TO OUR PATRONS.

The town of East San Jose having incorporated and desiring to have a paper we have undertaken to furnish them one, realizing that it is a much more extensive field. So far we have met with splendid encouragement.

For some year or more the PRESS has had very little support from our business men, with but two or three exceptions, and it is to their support with the addition of the San Jose and foreign advertising that we have been enabled to issue a paper at all. We have given as good a paper as the town would support. It is needless to say that at times it has been run at a loss—that is patent to anyone familiar with the business. But a sentiment for the town and a hope that a revival of business would push Campbell ahead, we have been content to sacrifice if need be. The defeat of the incorporation movement was a severe blow to the town as is now realized by many of the merchants and instead of keeping pace with the sister towns, we have been content to drift along with the current—down stream.

This paper will be published as usual, but the bulk of our plant

has been removed to East San Jose, where we have formed a partnership with L. C. Dick and putting two plants together are better prepared to do all kinds of work than heretofore.

The PRESS will continue to do its share in the work of advancing the interests of the town, and we feel that the present arrangement will make it possible for us to better do this. As to whether we will maintain a regular office in Campbell will probably be known so that announcement can be made next week. If you have any news for the paper or desire information, phone to Mrs. Hurlbert, or to Hurlbert & Dick, phone John 1071. We will also be around Campbell evenings and thereby keep in touch with matters.

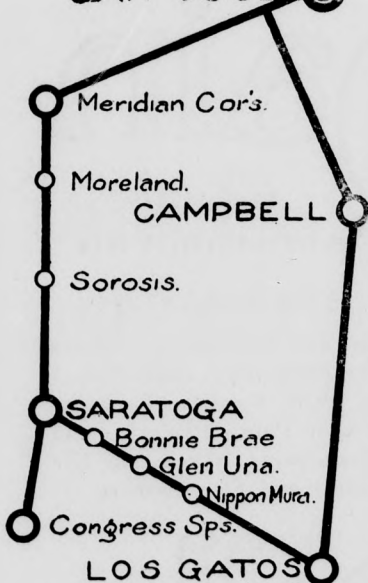
