It further shows that the KAN-TOKU-EN plan was drawn up in the middle of 1941 and that this was in the main dependent upon the plans which the witness drew up in 1940. The witness further states that TOJO was in favor of attacking Soviet Russia at that time while she was being attacked from the west by Germany.

TOMINAGA, Kyoji Request by UMEZU, Yoshijiro Address: Believed to be POW of Soviet forces in Siberia. He was formerly a Lt. General in the Japanese Army. The facts to be proved by witness are the policies, utterances and actions of defendant UMEZU during the period in which he is charged by the indictment.
