# EFFICIENCY PAY

AMONG MEMBERS OF MILITIA YESTERDAY

Dr. Sohen reports that shortly after Peary's departure the ice broke and much open yeater was visible hetween Littleton Island and Cape Sabine; that twelve hours later, ascending the wountain immediately north of Etah, no sign of the Roosevelt could be seen at Payer barbor, at Sabine cipe or anywhere for the west or north, while two-drys after that, or on the 21st of August, the second officer of the Erik reported from the top of the mountain a similar condition of affairs.

OLDEST OF TIN MINES.

Deposits Found in Cornwall as Early as

An interesting description of the tin mines of Cornwall is given by J. C. Fuller, a mining engineer, who is thoroughly familiar with the deposits and is now in this country. These mines are among the oldest in the world. The Phoenicians as early as 500 B. C. had made their way to the southwest part of Britain and discovered tin deposits there, Although the mines have been worked almost continually since that time, there is no immediate sign of their giving out.

# YUKON'S RECEPTION

HON. FRANK OLIVER

GIVEN A BANQUET

The Honored Guest Explains the Policy of the Government Respecting the North.

The Yukon World says that the banquet tendered Hon. Frank Oliver at Dawson on Wednesday, August 30th, was one
of the greatest ever given in that city. "It
was, in the first place, an entirely representative gathering," says the World;
"not one of the Liberals or Conservatives,
but of the great body of Yukoners. It
was they who surrounded the festive
board, and who cheered to the echo
every word that the minister said that
had in it a foreboding of better times
for the Ynkon."

N. F. Hogel, K. C., in proposing the
toast of the guest of the evening, said:
"We have with us to-night the minister
of the interior of the Dominion of Canada, and we have reason to congratulate
ourselves that this is the first visit that
a minister of the erown has paid to this
territory. It is a matter of great congratulation to us no matter whether we
see sfrome party or the other, or of no
party at all—cheers)—because we are
receiving him as one people—the people
of the Yukon." (Cheers.)

Continuing, Mr. Hagel said: "One of
the first acts of the minister on which
the people of Yukon had to congratulate
themselves was his appointment of the
present commissioner. (Lond applanse.)
For the future prosperity of the Klondike
we had to look very materially to the
minister and to the commissioner, and he
was pleased to find in both the same directness of purpose, the same independence. (Lond cheers and shouts of "Billy's
all right.")

During his reply Hon, Mr. Oliver said:

During his reply Hon, Mr. Oliver said: "I am sure that it is the wish of the government, and my presence here is a pledge, that the administration of the affairs of the Yukon, so far as the Dominion-government is concerned in those affairs, shall be for the welfare of the people of the Yukon and of the Dominion of Canada. The government of this country necessarily has only one interest country necessarily has only one interest in carrying on the government of the country, and that is, the interest of the people of the Yukon, Whether it be in the Yukon or not, the prosperity of Canada is the prosperity of its various parts. And no one can say that this

Hongkong, Sept. 12.—Representative Chinese in discussing the anti-American boycott with Secretary Taft on September 5th suggested modification of the definition "labor," the exemption of business assistants and the validity of consular certificates to be accepted as final evidence of identification. COUNTRY LIFE BEHIND GLASS. Florists Imports Bits of Field and Forest For Window Displays.

In midsummer the New York florists keep their shop windows just as attractive as in spring. In one window, filled pany or bees and butterflies. Thudding of the black and yellow bees against the glass draws attention to the window that

has not already been won by country soom or light-laden butterfly wings.

Thoroughly pleasing is the window which has been converted into a garden of decided landscape pretensions. 
