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FALL CARE OF LAWNS

This summer has been a hard one on the lawn and we have a good crop of crab grass. The University of Minnesota in its bulletin "Making the Home Lawn" suggests the following treatment for the control of crab grass.

"Crab grass, especially, should be pulled to prevent spreading and forming a dense mat that will smother the permanent grasses. Where it has become very thick, use an iron-toothed rake to pull up the creeping branches so the mower will cut them. Then rake and cut in the opposite direction. What is left pull cut by hand. Above all, fertilize the grass well with sulphate of ammonia to crowd out this pest."

<u>Pandelions</u> and other tap-rocted weeds may be destroyed without disturbing the grass by jabbing the crown with an ice pick, dipped in sulphuric acid.

<u>Harly seeding</u> in the fall is recommended for the Chicago area, September 20th generally proving to be the latest planting date safe from winter-killing. Our weather is then favorable for the grass while most weeds lie dormant permitting the formation of a dense, weed-free sod.

The crop of grass seed this year is better than usual, resulting in lower prices for fall planting.

THE HARDY GARDEN

<u>PERENNIALS</u>: During the summeryou probably noticed some perennials that would look better in a different place in the border. It would be well to make a note of these and transplant them to their new locations in October.

Dividing and resetting the old clumps renews their vigor, as well as increasing your display. Leave several shoots or buds with each division and mix bone meal into the bed before resetting.

PEONIES. These superb flowers, so hardy and easy of culture should be in every garden. Planting in September to November saves a year's time, and the root system suffers less. A good rich soil is essential, using bone meal as a fertilizer. An important point to observe is that the crowns are covered with 2 inches of soil no more.

For either lawns or gardens, a mixed fertilizer is best for full plant development. We recommend LOMA 1# to 25 sq. ft.

For top-dressing the lawn to thicken the turf and brighten the color, we recommend

Organic fertilizers, more slowly available, may be mixed with the soil around bulbs or roots.
