CARL GREY AND PARTY IN WEST. VISITED TOWNS IN CROW'S NESS PASS. Turbine Steamer Floated—Montreal Produce Dealer Beaten Into Insensibility.

Coleman, N. W. T., Sept. 12.—Their Excellencies Earl Grey and Countess Grey, their daughter, Lady Evelyn Grey and suite, toured the Crow's Ness Pass today. They journeyed over the Crow's Ness Pass line of the C. P. R. as far west as Crow's Ness, the summit of the main range of the Canadian Rockies, and returning stopped at Coleman, Blairmore and Frank, where receptions were tendered them.

Montreal, Sept. 12.—A coal barge belonging to the Ogdensburg Coal & Torining Company carried away the Canada Atlantic railway bridge over the Soulanges canal, near Coteau, this morning. The canal will be blocked for some days, causing immense damage to shipping via that waterway.

Montreal, Sept. 12.—The Allan turbine steamer, Victoria, which was grounded in the channel near Three Rivers on Friday, September 1st, was floated at 8 o'clock this morning and left for Quebec at noon.

Montreal, Sept. 12.—James Hamilton, one of the local produce dealers, was alone in the office of his warehouse today when two men entered and, pointing a revolver at his face, bent him into insensibility. When he came to an hour later Hamilton found that he had been locked in his refrigerator. With the aid of a small saw which happened to be in the refrigerator he managed to make his way out and summoned assistance. He was badly cut about the face and hands. Half a dozen stitches were required. The robbers secured about \$75.

BAND OF TARTARS ANNihilated at Baku. Refused to Surrender and Every Man Was Killed By Artillery—Prince Assassinated.

Tills, Sept. 12.—Prince Taitanoff, a landed proprietor, was assassinated today at Gori, fifty miles from Tills. The following incident showing the desperate spirit displayed by the Tartars, is reported from Baku: A band of Tartars hurried themselves in from the windows on a patrol officer, who summoned them to surrender. The Tartars replied to the summons with another volley and continued firing while artillery was brought up. The artillery laid the house in ruins. The Tartars perished to a man.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 12.—The latest address from Baku regarding the fighting continues in the outskirts of the Blacktown quarter, and that the rioters are committing acts of incendiarism and plunder at Balakhan. Many factories in the Volga provinces have already been closed owing to lack of fuel. The workmen there are excited and disorders there are anticipated. A dispatch to the Caucasus Oil Company from Baku says that the fires in the oil fields are practically exhausted and that the military authorities are stationing guards in the district.

THE JAPANESE MINISTERS. Emperor Advises Them to Remain in Office.

Tokio, Sept. 12.—Some American press comments considering the burning of churches as an insult to foreigners and an outburst of anti-foreign sentiment have been received here with profound regret and surprise. An Associated Press representative was interviewed on this subject and stated that the investigation of the burning of churches and the burning of the American consulate is one of the most serious matters.

FAVORABLE WEATHER. Peary Would Probably Be Able to Winter at Floeberg Beach.

New York, Sept. 12.—Dr. Frederick Schott, of Washington, surgeon of the Peary auxiliary steamer Erik, is here on his way home. He brings news of Commander Peary, nearly a week later than the explorer's telegram of August 10th at Etah, reporting his intention to cross Smith Sound, which was at that time covered with ice, from Littleton Island to Cape Isabella, and that he would make the attempt to establish a base at Cape Sabine.

YUKON'S RECEPTION TO THE MINISTER

HON. FRANK OLIVER GIVEN A BANQUET The Honored Guest Explains the Policy of the Government Respecting the North.

The Yukon World says that the banquet tendered Hon. Frank Oliver at Dawson on Wednesday, August 30th, was one of the greatest ever given in that city.

N. F. Hogan, K. C., in proposing the toast of the evening, said: "We have with us tonight the minister of the interior of the Dominion of Canada, and we have reason to congratulate ourselves that this is the first visit that a minister of the crown has paid to this territory."

Continuing, Mr. Hogan said: "One of the first acts of the minister in which the people of Yukon had to congratulate themselves was his appointment of the present commissioner."

During his reply Hon. Mr. Oliver said: "I am sure that it is the wish of the government, and my presence here is a pledge, that the administration of the affairs of the Yukon, so far as the Dominion government is concerned in those affairs, shall be for the welfare of the people of the Yukon and of the Dominion of Canada."

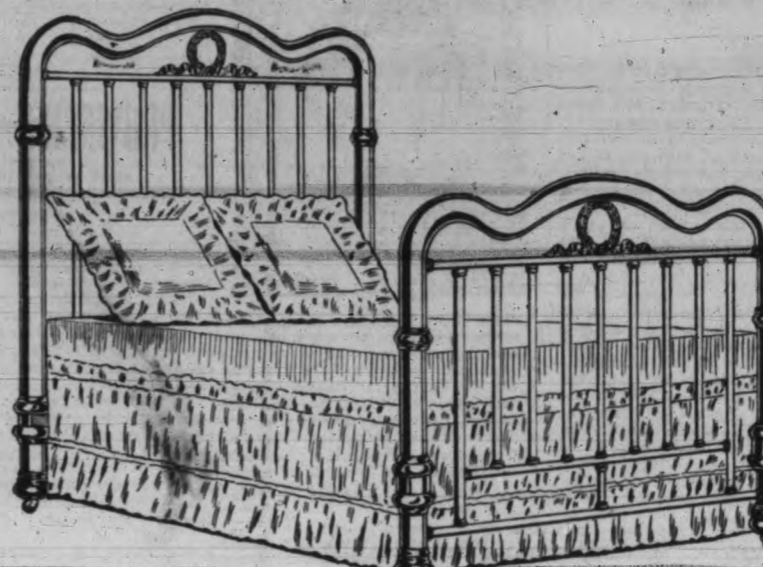
