of Captain Beaton at Danganan lodged in that Court,
for saving the hides - and until the decision is given (which is expected next month), no correct statement can
be made out - but the probable net proceeds of the cargo
to come to your credit may be stated at £5300.

Had the cargo arrived safe, it would not
have amounted to nearly that sum - the price of hides
having fallen so very much notwithstanding the
limited import of the blockade of the River Plate
continues, much longer it must have a small effect





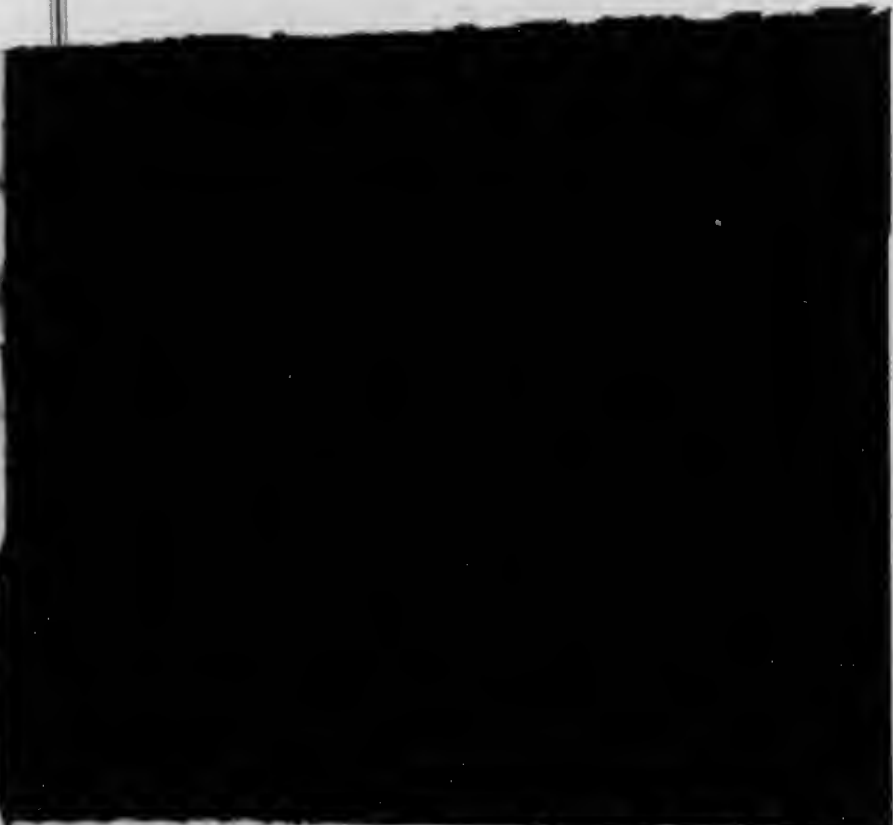

The inconvenience I have myself experienced at San Francisco from the want of some Government Agent to provide for the necessities of the ship under my command, and interest himself in the negociation of the several Bills we have had occasion to draw on His Majesty's Government would alone I trust be thought sufficient reason for my addressing you on the present occasion, but I am the further induced to do so from having found on my arrival at Monterey that much inconvenience and loss has occurred to some British Ship owners in consequence of the want of some person of authority to whom they could appeal and in whose hands they could lodge their case.

The trade of the Pacific is now becoming much extensive, and British Merchants, Vessels & Whalers constantly visit both the ports of Monterey and San Francisco; their

Seamen occasionally quit their ships and are left behind and some have become obnoxious to the Mexican Government in these Ports; all of which call for an appointment of some agent such as a Vice Consul, whose principal residence should be Monterey; and I am encouraged in my recommendation of the subject to your notice from having found Mr. Hartwell, a partner of the very respectable house of Begg & Co. at Lima, and resident at Monterey, a person willing to take upon himself the duties of the appointment without any salary being attached to it; this gentleman has already been of great assistance to me in forwarding the service I am engaged upon and procuring several supplies which the Ship stood in immediate need of, and is entitled to my public thanks for so doing; But had he held the situation I hope to see established ere long so much to the mercantile interest of these Ports, much expence would have been saved His Majesty's Government and the Blossom would

have departed with fewer demands unsatisfied



be drawn by the glass tube fitted for the pur-

on being first applied the glass ought to be first
used to draw out a little milk when it will
either continue to flow of itself or be readily
obtained without pain by the child. -

If inflammation of the breasts should come on,
cotton clothes clipped in a wash made of equal
parts of the Spiritus Mindererens & water kept

great care being taken to wash away every
particle of the wash with a little tepid milk or
water before the child be permitted to suck. —

We have heard, with much concern, a report that the Mexican Government have ordered the departure of all foreigners from their coast, excepting such as have special permission to remain there. If this be true, it will soon contain the source of much uneasiness to you until you can receive an answer from the Capital. And my hope is that they will be sufficiently alive to their own interest to allow you to await that period.

It has been rumored that the order does not emanate from the Capital, but from some minor authority & answer some particular interest; of this you will of course have the best information: and I so hope you will not fail hereafter to represent to the Minister incommunicated you may have suffered in consequence. ~~of~~ If it comes from Headquarters

There must be doubtless something at the back of it
with which we are unacquainted - as it almost implies
a declaration of war between the two Powers -

We have had papers up to the middle of August
last. which state that the country & commercial
interests are improving and the Banking houses
extricating themselves from the difficulties they
had been suddenly plunged into by the singular
speculations that had ^{been} made, and that the Bank of
England was exerting itself to its utmost to assist
them. But the markets were still very bad indeed.
Liverpool & Manchester ~~were~~ ^{had suffered} very considerably.

They contain no other news, the country was quiet
and there was little going forward anywhere, except
in the Mediterranean with the Greeks - You are aware
of their having been joined by Lord Cochrane; who has
written a letter to Ali Pasha of Egypt to with a view to

advantages that would accrue to them if he did so, and

The general news I have not time to touch upon but have requested Mr Park to give you the news & tell you what is going on at Oahu, what I came out here in. &c. he may forget to tell you how long I was getting here. but that I will do myself for I can boast of making the longest passage of any vessel that ever came ~~came~~ out here from America I was nine months & one day - during that time I anchored in twenty one different ports & harbours & spent four months South of 52° South Lat. which includes the three winter months. I had a verry happy time at home I spent near seven months there traveling a part of the time & among other places I called on Mr Childs at Lynn. & saw him several times during my stay at home. he feels interested in your welfare & enquired much after you. I likewise became acquainted with your old friend Capt Dorr. who enquired much after you. when I got home I had a

a favourable settlement with the *Thuddeus* concern. they paid me every dollar I demanded & even more. (I no thank) to our friend Capt Blanchard who was at home at the time. Capt B's Character has become known at home & he had to refund a few hundred dollars to the owners while I was at home) the voyage was settled up & the share's paid out as far as the funds had got home, the ballance due the concern at the islands is the same as when I left for home (806 Piculs)

All the complaint I heard of you ^{at home} was, that you did not write enough & when you did, you did not give particulars

I have heard from you several times lately, and am very sorry to learn that you have met with difficulty in settling with your late employers. but, that you may get through with this difficulty & prosper in all your undertakings is the wish of your friend &

Since I last had this pleasure

I have to acknowledge receipt of your esteemed favour of
Decr. 17/25, July 7 & August 24/26 the contents of which
have my particular attention & I observe, what you men-
tion respecting the sailing concern in your favor of Decr. 17/25
and in that of July 7, that you have done your utmost to enter in this
place & certainly approve of, for from all appearances it was likely
to turn out to be an expensive establishment and no great hopes
of much profit resulting from it & Some time since I gave orders
to make 4 pairs steel yards for you, but my brother (who was making
them) was taken unwell before they were finished, and obliged to go
to Philadelphia for the benefit of his health but should he not return
in time to finish them before the next opportunity, I shall try

and get some other person capable of doing so. and shall forward them to you by next vessel. I am sorry to observe that poor Capt. Smith's thread of life has been cut for he was as very useful a Captain as Mr. Pegg has written you respecting Mr. Lewis coming up in the Aurora.

From the manner in which I am employed here I have no prospect at present of having it in my power to take a voyage to California. The winding up of the late concerns of John Driscoll & Hugh M. Bulloch & Co whose affairs turn out to be any thing but flashy engrosses all my time and attention, and except when the affairs of the Californian establishment require them and then you will never find me absent from my post. I may safely say that, between one thing or another, no one in the two Americas is more troubled and bothered with the cares and concerns of this life than what I have been for the last 10 months and am likely to be for 8 or 10 months to come. The cares and anxieties of the last 10 months have literally made an old man of me before my youth is half finished.

You will find by the Account Sales of the Eliza & Izarr's cargoes that all that I have done has been "sully free" and handled I suppose will never answer to be sent here as they are now subject to an importation duty of Eighty P Cent. The Otter Skin Baskets Bows and arrows received all right and return you many thanks for the same. You will receive by this conveyance the Glass shafts for two Malabar (which you will find charged in the Invoice herewith) and a Mamadera for your "better half" I am sorry that I have not been able to procure a pair of Stays, but I understand that there is a vessel on her way from England which has got stays i.e. Ladies stays on board: should such be the case I shall send them by next opportunity: the stays which I formerly sent were fallen in with by the merest accident as the Pencils de Miniatura and Piedras de Poudre cannot be replaced and the Spanish Writhe were entrusted to Mr. Logan and I am not sure whether he has purchased it & sent it or not. 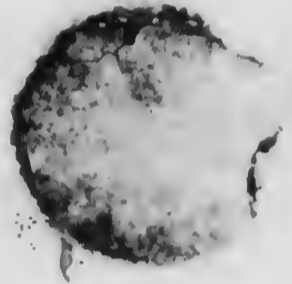

If you have collected any information respecting the Thaddeus voyage to Norfolk Sound, that will be for the interest of the owners. I

I think Mr Charles Thatcher, or Isaac Hall
will be glad to have you send them the partic-
-ulars. They are the agents for the concern, & I think
they will pay a proper attention to what you
may have to say on the subject, or, if you do not

I had this pleasure of the Aurora and cannot since acknowledge receipt of any of your esteemed favours. This goes to your quarter by the Brig Paradise of Ham-
burgh, sent down to your coast on account of Mr. Anderson.

You will receive herewith a Parcel of Newspapers both English & Peruvian, and by this opportunity a parcel of letters from Messrs. Ino & Begg & Co., Messrs. I. B. & Co. advise you in their letter of the 11th of Curra, to arrive, having been sold at 12 £ on board, and if you can lay in Sallow at a low rate, which I have no doubt you can at present, you need be under no apprehension of my being able to dispose of it here at the best market price, which, altho' there is a very considerable stock in the market at present, I have no immediate fears of materially declining for some considerable time to come and I. B. & Co. give you their prospects of the Hide market, with the latest quotations of that Article from England; certainly,

in this Branch of the Business, should the present hostilities between the Buenos-Ayrians and the Brazilians be shortly brought to a close, the prospects before us are not of the most flattering description, for upon the opening of the trade with Buenos-Ayres, the produce of that country, which is now collected there, and which will naturally flow into the English markets, must be immense and must greatly depress the price of Hides in those markets. J. D. H. also mention in their letter that they expect to send you the "Alice" in lieu of the "Rob Roy" which has been wrecked at Valparaiso, but from what the Captain of that Vessel has told me himself, I have strong reasons for suspecting that he will not consent to go down to your Coast; however there are plenty of good Vessels here at present, which will very gladly seize upon such an opportunity to get themselves employed. By this opportunity I would have sent you the Stays I wrote you of in my last, but the "Earl of Wellington" the Vessel in which they were coming from England has never since been heard of, and strong fears are entertained that she has foundered at sea and that all on board have perished. I shall be on the look out and if

I can encounter any, I shall certainly lay hold of them. I forward them to you by the earliest opportunity.

Expecting to have the pleasure of hearing fully from you by the Aurora and begging my respects to Mrs. Hartnell

The Emperor was about rejoining his Army at Rio Grande with a considerable reinforcement and would take the field in person - The Army of Buenos Ayres is represented to have diminished much by desertion and the separation of the provinces and the Gov^t is incapable of applying any remedy - To all appearances the war cannot last much longer and we do not think the Laura Barge will do more than save itself - when the Cordillera opens large parcels of tallow are expected from Mendoza which is superior in quality to that of California, and as the duty will be reduced to a dollar & 75¢ it can be imported on better terms than from your quarter - the price at which tallow has ruled the last two years is far above its natural value and in the ordinary course of

trade it must come down. The Stock of hides at home have increased although

I have been obliged to sell five hundred hides to the American Brig Andes at two dollars for the purpose of paying Pacheco one thousand which he demanded immediately after you left. Burke has also been hunting after me like a hungry dog as he is to be married in a few days to Manuel Cotas Aulo wife. This young man certainly has a sweet taste.

One of the Sowers we engaged went away on board of a vessel. I have just got a beginning made with the other one and black Jack, but have the promise of another man who understands something of the business. I have planted about seventy trees in

the Garden that was all we could get from the Solidad but as soon as I can pass the river will try San Johns for more, there is very little communication with any of the Missions owing to so much rain, really this year looks something like twenty four.

The General has left for Santa Barbara Macaco also, but his family is still here. Dr. Mariano is Comandante. There is no accounts from Mallaven the Brute never writes his wife.

There is two new Padres arrived in this quarter the one has taken charge of San Johns, the other the Cruz Padre Luis is still the same.

The little boat of a Sailor is going to be married to Taffaros Widow, it would be better for him to stuff his backbone in his back-side.

The old Sergeant is going to die, and Coopers wife is with child one out of the woods, and another in, a fair exchange is no robbery.

Old Sorey is elected Alcalde.

River sailed on board of Danas Schooner for the Columbia river, but found out in Lat^o 40 north that there was no provisions on board, nor spare

sails, put back to this port and is about to have a law suit with Dana, who is now in Sta Barbara the vessel cannot go to Sta Barbara or they loose the Insurance upon the goods, and Dana cannot get her on ash of the river, and here they are doing nothing but being in Dr. Marianos new house, drinking Bordeaux, and smoking Segars,

Last month we had a Schooner here from Belgium to the Columbia for the purpose of getting provisions but brought no salt. they left this for San Fran. whether they have succeeded I know not, they brought an acct against Estudella to the amt of four thousand dollars, and another against Poot. for seven hundred for goods left in 1815 that I suppose is lost, they who've paid Dr. Mariano in goods to the amt. of three hundred and forty an acct owe him since that same date.

I have had two letters from Mrs. Hartwell she was then in good health and all the family I have wrote her three times to keep him if possible indebted to me one. I forwarded to her a Gargantilla that Mr. Clevecoff left for her, it has got so many San ~~George~~ Georges crosses & Duke of Yorks Stars, that I cannot mind a proper name for it neither in Scottish or English

The Ship Franklin is doing little good. every article on board is about one hundred p cent dearer than the Cause the super cargo is a complete Swindler, even to his own Countrymen.

You may expect you in all May with a suitable cargo for the coast then will have it in your power to do them as the Padres is getting completely tired of dealing with Bankers,

Milligan sends his true Compliments to you. He is always shaking away the same as us by. Some times will have three and our fitters in one day. Compliments to McCulloch -

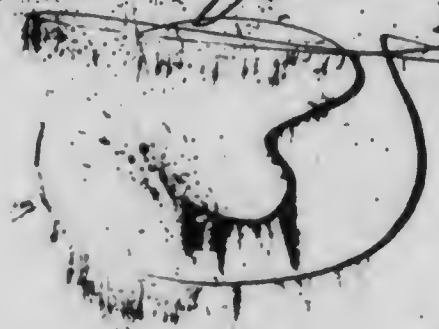

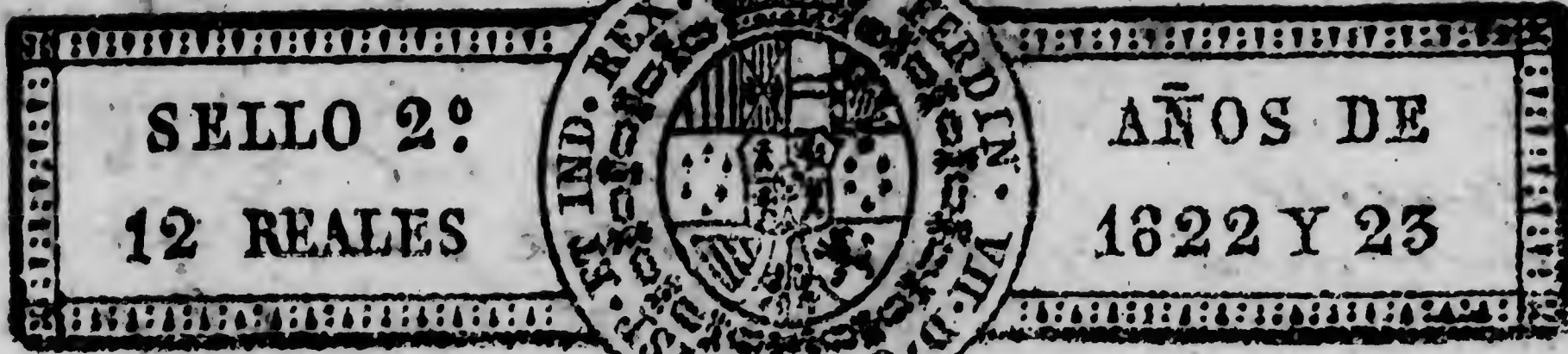

Your letter by Capt Rogers of the
Brig Andes was duly received, it was received
with a pleasing satisfaction as it assures me that
I am not forgotten by an old friend & Shipmate
I had almost given up the expectation of ever
receiving a line from you as you have never
acknowledged the receipt of any of the number
letters which I have written to you, you say
I am indebted to you, this was the first letter
I have received from you & I think some of the
many letters I have written you must have rea-
-ched you. However, I hope you will always keep
me indebted to you for a letter, but I will assure
you I will not remain indebted to you for any
more than one letter at a time, if there is any means
of conveying a letter to you ⁱⁿ return
you say you are married to a long Africa girl
I have heard from you & her from a very direct
source & had more particulars than you write. I
congratulate ~~on~~ you on your happy settlement in life
and am happy to hear you have so fine a woman for
a partner for life, I am sorry however that you
have not chose a better government to live under
for by your account of them. I think they are much
worse than Sandwich islanders, for my part I look
on the islanders with a more favourable eye than
I used to in former days, there are circumstances which
lead me to think more favourable than formerly, will
doubtless lead you to join me. one ~~the~~ ~~circumstances~~ is they
have paid me (this last winter) all the balance due for the
Brig Thaddeus concern & I have sent the principal part of it to Canton
and

And beside the old Thaddeus concern I have succeeded in
collecting a considerable amount for Bryant & Sturges
and in my own private concerns I have been more successful
than I have ever been heretofore, as I am now situated
I am not bound to any concern, but at liberty to
act for any concern who see fit to employ me
you no doubt hear often from me by persons from
the islands, some of the stories may be very favourable
other may be bad. you will do well to sum up the
two extremes and take the mean of the whole
you wish me to write you the news but I don't think
of any that will be interesting to you
your old friend Capt M^r Blanchard was here last fall
sold his Brig & is gone home ^{had} some talk about
you but nothing to your disadvantage (Putter was with him)
our old master Andrew was at home last account expecting
to loose his voyage in the Ship Octavia by the failure of
his owners Capt Peirce & Barker in the Volunteer and
Griffon sailed for the coast in February. I some expect
Barker will call in to Monterey next fall to see you
you want to know how your skins went to Canton that
were shipped in the Waverly last season. Dana no
doubt can best answer that question to you
by my former letters I wrote you all I knew of you connections
at home I have not received but few letters from any
at home except family letters. I received one a few days
since from my wife. She says my friends were all well
Capt Meek tells me the Russians have given you a correct
account of the things sold out of the Thaddeus at the sound
if you have not sent it home, you had better send it
by the first opportunity to Mr Charles Thacher our agent
he is a very fine man & knows very well what Blanchard
is, when I was at home I asked Mr Thacher a few questions
which Cost Capt B. 500 \$ to answer. (I did not bring any charges
against Capt B. I only asked a few questions). If you have any ^{news}

questions to put to Mr Thacher you must send them soon, for
the concern will be closed at home next season after that, it
will be too late to ask any questions.
I rec^d your letter for J. P. Sturges Canton, which you sent
by the Andes and shall have an opportunity to forward it
in a few days. by last accounts (say Jan'sst) from Canton
I hear Seal Skins were about two dollars, what you
brought I have not heard. last account, Sandal Wood
was well up, but by next account I shall expect to
hear the price much fallen as there has been a great
quantity sent down within the last few months.
The missionaries continue to go on about the same as
they did when you were on the spot to see them, they have
however more influence now than formerly, not however
as chiefs to govern the islands, but as missionaries.
they are much opposed by us residents, and many wrong stories
told about them, some of which you no doubt hear on the
Coast with some additions, but I find them, now the same
agreeable pleasant people we found them when in the Thaddeus.
Your old master Blanchard you know was the first to
exclaim against them & you know they had good reason to
to be dissatisfied with his hooking principle.
I was down to see them with Capt Rogers last night. & told
Mrs Brigham I had heard from you, that you had got
spleen & she appeared to be glad to hear from you
Mr Spear is no doubt dead, as he has never been heard from.
Mr Wood by last accounts, was sailing out of Philadelphia
Conant is here poor fellow in bad order & his own fault
March 30th J. P. Capt Rogers remains at the
islands longer than I expected, which enables me to
to give you a later date tho but little additional news.
The ship Parthian Capt Blinn arrived here yesterday 147
days from Boston with a reinforcement of 4 missionaries
with their wives, a doctor & a printer with their wives and
four single ladies, & lots of house framing lumber &c. I have
seen only one of the gentlemen, & none of the ladies. I have
received a few letters from some of my employers, which

which afford me some pleasing satisfactions as they assure
me I have given satisfaction to them

I have not as yet got any of my family letter, but
I expect I have a number in the ^{young} Partisan. Hammatt, that came out with us in the Thaddeus, has
sailed from Boston master of a Brig for the Brazils

I thank you for your promise of sending me a horse
by Dana (or the waverly) dont forget to write me the
news when you send the horse. I think I shall
I did get a letter from Dana or Temple. I want to
hear from them. I wish you to give them my
aroha, and aroha to your good wife for me

I do not expect you will ever see me at Monterey,
but I hope you again either here or at home
as you are so much dissatisfied with the people
among whom you reside, why ~~not~~ pick up your

property take your dear wife move to some place
where you can expect to have justice done you in
your dealings with your neighbours, and where

would you find a place better or a better government
than you will find in the vicinity of Boston

for my part when I make a move from here
it will be for old Charlestown but I do not much ex-
pect I shall start in less than a year from next fall

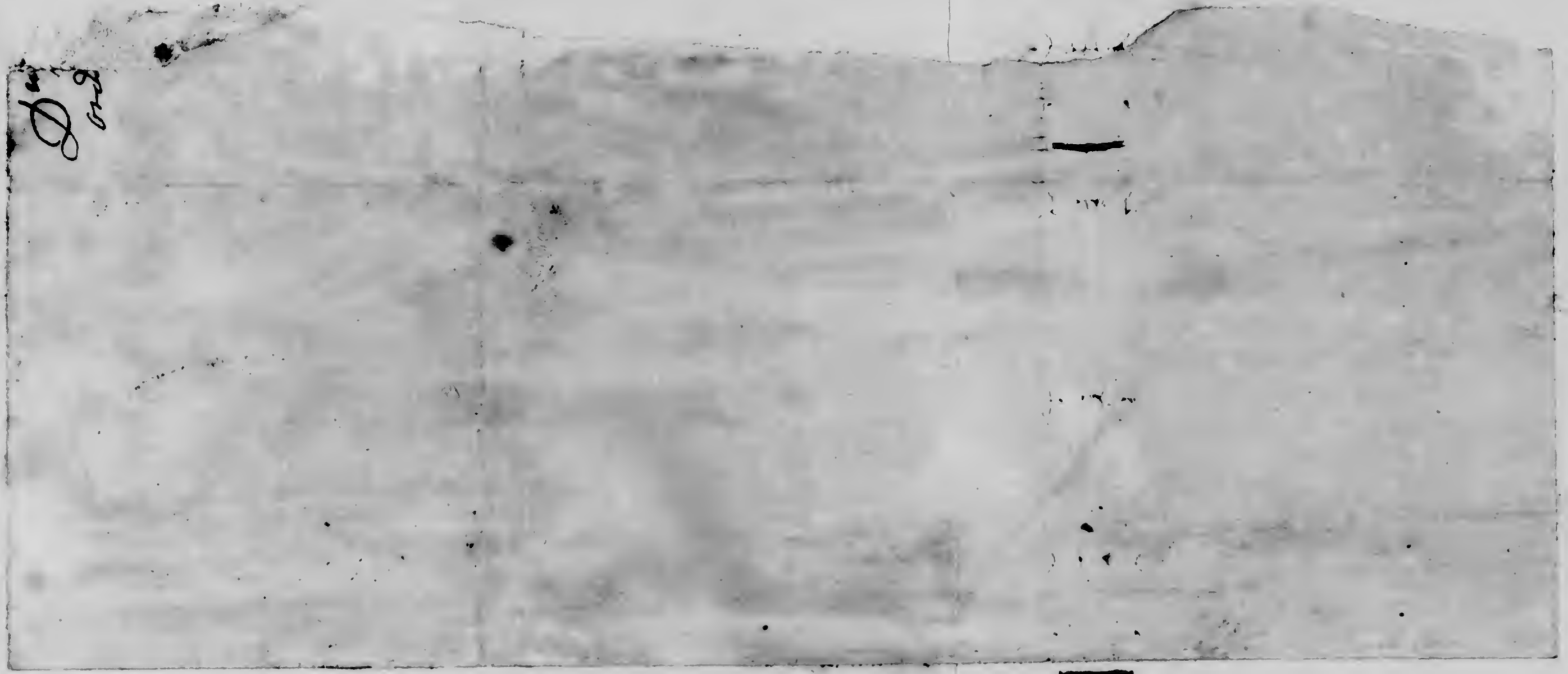

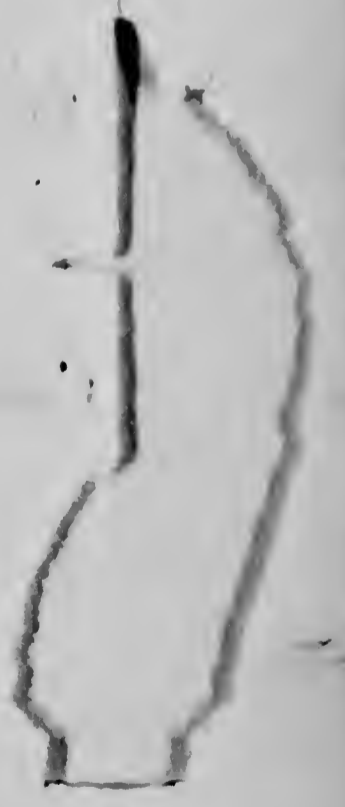

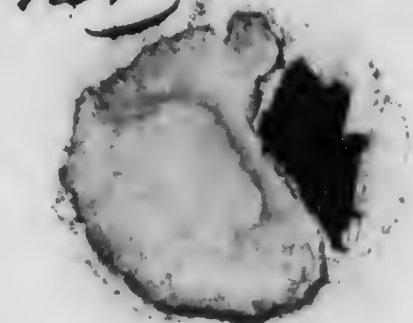
I presume you will not be against hearing from me. I understand you complain of being slighted by your friends, but you must recollect that we did not know where to direct to you, or I would willingly have wrote, but you know where to find us, however we must look over all those things, and begin with telling you how we all are, Mr & Mrs Mahy are well, they have buried 2 children since you left and have now 4 Sons and 1 Daughter, James is likewise married, he has a very careful wife and is doing well he is capt. of a brig he trades from here up the straits of Gibraltar, he was taken one voyage by the Greek pirates, plundered of every thing, and nearly strangled him besides we now expect him home handsly — in the next place I have to acquaint you that Lucy is married to a person by the name of Trask, he carries on cabinet business, she is very comfortably settled, I live with her — Sister Cooper is living in Dorchester, she keeps school, and Martha Dunn lives with her, and works at Mantua making, so I expect they rub along tolerably, its more to their satisfaction than living at the point, David Cooper has been sailing out of this port chief mate for some time but is now gone to South America with an intention of staying there, as he thinks it will be more advantageous
