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Got A Question On Food? Try Dial-A-Dietitian

You can phone a question about nutrition to that number between 9 and 5 Mondays through Fridays.

Within 48 hours you'll have an answer phoned back from a registered dietitian.

Dial-A-Dietitian is a community service cosponsored by the Genesee Valley Heart and the Genesee Dietetic Associations.

Half of the 100 members of the Genesee Dietetic Association have volunteered their time to answer the public's questions about the foods they eat.

Janet Sim, assistant professor of dietetics, in the Department of Food Administration and Tourist Industries Management at RIT is this year's chairperson. Her co-chairperson is Dr. Carol Whitlock, another member of the department. They took over from Ivan Town, an assistant professor in the same department at RIT.

The most common questions to Dial-A-Dietitian concern saturated fats, heart disease, weight reduction, vitamin supplements and health foods.

Some typical responses are:
On Vitamin E: "Despite claims that large doses of Vitamin E may benefit patients with heart disease, the weight of evidence appears to be strongly against the hypothesis. Dietitians tagree that self-medication with Vitamin E is not necessary."

On health foods: "These are usually expensive sources of the nutrients which can be obtained readily in foods available on the grocery shelf."

On food additives: "Assume that the food products available on the market are safe unless the federal government finds otherwise; its decisions are legally binding, and scientific advisory help is almost unlimited."

On vitamin supplements in general: "Nutrition authorities agree that normally we can get the required nutrients in the food we eat."

If a caller says he wants to lose weight, he's referred to his physician first. If he says his physician has put him on a restricted calorie diet, the dietitian receiving the call will suggest menu plans.

A major function of the service seems to be to soothe people's fears, says Professor Sim. The nutritional advances of the past 50 years have confused the public, she says, because the lay person can't keep up with the latest information.

Sometimes the calls solve immediate practical problems. One woman, for instance, wanted a recipe for cranberry sauce she could serve to a diabetic Thanksgiving guest. The service provided it. After Thanksgiving she called back her thanks--and said she'd received many compliments on the sauce.

Most callers are grateful, says Professor Sim. The only major problems she's encountered is that many people expect an immediate response.

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Environment Gets New Boost From RIT Task Force

The environment has a new defender. Called the RIT/Community Task Force on Environmental Improvement, the organization is the result of a proposal made to RIT in 1972 by concerned business people in the Genesee-Finger Lakes area.

The task force office was formally established this fall under the direction of RIT Provost Dr. Todd H. Bullard, and Dr. Robert Desmond, professor in the College of Engineering. Task force activities will be coordinated by William C. Larsen, who has been appointed executive director.

Noted in the original proposal for creation of a task force was the need for a continuing exchange of environmental plans and ideas among individuals, governmental and private agencies, business groups, and educational institutions.

"We don't want to duplicate efforts already underway," explains William Larsen, "we hope we can add something."

Larsen is owner of William C. Larsen, Consulting Civil and Sanitary Engineers, and adjunct professor at RIT. Known locally for his interest in environmental projects, he had completed drainage programs for both the towns of Odgen and Greece. His proposals for the Honeoye Lake Watershed won state and national awards from the Consulting Engineers Council in 1972.

The first project of the new RIT/Community Task Force will be a Saturday morning forum for county and town environmental management councils and conservation boards to be held in January. The seminar will focus attention on common problems and individual successes in the preservation of the environment.


"We hope discussions of problems and a sharing of expertise will accomplish some measure of positive environmental improvement," says Larsen.
