Total number of Patients admitted since the establishment of the Hospital in 1802, 47,601.

The Committee have to report that, through 1866, the Hospital has maintained the character for unprecedented usefulness claimed for it in the four previous years. The number of patients admitted into the Hospital during 1866 was 3577. This number exceeded that admitted in 1865 by 222, and, with the one exception of 1864, when the number was greater by 33, is the largest admitted in any year since the foundation of the Hospital. The total number of patients, under treatment, in 1866 was never before equalled, exceeding that of even 1864 by 41. In the course of the past five years (1862-66) the number of patients admitted has amounted to 15,351, or to nearly one-half of the aggregate admisssions during the previous sixty years (32,250).

In 1865, the male patients exceeded the females by 41; but in 1866, the females were 87 in excess of the males.

The number of admissions was large in every month of the year. In March, it reached 379, a number almost equalling the total admissions for the year 1860 (391); in June, it fell to 238; but in December, it rose again to 341. The daily average number of patients in the Hospital for the entire year was 184, or about the same as that for 1864 (185), and considerably in excess of that for 1865 (178). The highest daily average for any one month was 262 in January; the lowest, was 129 in July. The largest number of patients ever in the Hospital at one time, was 289 on January 19th, 1866; the smallest number during 1866, was 107 onthe 4th of August.

Of the 3577 patients admitted during the past year, 2897 were suffering from true specific fevers, and 90 from cholera; while in 590, the febrile symptoms were the result of local disease. Of the specific fevers there were of

Concerning each kind of fever some more detailed statement may be made.

TYPHUS FEVER, or the fever whose prevalence is connected with overcrowding and destitution, is the disease on which the variations in the number of admissions into the Fever Hospital mainly depends. The small number of patients admitted in the years 1858-61, and the unprecedented numbers in the last five years, have been mainly due to the almost complete absence of typhus in the former case, and its great prevalence in the latter. In the year 1858, the number of patients admitted with typhus was only 15, and during seven months only one case was observed; but in the last five years the annual number has varied from 1319 to 2497. The typhus epidemic, which commenced in December, 1861, still continues; but it is satisfactory to add that the typhus admissions for 1866 are considerably less than in either of the two preceding years. The total number, (1735) in fact is less than that for 1864 (2497) by 762, while the number of typhus patients admitted in December, 1866, (140) was scarcely more than half the number admitted in December, 1864 (270). Throughout the epidemic, males (4622) and females (4717) have been admitted

with typhus in almost equal numbers; and in 1866, the females were only 95 in excess of the males. A large proportion of the typhus patients admitted, during the past year, had been out of employment and in a very destitute state, for a long time prior to their attack. The localities also from which they were mainly brought were the poorest and most densely-crowded. Thus, of the 36 districts into which London is divided, St. Pancras furnished 232 cases; Bethnal Green, 176; Whitechapel, 156; and St. Luke, 156. At the same time, the cases admitted into the Fever Hospital showed that in 1866 the epidemic was more generally distributed throughout the Metropolis than it was at its commencement.

Of the 1735 typhus patients admitted during 1866, the characteristic eruption was noted in 85.7 per cent.

The principal complications were as follows:

ENTERIC FEVER is the fever whose prevalence is more especially connected with bad drainage, and is characterised by a tendency to increase in autumn or in hot weather. It differs from typhus in being an endemic rather than an epidemic disease, but from this point of view it has had, during the last two years, a special interest. During the seventeen years, (1848-64) the total number of cases admitted was

3076; the average for each year being 181; the largest number in any one year being 252, and the smallest, with one exception, being 137. The exceptional year was 1860, in which only 94 cases were admitted. That year was remarkable for its cold and rainy summer and autumn, and the small number of patients with enteric fever in that year was accounted for by the absence of the ordinary autumnal But in the two last years (1865 and 1866) the admissions increase. for enteric fever have risen to 520 and 575, or to more than double the largest number admitted in any of the previous seventeen years. But a small proportion of this remarkable increase can be fairly referred to the increased accommodation arising from the extension of the Hospital, and there can be little doubt that the excessive prevalence of this disease in London is, in a great measure, to be ascribed to an exaggeration of the climatic conditions that habitually favour its development—to circumstances, in fact, the converse of what were noted in 1860. Up to July, 1865, there were not more than the usual number of cases of enteric fever in Hospital, but then, during several weeks of dry hot weather, they began to increase in frequency, and more and more were admitted as the summer In October, after six weeks' want of rain, and with a mean temperature through two of those weeks of 66½° Fahrenheit, the disease acquired a new power, so that 91 patients suffering from it were admitted, and in November, this number increased to 128. In the following winter and spring, although the number of cases was as usual materially diminished, (the admissions in April being only 26) the diminution, as might have been expected, was less marked than in previous years; and in August, 1866, after a period of very hot and dry weather in July, there was again a considerable increase. But, although the total admissions for enteric fever in 1866 exceeded those of 1865 by 55, the autumnal increase was less. Thus in 1865, 85 per cent. of the total number were admitted in the last six months of the year, but in 1866, only 57 per cent. From this it is fair to infer, that in 1867, unless there be a renewal of the unusual climatic conditions observed in the autumn of 1865, the number of cases of enteric fever will be much less than in the last two years. It is of some importance to note that the unprecedented increase of enteric fever, in the autumn of 1865, was coincident with the appearance of true Yellow Fever in

Britain, a disease which previously had been thought incapable of spreading except in tropical countries. The female patients admitted with enteric fever in 1866 were 23 in excess of the males; but taking the two last years together, the number of the two sexes was remarkably equal (450 males; 445 females). The skin eruption of enteric fever was present in 65.57 per cent. of the cases admitted, a smaller proportion than usual.

The principal complications and sequelæ observed in the cases of enteric fever were as follows:

The number of cases registered under the head of SIMPLE CONTINUED FEVER OF FEBRICULA was 282, (125 males and 157 females).

The number of cases of Scarlet Fever was less than in either of the two preceding years. It amounted to 240, (116 males and 124 females). Eight of the cases were complicated with pulmonary affections, 12 with maniacal delirium, 4 with dropsy, 3 with brawny swelling of the neck, and 1 with cancrum oris.

Six cases of Measles, 59 cases of Small-Pox, and 90 cases of Cholera, were admitted during the year. Of the Small-Pox cases,

45 were transferred to the Small-Pox Hospital, (as well as 3 other patients and 1 nurse who contracted Small-Pox in the Fever Hospital): of the remaining 14, 3 were too prostrate to bear the additional journey, and 11 could not be admitted into the Small-Pox Hospital for want of room.

Not one case of the disease known as RELAPSING FEVER has been admitted for upwards of twelve years, although in 1851 the admissions of this fever exceeded those of any other form of fever.

Of the total number of patients, 133 were domestic servants, or shopmen, for whom an admission fee was paid; 102 were admitted free, and 3342 by parish orders. Of the typhus patients, most were admitted by parish orders, and the proportion paid for was only 1·21 per cent. (21 in 1735) of the entire number; many of the paying cases also were nurses or patients who had contracted the disease in other hospitals. Of the cases of enteric fever, 6 per cent. (34 in 575) were paid for, a much smaller proportion than usual; and of the cases of scarlet fever 17·9 per cent. (43 in 240). Of the cases admitted free, 34 were typhus, 11 enteric fever, and 20 scarlet fever.

Of the total number of patients in the Hospital, after deducting the 45 cases transferred to the Small-Pox Hospital, 3,658 were under treatment until the termination of their illness, and of this number 658 died, or the rate of mortality was 17.98 per cent. But in comparing this result with that of former years, it is necessary to deduct 90 cases of cholera, of which 59 were fatal. When this is done, the rate of mortality falls to 16.55 per cent. Deducting further 64 other cases moribund on admission, death occurring within 24 hours, and 51 others, fatal within 48 hours of admission, the mortality among the patients fairly under treatment is only 14.01 per cent. These results are favourable as compared with those of most previous years.

Of 2627 cases of typhus, enteric fever, and febricula, ordinarily included under the common designation of "continued fever," or "typhus," 451 or 17·16 per cent. died. Deducting 39 cases moribund on admission, or dying within 24 hour, and 34 others fatal within 48 hours, the mortality was 14·8 per cent. In one only of the previous five years was the mortality less than this.

Of 1742 cases of typhus alone, 343 proved fatal, or 19.69 per cent. Among the male patients the mortality was 18.7 per cent.; among the females, 20.62 per cent. Deducting 38 cases dying within 24 hours, and 31 others dying within 48 hours of admission, the mortality was only 16.37 per cent. This mortality was slightly less than that of

typhus in 1865. Of the fatal cases, 182 were complicated with congestion of the lungs, bronchitis, &c.; 41, with diarrhea; 16, with convulsions; 10, with parotid bubo; 6, with erysipelas or pyæmia; while 1 died of scarlet fever and another of cholera, contracted in the hospital. But the circumstance which most influenced the rate of mortality was the age of the patients. The annexed table * of the typhus patients, admitted during 1866, shows what a large proportion of them were advanced in years, and also the influence of age on the mortality. Thus, of 215 patients between 10 and 15 years of age only 6 died, or 2.8 per cent.; and deducting one case in which the fatal event was due to cholera, the mortality was only 2.3 per cent.; whereas of 160 patients above 50 years of age, as many as 91, or 56.87 per cent. died.

Of 619 cases of enteric fever, 108 proved fatal, or the mortality was 17.44 per cent. Among the male patients (17.4 per cent.) the mortality was the same as among the females (17.48 per cent.). Deducting 1 case

fatal within 24 hours and 3 others fatal within 48 hours of admission, the mortality was 16.9 per cent. This mortality was slightly less than in either of the two years immediately preceding 1866. In 61 of the cases death was due to pulmonary complications, in 9 to hæmorrhage from the bowels, in only 2 to perforation, in 1 to peritonitis without perforation, in 1 to convulsions, in 3 to erysipelas, and in 1 to cancrum oris.

The mortality from scarlet fever was less than in any of the ten years preceding 1866, or only 10·24 per cent. (244 cases and 25 deaths.) Moreover, of the 25 fatal cases 6 died within 24 hours, and 1 other within 48 hours of admission. Deducting these 7 cases, the mortality is reduced to 7·59 per cent. Of the 25 fatal cases, 12 were examples of the disease in the most malignant form, 5 were complicated with pulmonary diseases, 3 with great brawny swelling of the neck, 2 with dropsy, and 1 with cancrum oris.

Of 14 cases of small-pox treated in the Hospital, 3 died within 24 hours of admission; the rest recovered.

Of the 90 cholera patients, 59 died, or 65.55 per cent. But of the 59 deaths, in one the patient was dead before reaching the Hospital; in 25, death occurred within 24 hours, and in 9 others within 48 hours of admission.

Lastly, of 577 cases which were not examples of true fever, 120 died, or 20.8 per cent. Deducting 16 cases fatal within 24 hours, and 16 others fatal within 48 hours of admission, the mortality was 16.2 per cent. The mortality in this class of patients is always high in the Fever Hospital, because it is only when acute cases of local disease assume a severe asthenic type that they are liable to be mistaken for "fever" and sent to the Hospital.

This great amount of contagious disease has of course not been treated with immunity to the attendants. During the year a resident medical officer, the engineer, 26 nurses, 1 scrubber, and 1 kitchen maid contracted typhus. In other words, out of about 112 persons engaged during the year in the management of the Hospital, 30 caught the fever, and of this number, 5, viz.: the resident medical officer and 4 nurses died. In deploring the loss of Dr. Wyber, the Committee

observe that of some thirty medical men, who have been from time to time in charge of the wards, they have not had the misfortune to lose any one from typhus during the past thirty-four years, though several have been attacked. The last previous death of a medical officer from typhus contracted in the Hospital, was that of Dr. Dill in 1832. The number of nurses attacked with typhus in 1866 has certainly been greater than what has been observed for some years, a fact attributable to more than ordinary changes in the nursing staff, no fewer than 56 new nurses having been engaged during the year. As it is very desirable to retain in the service of the Hospital a staff of nurses seasoned by an attack of fever, the Committee (and particularly one of their number, Mr. W. Robinson) have carefully inquired into the circumstances that seem to have led to these frequent changes, and by raising the scale of payment and in other ways ameliorating their condition, they hope that these changes will be less common in future. At the same time it is a source of some gratification to find that, contrary to what has been observed in other institutions, the mortality among the attendants attacked with typhus has been considerably below the ordinary average typhus mortality, a favourable result which is explained by the practice that has prevailed at the Hospital, for some years, of engaging young nurses in whom the disease is much less likely to be fatal than in persons more advanced in life. In addition to the attendants who were attacked with typhus, 5 out of 1,842 patients admitted with other diseases than typhus, took this fever. It is worth noting that all of these cases occurred in the first three months of the year, when the crowded state of the Hospital interrupted the ordinary classification of the patients, and that since the erection of the new wing, affording additional accommodation, no patient in the Hospital has contracted typhus. During the year also 1 nurse and 1 patient contracted scarlet fever, (the patient who was convalescing at the time from typhus, died); and 1 nurse and 2 patients contracted small-pox. It is no part of the functions of the Fever Hospital to treat small-pox; the practice is to transfer patients with this disorder at once to the Small-Pox Hospital; but during the past year, owing to the deficient accommodation in the latter Institution, no fewer than 11 cases have had to be retained in the Fever Hospital, where there is no suitable provision for their treatment, and many of

the cases that were ultimately transferred have had to wait for three, four, and even six days, until there was room in the Small-Pox Hospital for their reception.

Mischievous fallacies can hardly be too often refuted, and it is therefore worth while to insist again that a few casualties of this sort, in the Fever Hospital, constitute no reason for diffusing fever cases through the wards of general hospitals. The objections raised against Fever Hospitals are two, viz.:—1, that the concentration of the poison increases the mortality among the patients themselves; and 2, that the concentration of the poison increases the danger to the attendants. The validity of these objections may be tested by comparing the results of the London Fever Hospital with those of six of the principal general hospitals in the metropolis.

During the first six months of 1862, 1107 cases of true typhus were under treatment in the London Fever Hospital, of which number 232 died, or the mortality was 20.95 per cent. In the same period, 343 cases of typhus were under treatment in six of the general hospitals in London, mentioned below*; of which number 80 died, or 23.32 per cent. The 1080 (1107-27) cases admitted into the Fever Hospital communicated the disease to 27 persons, of whom 8 died. In other words, only 1 person took the fever for every 40 admitted, and only 1 died for every 135. But the 272 cases admitted into the six general hospitals communicated the disease to 71 persons, of whom 21 died; or 1 person caught the fever for every 3.8 cases admitted, and 1 life was lost for every 12.9 cases admitted. The experience of 1866 would be much more in favour of the Fever Hospital, notwithstanding the large number of nurses attacked. Thus the mortality in the past year, among the typhus patients, was only 19.69 per cent., although one-fourth of the entire deaths occurred within 48 hours of the patients' admission; while only 1 person took the fever for every 56 admitted, and only 1 life was lost for every 341 cases admitted.

It appears then that the objections raised against a Fever Hospital with thorough ventilation, however plausible in theory, are not justified by facts, and that a given number of typhus patients can be treated on the plan of isolation with equal advantage to themselves

and with far less danger to the attendants and other patients than in the wards of a general hospital. With perfect ventilation, there need be no more concentration of fever-poison in a fever ward than in a general ward with a sprinkling of fever cases, and in the former case there will be no danger of other patients contracting fever. It may fairly be asked, what would have been the effect if there had been no Fever Hospital in London, and if the 9339 cases of contagious typhus admitted into it during the last five years, had been distributed through the general hospitals, in addition to the few hundreds actually treated in them.

Cholera is a disease which rarely spreads to hospital attendants. There is reason to believe that the emanations from the sick only assume a virulent property at a certain stage of decomposition. in August, shortly after the admission of the first cholera patients, a nurse in the cholera ward was attacked with the disease and died; and on each of the two last days of August, and on the 1st of September, a patient, not in the cholera ward, was attacked: one of the three patients, a lad recovering from typhus, died. The cause of this outbreak was at once inquired into by the medical officers, and it was discovered that a drain into which the cholera evacuations were thrown, had become blocked up. This was cleared out on the 2nd of September, and a system of flushing commenced; the result was that from that date no fresh case occurred. But, what was not a little remarkable, within a short time of this outbreak, an interval not longer than the period of incubation of the disease, two nurses were attacked with enteric fever, a disease, so far as its causes are concerned, presenting many points of resemblance to cholera, and like it, rarely spreading in hospitals. No other case of enteric fever occurred in the Hospital, and the circumstance is the more remarkable from the fact, that during the last five years the cases of enteric fever, and the cases which have not been true fever at all, have been kept together in the same wards; that 1739 cases of the former, and 2123 of the latter, have thus been interspersed among one another; and yet that none of the patients, and before September, 1866, none of the nurses and attendants, in these wards, has contracted enteric fever.

The principal change in the medical staff of the Hospital has consisted in the retirement of Mr. Charles Squarey from the post of

Resident Medical Officer, and in the appointment of Dr. John Barbour as his successor. Dr. Alexander Collie was also appointed Assistant Medical Officer in the room of Dr. John Wyber, whose melancholy death from fever, contracted in the Hospital, has already been adverted to.

Such has been the medical history of the London Fever Hospital in 1866.

But the Committee of Management, although rightly considering the recovery of the sick as their primary object, have ever sought to employ what means were in their power for the prevention of contagious diseases. In the earlier period of the Hospital's history, when the importance of preventive measures was very little understood, when sanitary legislation was almost unknown, and no officers were charged with the execution of such laws as did exist, the Hospital authorities used to advise the public how to prevent contagion, and by its own servants undertook to cleanse and disinfect houses from which fever patients were brought; and although by the present sanitary organization of London, the direct function of the Hospital in preventing disease at its source is, in a great measure, superseded, the Committee still keeps this object in view. Some of the ways in which the Hospital continues to contribute to this important end may be briefly referred to:—

1. With the object of discouraging the practice of conveying persons suffering from infectious diseases about the metropolis in street cabs, the Committee, six years ago, provided an Ambulance, which has been maintained at the expense of the Hospital, and which has always been obtainable upon payment of the horse-hire. During the past year, the use of street cabs, for the purpose referred to, has been made illegal by Act of Parliament; and the Committee are therefore glad to be able to report that a second Ambulance has been presented to the Hospital by the Directors of "The Hospital Carriage Fund." The Committee have not only readily co-operated with the Directors of the said Fund, by sending the Ambulances to any part of London on proper application being made by telegraph or otherwise, but they have consented to the erection, on the grounds of the Hospital, of a shed to hold a carriage for the conveyance of Small-pox patients

from any part of the metropolis to the Small-pox Hospital. For several months the Small-pox, as well as the Fever, Ambulance, stationed at the Fever Hospital, has been in frequent use.

- 2. During the past year, on the outbreak of the epidemic of Cholera, application was made to the Committee by the parishes in the vicinity of the Hospital to admit cases of cholera. Although it was deemed inexpedient to admit cholera cases into the fever wards, and although the necessity of a medical officer being in almost constant attendance on cholera patients prevented such a duty being thrown on the Medical Staff of the Hospital, yet, as one wing of the Hospital was at the time unoccupied, the Committee at once placed it at the disposal of the parochial authorities of Islington, St. Luke's, and Clerkenwell, for the reception of cholera patients, under the superintendence of Dr. Jeaffreson. Ninety cases of cholera were admitted. It is not unreasonable to conclude that by this action the Hospital contributed to arrest the spread of the epidemic in the neighbourhood.
- 3. As pointed out in the Report of last year, the Hospital renders an important service to the sanitary organization of the metropolis by giving free access to the Registers of the Hospital to Officers of Health These registers—from which some particulars have been and others. abstracted for this Report—are, on the evidence of the Government Inspectors, "kept on a plan, and with a degree of detail that renders "them unusually instructive and interesting." Among other points, they record for each patient the house and parish from which he came, and the nature of his illness-information of great value to Sanitary Officers in tracing the places where measures of improvement are most urgently needed, and even indicating, to some extent, the nature of the sanitary defects that may be expected. For it is now certainly known that epidemic typhus fever depends mainly upon the huddling together of uncleanly people upon too limited an area, and in too confined rooms, and that where enteric fever exists, defects of drainage and polluted water are to be looked for. Some Officers of Health are at present in the habit of consulting the hospital records with much advantage; and the Committee invite all who are concerned in the local government of the metropolis to make free use of them. following Table will give some idea of the amount of valuable information to be obtained from them:-

- 4. The valuable statistical data, published in the Annual Report, have also assisted in no small degree the advance of sanitary science, and thus contributed, in an indirect manner, to arrest the progress of those diseases for the treatment and prevention of which the Fever Hospital exists. The facts contained in these Reports are constantly appealed to, and, in several instances, the plan of the Report has been adopted as a model by similar institutions throughout the country.
- 5. With the same object of arresting the progress of contagion, the Committee have not hesitated to extend the Hospital buildings whenever the emergencies of the present epidemic appeared to call for such The new wing, which was opened in January, 1864, enabled the Hospital to receive all applicants till the end of 1865. But early in 1866, the number of applicants became so great that the wards were too crowded, and the system of classification of diseases, which for some years had been in beneficial operation, was occasionally interrupted, so that the alternative presented itself of rejecting patients and sending them back to spread contagion in their homes, in workhouses, and through London indefinitely, or of making a fresh extension of the Hospital. Under these circumstances the Committee did not hesitate for a moment what course to pursue. To meet the more pressing emergencies, an iron shed, capable of holding 30 patients, well-warmed and well-ventilated, was erected and ready for use within ten days; and the foundations were at once laid for another permanent new wing for 60 patients, which has since been completed and is now in use. In consequence of these measures, the Committee are in a position to state, that during the last three years they have not turned from their doors a single applicant for admission. Had the 15,000 patients admitted into the Fever Hospital, during the last five years, remained at their own homes for treatment, they must have formed so many centres of infection, the disease must have acquired a greater power of diffusion into the better districts, and a multitude of homes would have been invaded that have now escaped the epidemic.

But this new extension of the Hospital, with ward furniture, beds, and bedding, has cost the Hospital upwards of £4,000., to meet which, in addition to the annual outlay of upwards of £10,000., it has been

necessary to sell out fully one-third of the small funded property of the Institution.

Under these circumstances, the Committee appeal with confidence for assistance to enable them to carry on the important functions of the Hospital. Regarding the amount of good that it confers upon all classes, both by the work it does, and the harm that it prevents, it has peculiar claims on the liberal support of the public. What the Hospital is most in want of is an increased number of annual subscribers. It will scarcely be credited that the annual subscriptions to an Institution, which is the source of so much public good, scarcely exceed £600., and that they are less in the year 1867 than they were in 1829, although an annual subscription of one guinea is the sole qualification for becoming a governor of the Hospital. The Committee feel confident that the best remedy for their impoverished resources is to make generally known, as they now do, the great benefits which the Hospital confers upon all classes of the community, upon the rich as well as upon the poor.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

- 1. All poor persons (not being parochial paupers) and domestic servants of subscribers, labouring under contagious fever, and residing in the metropolis or its neighbourhood, shall be considered proper objects for this charity, and shall be admitted gratuitously, according to the next regulation. Parochial paupers, domestic servants, and non-subscribers, and all inmates of other public charities (except medical hospitals), shall be admitted on the payment of such sum for each patient as the Committee shall from time to time determine.
- 2. On application for the admission of any patient to the hospital, notice shall be immediately given to the resident medical officer, and the person after inspection may be admitted by an order signed by him, or on a certificate signed by any physician, surgeon, or apothecary, stating the disease to be fever of a contagious nature, or likely to become such. The order or certificate shall entitle the patient to admission, subject to the provisions contained in Rule No. 1, unless the case shall be deemed an improper one by the resident medical officer, or unless the hospital shall be full.

GOVERNORS.

3. All subscribers of one guinea annually, or of ten guineas in one donation, shall be governors of this hospital.

GENERAL MEETING AND ELECTION OF THE COMMITTEE.

4. A general meeting of the governors, of which ten days' previous notice must be given in three morning newspapers, shall be held every year, on the second Friday in February, or as near thereto as may be convenient, for the purpose of approving or rescinding the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year; for receiving an annual report of the state of the funds; and for electing a president, vice-presidents, treasurer, honorary secretary, and other members of the Committee for the ensuing year. At all meetings connected with the affairs of the hospital, a simple majority of the governors

present and voting shall bind the minority; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have an additional vote or casting vote.

- 5. A special general meeting of the governors may at any time be called by direction of the president or of the Committee; or on the requisition of any twelve governors, provided the requisition be made in writing to the secretary, and the purpose for which the same is summoned be published in three morning newspapers at least ten days prior to the next meeting; but the proceedings of such special general meeting, though acted upon pro tempore, shall not be deemed final, until confirmed by another general meeting.
- 6. No new rule or law shall be made, nor shall any existing rule or law be repealed or altered, until determined upon at a general meeting by a majority of governors present and voting, and until confirmed at a subsequent general or special meeting.
- 7. The presence of seven governors shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at general meetings, and without that number no business shall be transacted.
- 8. At the annual general meeting, a Committee for the management of the Institution shall be elected, consisting of the president, the vice-presidents, the treasurer, honorary secretary, and twenty-four other governors; four of which governors shall not have been members of the preceding Committee. They shall meet on the last Friday, or on such other day of every month as the Committee may appoint; and three members shall be necessary to constitute a meeting, and to transact business. A special meeting of the Committee may be called by the direction of the treasurer, or by any three members of the Committee, on giving at least three days' notice of the same, and specifying the business for which it is called.
- 9. The Committee shall have authority to appoint sub-committees, whose reports shall be submitted to their consideration; they shall elect all the officers, except the physicians of the hospital and the honorary secretary, who shall be elected by the governors at large; and with the assistance of the medical officers, shall form regulations and by-laws for the internal management of the hospital.
- 10. The resolutions of one meeting of the Committee shall not be rescinded by another, unless it be specially summoned for that purpose. All accounts, except such small sums as may be comprised under the item of petty cash, shall be submitted to the Committee at the monthly meetings, after having been duly examined by the secretary, the resident medical officer, and the house-directors; and such accounts, if approved, shall be paid by cheques payable to order, signed in Committee by the chairman and one other member, or, in case a Committee cannot be formed, by two of the house-directors, and in all cases countersigned by the secretary. All the larger articles of supply,

when practicable, shall be furnished by contract made after public tender. No expenditure for repairs of premises or any machinery shall be incurred, without a written order from the Committee or house-directors.

- 11. The Committee shall yearly publish a report of the state of the hospital.
- 12. No person being a member of the Committee, shall furnish for profit any goods, provisions, or other articles for the use of, or on account of, the hospital, or be concerned in any contract for supplying the same, or be employed for hire, or wages, or profit, in any office or employment under the charity.

TREASURER.

13. The treasurer, if present, shall take the chair at all meetings of the Committee, in the absence of the president or vice-presidents. He shall keep an account at the bankers, and all moneys received for the use of the hospital shall be paid to such account, he shall honour all cheques signed, as provided in Rule 10; and the signature of the secretary shall be a sufficient warranty that the cheques purporting to be so signed are properly signed, and shall be an indemnity to the treasurer against risk.

AUDITORS.

14. Three gentlemen shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Committee in November, who shall audit the accounts of the Institution for the current year, and approve an abstract of all receipts and disbursements to be prepared by the secretary, and laid before the annual general meeting in February.

MONTHLY DIRECTORS.

- 15. The Committee shall, at each monthly meeting, appoint three members of their own body as Directors of the hospital, of whom two shall be a quorum, and who shall continue in office until the next monthly meeting of the Committee. The Trustees and the two senior physicians shall be ex officion Directors of the hospital, in addition to three members to be appointed at each monthly meeting, as provided by this rule.
- 16. They shall, from time to time, cause the beds, clothes, and apparel belonging to the hospital to be examined, and shall report thereon, if necessary, to the Committee. They shall inspect the tradesmen's bills, and take care that the provisions, bedding, clothing, furniture, and every article for the use of the hospital, be supplied on the most reasonable terms; they shall order in writing all permanent stores.
- 17. They shall be authorized in all respects to enforce the observance of the regulations of the hospital; they shall notice and report to the committee

any irregularity or misconduct on the part of the officers, servants, or patients of the charity, and shall, at every meeting of the Committee, cause a statement of the house expenditure to be produced for the preceding month. They shall appoint the porters, nurses, and other menial servants of the hospital, and dismiss them for misconduct.

PHYSICIANS.

- 18. There shall be two physicians, and two assistant-physicians, who shall be Fellows or Members, (formerly called Licentiates) of the Royal College of Physicians of London; and also a consulting surgeon, who shall be a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.
- 19. The physicians and assistant-physicians shall be elected by the governors at large; and no governor shall be qualified to vote, unless he shall have become a governor three months before a vacancy is declared.
- 20. One of the physicians shall visit the hospital at least once every day, and at such times as they may deem necessary. They shall have the power of dismissing any patient or convalescent for refractory conduct or disobedience of orders.

ASSISTANT-PHYSICIANS.

21. In case of the illness or necessary absence of either of the physicians, one of the assistant-physicians shall attend regularly in his stead. Such attendances are to be reported to the Committee.

HOSPITAL PUPILS.

22. No medical student shall be permitted to visit the hospital unless in company with one of the physicians, and unless he is regularly entered or registered as a pupil.

RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER.

- 23. The resident medical officer shall reside constantly at the hospital, and shall devote himself entirely to the duties of his office; and previously to his election, he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials to the Committee.
- 24. He shall superintend the patients between the visits of the physicians, and the dispensary shall be exclusively under his control. In the absence of the Committee and house-directors, he shall be recognised as the head of the establishment.

- 25. Accurate registers of the patients admitted, as well as of the remedies employed for their recovery, shall be kept—which registers shall be the property of the hospital; he shall produce a special report every month, to be laid before the Committee.
- 26. When the number of patients shall be great, a medical assistant shall be appointed by the House Directors, subject to the confirmation of the Committee, and he shall receive such remuneration as the Committee shall from time to time determine.

HONORARY SECRETARY,

27. There shall be an honorary secretary, who shall also be a member of the Committee, and chosen annually with them. He shall be at liberty to attend all deputations to public bodies and private persons. He shall communicate with persons concerning the affairs of the hospital during the intervals between the monthly meetings of the Committee, and shall report to the Committee, at their next meeting, all special or important events that shall have occurred within his knowledge during the month. He shall also assist the treasurer in the discharge of his duties when necessary.

SECRETARY AND HOUSE STEWARD.

28. The duties of this officer shall be to reside in the hospital, if required by the Committee, and—in the absence of the House Directors—to have the management of the domestic affairs of the hospital, under the general superintendence of the resident medical officer. He shall be required to enter into a bond, with sufficient sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties. He shall also perform the several duties specified in the by-laws.

MATRON.

29. The duties of the matron shall principally relate to the wards, the kitchen, and the laundry. She shall exercise a strict superintendence over the nurses; shall have the charge of linen, bedding, glass, crockery, and ordinary kitchen and scullery stores, subject to the general supervision of the house steward; and shall visit every ward of the hospital at least three times in the day. She shall also perform the several duties specified in the by-laws.

COLLECTOR.

30. The duties of this officer shall be—

To call on subscribers and collect all donations and subscriptions of the hospital; to give only authorized printed receipts for the same; to attend all meetings, when required; to keep correct lists and duplicate lists of all donations and subscriptions, with the residences of the donors and subscribers made up from

day to day; to pay weekly all moneys he may receive to the bankers; to deliver weekly to the secretary reports in writing of all moneys received and paid, with the balance at the bankers; to keep the accounts regularly entered in the collector's cash book; to deliver a copy of the annual report to each subscriber; and to give such security, with sureties, for the due and faithful performance of his duties, as may be required.

NURSES.

- 31. The head nurse in each ward shall attend principally to the patients; and to the keeping of the wards clean and quiet.
- 32. The under-nurses shall be under the direction of the head-nurses, and shall perform the more menial offices of the hospital.

PORTER AND ENGINEER.

33. The porter and the engineer shall be employed as the Committee or directors may think proper. They shall not absent themselves without the permission of the house-directors or resident medical officer.

TRUSTEES.

- 34. The legal estate in the lands, buildings, and premises of the hospital shall be vested in three trustees; new trustees being appointed when vacancies occur, at a general meeting of the governors.
- 35. All legacies of £100. and upwards, unless otherwise directed by the testators, shall be invested for the benefit of the hospital, in the names of the three trustees.
- 36. No variation in the usual gratuities and fixed salaries shall be made, unless the Committee be specially summoned for the purpose, and unless the proposed addition, or diminution, be confirmed by a subsequent Committee.

BY-LAWS.

37. The by-laws which shall from time to time be made by the Committee shall be open to the inspection of any subscriber, and shall contain, among other things, a full specification of the duties of the resident medical officer, the matron, and other officers of the Institution, with the practices usually adopted for their election; which specification shall be read out to every individual before his appointment, and referred to on all occasions of doubt.
