

NEW YELLOW ASTER.

THE form of the double flower is a perfect ball, the quills are close together and of the brightest sulphur yellow. The border petals are broad and of a lighter tint, seeming to enclose the flower like an old-fashioned bouquet paper. The flowers are borne upon long erect stems, excellent for cutting. The plants, twelve or fifteen inches high, are of compact, bushy growth, and most abundant bloomers. Pkt. 6c.

NEW WHITE BRANCHING ASTER.

THE large, double white flowers, quite four inches in diameter, are borne upon long stems, making them excellent for cutting. 

Branches cut and dried retain their rich and brilliant color, and make most beautiful winter bouquets when used with dried grasses or leaves. The plant grows from one and one-half to two feet in height. Treated like a Tomato, it grows and fruits freely from seed the first season, yet the plants are perennial, and may be wintered in the cellar or grown in pots as a window plant. Pkt. 4c.

CYPRESS VINE.

A most beautiful vine with delicate fern-like foliage and beautiful star-shaped rose, scarlet and white flowers. Seed very slow to start growth, though easily grown. All colors mixed. Pkt. 3c.

CENTAUREA-New Marguerite-Odorata.

N exceedingly novel and beautiful flower, at first sight resembling a highly-fringed carnation, but closer examination discloses the outer petals composed of a dozen or more distinct little fringed cups closely set together and raised above a full tasseled and fringed center. Each flower is enthroned on a beautiful green calvx penciled much like a pineapple, giving it an odd, pretty appearance. Stems long and strong. A free bloomer, the plants being almost covered with these rare flowers from July until late in the autumn, giving out the daintiest perfume imaginable. It must be seen to be appreciated, and once you have had it in your garden you will not want to be without it. Flowers are white, light lemon yellow and violet rose. Leaves long, slender and serrated. Pkt. 6c.

CANNAS-Paris Exposition.

NE of the most popular of bedding plants, while even single specimens are most attractive in the garden. They will bloom the first year from seed, if you soak them in boiling water over night; sow singly in small pots as soon as conven-

ient, and grow as rapidly as possible. The roots can be kept in the cellar over winter and each clump will give six to eight good roots for planting out the following spring. Pkt. 5c.



CALENDULA.

THE name of this flower is derived from the fact that it will bloom every calendar month of the year. If seed is sown early in the open ground, plants will be in bloom by June, and will blossom continuously

until severe frosts. It is also a very fine pot plant, and for winter, especially for cold rooms; its large, double bloom is always welcome. Finest mixed colors. Pkt. 3c.

CLEOME-Pungens. (THE GIANT SPIDER PLANT.)

A robust plant growing vigorously four to five feet high, unaffected by wind or weather, and flowering profusely and continuously for months. HOW TO DRY AND PRESS PANSIES.

TO dry flowers, place them in a large, shallow pan or box and sift over them gently the finest, driest sand, giving them a bed of this sand at first, of course. By sifting it over very gradually and carefully, the sand atoms will slowly form about the flower, which, because of the gradual drifting about and piling up of the atoms, keeps the shape even to the most delicate curving. After the flowers are all well covered from sight, keep the pan or box exposed to a gentle heat for some days, after which it is left to cool slowly, and the flowers, ferns, grasses, etc., thus treated are found to have kept

their natural forms, and with very little perceptible difference in color. This is an old German method and one that is most successful. You can also press the blossoms between clean blotting paper if you are careful in smoothing out the petals so there will be no creases or wrinkles, but it is advisable to place oiled tissue paper over the face of the blossom.
