Officials Confer Over Plan To Permit This City to Connect With Outfall

Harmony was the keynote of the conference between represen-tatives of Glendale and Los Angeles, which met at the Los Angeles city hall for the purpose of discussing Glendale's sewer prob-

Mayor Spencer Robinson, wh acted as spokesman for the local delegation, explained the urgent necessity of Glendale finding some permanent method of disposal of its sewage.

A written proposition was sub-A written proposition was submitted to the Los Angeles City Council. This suggested that city of Glendale should defray the cost of a forty-eight inch trunk line from the southern city limits to a connection with the outfall sewer main at Sixth and

For the privilege of permitting the Atwater tract and communities in the San Fernando valley to connect with this main line, Los Angeles would not be expected to charge Glendale anything for the privilege of connecting with the outfall sewer.




