In transplanting set about a foot apart, as if planted too thickly they are liable to mildew. Cutting away the flowers and seed pods will prolong



Alcachofa.

Artischocke.

One ounce will sow 100 ft. of row, and produce about 500 plants.

A deep, rich, sandy loam is best adapted for this plant. The seed should be sown thinly in drills 1½ inches deep and one foot apart. When large enough, transplant to permanent rows 3 feet apart, allowing two feet between the plants. They reach maturity the second year, and in the northern States should be protected in winter by a covering of leaves or coarse manure. A bed will continue in bearing for several years.

One ounce will sow 50 ft. of row, and produce about 1,200 plants.

Sow the seed as early in spring as the soil can be worked, in drills 12 to 14 inches apart, and when well started thin out to three inches apart. When one or two years old, transplant into permanent beds, thoroughly trenched, two feet or more in depth. Set the plants in rows two feet apart, and not less than 18 inches apart in the row. Care should be taken that the roots are well spread, and set at a depth of six inches below the level of the bed. Cover only two or three inches, and fill in gradually as the plants grow. Very little, if any, should be cut the first year after transplanting, but a fair crop can be cut the second year. Every fall after the tops have been cut down apply a dressing of coarse manure, and in the spring fork it in. An occasional top dressing of salt at the rate of one-half pound per square yard is also beneficial, and keeps down the weeds.

Golden Wax Bean

BEANS

Beans like a well-drained, rich and light loam, and should not be planted too early, as they are very sensitive to cold and wet. Plant about the middle of April when warm and favorable, and at intervals throughout the season for a succession until the latter part of August. Bush varieties should be planted in drills 2 feet apart, and from two to six plants to the foot in a row. Keep them well cultivated and draw the earth up to the stem.

For pole varieties drive stout poles 4 feet apart each way, leaving them from 6 to 8 feet high when set. Make a slightly raised hill about the base and plant 5 or 6 seeds, placing the eye downward when planting large flat varieties like the Limas.







Mushroom beds may be made in a warm, dry cellar, or in any building where the frost does not penetrate, and in the open air during the summer and fall months. Having procured the spawn, the next thing to be attended to is to make preparations for the beds. About a fortnight or three weeks before the beds are to be made, collect a quantity of fresh horse manure without the straw; place it in a heap under cover, and as it heats keep turning it over once or twice a week, until the fiery heat has become exhausted, which will require from ten to fourteen days' time. When the manure is in a condition to be made up, lay out your byd according to your requirements, say three feet wide, ten feet long, and from two to three feet deep; beat it well down with the back of the spade

as the process of building goes on. When the bed has been made some time, say a week or thereabouts, and the heat sufficiently declined to a temperature of 65 or 75 degrees, the spawn may be put into it. Break the spawn in pieces two inches square, and put them six inches apart, all over the bed, then cover the bed with two inches of rich soil, the stronger the better, but of a two menes of rien son, the stronger the better, but of a loamy quality, beating it down firmly with a spade. The soil used for this purpose should be in a pliable condition, and not too wet or over-dry. Cover the bed with a foot of dried straw or hay; examine once a week with a foot of dried straw or hay; examine once a week to see if the manure is not heated while in this condition; if so, it will destroy the spawn, and necessitate spawning a second time. If everything goes on well, you may expect Mushrooms in about five or six weeks. When the soil looks dry, give a gentle watering with tepid water, using a rose on the watering-pot. If the beds are made out-of-doors, protect them from rain by eovering them with shutters or sashes. Good crops of mushrooms can be obtained by spawning the hotheds in spring. They can also be raised in pots, boxes, or anything eapable of keeping the materials together, and placed in a cellar, closet or greenhouse. We have on hand a choice lot of English and French spawn.





The Potato can be grown with varying success on soils of all kinds and in all conditions of fertility, but the soil best suited is a sandy loam. Manure is applied either in rows or hills, or broadcast over the hills and plowed in, the latter in most cases being preferable. The Aster's vigor and ease of culture are important factors of its popularity. A deep, rich, moist soil is best suited to Sweet Peas. They are usually grown in double rows, with a wire trellis or a row of brush between. For each double row make the drills about five inches deep, and nine or ten inches apart. Sow plentifully, covering about two inches deep, and by degrees, as the vines grow up, fill the trenches with soil. Spring sowings should be made just as early as the ground can be prepared; frost does not hurt the little seedlings. The earliest flowers are from seed sown in the fall, preferably in a dry situation, and four or five Inches deep, giving them level culture. As fertilizer, a liberal use of bone meal worked into the soil will give excellent results.





They succeed in any ordinary garden soll and will repay any care in cultivation bestowed on them. The ground should be liberally enriched and dng over to a depth of fifteen to eighteen inches. Plant in the open garden from April until June, setting the bulbs seven or eight luches spart and about four inches deep. By planting at intervals up to the first of July, bloom can be had all through the summer and fall. About the end of October, when the leaves begin to wither, the bulbs should be taken up, dried in the open air and stored in a dry place, free from frost, until planting time the next season.
