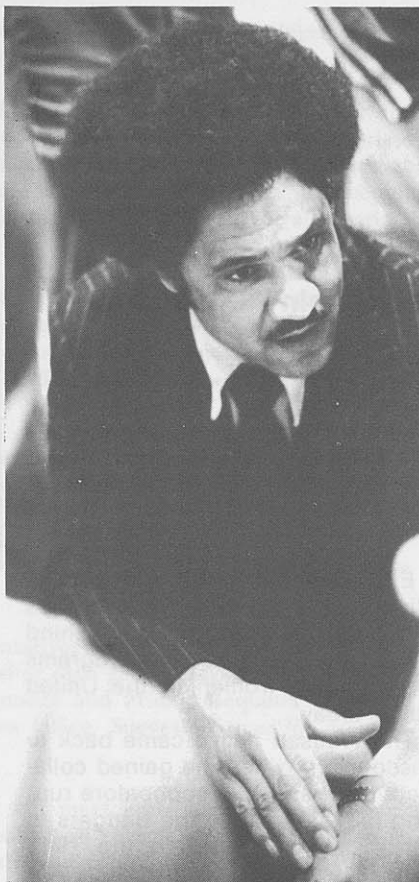
Cofield played his college basketball at Casper Junior College in Wyoming, and later at McKendree College in Lebanon, Ill. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in physical education from McKendree in 1963, and a master's degree, also in physical education from the University of Kentucky in 1967.

Bill began his coaching career at H.E. Davis Junior High School in Cleveland, O. in 1963. After two seasons there, he moved to the head coaching position at Cleveland East-Technical High School where his team posted a 20-1 record in 1965-66.

The following year Cofield entered the college ranks as an assistant coach at Kentucky State College. In 1967, he became the head coach at Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. His teams at Lincoln finished 19-3 and 19-9, winning conference championships and earning NAIA berths in both 1967-68 and 1968-69. The '68-'69 squad placed second in the NAIA tournament.

At the start of the 1969-70 season, Bill moved to Prairie View A & M where he compiled a four-year record of 57-48. His 1972-73 team finished with a 19-8 record, good for second place in the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

In 1973 Cofield became the nation's first black athletic director and head coach at a predominantly white institution of higher learning when he accepted both positions at the College of Racine.



He left Racine after the 1974 season when the school went out of business, and joined the staff at Virginia.

Bill and his wife Shirлие are the parents of three daughters, Kimberly 16, Staci 15, Kena 13, and a son Clay 12.

## Meet the Staff

### ASSISTANT COACH WILLIAM "BO" RYAN

On the same day that Coach Cofield accepted the head coaching position at Wisconsin, he named William "Bo" Ryan of Chester, Pa. as one of his assistants. Bo will be coaching the guards for the Badgers.

The 29-year-old Ryan, who at the time was the basketball coach at Sun Valley High School in Sun Valley, Pa., had previously worked as an assistant to Cofield at the College of Racine in 1973-74.

Bo was a high-scoring guard for Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., for four years, where he was captain and MVP his senior year. Bo still holds two records at Wilkes, most points scored in a conference game (43) and most field goals in a single game (18). Coach Ryan graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1969. He has done post-graduate work at Villanova.

In 1975 Ryan was named Delaware County Coach of the Year as he guided his Sun Valley team to a 15-7 record and a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban 2 League, despite having no starter over 6-1. That second-place finish qualified Sun Valley for the State tournament for the first time ever.

Bo and his wife Kelly are parents of a two year-old daughter Megan.



### ASSISTANT COACH LARRY REED

Larry Reed, former star player at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee, also joined the Badger staff in March of 1976, from the front office of the Milwaukee Bucks of the NBA. Larry's primary responsibility is that of coaching the forwards and centers at Wisconsin.

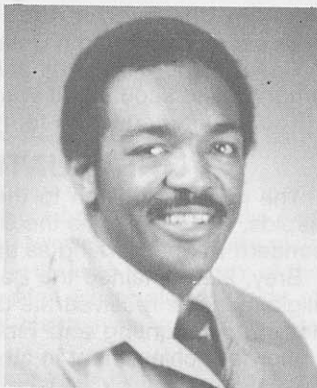
The 37-year-old Reed is a 1957 graduate of Milwaukee Lincoln High School where he starred in football, basketball, and baseball, winning nine letters; and a graduate of UW-Milwaukee with a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Welfare in 1967. He received a Master of Science degree in Social Work in 1969 from UW-Milwaukee.

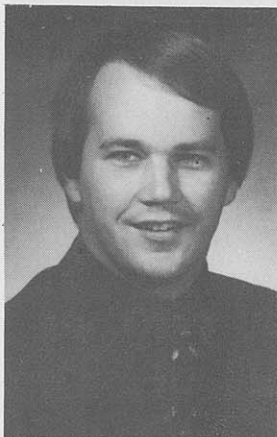
Larry's collegiate career, which began in 1957 was interrupted by service in the U.S. Air Force where he was three times named to the all-Air Force team. He returned to UW-M in 1964, and by the time his career ended in 1967, he had established himself as the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder.

He served as an assistant coach at UW-M for two-years following graduation, and joined the Bucks organization in 1970. That year Reed coached the Milwaukee Muskies, a Buck farm team, to the Continental League title.

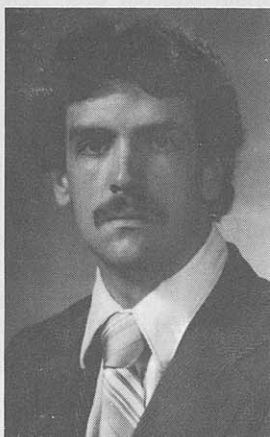

Larry and his wife Sharon are the parents of three sons; Larry, Jr., 15, Darrell, 13, Damian 3, and a daughter Terri, 11.

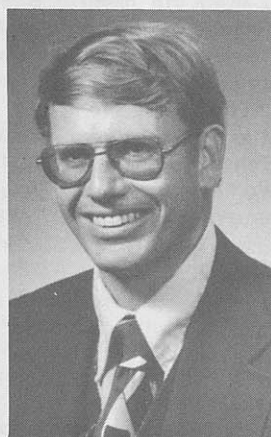

### **ASSISTANT COACH TODD LANDRUM**

The youngest assistant on Coach Cofield's staff is Todd Landrum, a part time assistant from Cuyahoga Falls, O. Landrum, 26, came to the Badgers from the University of Delaware, where he served as a graduate assistant for two seasons.

Todd received his undergraduate degree in physical education from Ohio Northern University in Ada, O., in 1973. He earned his master's degree in physical education from Delaware in 1976.

Coach Landrum is primarily responsible for handling the Varsity Reserve program and scouting at Wisconsin.

Todd is married to the former Brenda Emmelhainz of Columbus, O.

### **GRADUATE ASSISTANT PETE BREY**

The newest addition to the staff at Wisconsin is Pete Brey, of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis. Pete joins the Badger staff as a graduate assistant. Pete's main concern will be working as an assistant to the Varsity Reserve program.

Brey, 22, captained the Badgers last season, completing his four years of eligibility. Pete received his undergraduate degree from the School of Business in Accounting and Finance. He received the 1977 Big Ten Medal of Honor for achievement in athletics and academics.

### **TRAINER BRAD SHERMAN**

Brad Sherman is a native of Chippewa Falls, Wis., and is starting his sixth year on the Badger training staff.

The 34-year-old Sherman is a 1966 graduate of UW-Eau Claire and coached football, basketball, and track at Wild Rose, Whitehall and Wautoma before coming to Wisconsin in 1971.

Brad served as head trainer at North Central College during the 1966 football season before starting his high school coaching career. Brad is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association.

He and his wife Jean are the parents of two sons Paul 7, and Eric 2, and a daughter Amy, 6.



## WELCOME TO THE BIG TEN

Big Ten basketball year in and year out is considered one of the finest conferences in the nation. *Basketball Weekly* rated the Big Ten the strongest conference in the country ahead of the Southeastern, the Atlantic Coast, the Pacific Eight, and the Metro Seven conferences. Many experts feel the best competition is in the Big Ten.

The Big Ten has appeared as a member of the "Final Four" at the NCAA Tournament more times than any other conference in making 23 appearances in the last 38 years (the modern era). They have been NCAA champions on five occasions, placing runner-up seven times, finished third on nine occasions and fourth twice. The best showing the conference has made came in 1976 when Indiana defeated Michigan 86-68 for the championship. Another statistic reflecting the prominence of Big Ten basketball is in the wire service polls where there has been a representative in the top ten in eight of the past nine seasons. Indiana in 1976 and Michigan in 1977 both ended the season as the nation's number one team.

Individually the Big Ten has produced more than its share of the top players of the NBA. Since 1970, the NBA has drafted more players from the Big Ten than any other conference in the nation. Beginning in 1955, a Big Ten player has failed to make the consensus All-America team only three times in 1967, 1968, and 1971. Such standout performers include Jerry Lucas, Larry Siegfried, and John Havlicek from Ohio State. Walt Bellamy, George McGinnis, Scott May, and Kent Benson all played their collegiate ball at Indiana. Michigan's members came in more recent years with players like Cazzie Russell, Henry Wilmore, Campy Russell, and Phil Hubbard. Purdue also has been represented in the past fifteen years with such players as Terry Dischinger, Dave Schellhase, and Rick Mount. These are just a few of the names that have found success in both the Big Ten and the professional ranks.

The caliber of basketball has not diminished by looking to last year's schedule ratings. *Basketball Weekly* yearly rates the schedules of every major school on the caliber of competition they play. During the 1976-77 season the Big Ten had six members of the top thirteen schools with the toughest schedules. Purdue ranked second in the nation behind Vanderbilt, with Northwestern fourth, Wisconsin sixth, Michigan State tenth, Indiana eleventh, and Illinois thirteenth.

The prominence of the Big Ten was evident in the type of recruiting done in the conference. The Big Ten rated six of the top twelve schools as having the best recruiting years in the nation. The conference landed twelve of the top forty players. This was the biggest sweep by one conference in the nine year history of the *Roanoke Times* and *World-News* survey of the top high school players. Eight of the ten schools landed at least one of the top forty players with only Minnesota and Northwestern left out.

Some of the top players to watch over the next four years include Kenny Page and Herb Williams both going to Ohio State. Ray Tolbert will join Bobby Knight at Indiana. Mike McGee will enroll at Michigan. Wes Matthews and Larry Petty enter a young Wisconsin team. Michigan State will have Earvin Johnson at the forward. Illinois, who rounds out the top twelve brings in Eddie Johnson. With this recruiting year and the players who have graduated from the conference the Big Ten should remain a strong power on the collegiate basketball scene for many years to come.

## HISTORY OF THE WISCONSIN FIELD HOUSE

The Wisconsin Field House was a project of Athletic Director George Little when he arrived in 1925. That project became a reality in 1930.

In 1927, Little proposed to the athletic council and regents the plan under which the field house was to be built. Two previous drives had failed; one of these had been put through the legislature only to be killed by the veto of Governor Zimmerman.

The original plans had contemplated a \$650,000 building to house both the indoor training of the intercollegiate teams and the required program of physical education. In that plan, the portion to be used for intercollegiate athletics was to have cost \$385,000.

That part of the original plan is represented in the present field house, but was to cost somewhat more. The actual cost was finally \$434,000 with construction to be completed in September of 1931.

The structure would be a part of the stadium, standing at the south end of the field, with concrete stands built against its north wall. The field house contained a basketball floor with a seating capacity of 12,000, complete track facilities, and room for indoor football and baseball work.

In April of 1976, the state Building Commission approved \$718,000 for the renovation of the field house. The project was aimed mainly at improving the seating quality. Permanent bleachers were added to the north, south and west sides of the court, with portable seats on the east side. This brought the seating capacity of the field house to 12,204. New locker rooms and a training facility were constructed under the west bleachers, and with the renovating of the existing locker rooms serve to make the Wisconsin facility one of the best in the Big Ten.



## 1977-78 WISCONSIN BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

A solid nucleus of eight returning lettermen plus the influx of some of the nation's finest talent as freshmen bring a sparkle to **Coach Bill Cofield's** eyes as he embarks on Season Two as Wisconsin's Head Basketball Coach.

The Badgers were 9-18 overall in 1976-77 and placed in an 8th place tie in the final Big Ten standings at 5-13.

Make no doubt about it, though — the Badgers were competitive last year as they played a total of 20 games decided by ten points or less, winning eight of them, losing twelve. For example, the Badgers lost to Big Ten champion Michigan by three points at Ann Arbor, by five points in the game at Madison.

Three freshman starters from 1976-77 who placed among the Big Ten's top 30 scorers — **James 'Stretch' Gregory**, a 6-8 forward; **Joe Chnelich**, a 6-7 forward; and **Arnold 'Clyde' Gaines**, a 6-4 guard — return for their sophomore campaign.

**Gregory** was Wisconsin's top scorer and rebounder last year with 15.9 points and 10.0 rebounds per game. He was 12th in Big Ten scoring (17.3) and fourth in rebounding at 9.7 per game.

**Chnelich** ranked third in team scoring and second in rebounding with 11.9 points and 8.8 rebounds while placing 25th in Big Ten scoring (10.4) and 7th in rebounding (8.4). He shot .511 from the floor in conference play and .537 for the entire schedule.

**Gaines** improved immensely over the course of the 1976-77 season and ranked 30th in Big Ten scoring at 9.4 points per game. He ranked 4th on the team with an 8.1 per game average.

Seniors **James Smith**, 1977-78 team captain and **Bill Pearson**, a 6-8 forward along with **Dean Anderson**, **Mark Newburg**, and **Ray Sydnor** are other returning lettermen.

**Pearson** averaged 6.6 points and 4.8 rebounds mainly in reserve roles last year while **Smith**, a fine scorer from outside, averaged 5.9 points per game.

**Sydnor** reported late a year ago from the football team and stepped in at center to start 13 games, score 5.3 points per game and average 5.7 rebounds.

Wisconsin's incoming freshman talent lists three of the nation's top 105 players including **Wesley Matthews**, a 6-2 guard from Bridgeport, CN.; **Larry Petty**, a 6-9 center from New York City's Power Memorial Academy; and **Claude Gregory**, a 6-8 forward, who is the younger brother of James 'Stretch' Gregory.

Freshman guards **Dan Hastings**, 6-4, Drexel Hill, Pa.; **Skip Jackson**, 6-5, Long Island, N.Y.; and **Darnell Reid**, Bridgeport, CN.; complete the list of newcomers.
